Divorce Should Be Made Easier And Quieter, Says Novelist Who Decries Usual Publicity

Divorce should be made easier and quieter, says Rupert Hughes, novelist.

"There is no more reason for the publicity and scandal attendant on divorce than there would be for performing a surgical operation in a courtroom," he says. "Divorce is the only cure for some evils, and it should be made as easy and quiet as possible."

"Abolition of divorce would be a backward step in civilization."

"My reason for advocating easy divorce is that compulsory wedlock is not only horribly contrary to all principles of freedom, but establishes a tacit consent to all forms of immorality, cruelty, and hypocrisy."

"Look at the communities where divorce is impossible. They don't shine under the searchlight of investigation."

"Many sets are absolutely opposed to dissolution of marriage with the privilege of remarriage. But in such groups thousands of married couples live apart in fact, and among them grows up tacit admission of the right to keep a

"Mr. Hoover's letter sounds to me like a bid for the presidential bacon."

Senator L. J. Dickinson, Republican, Iowa:

TAMPA, Mar. 26.—Several hundred men and women who were lined up at Eighth Avenue and Sixteenth Street to receive free meat from the FERA put on a demonstration yesterday afternoon in protest against the quality of the meat.

A few hurled packages of meat at the men who were handing it out. Some others trampled it under foot until about 100 pieces or 300 pounds of kidneys, heart and ground meat were kicked about in the dirt.

#### PENALTY CARD OF A DEFENDER

**DEFENDER:** If during the play a defender improperly exposes a card, such card becomes a penalty card. A penalty card must be faced up on the table until played and whenever it is the turn of the defender who wins it he must play it, unless the play of the penalty card would constitute a revoke.

This law involves a slight in that before the owner of a penalty card was not required to play it at the first opportunity. Instead, the card remained available to call by defender, unless in the meantime, the owner had a chance to play it. In a case where the new law still makes a difference, since the owner of a penalty card has always turned it over to the exposed card if it were his advantage to do so, he failed to call it in the new law.

**Play at auction:** In case of the danger of being compelled to play a later or more important card, the owner of a penalty card may, if he has always turned it over to the exposed card if it were his advantage to do so, he failed to call it in the new law.

#### PENALTY LESS SEVERE

#### INSTEAD OF QUITTING

**TRICK:** If a player might be forced to make a specified total frequently resulting in a severe penalty, suddenly out of keeping with the rules, through changing of the premium entry.

#### RIGHTS OF DECLARER

**PARTNER:** Under the old laws, declarer's partner is given certain definite rights as follows:

(a) Reply to a partner's proper question.

(b) When requested, diagnosis questions of fact or law.

(c) Question declarer regarding other possible revokes.

(d) Draw attention to a defense's irregularity and ask declarer if he knows his rights.

He has no rights in addition to the foregoing, and he loses all of those if he intentionally looks at the face of a card in a player's hand.

#### REWRITTEN FOR CLARITY

#### THE REVOKE AND ESTABLISHED REVOKE
