SPOKANE. Wash. - A bank in Spokane learned an expensive lesson by refusing to validate a 60-cent parking slip for a destitutelooking man, who retallated by withdrawing his-\$1 million account.

"If you have \$1 in a bank or \$1 million, I think they owe you the courtesy of stamping your parking ticket." John Barrier sald in an interview published Monday in the Spokane Spokesman-Review.

Barrier, 59, said he was wearing his usual shabby clothes last October when he pulled his pickup truck into the Old National Bank parking ot in Spokane.

He paid a quick visit to his broker, cashed a check at the bank and then went outside to

The lot boy said there was a 60-cent parking fee, but that Barrier could take his slip inside to get it validated.

Satanists subject of probe

HILLSDALE, Mich. - Vandalism in graveyards, disemboweled and partially skinned animals and ritual altars have prompted police to investigate an upsurge in suspected satanism and occultism.

Police Chief John Kalusuiak said a goat was found skinned from the middle of the body upwards and the top of the animal's skull was missing. Police suspect the horns and skin were used for a ceremonial robe

"That's pretty serious," he said Monday, "Some poor goat gets its throat cut and bled out. I mean, it could be your pet or mine



Florida's 1980s growth sets record

GAINESVILLE — Florida's population has skyrocketed by nearly 334,000 people a year during the 1980s, the largest growth of any decade in state history, according to estimates

Figures from the University of Florida's Bureau of Economic and Business Research show state population in April 1988 was 12,417,606 — an increase of 2,870,645, or 27.4 percent.

Cargo plane crashes with 8 aboard

HURLBURT FIELD - A C-141 military cargo jet with eight people aboard crashed in a heavily wooded swamp on Eglin Air Force Base Monday night while trying to land at Huriburt Field. Air Force officials said. There were no reports of survivors

The 168-foot C-141 Starlifter, en route to Hurlburt from-Colorado Springs, Colo., crashed about 8 p.m., said Air Force Capt. Thomas Connell. It went down about 4 miles north of Hurlburt Field on Eglin Air Force Base, he said.

Connell said there were seven crew members and one passenger aboard when the plane crashed during its final approach for landing.

"There's no word yet on the possibility of survivors," he said.
"It will be daylight before anything firm will be known about the eight on board. It (the wreckage) doesn't appear to be too spread out. Part of the tail is still intact."

into Wallace's driveway. He was killed by a single shot to the abdomen from a large caliber handgun, which sheriff's deputies said was apparently fired through the window of his 1983

Neighbors who heard the shot called the sheriff's department and when deputies arrived they were told nothing was wrong at the Wallace address. However, a handgun was discovered on a picnic table, and Conner's body was found in his car.

Defense attorneys J. Cheney Mason and Russell E. Crawford entered a motion Monday morning to suppress certain statements Wallace made to, or in the presence of, law officers at the crime scene, or at the jail.

Testimony on the motions began Monday afternoon after the jury for the trial was selected, and continued this morning.

Mason told Judge C. Vernon Mize Jr., who is presiding over the trial, that Wallace was never given the Miranda warning after his arrest. The warning, named for the name case in which the

U.S. Supreme Court ruled those rights must be read to a defendant, informs suspects of their rights to remain silent or have an attorney present at questioning.

Assistant State Attorney Thomas Hastings agreed that the Miranda rights were never read to Wallace. However, he contended that some of the statements made by Wallace were "spontaneous" and were not in response to questions from law officers. However, he said some of Wallace's statements probably should not be allowed into evidence to be considered by the jury.

Mason said some of the statements were in response to questions from a paramedic at his residence who asked him whether he shot Conner and why he did it. Although the paramedic was not a law officer, a deputy standing with him heard Waliace's replies, Mason

Other statements Mason asked to be removed from evidence were ones made by his client at the jail when he was being questioned in regard to being booked into the jail.

County approves Sanford spray plan

SANFORD — The Seminole County Board of Adjustment unanimously approved the city of Sanford's request Monday night to spray up to 3.1 million gallons per day of treated wastewater on a 1,150-acre site near Geneva.

The citrus and hay irrigation site is a mainstay of the city's sewage treatment improvement program, which will cost up to \$20 million.

The system includes a \$3.5 million improvement to the city's Lake Monroe treatment plant and a \$2.5 million loop

around Sanford between the

treatment plant and the spray

City engineer Bill Simmons said the spray irrigation system will cost about \$8.9 million, although the land's cost, site preparation and other costs could escalate the project's total price to \$14 million.

The spray irrigation site is located on a 2,200-acre site of Sanford, a mile con of the State Road 46 bridge. Aparica acres are under state wetland and floodplain jurisdiction and another 700 acres are unusable for irrigation, according to a city report, said deputy county manager Jim Bible.

Final design of the system will

plete, Simmons said. The entire sewage treatment system is expected to be operating in 18 to 24 months, he said.

Simmons said about 200 acres of the site will be planted in citrus, possibly Hamlin Juice oranges, by the city or a leasor. The remaining acreage will be planted in hay. The citrus will be ire a c1 using microjet un-derest sprayheads. The hay will be irrested using a trickle ir-

rigation method. Simmons said the system should pose no threat to nearby Lake Jesup or the "Geneva Bubble" — Geneva's fragile Island of freshwater surrounded by saltwater. He said the small

take about six months to com- amount of treated wastewater placed on the site should evaporate without seeping into the lake or the Geneva Bubble.

When the final site plan is completed, county commissioners will have an opportunity to review it in a public hearing in about six months.

City officials have also offered part of the site to the federal government for a prison and a Veteran's Administration hospital and nursing home. Federal prison officials are actively pursuing investigation of the site. VA officials are considering it with nine other central Florida locations, including one near

to a suggestion from Assistant State Attorney Steve Plotnik that the county commission try to draw an ordinance authorizing law officers to stop suspected drug dealers.

Plotnik explained that a cur-rent Florida law giving law officers the authority to arrest someone for "lottering and prowling" if the person is "at a place where it is not normal for him to be and the person can give no reason for being there."
He said, "the trouble is, most crack dealers can come up with a reason why they are there.

He said it may be possible for the county to draw up an ordinance that goes beyond state statutes, but said such an ordinance would inevitably be challenged by the first person arrested under its authority, and it would be up to the court to decide if it was constitutional.

Johnson liked the idea of such an ordinance and said the group of ministers will meet with Plotnik to further discuss how auch an ordinance could be worded.

Ealinger, when asked what the community can do to help law enforcement officers, said members of the Midway community can communicate more with the sheriff's department. "I don't know where all the crack houses are in Midway and maybe some of you do," he said. "You can call me directly and I'll be glad to talk to you." he said. He added that eny emergency situation should be reported by using the 911 emergency number.

Johnson contended that outsiders are bringing drugs into the community and outsiders are coming into the community to buy them. He said the cars that come into the area night"

after night should be stopped.
However, Elsinger disagreed that most drugs in Midway are being bought and sold by outsiders. "The number of buyers from outside the community is

not as high in Midway as it is in some other areas of the county," he said.

Elsinger also disagreed with a statement from Johnson that drug laws were not enforced as well in the northern part of the county as in the south and that Midway's drug problem was worse than other parts of the county. "Crack is a problem in every community in the county," he said.

Rep. Frank Stone also advised those present to "get more involved in neighborhood watch programs — take down license numbers, take pictures if you can, and communicate with the sheriff's department."

Johnson demonstrated the community's interest in improving by listing past efforts to clean up drainage ditches and malfunctioning septic tanks, improve drainage and get rid of abandoned houses. He said those efforts did not meet with any success when brought to the attention of county officials.

Some of the abandoned houses are now crack houses, he said.

County Commissioner Jennifer Kelly, who represents the Midway area, said she would begin the process of getting those houses condemned and razed if she was furnished with their addresses. She said the owners of the abandoned houses had to be located and informed of the county's intentions before any action can be taken.

She said she had already told the county Environmental Services Department to gather water samples in the area and report violations of the the county health code.

Johnson said the group is also

interested in what can be done about groups that gather outside of bars all night, dealing in drugs and stopping cars and beating their occupants.

The group also said penalties for drug dealing and purchasing should be haraher and those convicted should serve longer terms in fail.

Continued from Page 1A that he, along with his wife, carried on to this day at RoJay women's apparel shop on First Street. It amounts to a legacy that epitomizes the American

Herman Jacobson arrived in America from Poland with his mother and brother when he was 16 years old, said Shirley Moak, a longtime family friend. In 1926, he and his brother Arthur decided to make their fortune in boom-time Florida. They moved from Providence,

R.I., to Orlando to work with a relative, said his son, Sam. "He didn't like working for someone else, so that didn't work out too well," his son said. "He and his brother wanted to get out on their own, so Arthur went to the Sarasota-Bradenton area to look and my dad came to Sanford."

A lover of farming, Herman Jacobson drove through the celery fields surrounding Sanford until he became stuck in one of them. "The farmer who owned the place came out and wanted to know why my dad was in his field and they got to talking," Sam Jacobson said. He told the farmer he was

looking for a store and the farmer happened to own a storefront at the corner of Sanford Avenue and Fourth Street. Sam Jacobson said. Herman

Ditended outlook

Jacobson looked at the store and rented it. H&A Department Store, named for the two brothers, was opened soon after. At the time, Sanford Avenue

was primarily the shopping district for the black field workers and Jacobson kept the store open until 1 a.m. on Saturdays for them, according to Sam and Moak Jacobson's business acument

paid off, even though he had no formal education, as H&A survived the Depression. Moak said Jacobson used a barter system. exchanging clothing for food during lean times. Jacobson met his wife, Rose

Edith Zauder, during the early 1930s. At the time, Rose Zauder was a fifth-grade teacher at Sanford Grade School. They were married in June 1935. Rose Jacobson quit teaching and went to work at the store. Arthur Jacobson left the business during the late 1930s and moved to Winter Haven, Fla., Sam Jacobson said.

Rose and Herman Jacobson continued to run the store until 1952, when Rose opened RoJay on First Street, where it remains.

The couple worked daily at the store together until about two years ago, when Herman Jacobson's battle with Alzheimer's Disease left him

unable to continue. Rose Jacobson continues to operate the store. Moak said.

Herman Jacobson was active in Sanford's business development and served on the board of Sanford Development Corp., the city bonding committee and was a major donor to the Downtown Redevelopment

We must attain justice for all

In the Supreme Court's 6-3 decision invalidating a Richmond, Va., plan designed to help minorities and women get govern-ment contracts, Justice Thurgood Marshall dissented. Marshall, the court's only black justice, alluded to "the tragic and indelible fact that discrimination against blacks and other racial minorities in this nation has pervaded our nation's history and continues to scar our society."

Recent headlines buttress Marshall's lament. Riots erupted in a black section of Miami after a police officer shot and killed a black man speeding by on a motorcycle. Controversy over a plan by the NCAA to strengthen entry standards for college athletes focuses on whether the plan discriminates against black students. Recent studies conclude that blacks continue to be victims of economic discrimination; the gap between black and white median incomes is wider than it was a decade ago.

All are reminders that questions of race and racism continue to vex this nation.

We don't argue with the court's reasoning in the Richmond case. Set-aside programs and affirmative-action plans, however laudable their intent, don't always accomplish what they are supposed to. But finding flaws in affirmative-action programs must not be an excuse to stop looking for ways to amerliorate the effects of race discrimination, past and present. Congress and the American people cannot relax efforts to eliminate every vestige of racism in our society.

Some 36 states and 190 cities have implemented some sort of affirmative;action plan. California, for example, requires all state contractors to use their "best efforts" to subcontract 15 percent of a project to companies controlled by minorities and 5 percent to companies controlled by women. Although the California law may be able to survive a court challenge because it doesn't absolutely require fixed quotas, many programs are likely to fall.

So what can be done to help minorities overcome effects of past discrimination? How can we hasten the day when racial injustice is permanently consigned to the past? President Bush reaffirms a basic commitment when he decries "bigotry and indifference to dis-advantage." The president's affirmation is laudable, but it's only a beginning. We must go further.

Affirmative-action plans implemented by state and local governments still are a possibility - if past discrimination can be proved. Governmental bodies may be able to implement affirmative-action efforts that stop short of mentioning specific percentages. They certainly can establish training programs that better prepare minority businesses to compete for government contracts. And, they can establish goals and timetables and undertake zealous recruiting efforts.

The Richmond ruling also reaffirmed the right of Congress to establish set-aside plans for federal programs it deemed necessary to enforce 14th Amendment guarantees. And, of course, Congress can make law that reinforces this nation's commitment to equal rights for all Americans.

Along with Justice O'Connor, we look forward to the day when questions of race are peripheral. As Justice Marshall knows, we're not there yet.

Raise the pay of federal judges

It isn't easy to identify the worst single aspect of the recent congressional pay-raise flasco. The sheer cowardice of Congress' attempt to raise its own pay by 50 percent through a tricky maneuver whereby it would never actually be seen to vote for the raise is certainly a contender for the prize.

But when one takes into account over-all damage to the public interest, the most inexcusable aspect of the whole affair was undoubtedly the harm it inflicted on our federal judiciary. That ought to be rectified promptly.

Like a highway robber leaving a gas station

with the contents of its cash register, Congress, in its raid on the federal treasury, took the precaution of taking along a hostage. The commission that was to recommend higher congressional salaries to the president was also charged with proposing raises for federal judges. The president could approve the recommendations, or modify them, or reject them; but, whatever he did, the chances were that he would treat Congress and the judiciary alike, in the interests of good will all around.

And that, of course, is what President Reagan did when he was presented with the recommendations of the Cutler commission. There is considerable evidence that what was chiefly on Mr. Reagan's mind was the need for substantial increases in judicial salaries, lest judges start leaving the bench for far more lucrative jobs in private law practice. But, having decided on husky raises for the judges, Mr. Reagan evidently concluded that members of Congress

would be mortally offended if he didn't do as much for them.

But the cases of judges and members of Congress are very different. The basic salaries of federal district Judges and members of Congress are identical (\$89,500), but the official and unofficial perks of a member of Congress are vastly

pays no postage on his voluminous mail. He is entitled to specific amounts of free travel to and from his home district or state. Even his haircuts and his parking space at the Capitol are free. He enjoys, in addition, the services of a large office

And then, of course, there are those famous "speaking fees" — payments averaging around \$2,000 apiece (plus travel expenses) for informal talks to friendly organizations. Some prominent and powerful congressmen earn so much this way that a lid has finally been put on how much of the booty they can keep; but such fees remain a formidable supplement to their base pay.

None of this applies to judges. Wherever they live and work, they must get along on that salary. If they have one government paid clerk, that's a lot. The financial burden undoubtedly falls most heavily on district judges, who tend to be younger and often still have children to put through college. Small wonder that many of them - including many Reagan appointees. who are of course on average the youngest of all

— are tempted to leave the bench altogether and

earn three times as much in private practice.

The solution, obviously, is to yank the judicial hostages out of the clutches of the highway robbers on Capitol Hill.

Roe overturned: Loss of freedom

BOSTON — The protestors are gone now. The legal hit team has wandered off in search of another target. The television crews have moved to other sites and other stories.

The people who surround Nancy Klein these days are those who care about her. Not as a case study or a political focal point, but as a wife, a daughter, a mother. Her husband Martin visits with her as he has every day since the 32-year-old woman went into a coma. He tells her the simple things, how his day went, what he did, what their 3-year-old

If some spark leads Nancy Klein out of the shadows of her coma, her husband and parents will eventually also tell her how strangers tried to wrest control of her medical care away from them. They will tell her how these intruders, men she had never met, sued to become guardians of her and her fetus, to make decisions about her life and death.

The story of the Flein family began on Dec. 13 with a car crash that left this woman, pregnant with her second child, in a coma. In the weeks that followed, doctors at the Long Island hospital told Martin Klein that his wife might have a better chance of recovery if she had an abortion.

These doctors offered opinions rather than promises, and odds rather than certainties. But Nancy's family held to those opinions and pinned their hopes on those odds. They opted for the abortion.

If this had been any other medical pro-cedure, there would have been no further delay. It is virtually automatic to allow family to make decisions for an incompetent patient. This hospital, however, spooked by right-tolifers, refused to perform an abortion without court permission. The administrators invited intervention and they got it.

Two men, anti-abortion advocates both, came to wrangle for power over the body of the comatose woman they had never met and have never yet seen. Their lawyer was A. Lawrence Washburn Jr., a regular on the right-to-life legal circuit.

In 1984, in the famous Baby Jane Doe case, Washburn was the one who sued to force surgery on the handicapped baby against the will of her parents. Since then, he has represented more than one estranged husband trying to prohibit his wife from having an abortion. In June, he was briefly appointed guardian of the fetus inside a client's wife's

Washburn eventually lost the Klein case as he lost those others. After two bitter weeks, three New York state courts ruled that only Martin Klein was the proper guardian. On Saturday after the Supreme Court refused to overturn the ruling, the abortion was performed.

The crucial sentence in all of this judical

maneuvering came from the appeals court ruling that' stated unequivocally that these "strang-ers" had "no place in the midst of this family tragedy."
All but the most

hard-core right-tolifers in the country seemed to identify with the family and against the invaders. Even Barbara Bush came out of her silence on abortion. Not only she but her husband sided with the Kleins. "I agree with my husband on that," Mrs. Bush said. "The life of the mother was at risk.

Who decides? The answer of the pro-life activists is: "Strangers."

I'm very grateful that it worked out as it did." Is the Klein case then such an exception in the annals of aboriton that even a pro-life President and an ambivalent populace can separate it from the others? I don't read it that

The question in this case was not whether an abortion would save Nancy Klein's life. The medical evidence was less than conclusive; sadly, she is still in a coma. What was at stake in the court was who had the right to make the

This is not some peripheral issue. It is the central question of the entire abortion debate: Who decides? The answer of the pro-life activists is: "Strangers."

Martin Klein eventually won the right o choose abortion because his wife had that right. It was protected in the Roe v. Wade decision. He was merely the guardian allowed to exercise his wife's rights. It abortion were illegal, he might not have had that right.

What we have seen here is a preview of what the world would look like if Roe if overturned. a grave and imminent possibility. It's a world in which the Washburns would decide the fate of the Kleins and the rest of us. A world in which the government would become the "guardian" of every pregnant woman, of every fetus. A world in which "strangers" would weigh the evidence of every woman's health

So I wish Nancy Klein a full recovery and a return to her husband and child. In a coma, this woman may have helped to wake up the

Eagleburger has ties to Yugoslavia

WASHINGTON — If Lawrence Eagleburger is confirmed as deputy secretary of state, he will bring with him a wealth of experience in dealing with Yugoslavia - maybe too much

Eagleburger has revolved in and out of the diplomatic door. While he was in, he hustled loans from American banks for Yugoslavia. While he was out, he joined the board of directors of a Yugoslavian bank that benefited from those loans. While he was in, he encouraged Yugoslavia to generate hard cash

by producing exports. While he was out, he became the top American representative for one of those exports - the Yugo car.

Now Eagleburger is on his way in again, h a vi n g b e e n nominated as the No. 2 person at the State Department. Congress will have plenty of ground to cover during his confirmation hearings.

Eagleburger is a well-regarded former foreign service officer who spent 27 years with the State De-

partment. His career was boosted during the Nixon administration when he became a protege of Henry Kissinger.

That Mon-day-morning

quarterback-ing is little

comfort

During the Carter years, Eagleburger was U.S. ambassador to Yugoslavia. Under the Reagan administration, he was assistant secretary for European affairs and undersecretary for political affairs, until he

retired in 1984. As ambassador and assistant secretary, Eagleburger leaned on U.S. banks to lend money to Yugoslavia, even though loans to East European countries were frowned on by the administration. For example, in early 1983, he summoned executives of nine major American banks to Washington to urge them to lend money to Yugoslavia, even if they were cutting back their loans to other East European countries. Treasury Secretary Don Regan was reportedly furious at

Eagleburger's meddling.
In a 1985 interview, a Yugoslavian newspaper asked Eagleburger if he felt some responsibility for putting Yugoslavia billions of dollars into debt. "I believe I did a great favor to Yugoslavs getting them the money they felt was needed at the time," he responded. "I will not apologize because of this. If now Yugoslavia has difficulties in paying back, then maybe she should not have taken the loans."

That Monday-morning quarterbacking is little comfort to Yugoslavia which is \$20 billion in debt and has an inflation rate of 200 percent.

When he left the State Department in 1984. Eagleburger went to work for Kissinger's consulting firm. In short order, he also became the American representative for Yugo mini-cars.

A Yugo sells for \$8,000 in Yugoslavia and for \$4,000 in the United States. To critica, that looks like a blatant attempt to raise hard currency by dumping a product for less than it is worth.

The Yugo is built by a division of Zavodi Crvena Zastava, the huge Yugoslavian conglomerate also known as "Red Flag," which is the backbone of the Yugoslavian arms industry. The Yugo is a sideline for Red Flag. The company builds tanks, helicopters and small arms. Among its clients are Iraq, Libya and East European countries.

As a private citizen, Eagleburger also became a director of the New York branch of Ljubljanska Banka, a bank owned by the Yugoslavian government. In December, a wholly owned subsidiary of Ljubijanska, LBS Bank of New York, was indicted for allegedly laundering more than \$1.4 million for U.S. Customs agents who were posing as drug

Three sisters, cousin killed in fire

NEW YORK - A fast-moving fire swept through the top floor of a three-story home Monday, killing three young sisters and their cousin despite their mothers' efforts to save them, officials

The children, ranging from 4 to 8 years old, apparently sparked the fire playing with matches, fire officials said. All four children were severely burned. One was declared dead at the scene, and three were dead on arrival at local hospitals, said Efrain Parrilla, a fire department spokesman.

Firefighters found a smoke alarm in a kitchen closet but it had no batteries. Parrilla said.

The fire in the third-floor apartment began shortly after 1 p.m. in a front bedroom, where the children had been playing, the spokesman said. The children were trapped by a mattress propped against one bedroom door and a bunk bed next to another bedroom door that opened inward, he said.

Firefighters found three youngsters huddled on the bottom bunk of the bed and the fourth child on the floor beside them, he said. "There was really not much of a chance," he said.

Trial set for accused police killers

NEW YORK - Prosecutors geared up for the trial Tuesday of three men charged in the shooting death of a rookle police officer on orders from a jailed crack kingpin in a case that riveted national attention on the violence of drug gangs.

The trial was set to begin Tuesday in state Supreme Court in Queens, almost a year after the Feb. 28, 1988, slaying of Officer

Lawyers for two of the suspects said Monday they doubted the defendants could get a fair trial, citing widespread publicity that has prompted a parade of politicians, including President Bush, to use the case as a platform for a campaign to restore the death penalty.

Salvatore Alosco and Frank Hancock, the lawyers for Todd Scott, 20, and Philip Copeland, 22, said they will not make any opening statements to the jury and are unsure of what defense to use because the prosecution may spring some surprises on them in the form of new witnesses.

Penalty phase begins in FBI suit

MIDLAND, Texas - Hispanic FBI agents who won a landmark discrimination case against the agency last year will seek \$10 million in damages in the penalty phase of the lawault, which begins Tuesday in a federal court.

U.S. District Judge Lucius Bunton, who in September ruled that the FBI had systematically discriminated against its Hispanic agents in job assignments and promotions, will preside over the second phase of the class-action suit.

The class-action suit involves 311 of the FBI's approximately 400 Hispanic agents, and at least 50 are expected to testify that discriminatory FBI practices caused them to suffer serious loss of income. Lawyers for the agents said they will seek \$10 million in damages from the government.

North trial begins, jury takes oath

WASHINGTON - Nine women and three men chosen as jurors in the Oliver North case were summoned to court Tuesday to take their oath, officially beginning the 12-count felony trial of the ex-White House aide.

After U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell administered the oath to the jury and five alternates, lead prosecutor John Keker was to give a 90-minute opening statement, followed by one from North's chief defense

lawyer, Brendan Sullivan. The attorneys' statements were expected to open a courtroom drama that has been 11 months and \$15 million in the making — and could last as long as five months.

Independent prosecutor Lawrence Walsh won North's Indictment March 16 on charges arising from the 1985-86 sales of U.S. arms to Iran and the diversion of profits to the Contra rebels in Nicaragua.

North faces 12 counts of lying to Congress, destroying official documents, tax fraud and accepting illegal gifts. If convicted on all counts, he could be sentenced to 60 years in prison and fined \$3 million.

High blood pressure film to be shown

SANFORD - A film showing how older people with high blood pressure can keep fit and active will be shown free by HCA Central Florida Regional Hospital on Wednesday, Feb. 23.

"Feelin' Fine," featuring Eddie Albert, will be shown from 2-3:30 p.m. with a discussion to follow. Signs will be posted at both hospital entrances concerning where the film will be shown."

"The purpose of the program is to inform people at greatest risk from high blood pressure, those in their fifties, sixties and over, about the d ngers of the disease and the importance of early detection and treatment, sald Nancy Edwards, RN, director of nursing education at the hospital.

Edwards pointed out that information about high blood pressure and how to live with it is a real need, considering that nearly half of all people 60 and older have high blood pressure.

'Thousands of Americans die each year from strokes and heart attacks brought on by high blood pressure," she said. "Yet many of these deaths are needless, because high blood pressure generally can be controlled.'

CFRH offers free blood pressure checks at the hospital on the first Friday of the month from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the lobby. Blood pressure checks also are given on the first Thursday of the month from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the **Urgent Care Center on Saxon** Avenue in Deltona.

Before he died, he left living legacies

DEAR ABBY: On Jan. 1 of this year, my husband and I received a call informing us that James, our 32-year-old son, had been seriously injured in a motorcycle accident in Honolulu. (We live in New Mexico).

When we arrived at the hospital, our son's body had no brain activity and we were told that his death was imminent. The doctors told us that this was the third death that week involving a motorcyclist wearing no helmet.

I promised James' doctors that I would write to our local newspaper about this, but I decided to write to you instead because your column is read nationwide and I want to spare as many families as possible the heartbreak that we have had.

It was James' wish that after his death, all usable organs should be harvested to help the living. I am enclosing the letter we received from Straub Hospital where James died. My husband and I give you permission to print it if you feel it will benefit others.

DEAR MR. AND MRS. BATES: Please accept my heartfelt sympathy on the loss of your beloved son. Your letter and the enclosure contain two very important messages: (1) Motorcyclists should always wear a helmet. (2) The last (and most valuable) gift one can give is to donate his or her organs to benefit the living.

Thank you for allowing me to

publish the following letter: "Dear Mr. and Mrs. Bates: We gratefully acknowledge your kindness and generosity in allowing your son's vital organs to be donated for transplantation surgery. This letter will provide Information about the beneficiaries, and hopefully turn a sorrowful time into a positive

"One of James' kidneys went to a 35-year-old woman who is engaged to be married. She had been on a dialysis machine for five years. The other kidney went to a 30-year-old married man with a family who would probably not have survived







Real mites require a practical solution

DEAR DR. GOTT: We have some kind of mite on our bodies we cannot get rid of. We've had our house fumigated, used two prescriptions of Kwell, put our clothes in the freezer, boiled everything. We finally went to a skin doctor who told my husband to repeat five times before going to bed, "I do not have bugs." Please help. DEAR READER: Mites are

tiny parasites that are responsible for rashes and intense itching when they feed on humans or reproduce under the skin. The most common mite diseases are chiggers and scables. Mites can also cause rickettsial pox (rash, swollen glands, fever and muscle pains) and, in the Far East, mite-borne typhus (scrub typhus, characterized by rash, headache, swollen glands, cough, shock and stupor).

The usual mite diseases in the United States are easily diagnosed by scraping the affected skin and examining the residue under a microscope; the eggs or mites themselves are usually visible.

The skin specialist who advised your husband to think the mites away evidently believed that your family is suffering a mental delusion about the parasites. If you are truly suffering from mites, see another dermatologist for a second opinion that will, I hope, provide more practical information than you have been

DEAR DR. GOTT: My grandpa just had new knees put in. At first he was getting along fine but now they are very sore and swollen. I hate to see him in such pain.

DEAR READER: Joint replacements, like any other sur-gery, sometimes result in unfavorable consequences. Postoperative infection, rejection of the artificial tissue or misplaced prostheses can cause pain and continuing disability.

I urge you - or your grandfa-

ther - to contact the surgeon who operated and ask for a re-examination or referral for a second orthopedic opinion. In all likelihood, the situation can be resolved, repaired or treated. Your grandfather does not have to live with chronic pain and a handicap.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Many players I know will automatically bid game when they have an opening bid with a six-card suit and their partner extends an invitation. That can be the winning approach on occasion, but whenever your partner has reason to assume that you have that six-card suit, you should definitely examine your total hand before going on. In today's deal, South's bidding showed a six-card heart suit. When North simply raised to three, South did well to make a conservative pass.

There was a reasonable play for 10 tricks. (If hearts split 2-2, declarer would simply play the A-K of spades, and then ace and a heart.) Nevertheless, South had to play with great care to

give himself the best play for his contract. The defenders cashed the ace and king of clubs and then played a spade. Declarer took the A-K of spades and then played a low heart. Declarer did not care if that was won by a singleton heart honor, since the defender who won that trick would then have to either lead a diamond for a free finesse or play a black suit to give declarer a sluff and a ruff. If the defender who won the first heart trick exited with a heart, then hearts were probably 2-2, in which case nine tricks would always be safe.


