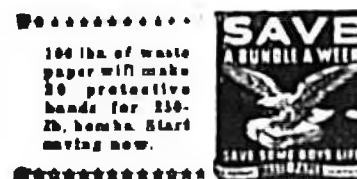

4 Leaders Of Varied Views Back Charter

Green, Phil Murray, Dulles, And Norman Thomas All Agree On Speedy Adoption

WASHINGTON, July 13. (AP)—Four leaders of different political views declared today the Senate ought to ratify the United Nations Charter speedily to establish American responsibility in international peace keeping.

President William Green of the AFL; John Foster Dulles, foreign affairs advisor to Gov. Dewey in the 1944 presidential campaign; Norman Thomas, former socialist candidate for president and Philip Murray, CIO president, all endorsed the charter.

In the House the OWI won a financial fight as the motion to hold its current year fund to 18 million dollars was beaten down decisively. A standing vote upheld the Senate-House compromise giving the OWI 35 million dollars.

Also in Washington, Col. Oreta Culp Hobby returned to civilian life today after retiring as head of the WACs to return "to my family and business." Her successor is Col. Westray Boyce.

British Bombard Nicobar Islands, Block To Sumatra

LALCETTA, July 13. (AP)—British Fleet units have bombarded strategic Nicobar Islands while carrier planes attacked airfields in Northwest Sumatra. Southeast Asia command headquarters announced tonight in a special communique.

British minesweepers swept the approaches to Malacca Strait, which lies between Sumatra and Singapore, on July 5 to 11 without sighting a Japanese vessel.

The British announced today that history's most catastrophic war had cost empire fighting forces a total of 1,427,634 casualties—something more than a third of those suffered in the first World War.

A total of 523,233 were killed, died of wounds, or are missing and presumed killed in the British Commonwealth and Empire forces up to May 31—a period of nearly six years included in this total are 40,500 men, men and children killed in Britain.

Deaths or wound caused by air raids and flying bombs cost the British civilians 147,760 casualties. Of these, 16,359 were children under 16. A total of 837 bodies never have been identified.

The United Kingdom suffered the bulk of the casualties in the armed forces, losing 200,614 killed or missing. This total, however, includes some forces from overseas, especially from Newfoundland and southern Rhodesia.

County Goes Over Top In 7th War Loan

Exceeds Overall Quota By Over \$600,000 Winning Praise For Great Achievement

Semnole County, small in size but big in public spirit and patriotic zeal, has gone over the top again in the 7th War Loan drive, exceeding its E-Bond quota by nearly \$100,000 and its overall quota by well over \$600,000—a remarkable achievement, according to Ralph Bagwell, secretary of the Florida War Finance Committee.

Final bond figures as revealed by a telegram to the Semnole County War Finance Committee from Mr. Bagwell are as follows: "Semnole County, final Seventh War Loan, sold \$415,244 in E-Bonds. Total of all issues sold was \$1,555,998—a remarkable accomplishment. Please express the Treasurer's deep appreciation for this great accomplishment."

Semnole County's quota for the drive has been set at \$323,000 in E-Bonds and \$875,000 overall quota.

COLD CITRUS CONCENTRATE HOLDS PROMISE FOR FUTURE
 Florida citrus growers are holding the cold concentration process developed by Dr. A. L. Stahl of the University of Florida Agricultural Experiment Station as an important market outlet for the future. (1) First step in the process, squeeze the juice. (2) Dr. Stahl watches the quickly frozen juice come out in flakes on form. (3) Mrs. Oham Hamilton applies the brake to the big centrifuge, which has whirled the concentrated juice away from the frozen water. (4) Miss Minnie Reta Garris packages the cold concentrate while Mrs. Hamilton seals the packages for cold storage. (5) Dr. Stahl shows from right to left, the fresh fruit, the juice which had been extracted from that quantity, the water removed from the juice, and the concentrated juice.

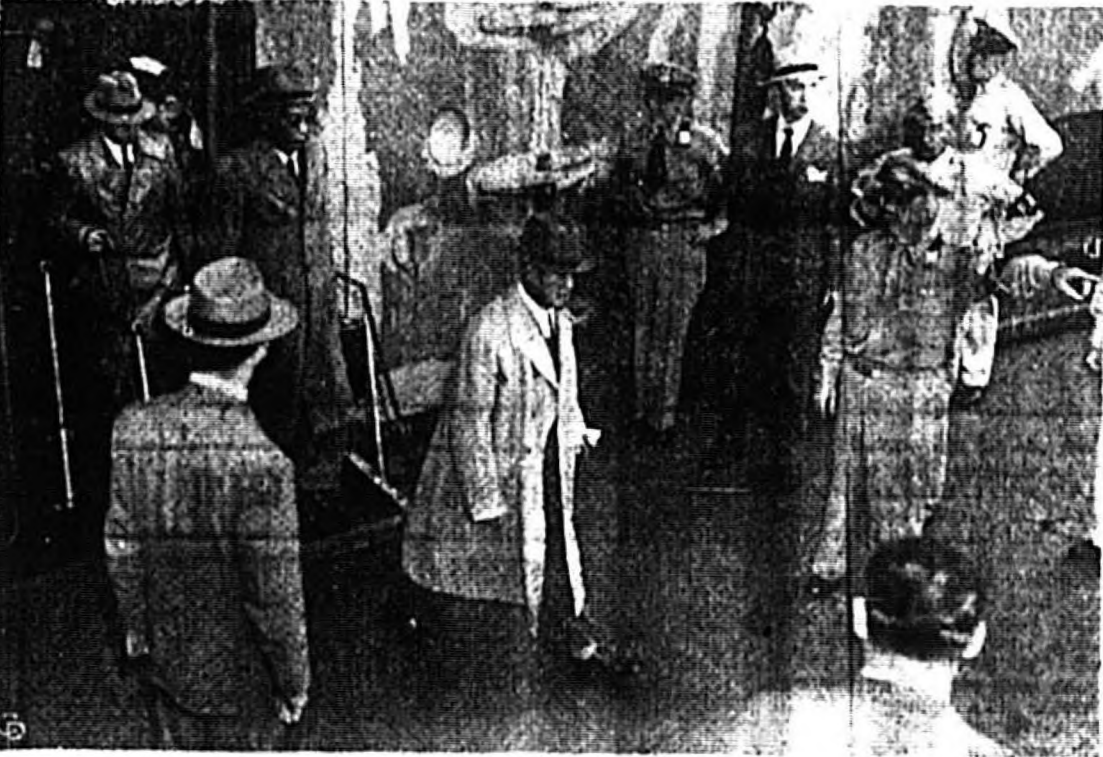

If these conditions would just even each other up, all might end well. But they don't. Where folks need dry weather they aren't getting it, and where they need rain they aren't getting that, either.

It isn't that weather is really worse in war time—it's just that we need good weather more. But there doesn't seem to be much anyone can do about it.

The war is striking harder and harder upon Japanese territory. Now it is said that Sakhalin has been shelled.

Sakhalin is a long narrow island about the size of West Virginia. Its ownership is a bone of contention between Russia and Japan. The Japanese have a long history of interest in this island...

But for Sakhalin to be shelled is one more reminder of how close the war has moved to Japan since those seemingly far-off days of two and three years ago, when we struggled to push her armies back from the Mid Pacific.

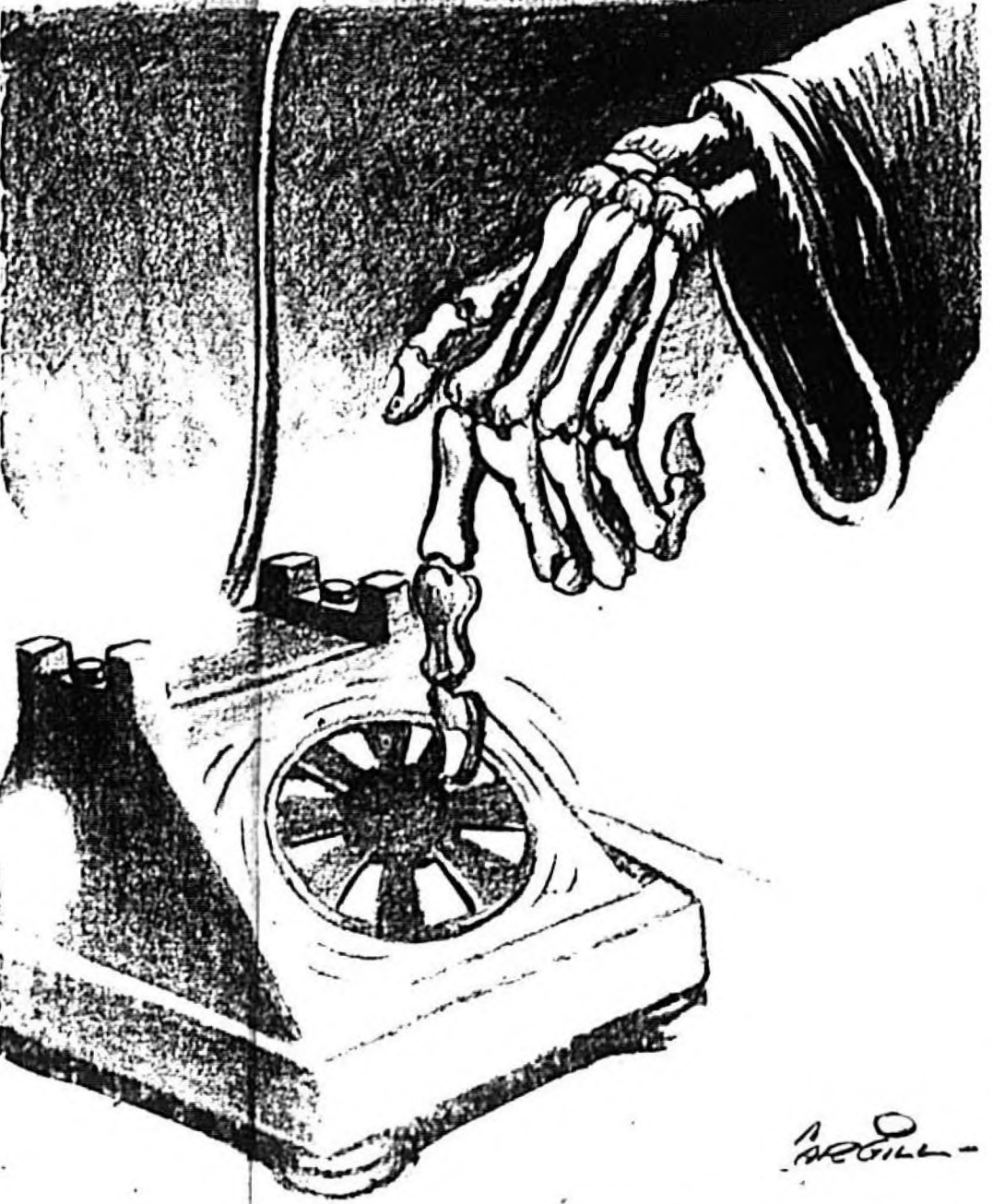

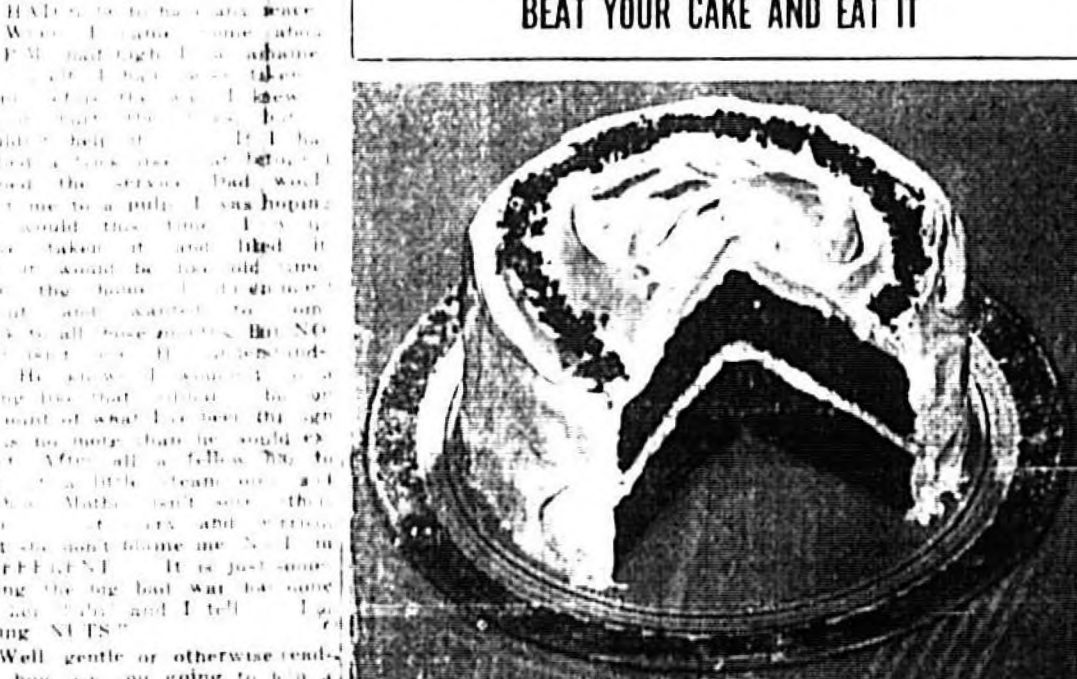
All those months of mud and blood, bitter fighting and setbacks were behind him. He had done his part. The thing that had sustained him and kept him going was the thought of home.

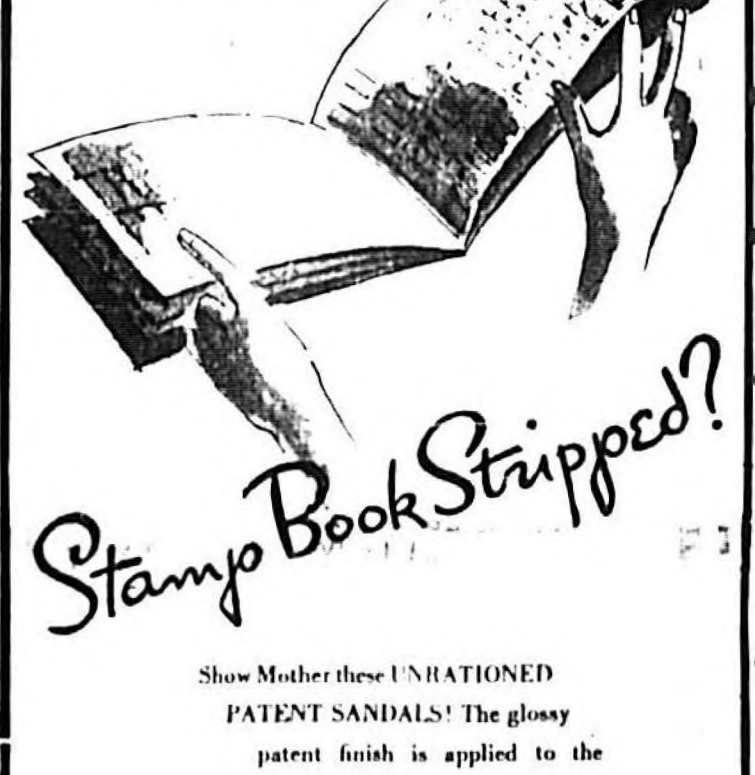

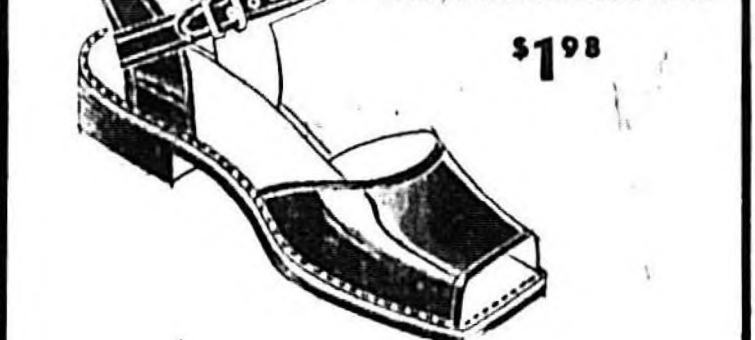

"Courtesy Week" Will Be Observed All Over Florida

JACKSONVILLE, July 13. — "Florida's 'Courtesy Week' starting Sunday, July 15, will be observed in practically every section of the state," Harold Cole, executive vice president of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce said today.

"Chambers of Commerce, newspapers, radio stations and individual business-enterprises have assured us of full cooperation in making this week an outstanding event," he said. The need for a forceful reminder of the value of courtesy seems to be generally recognized, and the only objection

we have received so far is that a week is not long enough considering the importance courtesy plays in our daily business and social lives.

"However, it is not our intention that this should be emphasized for only a week and then forgotten, but rather that it may be revived during this week so efficiently that it will become a daily habit. We feel certain that when clerks, customers, operators, business men, and the public discover how pleasant life is when courtesy, traditional in the South, again becomes a common custom, they will not relapse into the 'don't you know there is a war on' attitude.

"It is pretty difficult to snarl and smile at the same time," he asserted, "and if we can get people to smiling, the snarling period will become a matter of historic past."

Penicillin For Use On Livestock Has Varied Limitations

TALLAHASSEE, July 11. (Special) News that penicillin, the "wonder drug", has now been released for treating livestock as well as human diseases, brought a word of caution to stock producers today from livestock health authorities.

"Penicillin has very definite limitations and there is danger that many livestock owners will be carried away by all the publicity it has received and endanger the recovery of sick animals by not knowing these limitations," says an announcement released here today by officials of the American Foundation for Animal

Health. "Like the sulfa drugs, this new drug is effective against some types of disease-producing germs, but wholly useless against others. For this reason, a veterinarian should check any sick animals before penicillin is prescribed. The technique of penicillin administration is also complicated—it must be given by hypodermic into the vein, or deep into the muscles, and the dosage must be repeated at stated intervals if the drug is to have the full effect through the blood stream."

Foundation authorities pointed out that penicillin is of no value against virus diseases such as hog cholera and sleeping sickness, and that many of its other uses are still subject to further research. They suggested caution in expecting the impossible of it, and care to see that it is used in the right manner.

Army Needs 1600 More Dogs To Aid Combat Soldiers

ATLANTA, Ga. July 13. — Dogs trained as scouts, save American soldiers' lives and the Army is in need of 1,600 more to join the "K-9 Corps". Headquarters, Fourth Service Command announced today in stressing the fact that no patrol of U.S. soldiers accompanied by a scout dog has ever been ambushed by the Japs or fired upon first.

Eleven scout dogs have earned the highest honor possible to a military animal in the form of citation certificates issued to their donors by Lt. Gen. Edmund H. Gregory, Quartermaster General under whose direction the dogs are trained for Army service of enemies, alerting the American patrols and saving human lives. Scout dogs have been known to detect an enemy at a distance of 500 yards.

Dogs are trained by the Quartermaster Corps at Fort Robinson, Neb. and when their service with the Army is finished, they are "de-militarized" by special training and again become the docile, obedient pet of the owner and are returned home at government expense. 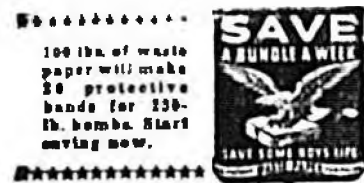

Churchill And Truman Await Stalin Arrival

Full Scale Opening Of Big Three Conference Seems Delayed 'Til Tuesday

(By Associated Press)
President Truman in addition to talking with Churchill, the wrecked heart of Berlin. He saw Hitler's ruined and looted chancellery, the battle-scarred Reichstag and wreckage of the Tiergarten. Outside the chancellery the President shook his head at the destruction and told reporters: "It is a terrible thing, but they brought it on themselves." Later while presenting citation to Company E of the 17th Armored Engineer Battalion he said: "I am only sorry that I didn't get a chance to participate in some phase of this war myself."

POTSDAM, July 16, (AP)—President Truman and Prime Minister Churchill with their ranking military and state advisors awaited momentarily the expected arrival today of Premier Stalin to start the Big Three conference at which the war with Japan appeared to be a leading issue.

Full scale opening of the conference seemed to have been delayed until perhaps tomorrow. Prime Minister Churchill met Mr. Truman for the first time since President Roosevelt's death in what was described simply as a courtesy call.

Tight secrecy prevailed as regards conference plans. Problems such as hunger, frontiers and rebuilding of Europe ravaged by war were high on the agenda. Plans roared in over the bomb-blasted capital in an almost continuous stream from about 2:30 P. M. on.

Col. Brabson Gives Talk On Far East At Rotary Meeting

High praise for the honesty and integrity of the Chinese people and their leader, Chiang Kai Shek, was today given by Col. James Brabson of the Orlando Air Base in a talk to the Rotary Club at the Hotel Mayfair. Prior to being sent to Orlando, Col. Brabson was stationed in China at the time of the Marco Polo incident when the Japs entered the country.

As to the Japs, Col. Brabson made some very witty and complimentary remarks which he requested be quoted. He refused to predict how long it would take to win the war, but pointed out that the latter need another Pacific port. He was introduced by H. B. Leisher, head of the meeting. Visitors were R. E. Reppard and W. L. Thorne of Orlando.

Solon To Seek End Of Peacetime Training

WASHINGTON, July 16, (AP)—Hour Republican leader Martin proposed today that before the United States adopts compulsory military service, the government seek an international agreement eliminating all such peacetime training. The Massachusetts representative made public the text of a resolution he will introduce tomorrow urging President Truman and others who will represent the United States on the compulsory military training.

Rationing Of Cars May End January 1946

Industry Seeks Permission To Undertake Grand Scale Expansion At Once

WASHINGTON, July 16, (AP)—The War Production Board, presiding the end of passenger car rationing in January, has considered an automobile industry request for permission to undertake full-scale plant expansion immediately.

Industry leaders, including WPA Coordinator of Automotive Reconstruction, told a meeting of the Automobile Industry Advisory Committee here that the "WPA would be willing to grant a few weeks" on the proposal for a multi-million dollar factory expansion. No priority will be granted, however, he said.

At a news conference after the meeting, WPA officials said that the industry's request for construction needed to build 2,000,000 cars a year. The proposed new steps—which Mr. Nelson acknowledged "must be undertaken sometime this summer" in the interest of peak postwar employment—would involve the building of new plants and branch factories adequate for 4,000,000 or more cars annually.
