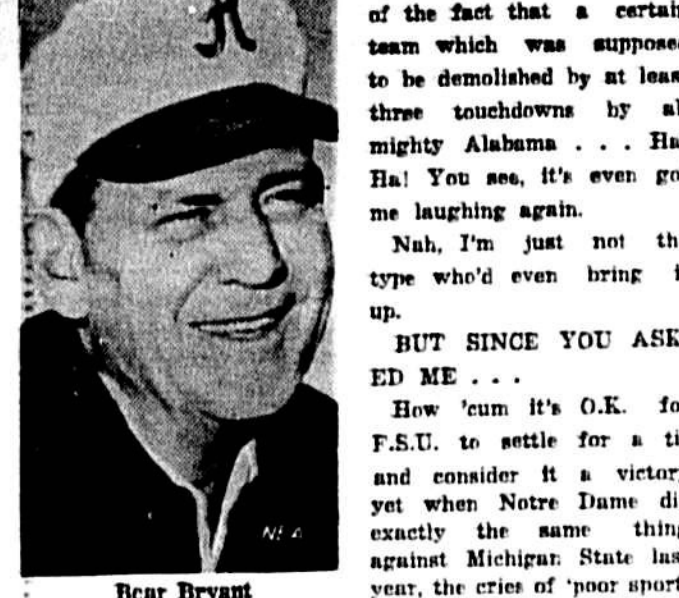

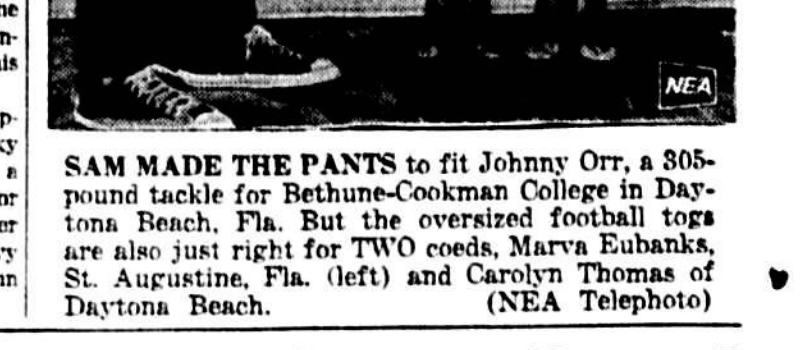

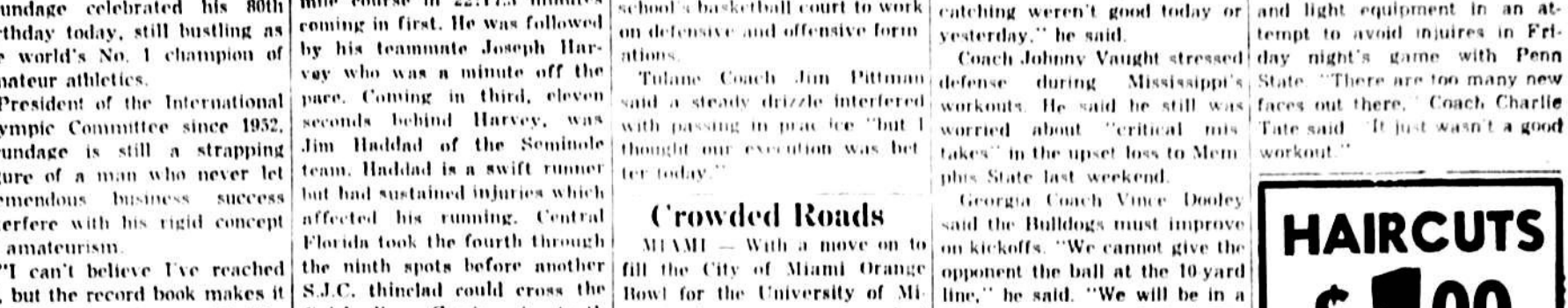

Medical News
 Clinics are now going to people instead of waiting for people to come to them.
 In Aluma areas across the nation, store fronts are being converted into health stations. In poverty-stricken rural areas buses are being turned into clinics.
 In two Alabama counties a big white bus marked Health on wheels makes regular scheduled stops along a well-publicized route. Women and children start lining up for care early in the morning. Many women have never in their lives seen a doctor, not even when giving birth.
 Although Health on Wheels is a family planning project of the local poverty program, family planning advice is not required in order for the women to get medical care.
 In addition to a physical examination, each patient is tested for cancer, diabetes and tuberculosis, among others; teeth are examined, toothbrushes are distributed and advice on tooth care is given.
 Several women found to be suffering from cancer were referred to hospitals for further checking and care. All had surgery and the outlook for their recovery is considered good.
 Women who want family planning advice and help, receive it—graciously and eagerly. One mother of six explained why she wanted birth control. Two of her children have serious speech defects; her husband is going blind; she has to manage with a monthly income of \$129.
 Another mother of eight was trying to keep her family alive on \$60 a month.
 Commented one woman after her first visit to Health on Wheels, "I didn't know anyone cared what happened to us." And another, "The bus was truly God-sent."

Brazil Bial
Draws Art From 61 Countries

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) - The Sao Paulo Bial, the largest periodical competitive exposition in the Americas of the world's modern art opened for a four-month stand here in late September.

Over 5,000 works of 1,000 artists from 61 foreign countries and Brazil are arranged in national displays in the huge, three-story Bial Building in this city's Itaipava Park. The Bial is scheduled to close on Oct. 8.

An international jury of art critics from Brazil and seven foreign countries have begun their task of selecting the winner of the \$10,000 Itaipava Award for the best individual work in any field.

The jury composed of Werner Schmelbach, West Germany; Alan Bowness, Britain; Ryszard Stanislawski, Poland; Andrew Ritchie, U.S.; Ida Rodriguez, Mexico; Ignacio Priovano, Argentina; Teijiro Kito, Japan; and Brazil's Geraldo Ferraz, will also choose the winners of the 10 Bial awards.

The U.S. exhibition, like those of Western European countries, seems to strike a balance between the traditional and the very new. A special retrospective selection of works of the late Edward Hopper contrasts with the list of 21 young artists including "pop" art, Andy Warhol and Tom Roush.

The "op" and "pop" works of Jean Pierre Reynaud, 28, and the "primary structures" of Alain Jacquet, also 28, represent the new French style. Two more mature artists, James Cuitel and Balducci Cesar, complete France's selection.

Gianni Colombo's electro-mechanical constructions, spark the Italian entry of 20 artists.

Russia, apparently unwilling to face the old vs. new issue, is only exhibiting stage and costume design for the theater.

The Sao Paulo Bial, in the heart of this industrial capital of Latin America's largest nation, is also the occasion for auxiliary international exhibitions, notably photography.
