As his service in the Senate will continue only till after the November election, probably the Democratic senatorial caucus will not be in session and so will have no occasion to rule on his admission. He would constitute a discordant element, whose caucus activities would be used to help the GOP.

Daniel has every right to choose his party and stand by his beliefs. He should not, however, choose one party, and claim the privileges of membership in the other.
