Four of our original planks still form an important part of our present platform, developments which we believe for the best interests of Sanford, but not yet achieved.

During the past two years the platform has contained a few planks neither in the original, nor in the present, platform.

As a matter of future action, we believe that a commission of five members is advisable, in fact necessary, just as we believe there should be a boulevard entirely around Lake Monroe.

During the boom period Florida people experienced something more than a tendency to get ahead of themselves.

And as we said in an editorial introducing our original platform to the people of Sanford, "The Platform" will change as time goes on.

An old inhabitant will see the day when The Herald's platform must be torn down because it will have outlived its usefulness.

They are not in any particular hurry to build a schoolhouse or streets or increase their bank deposits, and if they are successful, a few of their "birds" will make some conditions worse and some harder to get—something no town desires.

When the merchants of a city are approached by one of these "birds" prior to falling for it, they should be told that when they are asked to spend our money it won't hurt a bit to investigate before spending. The thing which we are asked to buy may be a good investment—in this case no salesman will object to our finding out the facts—; in the other hand, and especially in this often true of advertising schemes, our purchase is more apt to bring loss than gain.

It may be said in passing that many cities have boards of censors which must pass on the advertising methods of concern like the one above mentioned. Is it not about time that Perry had one?

Large Poultry Project Near Longwood Made To Hold 25,000 Chickens

LONGWOOD, Feb. 5.—Announcement was made here today of the plan for a large scale commercial poultry plant to be operated on a co-operative plan.

With the exercising of its option on a part of a 100 acre tract having more than 2000 feet frontage on the Black Bear Trail in what is likely to be the new heart of Longwood when this international highway is completed in early spring, officers of the Longwood Co-operative Poultry Farms have revealed the purpose for which the land has been acquired. Through E. J. Hemminger, managing director of the Longwood Poultry Company, and co-ordinating the poultry interests of the community after the fashion of similar enterprises in California and New Jersey, a public statement has been made to the effect that the newly formed Co-operative Poultry Farms organization will immediately engage in the building and equipping of a thoroughly modern and down-to-date commercial plant with an ultimate capacity of 25,000 birds.

Work of Experts

The plant, the first unit of which is contemplated will be in operation within the next 30 days, will be operated under the complete supervision and management of a poultry expert of national standing and recognized success. The name of this gentleman is not yet announced, but it is known that several widely known, successful poultrymen, familiar with large scale operations, have either visited Longwood in person, during the past thirty days, or have presented their qualifications for taking charge of Longwood Co-operative Poultry Farms, by letter.

Meanwhile the men what will finance and direct this undertaking have made large preliminary expenditures of time and money in research investigating, markets, sources of supply from which the great Longwood flock will be built; types of houses and equipment.

Questioned as to the co-operative feature of the enterprise, Thomas P. Ballock, who has been engaged as acting executive of Longwood Co-operative Poultry Farms, gave this information: "All of the buildings, buildings and equipment of our company will be owned by the small group of citizens of Longwood, Orlando and Sanford who are backing this business in a substantial way."

Poultry Owned by Public

"The birds with which our plant will be stocked—ultimately some 25,000 in number—if markets and other conditions warrant as we are confident they will—will be owned by the public and managed by us under a profit sharing arrangement."

Movement Afoot To Buy Highway From William J. Connors

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 5.—(PSC)—The movement for purchase by the State or Palm Beach, Martin and Okechobee counties of Connors' Highway from Okechobee City to Twenty-mile Bend across the shore of Lake Okechobee and through the Everglades, has progressed to the point where W. J. Connors, builder and owner of the thoroughfare says he is willing to sell, according to information received by the Florida State Chamber of Commerce from West Palm Beach.

George F. Bessel, president of the Greater Palm Beach Chamber of Commerce, member of a committee appointed by the organization to discuss possible purchase of the highway from Mr. Connors, reports that Mr. Connors concurred with the Chamber in the belief that the highway should be free to the public. Cattle Dipping Operations In West Florida Will Be Started Soon, Says Knapp

BY JOSEPH L. LAUBE, International News Service Staff Correspondent

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 5.—Systematic dipping of cattle for eradication of the Texas fever tick that is costing Florida \$15,000,000 annually in the area between the Okeelokee and Suwanee rivers will begin in March and a force of experts is being assembled today to direct operations in that territory, Dr. J. V. Knapp, state veterinarian, declared in an interview with International News Service.

Operations will not begin until March because of the life history of tick, Dr. Knapp explained in stating that he had received numerous inquiries as to why the work would get under way next month.

"Seed ticks hatched from the eggs of 'engorged' ticks dropped from cattle during March and April will be found alive and ready for business early the following spring, but seed ticks hatched from the 'engorged' ticks that were dropped during months prior to March will either die of starvation or be destroyed in the vats by the coming December," he said.

"March and April constitute the most vulnerable period in the life of the tick and it is for this reason that dipping must begin the first of next month in Florida if tick eradication is to be completed in this area within the year."

"Systematic dipping on a hundred per cent basis every fourteen days during the year is equally as essential."

"Tick eradication is accomplished by the destruction of ticks on cattle when they pass through the arsenical mixture in the vats every 14 days or from starvation when they fail to attach themselves to the cattle."

"With the destruction of the March and April ticks before they can drop to the ground and furnish seeds ticks for the next season and the systematic dipping of all cattle in the area will enable the state livestock sanitary board to complete within the year eradication in the area in which the work is just being established."

FLA., Feb. 5.—(INS)—Linked hands with Connecticut in the fight against inheritance tax, Attorney General John H. Trumbull of Florida, while here on his first visit to this state will co-operate to the extent with Florida in the validity of the law which is stubbornly resisting a rebuff recently in the States Supreme Court.

Trumbull and Connecticut have common, both in their national problems and in their executive said.

"The inheritance tax, however, is the main factor in causing the existing friendly feeling between the two states, and its discrimination against Florida, which does not levy a state inheritance tax."

Governor Trumbull made known that he has written to the executives of all other states an expression of his attitude and stand on the inheritance tax question.

Should it become necessary, Governor Trumbull declared, an individual test case will be provided in Federal court to test the constitutionality of the tax.

"If we stand by and let the government have its way with the present inheritance tax measure, he continued, 'it will not be long before discriminating income, and Federal aid taxes will be levied.'

"I am opposed to all such taxes. Why should we have to pay the bills of North and South Dakota, New Mexico, and other states, or help to build roads in Wyoming?"
