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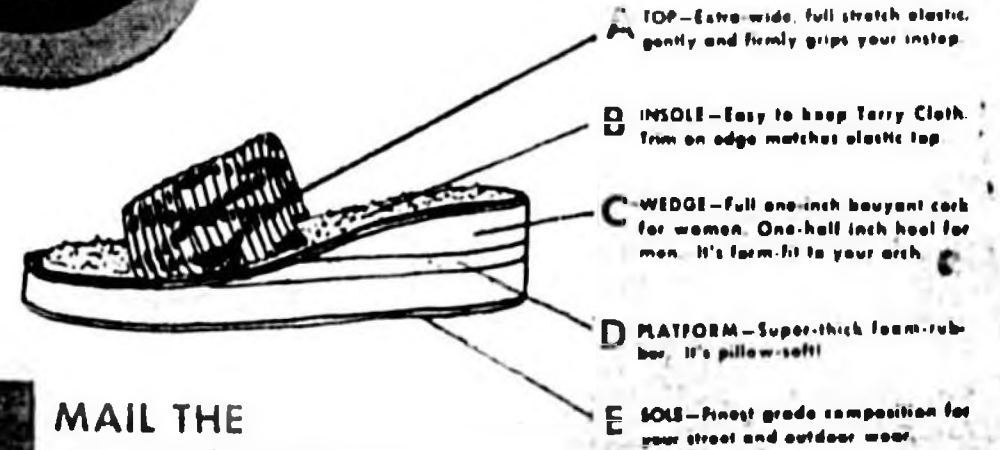

The Baltimore, Md., 43-year-old Baltimorean signed two copies of the extradition papers at a short hearing in the chambers of Baltimore County Circuit Court Judge J. Howard Murray.

Typhoon Is Fatal To 1,500

58 Americans Dead, Missing In N. Japan

TOKYO (AP)—An estimated 1,500 persons perished in a howling typhoon which struck northern Japan last night including nearly 1,000 who died when a huge 60-gauge ferry capsized. Fifty-eight Americans are dead or missing. Authorities said 290 bodies have been recovered, including those of 14 Americans. Another 943 are missing, among them 44 Americans.

The six-member committee and McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican, had testified before the Senate and one of its committees contemptuously. It said further that on another count, his alleged abuse of Priv. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker, "the senator from Wisconsin, Mr. McCarthy, should be censured."

My Dear, Did You See What She Was Wearing At The Football Game Here On Friday Night?

All of Sanford must have turned out for the Sanford football game Friday night at Memorial Stadium. A colorful array of new fall clothes really dressed up the bleachers on each side of the field.

A soft looking carpet of green, which only Old Mother Nature herself can weave, formed a pretty background for the evening's action. At each end of the field were the white goal posts entwined with crepe paper streamers of orange and black at the south end and blue and yellow at the north.

Long benches lined the sides of the field and seated on them were uniformed players dressed in out fits that furthered the color scheme of orange and black and blue and yellow.

The Sanford boys were clothed in black knee trousers with an orange stripe extending down the side from the waist to the knees. Their white jerseys featured a shoulder yoke of orange, and orange saddle numbers were sewed on the front and back.

Each player wore a headpiece consisting of a white metal helmet with an orange stripe going down the center. They wore white and orange socks and black leather high top boots that looked terribly uncomfortable with all those little nails coming out from the soles.

The opposition from Eastville wore the same type uniforms with the blue and white stripes on the blue. Their helmets were also white but featured a blue stripe down the center and they wore the same kind of old shoes.

On the opposite side of the field the Eastville band was seated in the bleachers in their white trousers and blue coats and blue military caps. The cheerleaders wore full skirts with alternate pleats of deep blue and yellow. Under the blue long-sleeved sweaters they had yellow blouses with the collar peeping out over the sweater neck.

Over on the Sanford side, the main attraction was Sanford's own Pep Club in blue and white pleated skirts and orange sweaters with black and white saddle numbers set off with orange socks.

The cheerleaders wore full skirts with alternate pleats of deep blue and yellow. Under the blue long-sleeved sweaters they had yellow blouses with the collar peeping out over the sweater neck.

Before the start of the contest, the Seminole High School marching band entered the field in their freshly cleaned West Point uniforms of black wool trousers and bright orange jackets. The white shoes and socks kept perfect rhythm to the beat of the bass drum as they assembled in the center of the field with the Pep Club and cheerleaders to play the National Anthem.

Household Bleach Sometimes Causes Mysterious Tears

Dry or liquid household bleaches may be the cause of holes and tears mysteriously appearing when a family bundle of clothes returns from the laundry; for such bleaches, when used full strength, may seriously weaken the fibers of a cleaning cloth, and, unless rinsed out, any other fabrics it contacts.

If a cloth saturated with hypochlorite bleach is dropped into a laundry hamper or bag, any resilient fabric that comes in contact with it will be weakened.

Tests duplicating such a situation were conducted recently in the American Institute of Laundering research laboratories. Technicians used both dry and liquid bleaches for the tests and in both cases dropped the unrinsed cleaning cloth into separate laundry bags containing sheets.

Two days later, the sheets and cleaning cloths were removed from the laundry bags and laundered. Before laundering the sheets looked entirely normal. It was impossible to see that the fibers of the sheets in contact with the cleaning cloths had been chemically changed to a weak, brittle substance.

Further tests verified the results. All showed that a higher loss of strength in various areas are a result of contact with the cleaning cloth tainted with household bleach.

A local authority on textile maintenance problems said that these tests amplify what he had found through experience.

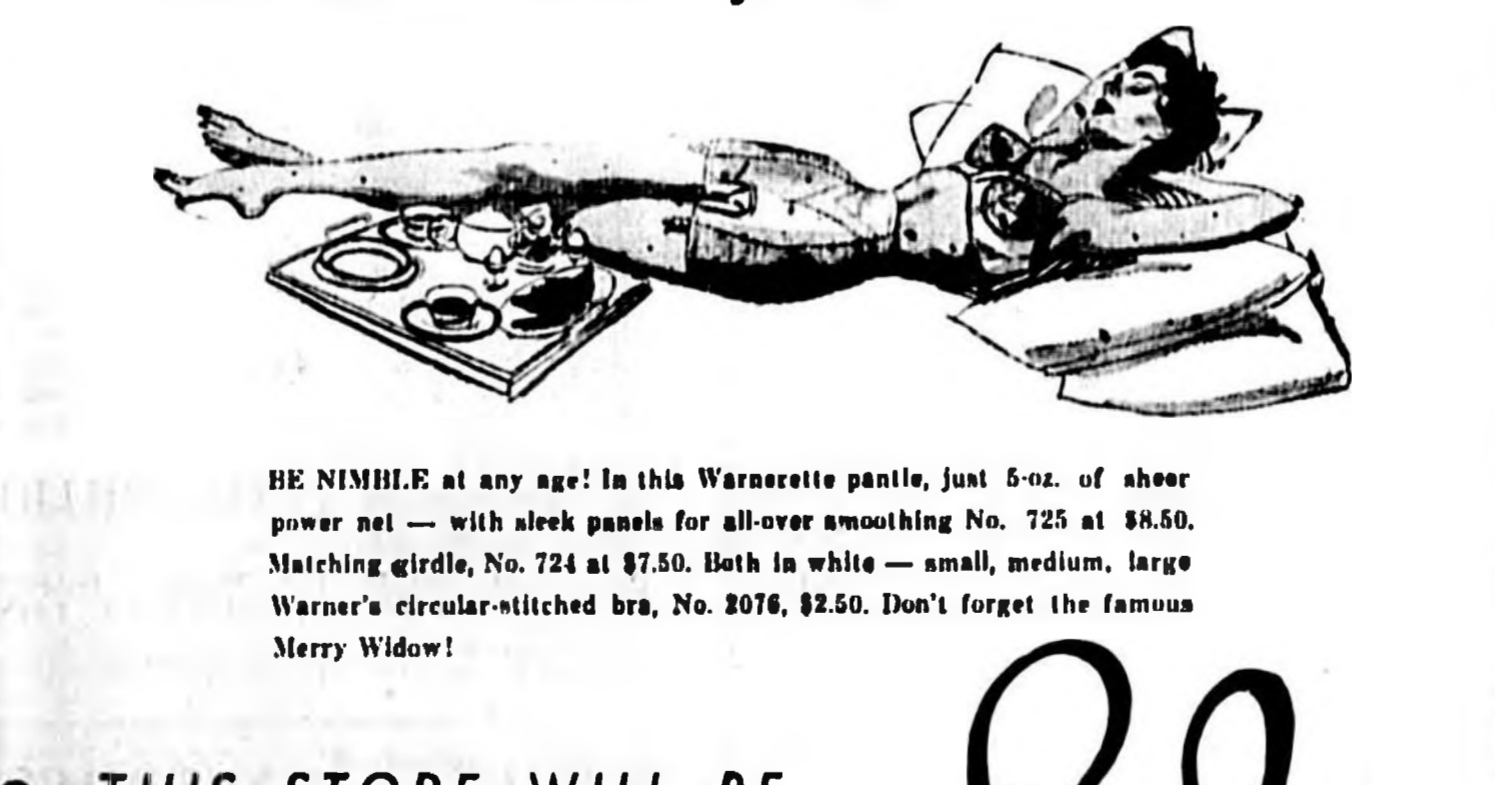
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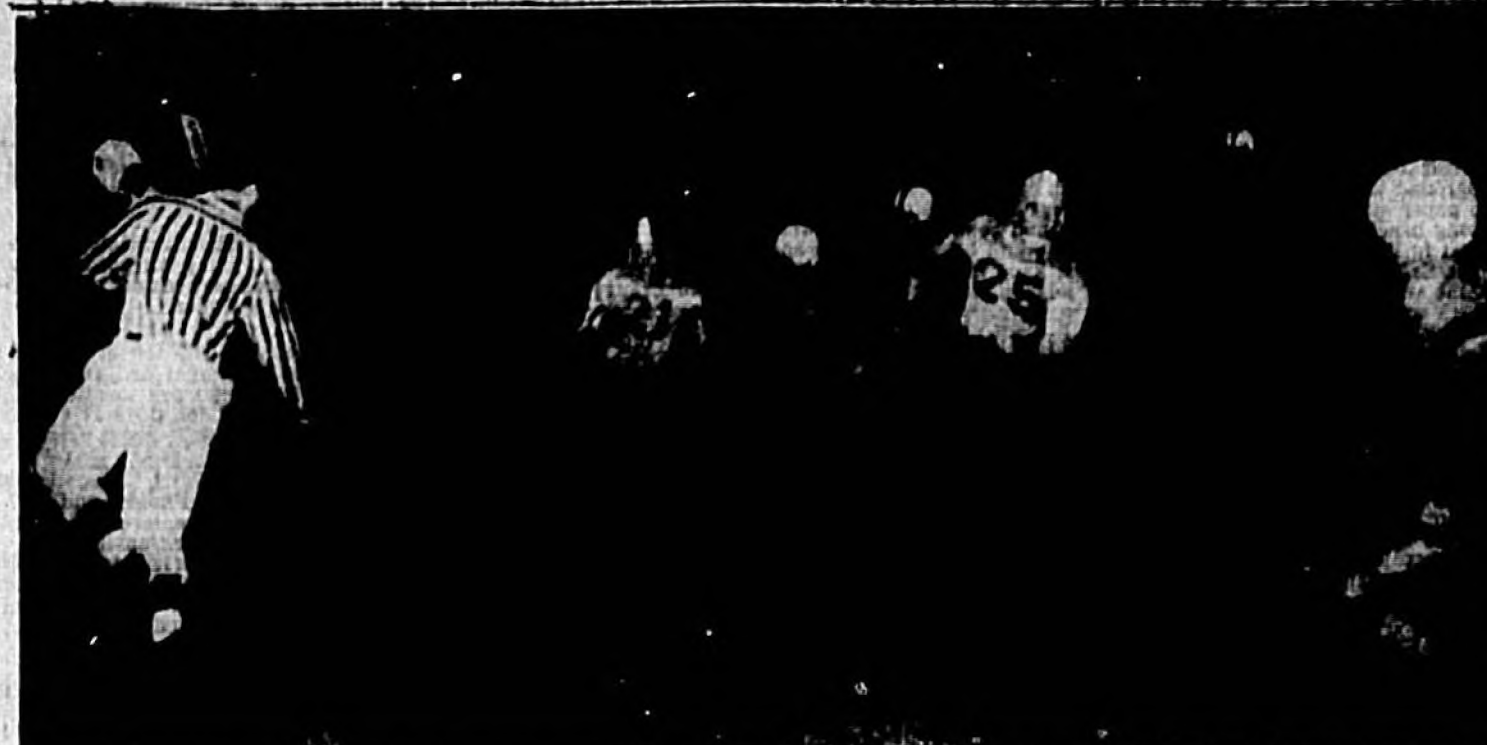

Sanford Seminoles Overwhelm Eustis Panthers Here, 20-7

'Locals' Power Too Much For Opponents; Razzle Dazzle, Fast Switches Highlights

National Loop Pennant Winners

Sanford Seminoles, astringing from the 7-6 defeat in their opener Apopka, retaliated against Eustis here Friday night, trouncing the Panthers to the tune of 20 to 7.

The visitors put up a scrappy fight, but were just plain overpowered by the locals' might.

Razzle dazzle and sudden turns in play highlighted the tussle between the two inexperienced teams.

However, Sanford began to look more like a clicking team last Friday night as the line ripped holes in Eustis' defense for backs to dart through, and pass after pass connected.

On the other hand, the Seminoles' defense pretty well put the Panthers' offense in a crouch. Eustis' backs all but gave up on the Seminole defense.

Jim Hawkins' running, behind first blocking, rather dimmed the efforts of the Seminole opponents, with the SHS back driving for almost as much yardage as the Eustis backs all together.

The Panthers accumulated a total of 183 yards in rushing, while Hawkins tallied 135 yards. The hard-driving back made over half the yardage collected by the Seminoles a total of 254 in rushing. He averaged 5.9 yards per try for 23 attempts.

Ralph Flowers also made a good showing in the rushing department, tallying 83 yards in 15 tries for an average of 5.4 yards. John Higgins, chalked up 25 yards for three tries, while Allen Maffett made three yards for two attempts, and Joe Rossi, eight yards for three.

Harold Pate, Bob Newson and Larry Bates, who returned to the line-up after being out with a broken hand, showed up well in line play, while other linemen, Gene Bass, Bud Davis and Bob Shoemaker also turned in good games.

The Seminoles made their first TD on ground play and the second on a pass shuffle of the ball that caught their opponents flat-footed and brought a big surprise to the crowd.

The Seminoles had steamrollered down the field in opening play only to lose the ball on downs within inches of the goal line. They regained possession of the ball again close to their opponents' goal when Eustis fumbled and Bass pounced on the ball.

In the touchdown play, Hawkins busted through a hole in the Panthers' line and went over standing up. The attempt for extra points failed.

In the razzle dazzle play which produced the second TD, the ball was passed to the center, to Rossi, who handed it off to Flowers, who pitched it far out to Hawkins, who passed it 15 yards to Maffett in the clear.

Captain Bill Fleming in commenting about the play, said it was a nice one "if it works." It was tried a couple of more times during an effort.

The Celery Feds scored their TD when Pate latched onto a Panther's pass and trundled about 30 yards to the goal line.

Canada Has Youth Net Program

TORONTO—Canada is definitely sports conscious.

Its pro football leagues are in full swing with teams playing to packed stands and being seen in the United States via TV. Big business moguls are trying to get Toronto or Montreal a spot in major league baseball.

Now this country north of the U. S. border is taking a serious interest in tennis. They are teaching young players the game with a eye to a future Davis Cup championship.

Deek Bouquet, once one of England's top professionals, is now coaching the sport here. He feels that the caliber of tennis and its popularity has been increasing steadily.

"I've been in Canada for only three years but each year the caliber of play among the junior players in the Toronto area appears to get better."

Bouquet claims that more and more competition in the tennis field is being played by a couple of Canadian Davis Cuppers in European tours this spring and summer has shown it can be done.

Lorne Main of Toronto and Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Quebec, turned in fine performances against many of the world's best players.

The 24 year old, won the singles championship at Monte Carlo this summer and teamed with Bedard in doubles to reach the quarter final.

Bedard upset Sweden's Sven Davidson, U. S. indoor champion at the Italian championships. He was beaten, however, by Jaroslav Drobny who later won the Wimbledon singles title.

At Wimbledon, Main extended Australian star Mervyn Rose to five sets before losing. Bedard carried another Aussie topnotcher, Lewis Head, in four.

Bouquet has a number of younger players ready for big time competition.

Says Bouquet: "I'm going to enter as many of my junior players as possible in the Canadian championships each year. They'll probably be beaten in the first round. But the only way one can learn anything in tennis is by playing—and also getting beaten. It might ruin their eyes a bit but it will build their ability."

The record for most shutouts by a goalie in the National Hockey League belongs to George Hainsworth of the Montreal Canadiens. In the 1928-29 season he had 22.

Showing up well in Eustis' backfield on defense was Aaron Chisholm, No. 89, who was linebacker. He was looking rather rocky in the final quarter from the beating he had taken from the Panthers' play of the Seminoles' line through the center of the Panthers' line.

The Feds will meet Leeburg here next Friday night. The Seminole's first conference game will be against Palatka when the local team travels to Key West for a game Oct. 8.

Weakened Browns Take Bad Beating From Eagles, 28-10

It was a sad funeral dirge they were chanting for the departed Cleveland Browns around the National Football League today.

Well, maybe it wasn't so sad in the Eastern Division, which the Browns have ruled with an iron hand the past four years. The other clubs, especially the Philadelphia Eagles and the New York Giants, can look ahead to sharing in some of the melon now.

The Browns won the league championship in 1950, then lost the playoff to Los Angeles the next year and in Detroit the following two years. All this time their Eastern Division foes had little to say about who was king of the class.

Times have changed. Coach Paul Brown has lost six of his main stars — Marion Motley, Chick Segade, Bill Willis, Ken Carpenter, Al Gibson and Ed Houston — for one reason or another and he hasn't been able to find satisfactory replacements.

The Eagles took full advantage yesterday when the entire loop played opening games and stung the hapless Browns 28-10. The score did not tell how one-sided the game was. Otto Graham, the great Browns' patsy, was held to 87 yards, and the once crushing ground attack gained only 47 yards.

Elsewhere, the opening day results produced an eyebrow lifting. The Lions clubbed the Chicago Bears 48-23; San Francisco whipped Washington, 41-8; Los Angeles slaughtered Baltimore, 48-9; and Pittsburgh edged Green Bay, 21-20.

Gators To Face Auburn Saturday In Outstanding Tilt After Upset

The Florida Gators, fired up after a surprising 13-12 upset victory over Georgia Tech, meet Auburn Saturday in what may well be the outstanding game of the day.

Both teams have demonstrated plenty of power on the ground. Auburn rolled over Chattanooga 46-0, using two outcasts and the old status of liberty ring during the slaughter.

Florida dominated the ground play against Tech, rushing the ball 75 times to Tech's 32, and making 24 first downs to Tech's 14. In fact, the Gators used more rushing plays and made more first downs than did Tech in both the Florida and Tulane games combined.

In other Conference contests, Alabama, a 12-0 victory over Louisiana State University, plays Vanderbilt, beaten 25-19 by Baylor, and Kentucky, defeated 28-9 by Mississippi, tie again against luckless Louisiana State.

In non-conference games, Georgia plays Texas A. & M., Georgia Tech meets S. M. U. at Dallas, Mississippi State plays Arkansas State, Mississippi engages Villanova, Tennessee takes on Duke and Tulane plays North Carolina.

Florida's win over Georgia Tech was the first since Tom Leah was coach back in 1941. Backs Jackie Simpson and Mal Hiramack banged through the Tech line and the passing of quarterbacks Dick Allen, Bobby Lance and Fred Robinson kept the Tech defenders off balance. But it was Allen's conversion in the third quarter that won the game.

Two players were largely responsible for Alabama beating Louisiana State. Quarterback Ritt Starr's passing sparked the way in the first score late in the second period. In the fourth, halfback Cecil Ingram took a hand-off from quarterback Ollie Yates and raced 68 yards for the second touchdown.

In the opening game of an unusual football "doubleheader" at Memphis, an 80-yard run by John Murray, a sophomore tailback, a blocked punt and a stunted 50-yard drive enabled Tennessee to come from behind and nose out Mississippi State 18-7.
