HARRIS FIELD, GAINESVILLE, Sept. 14.—Big Owen Wright mowed down Don McShane's Gainesville G-Men last evening when he allowed only four hits while the big guns of the "Raw Meat" Rogers' Sanford Lookouts heavy artillery blasted and roared out 12 hits off the deliveries of Lefty Joe Sparkman and Red Sweeney to take a 7 to 2 score that was watched by 1000 people at Harris field in Gainesville...

The entire Sanford club played excellent ball behind the ace moundmen who fanned six of the G-Men while giving up three bases on balls. Sparkman delivered a pair of walks and also two strikeouts while Red Sweeney walked two of the Lookouts and fanned one. Battling hard for the evening were taken by Wes Kingdon who was at the plate two official times and smashed out hits at each appearance. Joe Ruggerio and Al Kasso split second honors with two for four each and Ed Kassar singled twice in five trips. Scoring bastions started in the Sanford half of the third inning when Al Kasso singled to center field and went to third on a slant to left by Wes Kingdon. Mayo Langston came up and hit to right field to score Kasso. The G-Men took the lead in their half of the fourth when Whitley McMullen singled to right field to score both Russ Bevell and Lou Rogino. Sanford came back in its half of the fifth to take a one run lead when they pushed

across two tallies off one hit and an error. Three hits gave them two more runs in the seventh and in the eighth they tallied two more times off four hits. The two teams will resume their series tonight at the local field.

## Anglo-French Sub Campaign Is Under Way

No Delay Seen As Result Of Italian Refusal To Abide By Nyon Agreement

## 200 Warships Are Ready For Search

Italy Demands Share In Plan Equal To England And France

LONDON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Britain and France refused today to delay their patrol of the Mediterranean against submarine piracy because of Italian objections to the Nyon Accord and announced that the nine-power agreement would go into effect at once.

British and French warships, already in the Mediterranean, were reported authoritatively to have begun scouring the Mediterranean sea lanes for undersea marauders without waiting for reinforcements.

Informed sources said the door was not closed to Italian participation in the patrol if Italy wishes to offer constructive suggestions, although she has declined to join the Nyon arrangement.

France and Great Britain have mobilized nearly 200 warships in the Mediterranean in their hunt for the marine marauders. Organized in a full wartime footing the combined fleet is to reach its maximum strength within a month when all additional orders for patrol duty arrive.

Italy refused last night to join the anti-piracy patrol in a secondary role, demanding full parity with Britain and France. The latter two nations were designated by seven cooperating nations—Turkey, Greece, Russia, Egypt, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and Rumania—to bear the brunt of the patrol.

Italy was offered jurisdiction of sea lanes just off her coasts in the patrol plan drafted Saturday at Nyon, at a conference boycotted by Premier Mussolini and Chancellor Hitler of Germany.

Last night with German adherence, Mussolini advised the British and French charge d'affaires that the situation which would result from the patrol plan "seems unacceptable."

The immediate reaction here was that the war against the submarine pirates will be real war, nevertheless, but observers were quick to point to the possibility of a compromise.

## WPA To Dismiss 1500 Employees From Rolls Soon

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 15.—(AP)—State Administrator Frank P. Ingram said yesterday he had received orders from Washington officials to dismiss 1500 WPA employees immediately.

The reduction is in addition to recent cuts in the supervisory and administrative staffs, he said. It does not include 250 men dropped from relief rolls in the Tampa area.

The opening of the citrus season, general improvement in economic conditions in the state and the necessity of reducing the expense of the work relief program were cited as reasons for the additional reduction.

## PALESTINE PARTITION GETS LEAGUE APPROVAL

GENEVA, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The League of Nations council arranged last night to approve quickly the partition of Palestine into Jewish and Arab states so that a new British royal commission may be sent to the Holy Land to draft a detailed plan.

China and warned all other vessels flying the Stars and Stripes that they carry war cargoes at their own risk.

In a statement issued after a lengthy cabinet meeting with Joseph B. Kennedy of the Maritime Commission it was emphasized the order did not invoke the neutrality law against China and Japan.

The President's order was believed aimed primarily at the Government-owned freighter Wichita, which is en route to China with a cargo of bombing planes where she is at San Pedro, Calif., refueling before heading for the Orient.

The Wichita, operated under lease by the Roosevelt Steamship Company, left Baltimore, Md., on August 27.

The statement said: "Merchant vessels owned by the Government of the United States will not hereafter until further notice be permitted to transport to China or Japan any of the arms, ammunition, or implements of war which were listed in the President's proclamation of May 1, 1937."

"Any other merchant vessels flying the American flag, which attempt to transport any of the listed articles to China or Japan, will, until further notice, do so at their own risk.

"The question of applying the Neutrality Act remains in status quo, the Government policy remaining on a 24-hour basis."

It was indicated that Kennedy already had issued orders for the Wichita to be halted at San Pedro. The Maritime Commission, however, was unable to say definitely that the Wichita would be prevented from proceeding. The Commission will meet today, and with the President's proclamation before it, make the final decision.
