## Congressional Coalition Of Democrats, Insurgents Appears To Be Dissolved

## Mild Weather Prevails Over Florida In Past Week, U. S. Report Shows

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 5.—Mild weather, typical of Florida in winter time, prevailed for the most part in the state during the week ending yesterday, according to the weekly weather and crop bulletins issued today by A. J. Mitchell, meteorologist in charge of the government weather bureau here. The complete bulletin follows:

The weather during the week was mild, and, as a whole, was very over the past-central and northeast coast districts with light and insufficient shower in the interior. The rainfall was very timely, but it did not extend very far inland, where uplands through the peninsula are very dry; low lands are in better condition and most lands in the Everglades district are in good condition, although there moderate showers are needed to some extent. The precipitation over the rest of the section ranged from a less than one quarter inch. The temperature excess ranged from 2 to 7, daily some midday temperatures being well up in the 80's.

**Our Changing Platform**

It was two years ago this month that The Herald began  
what it was pleased to call its “Platform.” That platform  
contained ten planks stating various improvements which,  
when acquired, would make, we believed, a bigger and better  
Sanford. The aims of five of these original planks have  
already been achieved.

They are as follows: (1) The extension of the white way;  
(2) Extension of local amusements; (3) Extension of street  
paving program; (4) Entrance into Florida state baseball  
league; (5) Acquisition of a municipal band. These are five  
things which The Herald advocated in its original platform  
which have since become realities, and which, we believe,  
have contributed to the growth of the city.

Four of our original planks still form an important part  
of our present platform, developments which we believe for  
the best interests of Sanford, but not yet achieved. They  
are (1) Completion of city beautification program; (2) Aug-  
menting of building program; (3) Deeper water route to  
Jacksonville; (4) Construction of St. Johns-Indian River  
Canal.

Only one plank of that original platform has been  
dropped through a change in our editorial opinion. That  
called for the construction of a boulevard around Lake Monroe.  
And we have ceased to advocate this improvement,  
not because we do not believe it a good one or a wonderful  
thing for Sanford, but simply because we do not believe the  
time ripe for it. We believe that in keeping with our econ-  
omy program, the boulevard around Lake Monroe should  
await improved conditions.

During the past two years the platform has contained  
five new planks neither in the original, nor in the present,  
platforms. We at one time advocated new and modern  
school buildings, but the construction of several has satisfied  
this want. For a while we were in favor of changing  
the City Commission from three to five members, but we do  
not now believe such a move would be advisable at this time.

As a matter of future action, we believe that a com-  
mission of five members is advisable, in fact necessary,  
just as we believe there should be a boulevard entirely  
around Lake Monroe, but we do not believe that the present  
is the time to precipitate a municipal row any more than we  
believe it is the time to vote additional bonds for such pur-  
poses on the boulevard.

During the boom period Florida people experienced  
something more than a tendency to get ahead of themselves.  
Enough subdivisions were put on, and lots sold, to accom-  
modate ten million people. Newspapers bought presses  
sufficiently large to take care of a circulation ten times its  
present size. It was a sort of hang over of this over-devel-  
opment which inclined us to city commission of five mem-  
bers. But when we begin to look the situation squarely in  
the face, we saw it would be several years before the pre-  
sent form of government would prove inadequate.

And as we said in an editorial introducing our original  
platform to the people of Sanford, “The Platform” will change  
as time goes on. It has changed in the past; it will change  
in the future. The achievement of an ambition, and the ne-  
cessity of forming new ones, or a change in opinion due to  
changing conditions, will always bring about a change in  
the platform.

As we said two years ago, the time will come when  
the oldest inhabitant will see the day when The Herald's  
platform must be torn down because it will have outlived  
its usefulness, and a new one constructed. As the various  
planks are realized they will be taken out and new ones put  
in their places and as the platform changes Sanford will  
grow and prosper.

**What Is Immoral?**

“Smoking by women is not immoral,” says Bishop E. V.  
Shaylor of Nebraska. “It is merely a molehill out of which  
some people would make a mountain. We have Ten Com-  
mandments. If people would diligently respect those laws  
they would not have time to dig up petty issues like women  
smoking, petting parties and things like that. What has a  
girl's smoking got to do with morality?”

Granting that it hasn't anything to do with morality,  
what about the physiological effect of smoking on women,  
Bishop? Does it, or doesn't it, injure the heart, lungs, blood  
cells, and membranes of the throat, nose and mouth? Do  
women who are consistent smokers make the best mothers  
and doesn't smoking have a more deleterious effect on women  
than men? If not, then we have been misinformed.

And if the good Bishop will grant, for sake of argument  
that smoking is injurious to the health of women, per-  
haps he will concede another point. Perhaps he will recall  
that somewhere in the Bible which gives him his Ten Com-  
mandments, is the statement that it is wicked to do anything  
which is harmful to the body. If smoking is harmful, it is  
wicked, hence immoral.

Does the Bishop think it immoral to get drenchedly  
drunk? The Ten Commandments do not forbid it.

**Expressly for International News Service.** — "I have been told of Benito Mussolini, the Dictator, the Man or the God. But Mussolini as a portrait painter, in my opinion, is a new individual. I have seen Mussolini in every mood, and with the eye of a painter, I have seen which I think others did not see.

Mussolini is a second Napoleon—why not then the next Mussolini?" he said laughingly.

Mussolini loves to laugh but one day there was a sudden change which gave me the view of the other Mussolini. He had slapped me on the back and was roaring aloud at one of his best jokes when a knock came at the big double doors of the room.

Immediately his countenance changed. He lowered those eyes to enter. It was a question to see him about some important political question of the moment.

### Meeting Delegates

With the opening of the doors, Mussolini's right hand closed into a fist and this he jammed into his side at the hip, standing with his elbow pointed toward the entering delegates. His face was stern; his attitude completely businesslike.

Then with machine gun-like rapidity, Mussolini answered the man and spoke a few brittle words to the other delegates. Then he abruptly turned away, turned his back on them in dismissal. It was not rudeness or unfriendliness—the interview merely was over.

My impression of Mussolini is that he is a fine specimen in his form. He is charming and child-like—he is stern and strong. He is like the captain of a great ship, standing upon the bridge and knowing that there is constantly a battle between man and the element and that upon his navigating ability depends much of the success of the voyage.


