# Buddhists Call Crippling Strike

**SANFORD (UPI)** — The government flew three battalions of troops, about 1,000 men, to the outskirts of the city today where a militant Buddhist-led strike of a crippling general strike. A local officer denounced the Buddhist leader Thich Tri Quang as a "Communist" but made no move against him.

In Saigon moderate Buddhists requested control of the anti-government drive, averting at least temporarily a violent confrontation with Premier Nguyen Cao Ky. But the situation grew increasingly tense in Hue where the anti-government drive has taken on anti-American overtones.

A U. S. spokesman in Hue said the Government flew two aircraft and one mission battalion from the Da Nang area to the Don Da National Training Center on the outskirts of Hue. They made an immediate effort to enter the city and the spokesman expressed doubt they would succeed.

Brig. Gen. Phan Xuan Thuan, commander of the Vietnamese army's 1st Division, who has worked in his loyalty, denounced Tri Quang and threatened to arrest him if he did not call off his troops from the city.

In Saigon, U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge called on Premier Ky for 50 minutes. No details of the talks were disclosed but embassy sources said it was a routine meeting which focused on economic matters.

Buddhist leaders announced they had dispersed their militant "Vietnam Buddhist forest" organization and formed a more moderate one called the "Committee to Safeguard the Vietnamese Buddhists."

The announcement was made by Thich Tam Chan, the moderate Buddhist leader who tried unsuccessfully last week to persuade the younger militant Buddhist leader to let the Ky government's chance to work out the orderly transition of power from the military to an elected civilian government.

# Temperature Slows Surveyor's Work

**PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)** — Scientists at the JET Propulsion Laboratory here today slowed down the picture taking of Surveyor as temperatures on the moon rose to the 200 degree mark at lunar high noon.

A total of 2,200 photographs had been transmitted before the sixth session began this morning. They included close-up views of the lunar surface and panoramic sweeps of the lunar horizon.

Scientists said Monday Surveyor was performing so well they were hopeful it would survive beyond original estimates of two weeks.

Next Monday begins the lunar "night," during which temperatures will drop to about 250 degrees below zero. It had been feared that the temperature extremes would either melt or freeze sensitive instruments on the 600-pound craft. But scientists said the solar panels, which convert heat rays into electricity, shielded Surveyor's cameras from the searing rays of the sun, and a "limit" picture taking mission would be held early this morning.

Because storage batteries were operating flawlessly, they planned to shut off all instruments except a few heaters to warm vital components during the lunar night. Scientists reported Surveyor had received and obeyed 50,000 separate commands since landing in the moon's desolate landscape.

Officials of the Rockwell Standard Company said construction of the facility will get started later this year and the plant should be in operation by the spring of 1967.

Rockwell Standard manufactures the Aero-Commander airplane. The firm said that the new plant will employ about 1,000 people.

# Astronauts Tell Of Flight

**CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)** — Amid the triumphs and disappointments of the three-day Gemini 9 mission, astronaut Thomas Stafford and Eugene Cernan learned a lot. Today they tell space officials about it in detail.

The "learned a lot" evaluation came from command pilot Stafford after he and Cernan airdropped a ballistics splashdown in the Atlantic that was witnessed by millions of television viewers.

The two astronauts are scheduled to spend a week reviewing Gemini 9's partially curtailed mission and a spacewalk program for Gemini 10.

Stafford and Cernan flew back to their launch site Monday after spending less than six hours aboard their recovery vessel, the aircraft carrier USS Yorktown.

Survivors are his wife, two sons, Ted and Walter Jr., both of Orlando; two sisters, Mrs. Katherine Sabatini and Mrs. Cresta Vogt, both living in Germany, and five grandsons.

Edward E. Doty, first class aviation structural mechanic hydraulics, was presented the check by Capt. C. W. Swanson, station commanding officer, for his plan for a universal flight controls holding and testing fixture.

Doty's suggestion cost him approximately \$10 to manufacture and it replaces seven separate holding devices which would have cost approximately \$6,000.


