## County Backs Divorce Mediation Program

Seminole County commissioners have given a tentative goahead for a mediation program, designed to settle disputes in divorce cases and reduce the court time needed to process

If formally approved, the program will receive funding from a \$2 surcharge on civil suits filed in the county. Using 1982 figures, that would generate about \$14,000 for the program.

That money will be used to pay for a contract for mediation services through the Seminole County Mental Health Center. The center will provide mediation services to couples seeking a divorce on a sliding scale. Those who can afford to pay will be charged and those who can't will be given service.

Couples will be encouraged to use that service or other private mediators available in the area. There remain several questions to be worked out about administering the program but the court system will probably be involved to refer couples to the program in one way or another

An agreement will be developed by the judiciary department defining the commitments of the board of commissioners, the courts and the mental health center.

Mediation programs in other parts of the country have already shown that time in the court system can be reduced, costs to the couples and costs to the courts also can be cut-

Dr. George Lindenfeld, director of the mental health agency, presented figures showing what the program could do if adopted nationwide. It would save \$9.6 million in court costs, \$88.6 million in legal fees and has resulted in a 33 percent reduction in tax dollars spent on custody disputes and a 58 percent decrease in legal fees.

Nina Cassidy, an assistant in the judicial division who has helped develop the mediation program, said initially some family law attorneys "felt threatened by mediation.

'But we found that a lot of attorneys who handle a lot of family law cases welcome a mediation program," she said-"Those who don't practice a lot of farmly law would be opposed

Commissioner Robert G "Bud" Feather, who has been a proponent of a mediation program, said he has received telephone calls from attorneys who support the program.

I thought the only ones who would be against it would be attorneys but we found that those attorneys who are the most professional endorse the program," Feather said. Seminole County Judge Joseph Davis was enthusiastic about

For years, attorneys who do dissolutions of marriages have

attempted to get reconciliation," he said. Davis said he did not want judges to be given the responsibility of assigning a mediator but was assured by Lindenfelt mediators would not be assigned Couples would be able to choose their own mediator from an approved list

Landenfeld said mediation can work in various ways with various couples

'One couple knew their marriage had to end but they wanted to remain responsible parents," he said. "They decided that the children should stay in the home. So they bought a condominium and the parents rotate each week between the house. and the condo.

Another case involved a couple that had been in divorce proceedings for three years. That situation had to be settled by shuttling between two separate rooms for talks with the husband and wife, he said

"If there's some way we can get the public to understand there is another way (besides the court) we can begin to keep these cases out of the courts," he said - MICHEAL BEHA

## Twice-Divorced Feather Says He's For Idea

Seminole County Commissioner Robert G "Bud" Feather has been divorced twice. Because of those divorces, Feather feels he is a perfect advertisement for a mediation program. Feather's second wife recently filed with the county clerk a report that he was behind on child support payments. Feather

said that is not true He prefers to make the payments directly to his ex-wife rather than sending them to the county and he has records that indicate he was \$1,036 ahead in payments at the end of 1981.

Feather contends the lengthy divorce proceedings built up animosity between them. As a result of that, he claims she is trying to publicly embarass him.

If there had been a mediation program in effect as the judiciary proposes, I know that we would have been able to work together and rapidly settle our disputes. Battle lines between attorneys would not have been drawn and days of valuable judge's time and courtroom time would have been saved," he said in a letter to area newspapers. "And my wife and I would have had a much better attitude about each

"I am convinced that though mediation our divorce could have been finalized rapidly, much animosity could have been avoided, hours and hours of the judge's and his staff's time could have been eliminated as could have the three days we six people took up an entire courtroom," he said.

"Over 1,300 divorce-related matters were disposed of before the courts in just Seminole County in 1981. There will be more this year," Feather said. "More than one-third of our school children are affected by broken homes. I've consistently encouraged initiating a program in our school system whereby the counselors are educated in how to cope with this particular crisis in a child's life.

"If we can initiate this mediation program, we can help to ease the strife during this crucial period and encourage cooperation instead of animosity. This will save us in social costs and actual costs at the same time enhance the quality of life in the county."

## Sanford Businessmen's Bodies Identified

While Orange County investigators have now positively identified the bodies of two men found dead in their home July 16 as those of two Sanford businessmen, few details are being released concerning their murders.

Orange County sheriff's department Lt. Kent Buchanon said today that medical records prove bodies of the two men, found stabbed and shot to death at 1231 Henry Balch Drive in north Orange County, are those of John N Stinson and Edward R. Wise, Stinson and Wise were coowners of the Sanford Quick Print, at 110 E. Commercial St.

"We have received word from the coroner's office that the bodies are definitely Stinson's and Wise's," Buchanon said. "We were able to prove their identities through dental records although we knew pretty much so that they were the ones because it's their home they were found in and other indicators were there."

Buchanon declined to reveal any details of the investigation into finding who killed the two men saying, "to release any details now could hamper our case in finding who is responsible for the murders."

Investigators discovered the bodies, which had been dead in the home for about a week, after a postman noticed mail piling up in the home and an odor coming from the mail slot in they could be released anytime the parole commission sees fit, according to

#### Investigators Checking Weather's Role In Crash

VAN, Texas (UPI) - An overloaded twin-engine plane taking off in a lightning storm crashed and burned 500 yards from an evangelical group's airstrip, killing eight children and four adults, including the organization's director.

A Federal Aviation Administration investigator rushed to the Last Days Ministry's airstrip after the crash late Wednesday, said David Wells, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety. Authorities said they had not determined if a thunderstorm entering the area at the time of the crash contributed to

#### Governors Vs. Reagan

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (UPI) - Southern governors are moving their lobbying headquarters to Washington to fight parts of President Reagan's tax package they fear would infringe on state treasuries.

The governors also adopted a resolution by Gov. James B. Hunt Jr. of North Carolina, urging Congress not to enact excise taxes that would reduce state tax revenues. Hunt's proposal was specifically aimed at the tobacco tax provision in the tax bill now pending before the House Ways and Means Committee.

That bill would double the current eight-cent federal excise tax on each pack of cigarettes. Hunt said such a hike in federal tobacco taxes would cost \$1 million in North Carolina, which has the nation's smallest tobacco tax at two cents per pack, and that the potential loss would be much greater in states with higher excise taxes on cigarettes.

#### Student Loan Crackdown

WASHINGTON (UPI)-Education Secretary Terrel Bell, stung by bad publicity on overdue student loans, says his department will crack down on schools with high default rates and on tardy-paying federal workers.

Bell said Wednesday his department will cut off new money for loans to needy students at schools with high default rates, and will begin matching personnel files against overdue loan records to catch delinquent

Bell said the department has already made "significant progress," collecting \$45 million in delinquent loan debts last year, expecting to retrieve \$55 million this year with help from private collectors, and hoping for \$80 million in 1983.

The government is owed \$1.7 billion in delinquent guaranteed student loans, and \$896 million in overdue National Direct Student Loans to needy students.

## Fired Deputy Won't Fight To Retain Job

Bowing to pressures stemming from suspension and subsequent termination from the Seminole County Sheriff's Department, former Sgt. Mike McClung has tired of the fight to get his job back.

According to Tom Green, lawyer for the 11-year sheriff's veteran, "We are dropping the case because of the pressures on Mr. McClung and his family because of his suspension and termination. He just doesn't want to have to go through it anymore."

McClung, 35, of 205 Pine Winds Drive, Sanford, had previously requested a hearing before the Civil Service Board in an effort to be reinstated to his job in the department's service division where he supervised the transporting of prisoners and to be reimbursed for his salary since his May 10

Polk has declined to discuss the reasons for the suspension but court and sheriff's department officials said the case may involve sexual misconduct by McClung involving a 15-year-old girl, and other undisclosed charges.

McClung, who joined the sheriff's department on Sept. 11, 1971, recieved an annual salary of \$20,916.

Mrs. Sheffield, who reportedly was fitted with the IUD in October 1978, is seeking an unspecified amount in damages. She charges in her suit that the device allows bacteria into the vaginal and cervical areas, resulting in the disease and necessitating an operation.

Mrs. Sheffield had her ovaries removed in Sept. 1979 and about four months later underwent the hysterectomy, the

## 12 Florida Schools Losing Loan Money

Twelve Florida schools will lose federal loan money this year because too many students have failed to pay the loans back, officials have announced.

The Florida schools are among 436 universities, colleges and trade schools nationwide that are being cut off from the National Direct Student Loan program, said U.S. Secretary of Education Terrel H. Bell. Some 1.2 million borrowers have defaulted on \$895 million

in loans, or 15 percent, since the student loan program began in 1958, Bell said. This year, the program is suffering a budget cut from \$186 million to \$178 million.

Schools being cut off have a default rate that exceeds 25

Bell also announced partial cutbacks that will affect more than 800 other schools nationwide, including Barry University and the University of Miami. At UM, default rates for the student loan program have run between 10 percent and 25 percent. UM will lose about \$150,000. The announcement did not spell bad news for all Florida

Some of the schools could appeal the decision.

Miami Wants World's Fair. **But Chicago May Get It** 

MIAMI (UPI) - Organizers say that although Miami is the underdog candidate to get the 1992 World's Fair, it would be worth the effort and \$500 million-price tag to get it held in south Florida.

The fair could mean billions of dollars in revenue to south Florida, Randy Coleman, president of the 1992 Florida Columbus Exposition, said Wednesday.

He claimed it would be well worth the \$500 million cost to stage the fair, planned to celebrate the 500th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the New World. Chicago, however, is far ahead in its proposal to host the exposition.

#### Cameroon To Get UF Aid

GAINESVILLE (UPI) — With a \$16.1 million grant from the U.S. Agency for International Development, largest in its history, the University of Florida will help the nation of Cameroon set up a new agriculture

Rhmadou Ahidjo, president of the West African nation, visited UF President Robert Q. Marstow and other university officials Wednesday to officially put the six-year project in motion.

The one-time grant will pay for the cost of constructing some of the university buildings, travel and salaries of UF and Cameroonian professors and training of the Cameroons.

#### Who'll Pay Resettling Cost?

MIAMI (UPI) — Officials of voluntary agencies resettling Haitians want to know how much of the estimated \$3 million cost will be paid by the federal government, as the Immigration and Naturalization Service continues to release refugees.

Another 27 Haitians were released from Miami's Krome Avenue detention center Wednesday, bringing the total number released since last Friday to 67. There are about 1,800 Haitians being held in federal centers in the U.S. and Puerto Rico.

Releases from Krome are expected to contunue through the end of the week.

### Reagan Claims In News Conference

## U.S. On Its 'Way Back To Prosperity'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan says "nothing is more painful" to him than the slow progress of his economic recovery program, but insists "we are working our way back to prosperity."

At his nationally broadcast news conference Wednesday, Reagan requested patience and vowed to stick with his plan despite mounting criticism and rising deficit projections.

"We've begun to rescue this economy ... but it's only the beginning," he said. "I think we're going to see an improvement in the second half of this year." He declined to predict how much, however.

Economic questions dominated the 12th news conference of Reagan's presidency, but he also was touched on a number of other topics - most of them involving foreign

He said he remains optimistic about Middle East peace efforts; expressed "no second thoughts" about his ban of U.S. technology to the Soviet Union; said he would soon announce whether a grain export agreement with the Soviet Union would be extended, and said he wants to foster relations with China without abandoning Taiwan.

House Speaker Thomas O'Neill, D-Mass., in a statement after the news conference, charged Reagan "is trying to hide from his own record."

He said Congress last summer "passed the Reagan tax bill, the Reagan budget, and the Reagan reconciliation bill."

"He promised to balance the budget by 1983. Instead he has presided over the highest federal deficits in history," O'Neill said. He said the president's program "has thrown 3 million more Americans into unemployment."

Reagan reeled off a string of economic statistics — a rise in real personal income, increase in retail sales and a slight drop in interest rates - to buttress his assertion recovery is knocking at the nation's door.

And he told reporters, "I'm not through with cutting in spending - I'm going to ask for more, I'm going to ask for more cuts."

Congress makes all the spending cuts and tax working our way back to prosperity.

He said, "Some of our people are still suf-Reagan said deficits cannot "be laid at any fering and nothing is more painful to me than

He called for support and patience and said, "We must have the courage to believe in ourselves."

On another matter, Reagan said he "very shortly" will announce his decision on whether the U.S. will extend for one year the grain sale agreement with the Soviet Union.

In the battle in Beirut between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization, Reagan described the bombing and shelling of Beirut as "two way." He characterized the war there as "this tragedy in Lebanon."

He said he is optimistic special U.S. envoy Philip Habib will negotiate a peaceful withdrawal of PLO troops, but added-"contrary to reports there are no deadlines of any kind that have been set."

Reagan said he has "no second thoughts" about banning export of technology to the Soviet Union to build a gas pipeline from that country to eastern Europe. ### State Supreme Court Throws Out One Death Sentence; Upholds 2nd

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)-The Florida Supreme Court today threw out the death sentence given the killer of a Collier County sheriff's deputy and sentenced the man to

The court also found that Dennis Smith, convicted of killing a Polk County man in 1975, got a fair trial and cleared the way for Gov. Bob Graham to sign another death warrant for Smith.

Donald Albert Walsh was convicted of killing Collier Deputy Allen Amos in December 1979 after Amos discovered him illegally hunting wild boar in the northwest Everglades near Immokalee.

Walsh shot Amos in the head with a .35 caliber rifle. The court upheld Welsh's first degree murder conviction, but said the trial court improperly rejected a recommendation by the jury of a sentence of life in prison.

The jurors apparently were swayed by defense arguments that Walsh had no prior criminal record and by testimony concerning his good character. "There was a reasonable basis for the jury's unanimous

recommendation and the trial judge should have followed this recommendation," the Supreme Court said. "We have allowed the trial court to overrule a life recommendation only where the facts justifying death are

so clear and convincing that no reasonable person could The court stipulated that Walsh serve at least 25 years in

prison before being eligible for parole. Smith was convicted of the stapping and burning death of John Mitchell Arnsdorff. Smith robbed Arsdorff of \$6 and a wrist watch, stuffed him in a car trunk, and then set the car on fire.

Graham signed a death warrant for Smith last year and his execution was scheduled for June 3, 1981. The Supreme Court blocked the execution, finding that Smith was entitled to a hearing by the trial judge on a claim that he should get a new trial because prosecutors withheld from his lawyers testimony from witnesses that might bolster his defense.

Polk Circuit Judge Oliver Green Jr. conducted the hearing and determined that Smith is not entitled to a new trial. The Supreme Court accepted Green's conclusion today,

### Insanity, And Murder

Insanity is a legal term. It can be defined — or redefined — by law.

Mental illness is a medical term. It can be

treated — or cured — by therapy.

Insanity and mental illness may intersect in a

Insanity and mental illness may intersect in a killer. Should he be punished for murder, or treated for mental illness?

John W. Hinckley Jr., suffering from mental illness, fired shots into President Reagan with the intent of murdering him. A jury in Washington ruled Hinckley was insane and sent him to a mental hospital. But his shots are reverberating through the legal system that releases the mentally ill from guilt and punishment.

Now the Reagan administration is supporting legislation in Congress to narrowly limit the insanity definition. Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, a sponsor of the legislation said it "would effectively eliminate the insanity defense except in those rare cases in which the defendant lacked the state of mind required as an element of the offense."

He added: "Mental disease or defect would constitute a defense only if the defendant did not even know he had a gun in his hand or thought, for example, that he was shooting at a tree."

Hinckley knew he was shooting at the president, not a tree. Under the new law, the delusion that he believed killing Reagan would endear him to his fantasy love, actress Jody Foster, would no longer be grounds to avoid punishment because of insanity.

But a law must be tested for its effect.

Victims ask: Does it matter if our father was murdered because the killer thought he heard voices? Any murder is an insane act. To allow the murderer to escape punishment because of insanity is crazy! The murderer must be punished for his action, not his intent.

Civil libertarians say: What does it do to a society to jail and execute people who were not in their senses when they hurt others? By treating the mentally ill like criminals, society takes on their unreasonableness. Society protects itself by preserving the rational basis of behavior and humanely treating the mentally ill.

These issues lie at the deepest levels of human consciousness and suffering. The apparently motiveless murder of a man on a beach — Albert Camus' "The Stranger" — of an old woman by a student — Fyodor Dostoevsky's "Crime and Punishment" — and of a father by his son — Sophocles' "Oedipus Rex" — are great writer's attempts to plummet the psyche of a killer. Senators must try to untangle the threads of insanity and mental illness, law and psychology, innocence and guilt.

In revising the insanity definition, Congress should avoid the cries for blood following the Hinckley verdict and not jettison the humanistic traditions that distinguish our society from the deluded assailants we seek to punish.

But mental illness should no longer provide an almost automatic escape from guilt. The insane impulse to kill that strikes human beings in torment must be met by a clear voice from society. "Murder and be punished."

# Rabies Still A Problem

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The annual number of cases of rables in Americans has declined to only one or two a year over the past three decades, but an infectious disease specialist says rables is still a serious problem in the United States.

Dr. Robert Fekety, professor of internal medicine at the University of Michigan Medical School, said more than 30,000 people in the United States receive rabies vaccinations each year.

This was particularly serious until two years ago because the rabies vaccine then in use, obtained from duck embryos infected with the virus, produced relatively frequent and serious side effects even if the person had not been exposed to rables.

A new vaccine derived from virus grown in human cells was licensed for use in the United States in 1980. Fekety said it is remarkable for its effectiveness and apparent freedom from serious side effects.

bobcats are the most significant wild animal

sources of rabies in the United States.

"In cases of exposure to one of these wild animals, the animal should be regarded as rabid until proven negative by laboratory tests, and prophylaxis should be begun immediately," Fekety said in a rables status report in the magazine Drug Therapy.

On the other hand, he said rodents are not considered important sources of rables infection for humans, and people bitten by mice, rats, hamsters, chipmunks, squirrels, rabbits, shrews and moles need not be vaccinated unless the rodent has been shown to be rabid.

Fekety said the need for vaccination tollowing bites from pet dogs and cats varies from region to region. He said if the bite is provoked, and the dog or cat is healthy and available for 10 days of observation, treatment should not be given unless the animal develops signs of illness.

However, he said if the cat or dog is a stray, even if it appears well, it should be killed and tested.

"In a situation where the condition of the dog or cat is unknown and it has escaped, but the bite was provoked, treatment can be dispensed with if the region is urban and known to be rables-free," Fekety said.

"However, treatment probably should be given if rables is present in wildlife in the nearby areas."

In any event, he said all bite wounds should be washed with soap and water and a 70 percent alcohol solution.

### New Words, Old Theme

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Recently we observed the Reagan administration's use of the venerable Washington institution of the "trial balloon" to float its long-awaited urban policy.

Just before the nation's mayors were to begin their annual summer meeting, a copy of the urban-policy statement suddenly appeared on the desk of a New York Times reporter — and subsequently on the pages of his newspaper.

The mayors almost unanimously condemned the document's central theme: that the cities' financial problems were rooted in an increased dependence on Washington that had turned local officials "from bold leaders of self-reliant cities to wily stalkers of federal funds."

Faced with this firestorm of protest from the mayors, the administration beat a hasty retreat, insisting that the published report was merely a first draft by low-level staffers and would be sent back to the drawing boards for "further research."

Well, the further research seems to have been done quickly.

Now the administration has quietly issued the report, which is required every two years by Congress.

The final version contains none of the inflammatory language that so angered the mayors. In its place are soothing assurances that the Reagan administration will "offer broader opportunities for urban leaders" and "seek to restore the balance of authority and responsibility among the three levels of government (federal, state and local)."

The language may have changed from one version of the report to the next, but the central message remains the same. The Reagan administration — in sharp contrast to its predecessors over the past two decades — is telling the cities that they must stop looking to the federal government to solve their problems and start looking to the private sector.

Several past columns have detailed the bewilderment of many within the Reagan administration at industry attitudes toward government regulation.

The Reaganites came to Washington as allout proponents of the free-market system. To them, government regulation was bad, less government regulation was better and no government regulation was best. They

assumed that all industry wanted was for the government to get off its back.

This theory ran head-on into reality. In fact, business is quite happy with helpful government regulation, especially regulation that holds down competition, and will fight hard to keep it.

This is especially true of the transportation industry. And a new study conducted for the Cato Institute by Dr. Thomas Moore, a leading transportation economist, contends that the administration has given in to that industry and embarked on a program of reregulation of trucking, airlines and railroads.

Moore's study points out that recent administration actions in both the trucking and airline industries have reversed deregulatory initiatives started during the Carter administration. And proposals to begin deregulating the railroads have been shelved.

In addition, Moore notes that the Reagan administration replaced Darius Gaskins, the "de-regulation minded" chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission, with Reese Taylor. Under Taylor, the ICC has significantly narrowed its interpretation of the deregulatory Motor Carrier Act of 1980.

These new moves reflect the desires of the affected industries — but they are in direct conflict with the free-market rhetoric so often espoused by the president and those around him.

We have written at length about the Davis-Bacon Act, which requires the federal government and federal contractors to pay top wages even when workers can be obtained at a lower rate. The law has long been opposed by conservatives and businesses but favored by organized labor.

The administration refused to wage a congressional fight to overtune the act but promised to try to accomplish the same thing through changes in administrative regulations.

Business representatives and conservatives cried "sell-out." But, lo and behold, the administration has finally published those new regulations, many of which eliminate or soften the portions of Davis-Bacon that opponents have found most objectionable.

### View From Geneva

They held a disarryment conference this summer and while a great many people came to the surprise of none it came to nothing.

The United Nations General Assembly concluded five weeks of talk about the need to reduce world armaments, particularly of the nuclear variety, with an admission that it was powerless to do anything about it.

It is questionable whether the exercise can even be written off as a good try. It was the work of the non-powers who constitute an overwhelming majority of U.N. membership but possess little themselves in the way of meaningful arms to discard.

The history of efforts to control national armaments through mutual agreement has few encouraging lessons. But what it does teach is that the powers that possess the weapons must be actively engaged.

weapons must be actively engaged.

That was not the case at the United Nations, in part because the larger powers were not inclined to debate their interests in a forum of 157 members most of which could contribute nothing but talk, and in larger part because the two members that most mattered were already engaged in discussions wisewhere.

In Geneva.

Actually, it is two discussions. The United States and the Soviet Union have been negotiating on intermediate-range missiles for half a year. As the U.N. talkathon was winding down, the commenced discussing strategic nuclear systems. At some point, if there is significant progress, the talks may well merge for all practical purposes.

American sources are saying they believe the Soviets are genuinely interested in negotiating, that there is real hope of eventual accords.

Despite the Reagan administration's shove-

off attitude toward the Soviets of the past 18 months.

Despite American refusal to ratify one

Despite American refusal to ratify already negotiated treaty.

And despite the initial wide gap between positions and the prompt Soviet rejection of President Reagan's proposed strategic arms cuts as soon as announced last May.

Both sets of talks are progressing not exactly in secrecy, but in calculated confidentiality. The negotiators are keeping the details of their discussions to themselves to avoid turning them into a media event.

In this respect, it is the antithesis of the

U.N. conference, which offered public addresses by a parade of world figures including Margaret Thatcher, whose remarks on disarmament so promptly following Britain's well-publicized display of arms in the South Atlantic were taken as unseemly by some.

 The U.N. event invited attention, but couldn't overcome the obvious obstacle to attracting much — its essential futility.

The history of U.S.-Soviet arms talks suggests that progress is not going to be swift, but that it is possible. Positive precedents are the nuclear test ban of 1963, the nuclear non-proliferation treaty of 1966, the strategic arms treaty — SALT I — of 1972 and the Vladivostok protocol of 1974, the basis of the unratified but observed SALT II.

After two decades, the two parties at least know each other and know that they can talk to each other and, given the right circumstances and will, reach agreements that both can live with. That, rather than the merit of the proposals actually on the tables at the moment, is the best thing the talks have going.

## Lebanon Commander A Young Sadat

WASHINGTON — One of the most significant developments in the Lebanese tragedy is the rise to international prominence of Bashir Gemayel, 35-year-old commander of Lebanon's Christian military forces. American intelligence analysts think he may be a young Anwar Sadat arising out of the ashes of the Lebanese war.

A charismatic leader, gifted orator and patient negotiator, Gernayel is regarded as a firm believer in Western democracy, not a religious or political fanatic. His aged father, Pierre, led the national movement that ousted the French in 1943 and still heads the political party of Lebanon's Christian majority.

Now the younger Gemayel is being touted as the next civilian president of Lebanon, and perhaps the one man who may bring stability to the war-shattered, faction-torn country. His emergence as a political force is a cause of cautious optimism in U.S. intelligence circles. He is seen as solidly pro-Western: He was educated at a French Catholic college in Belrut and at Southern Methodist University

But, needless to say, Gernayel's importance has not been lost on the Kremlin. My intelligence sources tell me the Soviet Union has been secretly courting Gernayel and the Christian forces for several months. In contrast, the U.S. State Department has ignored several informal approaches by Gernayel's emissaries over the past year.

Fortunately, the Kremlin's ardent courtship of Gemayel has so far been rejected. "The Soviets approached us several months ago with offers of cultural exchanges and offers to build television and radio stations and train our people," a source close to Gemayel confided. "But they also had plans to establish a KGB station in our area. We were not willing to permit this."

The Lebanese reluctance to give the KGB a toehold in their postwar situation is understandable: According to intelligence sources, the Russians had one of their strongest KGB posts, manned by some 300 people, in areas once controlled by the

Palestine Liberation Organization and Syrian occupation troops.

Painfully aware that their alliance with the PLO and the Syrians has not endeared them to the Lebanese, the Russians are trying to regroup by sucking up to the presumed dominant forces in postwar Lebanon. My intelligence sources are betting they won't succeed.

Actually, the United States is lucky it doesn't share this Lebanese resentment over the Syrians. The idea of covertly encouraging Syrian troops to act as an occupation force to keep peace in Lebanon was apparently Henry Kissinger's brainstorm. Kissinger had hoped that the Syrians would rein in the PLO.

"The United States sout a special emissary, who told us not to oppose the Syrians," recalled a Lebanese official who was privy to the negotiations. "He said the Syrians of 1976 were like the Marines of 1958." This was a reference to the U.S. Marines sent in by President Eisenhower as a warning to

Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser, who was believed to be planning a military attack on Lebanon.

The Kissinger plan didn't work out, of course. Syrian troops were unable to control the PLO in Lebanon, and confined themselves to occupation of their own chosen territory in the unhappy country.

The Christian Lebanese forces are also resentful of their portrayal in the American press as "right-wing phalangists" and "militia." They claim the first label was pinned on them by the PLO, and as for the second label, a Lebanese spokesman said: "How can anyone describe the strongest and best organized political party in the region

and our 40,000-strong army as a 'militia'?"

Gemayel is equally ambivalent toward the Christian forces' support from Israel. He has stated publicly that "to save Lebannon, I would cooperate with anybody." And one U.S. expert said of Gemayel's relationship with the Israelis: "He won't kowtow to them. He's too independent."

## Garbage Fees Will Increase At Altamonte

Beginning Sept. 1 Altamonte Springs residents will pay more for garbage collection and will face a late payment fee and reconnection charge on overdue accounts.

At its Tuesday meeting, the City Commission gave final approval to a hike in garbage pickup rates from \$5.75 per month to \$6.25 per month.

Residents will have 28 days to pay the monthly bills. If not paid within that time, a 10 percent late fee on the total bill will be imposed. In order to crack down on late payments, the city may discontinue garbage pickup after a total of 35 days and in conjunction may discontinue water and sewer service until the hills are brought up to date.

In addition to suspension of service on late bills, the commission agreed to implement a \$25 reconnection charge of suspended service.

At the Tuesday meeting the commission also turned down a request by Alan Glisson, president of Alan Glisson Contracting, Inc., to land a single engine airplane at an airstrip adjacent to State Highway 436 and Interstate 4 to make payroll runs and construction inspection trips.

Neither the state Department of Transportation nor the Federal Aviation Administration appeared overly concerned about the plane landing in the proximity of a busy highway, but the commission was and unanimously voted against the

The commission also approved the awarding of an engineering contract for the Northlake Roadway Extension Project to Lochrane Engineering Corp. in the amount of

The firm will render engineering services in connection with the roadway extension from Cranes Roost Boulevard to the planned extension along the south side of the Triad Otice Complex covering a distance of approximately 900 feet.

The commission also approved Resolution 508 for the repair and improvement of the city's sewage treatment plant. The resolution carries forward a total of \$500,000 from the city's construction-in-progress fund from fiscal 1981-82 > 1982-83. Some \$400,000 will be used to install a third raw sewage pump as a backup pump to satisfy Department of Environmental regulations. The sum also will pay for the replacement of the present barminutor system at the head end of the plant with a system of static screens to eliminate floatable solid waste problems at the plant. The improvements are such that they can be incorporated into any future plant expansion.

The commission also approved a bid award to Basic Asphalt and Construction Corp. for reconstruction of Magnolia Drive between Longwood Avenue and the Eastmonte Recreation Center. Basic's original bid for the project was \$55,423, but was reduced to \$47,818 after city officials determined that about \$8,000 of sidewalk construction incorporated into the paving project could be done by city crews in conjunction with other sidewalk projects in the future.

A total of \$32,818 from the city's general fund and \$15,000 from the city's trust fund will finance the paving project.

## Gandhi Trying To Boost Indian Relations With U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi is making her first visit to the United States in 11 years and trying to bolster U.S.-Indo relations.

Mrs. Gandhi was to meet today with President Reagan and at that time a major settlement - ending a dispute that has soured relations for four years - was reportedly to be an-

The Washington Post quoted sources today as saying a compromise was reached under which India can continue to receive nuclear fuel for its U.S.-built Tarapur atomic power plant — Bombay's primary energy source.

There was no immediate White House comment.

Mrs. Gandhi, upon her arrival Wednesday at Andrews Air Force Base in suburban Maryland, said "I look forward to meeting the president and exchanging views on problems between our two countries and in the rest of the world,"

She said, "One of the reasons I am here is that I want them to

Mrs. Gandhi was greeted by Secretary of State George Shultzand about 200 Indians who carried fluttering orange, white and green Indian national flags. She continuned her trip

to Washington aboard a Marine helicopter. Mrs. Gandhi is on a 10-day trip to the United States. She arrived in New York Monday and returns to India Aug. 4, following a return trip to New York and a visit to the West

Mrs. Gandhi has said she intends to tell Reagan India's friendship with the Soviet Union, which is behind many U.S.-Indian bilateral troubles, does not preclude friendship with the United States.

She and Reagan are expected to discuss India's refusal to condemn the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan - which Mrs. Gandhi has said she opposes — and the U.S. sale of sophisticated arms in a \$3.2 billion aid package to India's rival, Pakistan.

Another topic may likely be India's displeasure with waning U.S. support for the World Bank and its soft-loan affiliate, the International Development Association — a key source of credit for India that provides loans on favorable terms.

The nuclear fuel snarl apparently has been settled. The 1978 U.S. Nuclear Non-proliferation Act bars resupplying the Tarapur plant because India refuses to accept full international inspection of its nuclear facilities.

The Post quoted sources as saying, under the new agreement, the United States has obtained assurances the fuel supplied to Tarapur will not be reprocessed without its con-

Kocheril Narayanan, India's Ambassador to the United States, denied reports Mrs. Gandhi's visit is intended to deal primarily with arms purchases.

"She would like to explain our point of view on the world and to understand the president's point of view," Narayanan told reporters in New York.

"... We are not looking for anything specific ... We have not come here to discuss arms purchases.


Charles, casual in a white shirt with no tie, looked slightly more uncomfortable than his son in three of the pictures. Two photographs were of Diana and the baby

DAYTON, Tenn. (UPI) — A carnival atmosphere prevailed in this tiny Tennessee Bible-belt town during those sweltering July days of 1925.

A three-foot man was identified as the missing link. One man displayed his own version of the origin of species: a halfcat, half-rabbit that he called a "cabit."

The real show, however, was in a crowded courtroom where one of the most famous trials of the century was played out. Perhaps the two best known lawyers of their time locked horns over a bitter and volatile issue, a test of belief and fortitude that, for one, would be his last.

The so-called "monkey trial" of John Scopes, tested a new state law that forbade teaching any form of evolution other than that which sprang from Divine creation. Today, 57 years later, the issue is still far from resolution,

The Scopes trial not only attracted hundreds of reporters, it drew into confrontation Clarence Darrow, who argued for the defense that man indeed evolved from a lower animal life, and William Jennings Bryan, the staunch backer of the literal Bible statement that mankind was spawned in the Garden of Eden

The fundamentalist viewpoint held forth on that day, and likely would again if the case were re-tried today. But, the question of whether both views should be taught in public schools is very much alive in legislative halls across the country. The arguments, pro and con, sound to a degree like echoes from that historic Darrow-Bryan donnybrook.

Evolution believers are being increasingly forced to defend their theory that the earth is 4 billion years old and that man once was a hairy brute that swung from trees and walked on all-fours.

Followers of "creation science" say they are digging up evidence to refute Charles Darwin's original theory and are calling on school systems to let them teach their theories alongside evolution.

Scopes was 24 and a high school math teacher in 1924 when the Tennessee legislature passed a law forbidding anyone to teach that man sprang from a lower form of life or to deny the divine creation of man.

"The general public should have no more right to tell a teacher what to do in his line of work than to tell a priest or anyone trained in the religious field how he should lead his flock and teach the principles of Christ," Scopes once said.

Seated around a wooden soda fountain table at Robinson's Drug Store in Dayton, Scopes and a mining engineer, G.W. Rappleyea, hatched the scheme to have Scopes arrested for teaching evolution and test the new state law.

One day in March, 1925, Scopes filled in for an absent biology teacher and went out of his way to teach Darwin's theory of evolution. He was arrested later on the tennis courts at the

Darrow offered to argue Scopes' case. Fundamentalists rallied the aging but still eloquent Bryan to the side of the Bible and the law.

"It was like a circus," said Scopes, who died in 1970 of cancer at age 70. "People came from everywhere to see what the monkey business was all about."

Indeed they did. Farmers came to town in mule-drawn wagons. Hundreds of newspapermen, among them H.L. Mencken, assembled to report every word of the argument. A little monkey wearing a hat and coat and carrying a cane and a

large chimpanzee paraded in downtown Dayton. The trial started July 11 and lasted until July 25. So Darrow and Bryan could argue without restraint, the jury was sent

repeatedly from the courtroom during the trial. Three days of the trial was held on the courthouse lawn, partly because of the summer heat and partly from fear the

Louislana now is the only state with a creation science law. The American Civil Liberties Union challenged it on behalf of a broad coalition of religious leaders, teachers, the Orleans Parish School Board and parents.

State officials say the Louisiana law will not be declared unconstitutional because it is not as specific as the Arkansas

"Louisiana law requires only the teaching of facts that point to creation and does not say what facts," said attorney general William Guste Jr.

"The Arkansas law mixes science and religious teachings, Louisiana's law does not. Louisiana's law was created to

protect academic freedom." In Lynchburg, Va., the Rev. Jerry Falwell's Liberty Baptist College has asked the commonwealth's school board to certify the school's graduates to teach biology in Virginia. The board of education has taken the possibly precedent-setting case under advisement.

Dr. William Moyer, executive director of the National Association of Biology Teachers, said the creationists are ignoring the scientific evidence of evolution.

"The battle has come about because of the success science has had in explaining how evolution takes place. If we weren't so darned successful they wouldn't have anything to say right now," Moyer said.

"In effect the creationists are saying 'we don't need evidence in order to have truth' It's burning the hell out of them that their fundamentalist views aren't being accepted today," Moyer said.
