Citing figures to prove this feminine financial domi-nance, he suggests the possibility of tomorrow's young man hurrying with notebook and pencil to the trilled com-mand of the company's president, or waiting shyly for proposal of marriage from the rich and rising young

"It may startle the atavistic males," Mr. Marcosson writes, "to learn that women are today beneficiaries of 50 percent of the nation's \$104,500,000,000 outstanding life insurance, on which \$2,000,000,000 is being paid out each year. The private wealth of the nation is only \$280,000,000,000, and women already own enough is only \$280,000,000,000, and women already own enough of that to make the he-Titans tremble. 


