New Park Funding Set


A \$34,000 aesthetic investment by the City of Sanford has secured \$150,000 in state and federal grants for development of the Hidden Lakes community Lee P. Moore Park.

The \$184,000 in combined funding will enable transformation of the 12 acre parcel to begin next month with the first of a two phase effort that will provide plenty of recreational offerings for residents of all ages and interests, Sanford Parks and Recreation Director Jim Jernigan said today.

The site is named in honor of Sanford's former mayor and was dedicated to the city three years ago by Residential Communities of America, developer of the Hidden Lakes community.

The city put up \$34,000, its manpower and equipment and the appraised value of the land as theoretical matching funds to meet grant acquisition condi-

tions. Jernigan said. First phase park work is

Daylight Saving Time currently begins the last Sunday in April and ends the last Sunday in October.

Reagan Wins Contra Aid

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) - President Reagan Sen. Paul Laxait. won the key vote on the \$100 million aid package to Nicaraguan rebels aboard Air Force Onc. a White House aide said Wednesday night.

The president gave the thumbs-up victory sign when he boarded Air Force One in Las Vegas for the 55-minute flight to Point Mugu, Calif. From Point Mugu. Reagan took a helicopter to his mountaintop ranch near Santa Barbara.

A White House aide, who asked not to be identified, said, "We won on the plane," referring to the four telephone calls the president made from Air Force One en route to Las Vegas.

Reagan attended a \$1,000-a-plate fund-raiser in Las Vegas for former Rep. James Santini, who is running for the seat being vacated by Republican

When the president boarded the plane in Washington, he had 213 votes and when he stepped off the plane in Nevada, he had 218 votes. White House spokesman Larry Speakes

Speakes said Reagan picked up eight to 10

votes in the last 48 hours. Reagan learned about the 221-209 vote just before he spoke at the Santini dinner, Speakes said. When members of his staff heard his exuberant exclamations, they began to applaud. he said. Reagan picked up 10 votes, five Republican and five Democratic, over his earlier defeat in the House March 20 on the Contra aid

Rebels Suspected in Fatal Cuzco Tourist Train Bomb Blast

LIMA, Peru (UPI) — Presumed lest-wing rebels dynamited a train carrying foreign tourists from Cuzco to the ancient Incan ruins of Machu Picchu Wednesday, killing seven people and injuring 39, authorities said.

One U.S. citizen, two West Germans, a Brazilian, a Peruvian, a Spaniard and an unidentified foreigner were killed, said Jorge Nicholson, administrator of the state train system office in Cuzco.

The dynamite was placed in the inside luggage rack of the third car of the four-car train, Nicholson said. The explosion knocked a hole in the wall and roof of the car. which was carrying 60 passengers, he said.

"The engine had actually started. People were getting aboard," said Buz Donahoo, a travel guide from Winter Park. Fla., who was in the car behind. "Everybody came running back through our car, and of course everyone was screaming. We expected there would be gunfire, but there

OPEC May Reach Ceiling Accord

BRIONI. Yugoslavia (UPI) - OPEC oil ministers apparently have laid the groundwork for a possible agreement on a strategy to stabilize collapsing oil prices in the range of \$17 to \$19 a barrel.

Both Ahmed Zaki Yamani, the influential Saudi Arabian oil minister, and Venezuelan Oil Minister Arturo Hernandez Grisanti, the outgoing OPEC president, emerged from the first day of talks at the cartel's summer summit Wednesday expressing cautious optimism about prospects for an accord.

OPEC sources said the talks centered on a Saudi-led plan calling for a production ceiling of 17.5 million barrels per day on the combined oil output of the 13 member states. close to the group's actual average daily output of 17.2 million barrels last year.

Grisanti relinquished the presidency Wednesday when the ministers elected Nigerian Oil Minister Rilwanu Lukman to the post.

Testimony In Hijack Trial Ends

GENOA. Italy (UPI) - Leon Klinghoffer, a wheelchairbound American slain during the hijacking of the cruise ship Achille Lauro, may have bitten the hand of one of terrorists before being shot and thrown overboard.

A deposition by the victim's widow, Marilyn Klinghoffer. who died of cancer Feb. 9, was read Wednesday to a hushed courtroom by presiding Judge Lino Monteverde. The reading marked the end of testimony in the trial of 15 men accused in the hijacking.

Rehnquist Dissents, Agrees With Scalia

Court Rejects Appeal Of Decision By Its Nominee, Upholds Anderson

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Supreme Court, overturning a decision by the man likely to be its next member, ruled Wednesday that public figures suing for libel must provide convincing evidence of that libel in order to go to trial.

The justices, voting 6-3, said a federal appeals court led by Judge Antonin Scalla erred in ruling that Liberty Lobby Inc. did not have to meet such a high standard before trial in its libel suit against columnist Jack Anderson and his magazine, The investigator.

Justice Byron White said the District of Columbia appeals panel led by Scalla should have relied on the standard set in the landmark 1964 ruling. New York Times vs. Sullivan, requiring public figures to prove with "convincing clarity" that they were libeled knowingly, or with actual malice.

"A court ruling on a motion for summary judgment (seeking dismissal of the case without trial) must be guided by The New York Times 'clear and convincing' evidentiary standard in determining whether a genuine issue of actual malice exists - that is, whether the evidence presented is such that a reasonable jury might find that actual malice had been shown with convincing clarity." White said.

The ruling was viewed as a major win for the news media because it reduces the possibility of frivolous, but still costly, libel suits going to trial.

Scalla - named by President Reagan as his choice for a high court vacancy - had ruled the clear and convincing evidence standard was like the "beyond a reasonable doubt" standard in criminal cases where probable cause is sufficient to go to trial.

Retiring Chief Justice Warren Burger and Justices William Brennan and William Rehnquist dissented. Rehnquist said the decision "will do great mischief with little corresponding benefit."

Reagan announced last week he wants Rehnquist to succeed Burger as chief justice and would nominate Scalia to fill Rehnquist's seat. Both shifts are expected to be approved by the Scnate.

In other action, the court: -Ruled unanimously that a Michigan biology teacher suspended after teaching a class about sex was not entitled to 8300.000 in damages. The court said the jury wrongly was allowed to base damages on the intrinsic value of the teacher's constitutional rights. The case was sent back for a new trial on what damages should be awarded.

The libel ruling was the second victory this term for the news media. In April, the court ruled 5.4 in a case involving the Philadelphia Inquirer that private figures bringing libel suits, not publishers, bear the burden of proof at trial.

Anderson called Wednesday's decision historic and said it will lessen the impact of libel suits filed to deter reporters from writing controversial stories.

"It means the other side has to lay out its proof in pre-trial." he said. "It means we don't have to go to (trial) every time some organization sues.



Attorney Mark Lane said Liberty Lobby would return to district court and ask for a chance to present more evidence to meet the standards set by the high court.

Season's First Hurricane Hits Texas, Causes Little Damage

PORT ARTHUR, Texas (UPI) — Hurricane Bonnie struck the Texas coast with 85-mph winds before dawn today. howling through streets abandoned by storm-wise residents.

The National Weather Service reported the eye of the season's first hurricane hit the beach just west of Sea Rim State Park, southwest of Port Arthur between Sabine Pass and High Island, at 5:45 a.m. EDT.

Thousands fled to high ground in the face of the season's first hurricane and most of Sabine Pass's 1,500 residents had already taken refuge inland.

Winds of 70 mph or more shricked around the Coast Guard station at Sabine Pass and Petty Officer Robert Martinez reported. "We are having leaks around all the doors. The rain is pounding on the doors. We just might be swimming out of here.

Trees and power lines were blown down across much of the upper Texas coast and power was out in much of the area. Downtown Port Arthur was plunged into darkness.

Panel Considers Impeachment

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A vote to impeach federal judge Harry Clathorne, who refuses to resign or give up his salary despite imprisonment for tax evasion, appears likely as the House Judiciary Committee today considers the matter.

A House subcommittee with jurisdiction over federal courts approved four articles of impeachment 15-0 and sent them to the full committee. Panel members had called the Nevada judge "arrogant" and "brazen."

The subcommittee found Claiborne's 1984 conviction warranted impeachment and that he had violated his oath of office and failed to obey the Constitution or to uphold the integrity of the judiciary.

Subcommittee Chairman Robert Kastenmeier, D-Wis., said Claiborne is the first convicted and jailed federal judge to face impeachment.

Tax Conferee Choices Dragging

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congressional fenders are taking their time choosing members for the conference committee to write a new tax code, but have warned lobbylsts that nothing will stop a tax reform bill from becoming law by

The lawmakers who will make up the conference will come exclusively from the congressional tax-writing panels that molded the two versions of tax reform approved by the House and Senate.

Passage of the Senate plan on Tuesday set the stage for the conference to begin work on a compromise bill next month. But aides to both the House Ways and Means and Senate Finance committees said Wednesday no decision had yet been made on when conferees would be appointed.

There was speculation that the Senate delegation could include all 20 members of the Finance Committee, and aides said Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., was "reviewing the record" of members of his panel so he could choose lawmakers he was confident would strongly defend the House bill.

Hostage Death 'A Mistake'

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - A SWAT team marksman hit the man he aimed for at the climax of the Rodeo Drive jewelry store standoff, but in a "tragic" case of mistaken identity. he killed a hostage instead of the gunman, officials said.

"It was not an accidental shooting," Sheriff Sherman Block said Wednesday of Monday night's killing of the Van Cleef & Arpels manager. "The person who was shot was, in fact, the person he had fired at. ... It was a tragle end, a mistake.

Hugh Skinner, a long-time manager of the exclusive store taken over by a gunman Monday, was shot through the heart by one of several sheriff's sulpers perched around the building when the suspect tried to flee using Skinner and two other hostages as a human shield.

Deputy District Attorney Elden Fox said multiple murder charges would be filed against suspect Steven Livaditis, 22. a Brooklyn-born drifter who previously lived in Las Vegas.

Downtown Parking Study Authorized

First Street shoppers will be polled for their parking preferences and downcown development trends will be projected as part of the \$12,500 traffic circulation study that will be undertaken in Santord during the next 14 weeks

Commissioners awarded the \$12,500 study award to a private consulting firm on Monday night.

Results of the study will hopefully enable Santord to successfully reroute the potential parking and traffic problems it faces down the road, said Engineering and Planning

Director Bill Simmons. The study-will be conducted by Howard Needles Tammen and Bergendoff a firm with headquarters in Orlando and a national reputation for traffic

studies. Simmons said. The firm will survey traffic flow in an area running from Seminole Boulevard to First Street, between Sanford and Myrtle avenues and look into parking availability from Third Street to Seminole Bouldvard. between French and Mellonville avenues, Simmons said.

The study will involve traffic counts and determinations "of what parking spaces are available now, where, and during what hours." Simmons said.

Additionally, random surveys will be conducted on First Street to determine where shoppers park and how far they are willing to walk to reach their destinations, Simmons said.

The gathered data will provide foundation for recommendations

regarding how Sanford can best handle the increased traffic and parking needs it faces in the near tuture. Simmons said.

He said there is sufficient parking area in downtown Sanford at the moment, and the study "will enable us to get a handle on what lies ahead so we can begin our planning now."

The study is follow-up to a like survey conducted in 1977 by the Greater Sanford Development Corporation.

In March, organization chairman and professional engineer Cal Conklin approached commissioners with a recommendation for a new study and offered assistance to the effort.

Conklin cited the last nine years of city growth in combination with anticipated development in the near future as

necessitating an updated study. In the very near future, the city anticipates construction of a 12,000 square foot library on a 30 car parking lot in the heart of downtown Sanford. The project will provide only eight on-site parking spaces, and they will be designated to employees.

Also, underway at the nearby Lake Monroe marina is a 14,000 square foot retail project.

Conklin has already proposed the city look into deck parking to accommodate future downtown developmet, and that it consider acquiring land for parking now. before available properties are purchased for buildings that would engender traffic and an additional need for parking.

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Justice Choice Critical For Us

"Scarcely any political question arises in the United States that is not resolved, sooner or later, into a judicial question," the French political analyst. Alexis de Tocqueville, observed a century and a half ago. The result. even more often today than in de Tocqueville's time, is that the Supreme Court is sure to be involved in the great questions of the day.

Associate Justice William Relinquist. nominated to succeed Chief Justice Warren Burger, and Judge Antonin Scalia of the Federal Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, nominated to fill the resulting vacancy, are both highly qualified judges, well equipped to engage in those momentous questions that await the court's

In his 15 years on the court, Rehnquist has been something of a lone wolf, staking out positions on a variety of delicate constitutional issues that are consistently to the right of his fellow conservatives. Though he often has found himself in the minority — on more than one occasion, a minority of one - he has articulated his positions with an accomplished writing style and an intellectual rigor that should serve him well as chief justice.

In his new position, he will be able to shape the court's deliberations and influence the national legal agenda in a variety of ways. though his abilities as a consensus builder are still in question. Since he was usually an ally of Chief Justice Burger, the voting pattern on the court presumably will stay the same.

The new chief justice would seem to have a formidable ally in Judge Scalia. Like Rehnquist. Scalia is known for the force of his intellect, the lucidity of his legal opinions and his strong conservative views. He has, for example, questioned the basis for the Supreme Court's recognition of a constitutional right to sexual privacy, including abortion rights, and has joined a ruling that the Constitution does not protect private homosexual acts between consenting adults. A liberal colleague on the court of appeals has called him "the most dangerous kind of conservative" — because the force of his intellect and his affable nature make him so persuasive. At 50, he is younger than any sitting justice.

The issues Rehnquist and Scalia will be helping to decide in the near future are both complex and controversial. They include the legality of various types of affirmative action in employment and education, the propriety of state efforts to restrict access to abortion. the permissible forms of state support for church-related institutions and the legal status of indepedent federal agencies such as the Federal Trade Commission.

Other issues likely to face the court include exceptions to the rule that generally bars use of illegally seized evidence in criminal cases. government regulation of electronic communications media such as cable television. the proper balance of power between the federal government and the status of regulating activity and protections the court has granted over the last few years to news organizations in libel cases.

Democrats have vowed to examine Rehnquist's record carefully before deciding whether to endorse his nomination as chief justice. California Sen. Alan Cranston, for example, has expressed concern about whether Rehnquist, "a man who has an extreme right-wing ideology," can "manage the court in a fair and balanced way.'

The senator's concern is not misplaced about Rehnquist or any other Supreme Court nominee. The choice of a new justice can change our lives and the lives of generations to come in tangible and significant ways. Sen. Cranston and his colleagues have an obligation to ensure that the choice is thoughtfully and carefully made.

A spokesman for Gente House Products, one of the indstry leaders, reminds that the garage door opener is a fairly new invention.

Until about 30 years ago, he notes, the opener was a person instead of a thing. "My grandfather would drive by the front of

his house, beep his born and drive around to the back where the garage was," he recalled. His Uncle George "would have the garage door open by the time he (Grandpa) arrived."

I don't know when Uncle George was invited but if he were anything like my uncles he required no batteries. Which may explain why they had to be jump-started on occasions.

The spokesman did observe that many modern customers no longer are content with

garage doors.

Just as we now have "smart" bombs that lock in on targets while avoiding radar detection, so high technology has brought us "smart" garage

Before any defense contractors get greedy. however, let me observe that I've never heard of a war in which the enemy was bombarded with automatic garage door openers.

"At last! Every family can have a genius in the house." the spokesman enthused.

Being the old-fashioned stupid type, I'll still take Uncle George. With or without batteries.

Moreover, the spokesman says "smart" units are as easy to install by do-it-yourselfers as were their earlier counterparts. Including, presumably. Uncle George.

Besides turning on the lights in the house, 'smart" garage door openers offer a number of other options, including not Uncle George but security-vacation locks.

The latter "enables the user to close and lock the door and, by remote control, turn off the entire system so that it can only be turned on again from inside the garage," the spokesman

That, I might add, is where the Uncle Georges of this world come in handy.

Leave them with a key to the house or garage while you are away on vacation and they will, most nights, turn out the lights and have the door open when you return. All automatically,

Other available "smart" features, some admittedly beyond Uncle George's mental capacity, include keyless entry systems, timer, monitor controls and "moving door alerts."

With monitor-controls, it was explained to me. a driver "can tell whether the gargage door is open or closed" while still in the house.

Which probably is more than could be said for Uncle George, unless he happened to be looking out of a rear window.

Pensions And Tax Reforms

By William R. Hawkins

The Senate Finance Committee tax reform package contains proposals to profoundly change the entire retirement income system. affecting the plans of all who are trying to provide for long-term security. And the change is not for the better.

Most controversial is the ending of tax deductibility for contributions to Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA) by workers covered by employee pension plans. This reverses the 1981 Economic Recovery Tax Act which opened IRAs to everyone, attracting more than 25 million participants. The implications of the demise of IRAs go beyond the immediate impact on tax revenues, however.

If people are not encouraged to provide for their own retirement. then they will become more dependent on programs controlled by others - pension funds and Social Security. Indeed, the foreclosure of IRAs to those with pension plans is based on the idea that 1) pensions and IRAs are substitutes and 2) pensions should be favored over IRAs. It is odd that the Reagan administration, which has stressed individual responsibility within an "opportunity society." should endorse a plan that prefers people to be dependent employees rather than independent investors.

Congress believes that pensions are easier to regulate than IRAs. The Senate committee plan, if enacted, would be the fifth major 'reform" of pension regulations in the last four years. Such constant change in a field which depends on long-term planning has been very disruptive and costly. The new reforms reflect committee chairman Sen. Bob Packwood's ideas about pensions, and have merely been a vehicle for Packwood to advance one of his pet projects.

The proposal forces companies to standardize their pension plans. It is normal for companies to have a different plan for salaried and clerical workers than for factory workers or to have different plans for workers in different locations or in different lines of business.

The current regulations to ensure that plans "fairly" represent employees in all compensation ranges are to be tightened. Credit for employer-provided Social Security benefits will be sharply reduced. The aim is to equalize programs to improve the benefits of those at the bottom of the pay scale. Since this would be enormously expensive, it will probably have the opposite effect. Firms will adopt a "lowest common denominator" plan which will reduce the benefits of more people than it will help.

belief seems to persist to this day. The espionage of both Pollard and Pelion is beneath contempt, but of the two Pelton is the more despicable. A National Security Agency (NSA) official. Pelton sold our secrets to the Soviets, and to some degree put the very security of the United States at risk. The Soviets are the enemy, and they are potentially lethal to the nation that nurrared Pelton. No punishment could be too condign.

The spying of Pollard for Israel. also despicable, is not potentially lethal. Israel is not going to attack the United States, and is a close American ally. The Israelis appear to have wanted from him information about the naval capabilities of neighboring Arab countries, after all a legitimate Israeli security concern.

Without for a moment excusing Pollard. I find it difficult to condemn the Israeli action on moral grounds. Of course, they got caught and the

Now Israel has been caught with whole thing is at least embarrassing to U.S. Israeli relations. On that account. American friends of Israel have been expressing extreme outrage, perhaps over-reacting. The fact of the matter is that we ourselves do spy on allies, and indeed we should do it more effectively

> It is obviously in our interest to know the military capabilities and political intentions of every nation in the world, whether NATO ally, Victnam, or the Chinese. Would it not have been valuable to the Roosevelt administration in 1940 to have had an accurate assessment of the capabilities and strategy of the French army?

> Just how good are the Chinese lighting forces today? How would they fare against the Soviet army in a localized war on the Siberian border? What is the state of Chinese fighter pilot training? What are the true, as against the stated, strategic intentions of the leadership in Beijing? On such points the balance of power in Asia turns, and with it the balance of power in the world. If some cash changed hands in the interest of more detailed information it would not imply hostility in China but rather an alert concern for our own and others' interest.

All of our own military attaches abroad are in some degree spies. They pursue military, economic and political information - even in triendly London. When our naval attaches go swimming, on any shore in the world, they are instructed to examine the beach gradient and the quality of the sand - just in case we have to put troops

SCAPPOOSE, Ore. (NEA) - The leading candidates in Oregon's gubernatorial race this year are known throughout the state as Norma and Neil - but that first-name familiarity obscures a fierce struggle between two highly competitive politi-

Nett is Nett Goldschmidt, a charismatic Democrat who was elected mayor of Portland, the state's biggest city, in 1972 when he was only 32 years old. He was re-elected in 1976, then resigned in 1979 to join President Carter's Cabinet as transportation secretary.

Norma is Norma Paulus, an equally appealing Republican and self-described "staunch feminist," who was an activist member of the state legislature. She was elected Oregon's secretary of state in 1976 and re-elected in 1980.

"It's already become a cliche to say the state can't lose regardless of which candidate wins," says one journalist who has observed the competition. (Republican Gov. Victor Atiyeh is legally prohibited. from seeking a third term.)

The confrontation in Oregon is among the most compelling of this year's gubernatorial contests - but a number of other races are equally noteworthy. Among them:

Two former governors, both Republicans, are seeking to topple incumbent Democrats and regain their old offices. In Texas, William Clements is challenging Mark White, while in Ohio, James Rhodes is attempting to unseat Richard Celeste.

Nebraska is the scene of an unprecedented gubernatorial contest. For the first time in U.S. history, both of the major party nominees - State Treasurer Kay Orr. a Republican, and former Lincoln Mayor Helen Boosalis, a Democrat - are women.

The governors of the country's two most populous states -California Republican George Deukmejian and New York Democrat Mario Cuomo - both face re-election this year and both are layored to win their bids for second

In two other populous states. however, popular governors are barred by law from seeking reelection to third terms. Forced to step down are Pennsylvania Republican Richard Thornburgh and Florida Democrat Robert Graham. Also retiring this year is the man who has served as governor of a state longer than any living politiclan - Alabama Democrat George Wallace, an always colorful and often controversial politician.

In Iowa, the Democrats hope to capitalize upon unrest stemming from chronic problems in the agricultural economy.

FAA Works To Ensure Pilot Fitness

And Joseph Spear

WASHINGTON - The Federal Aviation Administration is scrambling to clean up a frightening problem: Auditors found that many doctors were giving sloppy or incomplete physical exams to pilots. especially those who fly small planes.

The Hercules in charge of this stable-cleaning operation is Federal Air Sorgeon Frank Austin, a medical doctor and former Navy test pilot who flew in Vietnam and assisted in Mercury space flights. Since the auditors reported their findings last July, about 100 out of 900 examining physicians have been stripped of their authority to give FAA certification to pilots.

In addition, the backlog of faulty physicals awaiting investigation and correction has dropped from 100 in 1984 to fewer than 50 currently, "I feel pretty happy about

it. Austin told our associate Stewart Harris.

The Transportation Department auditors' unpublished report is enough to whiten the knuckles of the most devil-may-care air traveler. Though Austin assured us that 99 percent of the errors turned up by the auditors were clerical goofs. some were not. As a result, dangerously unhealthy pilots were

certified fit to fly.

For example, on March 21, 1984. an FAA-certified military doctor in Pensacola, Fla., declared a retired naval commander healthy enough to pilot a small plane, even though he suffered from atrial flutters and cardiac arrhythmia - both heart conditions that can ground a pilot as well as gallstones, kidney stones and a hernia.

Officials in charge of monitoring the physical exam records didn't get the pilot's file until 42 days later. when it arrived at the Civil Aeromedical Institute in Oklahoma City, Okla. By the time they got more test data on the excommander, it was too late: 60 days had passed, and under the law the medical certification was considered "affirmed" by the FAA.

Despite urgent pleas from the Aeromedical Institute, the pilot did not relinquish his medical certifica-

Another case: On Nov. 1, 1983, an FAA-certified doctor in Lagos. Nigeria, approved a pilot to fly commercial aircraft for another year. When the examination record arrived at the Aeromedical Institute three months later, officials were appalled to see that the medical exam was blank except for some eye tests. The medical examiner in Nigeria never replied to inquiries from the institute, which eventually dropped its attempt to get a complete physical examination on the

Based on a random sampling of

the 56,500 filers who passed FAAcertified annual physicals in 1983. the auditors indicated that roughly 5 percent should have been grounded or at least restricted for health reasons. Almost half the mistakes or omissions by the examining physicians involved significant areas such as vision, blood pressure and pulse, urinalysis and medical history.

The auditors found that generally the most errors were committed by physicians who gave the fewest medical exams. For example, at McGuire Air Force Base, N.J., the doctor with the lowest error rate (29.5 percent) gave 465 exams in 1983. A second doctor made errors on 65 percent of hts 26 exams, and a third made mistakes on both the exams he gave.

Overall, the auditors estimated. 39 percent of all the exams given to filers in 1983 contained errors of some kind.

BATmobile Passes Its Trial Run

Washington To Consider Capsule Ban

SEATTLE (UPI) - The manutacturer of Anacin-3, the latest painkiller found to be laced with deadly eyanide in the Seattle area, ordered its capsule products off the Washington market and state officials Wednesday considered a total ban on capsule sales because of two cyanide poisoning deaths.

A bottle of Anacin-3 taken Tuesday from a shelf in Auburn during a random test by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration was found "to contain the presence of eyanide," said officials investigating the deaths of a man and a woman who died from cyanide-laced Extra-Strength Excedrin earlier this month.

It was the fifth evanidecontaminated bottle of headache. pills to be discovered in the Auburn area in the past two weeks.

The FDA immediately issued a "strong consumer warning" to residents of the communities of Kent and Auburn, about 20 miles south of Seattle, not to take any form of capsule product pending the investigation.

Barbara Vanderkolk. chairman of the state pharmacy board, said she would ask the board to temporarily ban all non-prescription capsule drugs in the state.

"In the instances we've seen of late, the public health and safety is being jeopardized by these capsules because they can be tampered with." Vanderkolk said. "We have the authority to regulate drugs in this state. I believe it is in our power to pass an emergency rule.

Several major chain stores, including Safeway and Pay 'N Save, voluntarily removed capsale products from their Washington stores.

Jack Wood, spokesman for American Home Products Corp. of New York, said the company has "quarantined" all its capsule products in Washington. The firm is the parent of Whitehall Laboratories which makes Anacin-3 and Dristan.

"We don't have any intentions at this time to discontinue capsule production." Wood said. The company has been told by the FBI and FDA, he said, that the latest tampering cases are ''local in nature.'

Auburn police spokesman Bob Karnofski said FDA agents joined police officers in sweeping all capsule products - including vitamins, allergy pills, diet pills and cold remedies - from the shelves of about 50 stores in Auburn.

Karnofski said that until further testing of the Anacin-3 bottle is completed by the FBI at its crime lab in Washington. officials will not know if the eyanide came from the same batch that caused the deaths of Sue Snow and Bruce Nickell in separate incidents.

The presence of cyanide in an unopened bottle of Anacin-3 from an Auburn drugstore was detected by a fluoroscope examination, similar to an X-ray,



Gunter Denies Law Firm Awards Tied To Political Campaigns

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter, who was first elected in 1976 and is seeking re-election, said there is no connection between his political fund-raising efforts and state contracts awarded to lawyers.

Gunter made his remarks at a news conference Wednesday in response to an FBI investigation of his office. Reports have been swirling for several weeks, and Gunter has confirmed, that two department employees have been questioned by FBI agents. Gunter said the investigation is confidential but there have been no specific charges brought by the FBI.

Several reports have quoted unnamed sources who said the investigation involves contracts in the state's selfinsurance program - the Division of Risk Management that are awarded to outside lawyers.

According to Preston Cowie, the director of the Division of Risk Management, which provides the state with self-insurance, there are currently about 130 law firms that do insurance work for the state.

Cowie said they are retained on a per case basis and are paid \$60-\$70 an hour. He said the firms are initially selected by insurance claims specialists based on the firms' qualifications. For the first 11 months of the current fiscal year, Cowie said, the state has paid about \$2.3 million in insurance legal fees.

Bundy Appeals To High Court

MIAMI (UPI) - Rejected by a circuit court judge, defense attorneys for serial killer Ted Bundy take an appeal for a stay of execution to the Florida Supreme Court today, just six days before Bundy is scheduled to die on the 10th anniversary of the death penalty's reinstatement.

Defense lawyers James E. Coleman and Polly J. Nelson of Washington, D.C. argued before Judge Edward Cowart Wednesday that Bundy had ineffective counsel during his trial and subsequent appeals, and requested time to allow an examination of his competency.

In a short oral ruling Cowart, who originally sentenced Bundy to death in 1979, rejected the appeal for a 60-day stay for lawyers to prepare motions for a new trial in the deaths of two Florida State University coeds.

Prosecutor Bob Cummings, Assistant State Attorney for Leon County, said after the hearing the defense did not say anything or attempt to prove anything that had not come

Judge Bribe Attempt Foiled

KISSIMMEE (UPI) - The Florida department of Law Enforcement arrested two men and charged them with attempting to bribe Osceola County Circuit Judge Cecil Brown over a divorce case, an FDLE official said.

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

Cast Out Technology, Follow Birds For Fishing Spots

Fishermen go to great lengths to eatch more and bigger fish. Much money is spent on boats, motors. lishing equipment and electronics.

Modern fishermen are capable of moving from one spot to another in excess of 60 miles per hours. Their boats are equipped with flashers and recorders that mark fish blow the boat. They also have PH meters, water temperature gauges, and color selectors that indicate what color of lure to use under certain conditions.

Fishing has become so technological that some fishing boats resemble spy vessels. All of the gauges, chart recorders, meters, and other gadgets would look susplctous to someone who is unfamiliar with fishing technology.

technology has made fishermen more effective. There are some expert fishermen, however, who do not rely upon any fancy equipment at all. They have keen eyes and can spot fish under the water. These fisherman are very patient and will wait for long periods of time at one spot without moving a muscle. They are on the water daily and know all the good spots.

These fishermen also have the ability to do something that even the most modern bass boat cannot attempt to do they can fly in the air and spot fish. below them.

By now you realize that these expert fishermen are birds.

We could all become better fishermen by observing birds and where they are feeding. Birds can locate

bajtfish better than the best fisherman. and all good fishermen realize that gamelish are usually close at hand

once baitfish have been located. One bird in particular, the blue heron, is well worth observing while yo nar fishing. This majestic bird stands around four feet tall and is an excellent fish eatcher. The blue heron stations itself at points, sloughs, run-offs and other fishy areas in search of food. Anglers would be wise to fish the same areas that this expert fishes, because bass and other gamefish lurk only a cast away.

Smaller members of the heron family and members of the egret family also merit attention. They too are expert anglers, and can locate small minnows and baitfish for alert fisherman. The presence of these birds indicates an abundant bait supply, and often the abundance of predatory fish

Seagulls are very helpful in enabling fishermen to locate roaming schools of fish in open waters. Sunshine bass,

largemouth bass, stripers, bluefish and Spanish mackeral are schooling fish that frequently feed upon schools of bairfish in vast areas of open water. Observant fisherman can spot seaguils diving for crippled battlish for up to a mile or so away. The feeding behavior of these birds is a signal to fishermen that gamefish are feeding directly

The gawky pelican can also help fishermen to locate fish. This bird will dive from above and capture baitfish with its large bill, it will then usually rest upon the water for a while before flying off in search of more food. Pelicans are very helpful to anglers in locating pods of bait in saltwater.

Phillies Close Carlton Chapter With Release

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) - The I join him in that." Philadelphia Phillies' portion of Steve Carlton's storied baseball career has ended.

His career itself, however, may not yet be over.

Phillies president Bill Giles announced the release of the four-time Cy Young Award winner Wednesday after failing to convince him to retire. At the same time, Giles said two other teams had inquired about Carlton's services.

"An American League club and a National League club asked about him." said Giles, who did not divulge the teams. "A lot of clubs are hurting for pitching and someone could pick him up.

"He thinks he can still pitch and he's hopeful someone will pick him up and

Carlton, 318-223 in his 21-year career, was 4-8 with a 6.18 ERA for the Phillies this season and had been hit hard in his last four starts.

"I met with Steve a week ago and we discussed his retiring," a tearful Giles said in announcing the move. "He convinced me he still wanted to pitch. We met again last night and he convinced me again that he still wanted to pitch but I was convinced it was no longer in the Phillies' best interest to have him pitch."

In his last start. Carlton gave up six runs on six hits, while walking six and striking out six in five innings against the St. Louis Cardinals Saturday night.

"I made up my mind Saturday in the fifth inning that we had to do something, that he could no longer pitch."

Giles said. "It took me three days to get up the nerve to tell him."

Pitching coach Claude Osteen said it would not surprise him if Carlton continues playing.

"He still wants to pitch, he still thinks he can win." Osteen said. "I'm not going to say he can't win. There's enough stuff there if he can get the rhythm he's looking for

Carlton, who does not speak to the press, was not present at the news conference.

Carlton, 41, who was acquired by the Phillies from the Cardinals in 1972 in return for pitcher Rick Wise, won the Cy Young award in 1972, 1977, 1980 and 1982 and is the only pitcher to win the award four times.

His 318 victories rank 10th on the all-time list and sixth in National League history and his 3,982 career strikeouts rank second all-time and are tops in the National League.

He has picked 55 shutouts. 13th best in history, completed six 20-win seasons, and his 4,961 1-3 innings pitched rank 10th all-time and fifth in the National League.

He is the Philies' career leader in victories, with 241, and strikeouts. with 3,031, and second in games pitched, innings pitched and shutouts. Carlton never pitched a no-litter but had six one-hitters in his career.

"I think for a period of 14 years, he had more impact as a pitcher than any pitcher in Philadelphia Phillies' history." Giles said. "We had winning seasons for 10 straight years and one of the reasons for those 10 straight

winning seasons was Steve Carlton." With Carlton, the Phillies won National League East titles from 1976-78. won their first World Series in 1980 and captured the National League

penant in 1983 before losing in the

World Series. In 1985, Carlton missed 90 days because of a strained left rotator cuff and compiled a 1-8 record. This year, he had surrendered 102 hits in 83 innings, while walking 44 and striking

Professor: Bias Dose Shouldn't Have Killed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Cocathe can kill by short circuiting the brain's electrical system and disrupting heartheat, but the potent enough to be fatal, one medical authority said.

The professor at a prestigious medical college, who requested anonymity, told United Press International Wednesday there had to have been something else wrong for a young, strapping athlete such as Bias to have succumbed merely from snorting what some say was his first

line of cocalne. That something could have been an undetected brain ancurysm - a soft spot on an artery that can balloon out and burst when blood pressure rises after cocaine use - or other physical condition. The physician

"It doesn't make sense," he said.

He said medical examiners would have to had examined Bias' brain to determine whether there were any abnormalities. and that "it was only theory" the former Maryland basketball star died because of the effects of the drug on his heart.

"You can't talk about an arrhythmia (an irregular heart beat) after he's dead. Unless he had an electrocardiogram on hun at the time, you don't know

he had an arrhythmia." he said. The physician declined to allow his name to be used for publication - because for all he knew, the missing information "is sitting around and no one has gone after it."

Dr. Robert Byck, a professor of pharmacology and psychiatry at

dose Len Blas took was not Yale University medical school, said no one knows exactly how much cocaine it takes to kill someone. Each person's toler-

ance is different. Most often, victims of cocaine fatalities are smugglers — those who swallow a plastic bag or other soft container that later bursts and releases huge doses

of the drug, he said. The National Center for Health Statistics said no national figures on cocaine deaths were available. Its reports show there were 580 deaths caused by cocaine or cocaine in combination with other drugs in 26 major metropolitan areas in 1984, and 600 were expected when figures for 1985 are completed.

Sunscreens Block Ultraviolet Rays

DEAR DR. GOTT - Do sun- find out which wines and foods screens really help prevent skin contain sulfites? cancer? Is it OK to use a sunscreen every day?

DEAR READER - As a general rule, sunscreens block out ultraviolet radiation - the portion of sunlight that causes tanning and seems to be associated with some skin cancers. Therefore, sunscreens will not help prevent all skin cancers, only the types that are sun-related. Unless you have an allergic reaction to the compounds, it is safe to use sunscreens on a daily basis.

DEAR DR. GOTT - My 78-year-old husband has long arms, and when he walks or sits, his hand is always on his penis. This embarrasses me, but he won't tell his doctor about this dirty habit. He's been married eight times. Will he harm his health from feeling himself all the time?

DEAR READER - His physical health won't be affected, but your mental health may be. I suggest that you take the initiative and inform your husband's doctor of the problem. Perhaps there is a physical reason why your husband can't leave himself alone. In any case, I believe that efforts to break his habit would best come from a health professional. Your husband may view your constant suggestions to keep his hands above the table as unjustified nagging. Let his doctor have a crack at this.

DEAR DR. GOTT - Since menopause, I've had seborrheic dermatitis. I have a cortisone cream which I use sparingly, but it helps. Will this condition ever disappear?

DEAR READER - Seborrhete dermatitis is a common, troublesome, chronic skin inflammation. On the scalp, it is called dandruff. The dermatitis usually responds to special shampoos or cortisone cream. It may disappear by itself. The cause is unknown. Dermatologists can often help patients with seborrhea cope more effectively with the ailment.
