A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Take-all: A disease of grasses

Take-all is a root rot disease caused by a soil-inhabi-tant fungus affecting all warm-season turf grasses, especially St. Augustine grass. Symptoms of this disease are primarily observed during the sum-

mer and early fall months when Florida receives the majority of its rainfall.



Symptoms

Because the roots are affected, plants will not be able to efficiently obtain water or nutrients from the soil, nor will they be able to store the products from photosynthesis. The fungus does not attack leaves and symptoms observed on the leaves are the result of the damage to the root system. If the turf grass is not stressed or is under a low

level of stress, leaf symptoms may never be observed. However, under high stress conditions, symptoms will begin to appear on the leaves. By the time the leaf symptoms appear, the pathogen probably had been active on the roots for at least two to three weeks, maybe longer.

Initially, yellowing areas develop randomly on the turf ranging in diameter from a few inches to a few feet. Roots develop black lesions and eventually, become very short, black and rotted. Stolons and mizomes may have black lesions and, under severe disease conditions, begin to rot.

Cultural Controls

Measures that prevent or alleviate stress are the best methods for controlling the disease or at least decreasing the potential damage. The turf grass must be mowed at the correct height during the summer. It may even be necessary to raise the mowing height during periods of rainy weather. The turf grass must be mowed as frequently as necessary so that only one third of the leaf tissue is removed during any one mowing event. Scalping the grass damages the growing point, especially of St. Augustine grass.

Balance nitrogen applications with equal amounts of potassium. For every pound of nitrogen applied, an equal amount of elemental potassium should be applied. Slow-release nitrogen and slow-release potassi-um sources should be used. Avoid nitrate-nitrogen products and quick-release urea products. If slow-release potassium is not available, then apply quick-release potassium to the turf grass between nitrogen applications. Extra potassium may be useful in late summer and early fall. Apply micronutrients, especially

Chemical Control


The fungicides containing azoxystrobin, myclobutanil, triadimeton propiconazole, and thiophanate methyl are used to control this disease. These systemic fungicides are not as effective as the use of cultural controls once the disease symptoms have developed. These fungicides may be useful when used preventively. This means they must be applied before symptoms develop.

For best control, apply the fungicides at least one

month before you normally observe aboveground symptoms. Continue applying the fungicide once a month until the weather is no longer conducive for disease development.

City should OK conference center agreement

Sanford City Commissioners will make an important decision Monday night as they consider whether or not to execute a memorandum of agreement with

Acquest/Benchmark Hospitality. The memorandum would outline the responsibilities and establish a timeline for gathering detailed information about building a hotel/conference center on the Lake Monroe waterfront.


The conference center issue has been in the public spotlight for five years. That's the norm for these types of projects. Decisions can't be made overnight and appropriate analysis must be done to ensure the city is not getting itself into a financial mess.

To date, the studies are positive for building the conference center. In addition, Sanford residents approved a referendum to build the facility three years ago. Therefore, the City Commission should approve the memorandum of understanding, which will allow all parties to complete their analysis and planning. Such efforts will produce the nuts and bolts facts about the feasibility of the project and the financing and design elements that are involved.

A small faction in the community would just as soon commissioners reject the memorandum of understanding. They don't want a conference center in Sanford come hell or high water. Commissioners should reject that negativism. To make an informed decision, commissioners must have facts, not misguided sentimentalism from a few curmudgeons who long for the days of their youth. While Sanford should never loss sight of its history, it must also focus on the future.

This newspaper has supported the concept of a conference center since the project's inception, and it will continue to do so for any prudent, viable plan that is presented. Approving the memorandum of agreement is the right step to determine if this is the viable plan. Commissioner Whitey Eckstein hit the nail on the head when he said, "If the city doesn't do this now, it won't happen for many, many, years. This is a once in a generation type thing."

Commissioners should remember that as they contemplate Moriday night's vote. It would be a shame for them to miss an opportunity to score big for Sanford just because they're afraid to take a swing at the plate.

Black Americans must turn off TV and turn on to books

Perhaps the NAACP's two-year crusade to force the big networks to cast more African-

Americans in starring roles on TV is paying off. According to one new study, 16 percent of all major characters in new series slated for fall are black — a higher percentage than blacks account for in the U.S.

population, which is about 12 percent black. Now that there is evi-dence the NAACP still Tucker has some clout, maybe the organization can be per-suaded to turn it to a worthwhile purpose. Badgering the networks to put more blacks on TV is the wrong cause. A more worthy crusade would be persuading black Americans—who watch more television than any other ethnic group—to turn off their TVs.

Initiative Media, the ad

agency that surveyed TV's eth-nic diversity, also looked at TV-viewing habits. According to its study, African-Americans watch 73.6 hours of TV a week about 17 hours more a week than Latinos and about 22 hours more than other nonblacks, including whites and Asians. If that's anywhere close to accu-rate, black Americans are spen ing a stupefying amount of time in front of the boob tube.

Much of what passes for TV entertainment is sheer drivel dumb, cliched, banal. And even well-written and well-acted TV shows are no substitute for a good book.

With the academic perfor-mance of black students still lagging behind their white and Asian peers, an emphasis on books and scholarship ought to be the NAACP's big push. The annual release of nationwide SAT scores revealed that, while scores for white and Asian students had risen, test scores for black and Latino students had declined.

While some of the learning gap can be accounted for by an economic gap — children of wealthy, college-educated par-ents tend to have higher scores than children of impoverished, less-educated

parents. That news comes as federal courts show

increasing hostility to college affirmative action programs, intended to boost admissions of minority students who have his-torically had less-than-stellar test scores. Just last week, an Atlanta-

based federal court ruled the University of Georgia's affirma tive action program unconstitutional. If the U.S. Supreme Co. upholds that view, many blac and Latino kids will be shut of the nation's premier unive

The NAACP Legal Defense Fund is actively working to sup-port affirmative action in college admissions. Perhaps its expertise can help to persuade federal courts to support college admissions programs that recognize centuries of legal discrimination in educational opportunity, going back to anti-literacy laws that made it a crime to teach blacks to read.

But it would be foolish to college admissions will last forever. African-American and Latino students need to prepare for the coming age of rigid reliance on standardized test scores. They need to take more demanding high school classes, attend SAT-prep courses and practice test-taking skills. And they need to turn off the TV and read novels on college-prep reading lists.

Actually, almost any book is more beneficial than TV. And an NAACP crusade emphasizing alternative leisurely pursuits — reading, chess, walks in the park would be more beneficial to black Americans than an integrated cast on "Friends."

this project," VanDerworp said. "One, we can bring in a private developer to do the whole thing. They in turn would go to a bank or go to investors to get funding at an interest rate of about 12.5 percent.

"Second, we as a city could finance the thing ourselves, and get a rate of about 5 percent. Under that acenario, the city would have to pledge its full faith and credit (through an increase in ad valorum taxes) to secure the funding.

"Third, we could get what they call a blended rate by establishing an SPOE - some people call it a Community
Development Corporation Corporation (CDC). With tax breaks and certain guarantees, you get a lower interest rate, about 7 percent."

VanDerworp said the SPOE model offers two advantages. One, it provides a better interest rate than 100 percent private financing, which translates into more money being spent on the facilities rather than on interest rates. Two, the city does not have to commit ad valorum taxes to guarantee the bonds.

"We're not interested and would prefer not to pledge gen-eral ad valorum taxes," VanDerworp said. "What this does is say to the general tax payer, 'You're not on the hook.' The bond holders are at risk. Whoever buys the bonds is assuming the risk."

The bonds can be guaranteed a number of ways, VanDerworp said, and the more guarantees, the lower the interest rate. For example, Seminole County has committed \$600,000 a year in Tourism Development Commission funds which could

be used as a pledge to lower bond interests rates. Community Redevelopment taxes generated by the facility could also be pledged, as could net profits generated by the hotel/conference center.

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said he is not familiar with SPOE funding models and has questions about it functions.

"The financing is the biggest part of it," Eckstein said. "We've got to make sure that's solid."

Eckstein said he did like the Idea of not pledging ad valorum taxes to guarantee a bond issuance.

"If it was just the city doing this alone, you would have to be very careful on the financing," Eckstein said. "I'll tell you this,

these people aren't going to build the conference center if they don't think they can make some money and pay off the bond service.

"And there are plenty of people out there who buy these type of bonds," Eckstein said. "We would-

n't have the Microsofts and these other companies if people didn't make these types of investments."

Commissioner Art Woodruff is more hesitant about the fund-

ing model
"I have a lot questions about how these things work," Woodruff said. "It concerns me that the developer doesn't take any risks and it seems like the

In particular, Woodruff said he thinks the city is changing its direction from three years ago when voters approved a referen-dum on the hotel/conference center. The ballot language for that referendum asks voters to authorize the city to "lease a portion of Fort Mellon Park, to enter into contracts and to authorize development of the park for a hotel/conference center and city park complex."

"It's a different plan than we went into three years ago," Woodruff sald, noting that the

proposed funding structure would create a SPOE rather than leasing the

property. "I think there were a lot of specifics given three years ago, and now we have changed those specifics."

VanDerworp Woodruff agreed - that the city has to have flexibility in determining what funding mechanisms to use. The City Manager also said the language in the referendum does not dictate there must be a lease

agreement. The voters were not voting on a lease or no lease,

said. "The intent in the language was to tell people that we're not going to give the property away. I've checked this with our attorney Bill Colbert."

Eckstein said he hopes the City Commission moves forward with the project.

"Art Woodruff is a smart guy, and he'll have a lot of question good questions that need to be answered," Eckstein said. "If we feel comfortable that all the questions have been resolved, we need to do it. If the city doesn't do this now, it won't happen for many, many, years.

"This is a once in a generation type thing."

what other people don't have," Liquori said. "It kind of touched my heart, and I felt like we could

do something for this agency."

Thursday morning officers began to pack the 30 navy Kosrae Police" baseball hats. flashlights, rain coats, PR-24s, bio-hazard kits, binoculars, cassette recorders, report and ticket holders, spiral note pads, key chains, magnetic vehicle police signs and a radar gun for the island.

"Their capacity is for tourism, but it's not really developed," Lindamood said. "They're installing runway lights at the airport as we speak. It's a strange place. They have some amenities, but not others. They have Internet connections but no television.'

The island is located 2,500 miles west of Hawaii and is a UN Trust Territory under U.S. administration. Magnificent coral reefs bring scuba divers

and snorkelers to the island. Originally the island was under Germany's control until World War I. During World War II, Japan occupied Kosrae and artifacts from the war still remain.

According to Lindamood, the relatively peaceful island of 8,000 people, which is one of the 680 islands in the Federated States of Micronesia, has recently come under criminal attack from Chinese and Russian mob-

"The one way to deter crime is to have a well-established, welltrained, well-equipped police department," Officer Derrick Becton said. "We help other agencies with minor things, but never to this extent. They would never have been able to afford what we're sending them.



Killing birds and other wildlife would not stop west nile virus

OCALA — Although some well-meaning Floridians are calling for a wholesale slaughter of birds to stop the West Nile virus outbreak and other mosqui-to-borne diseases, wildlife officials say that wouldn't work.

"Birds aren't causing the problem - mosquitoes are," said George Wallace, Ph.D., bird conservation coordina-tor for the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) office in Panama City. "Birds, especially crows, are just victims." Wallace sald West Nile

virus is what scientists call an "arbovirus" — a disease spread by such critters as mosquitoes, sand flies and ticks. Mosquitoes carry West Nile virus in their saliva, and they infect host species, such as birds, when the insects bite to draw blood.

"Some birds die within a couple of days," Wallace said. "Others — the birds that survive the virus, will have infectious West Nile virus for one to four days after exposure. Then they are immune."

A large number of mos-quitoes must feed on an infectious host to ensure that some of them are still around after the portion of the virus' incubation cycle that occurs outside of a host (about 2 weeks, depending on temperature) to feed again on another bird host. Over 70 species of birds have tested positive for West Nile virus in the iciulcasiem slaics when the virus first turned up in North America in 1999.

People, horses and most other mammals are not known to develop infectious-level viral disease very often, and thus are probably 'dead-end' or incidental' hosts," Wallace

So far, 20 birds have tested positive for West Nile virus in Florida, all of them in Okaloosa, Washington, Leon, Jefferson, Madison, Duval and Taylor counties. Half of them were in Jefferson County.

West Nile virus can cause encephalitis (inflammation of the brain), and it can also cause serious disease or even death in horses, but people can protect them-selves by taking a few simple precautions.

For instance: * Stay Indoors during hours of peak mosquito activity. If you are going to be outdoors during those times, use mosquito repel-lent with DEHT (30 percent or less is strong enough).

* Eliminate mosquito breeding habitat around your home, such as stag-nant water in bird batha, buckets or tires.

* Report dead birds to your county health department or to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. You can log dead bird discoveries at FWC's Web site: http://wld.fwc.state.fl.us/b

Fewer than 1 percent of all mosquitoes are infected, and fewer than 1 percent of all people bitten by infected mosquitoes develop the disease. Even fewer develop See, FWC, Page 2B



Offensively, the Bears were led by senior running back Chauncey Hampton, who carried the ball 26 times for 164 yards and a touchdown. He had a second touchdown called back in the fourth quarter by a holding penalty.

Quarterback Jimmy Lanier completed just five of his 13 pass attempts, but Kyle Hill turned one of the completions into an 85-yard touchdown play just before halftime. Micah Smith also contributed a 36yard field goal.

All of the Bears' points came in the first half. After that, it was up to the defense to hold the Lions at bay. While the wet, heavy turf helped slow Oviedo's quick-strike attack a step, Winter Springs continually won the war along the line of scrimmage, stuffing Lion plays before they had a chance to develop.



In areas where the virus has been found, it occurs in a very small percentage of the birds. Of those that do carry the virus, many are dead-end hosts that have no role in spreading the virus. Killing a few birds will do virtually nothing to stop the virus. The odds of killing birds that actually have infectious West Nile virus are extremely small. Furthermore, it's against the law. All migratory birds except introduced species such as starlings and house sparrows are protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

West Nile virus is not known to affect whitetailed deer. Most mammals are also protected by state law.

In combating arboviruses like West Nile virus, it's much easier to control the vectors (the mosquitoes) than the hosts (the birds).

The most effective method of controlling the spread of the virus is mosquito control targeted at specific areas where the virus has been detected.

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and county and regional mosquito control boards are in charge of those efforts.

Now that the regulatory signs are in place, boaters are required to abide by the new speed restrictions. However the new manatee protection zones do not supersede more restrictive local government zones or other state regulations that must also be obeyed.

The Florida Inland Navigation District (FIND) posted the new signs in Duval and St. Johns counties, while the FWC posted the signs in Clay County.

The aluminum signs have a white reflective background bordered with international orange

In addition, the pilings to which the signs are attached contain international orange and white reflective bands to increase boater visibility for both day and nighttime travel. Boaters are urged to use caution if operating at night to ensure that they see the new signs.

Following are some of the specific changes to the posted speed zones:

* The Slow Speed zone at the intersection of the St. Johns River and the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) at Sisters Creek has been changed to a 300-foot Slow Speed shoreline buffer.

* The 300-foot buffer in most of Mill Cove and around the associated islands has been removed.

Slow Speed shoreline buffers have been adopted from the Fuller Warren Bridge south to Peter Branch in Clay County, and Nature's Hammock Road in St. Johns County, as well as in Doctor's Lake and its associated waterways (Swimming Pen Creek and Duck Creek). These shoreline buffers extend 500 feet from shore or 200 feet beyond the dock line, whichever is greater.

"Ever since I was a kid, I liked models," he said. "But when I was younger, we didn't have the technology we have today. Back then, we would throw rocks to sink ships.

Technology has changed. Today, captains use BBs to shoot and sink their opponents ships. Strict rules and regulations established by Model Warship Combat Inc. (MWC), help determine the winner of each battle. Points are accumulated by the number and location of a BBs' entry hole, penalties and the sinking of an opponent's ship.

According to King, however, it is rare for a muniature ship to sink - but there is always a diver on hand, just in case.

For Joel Goodman of Atlanta, the idea of his ship sinking is probably a painful thought. It took three months for him to build his 1:144 (1 inch equals 12 feet) scale model of the USS Indiana. He is one of the few

members of FRAG who spends hours on the minute details of his ship, including the flags, cannons and airplanes that were found on

and airplanes that were found on the original ship's deck.

"I do this because it's cheaper than therapy," Goodman said.

"Actually, it goes back to when we were kids. Then, we made model ships and then blew them up with firecrackers. Now, we use BBs."

The miniature battleship captains spend more money than children do on plastic and metal models. According to King, people interested in getting into the naval combat hobby should expect to pay between \$300 and \$1,000 for their first ship.
