## Seminole certifies election results

### Democrats, however, claim GOP illegally altered absentee requests

SANFORD — The Seminole County Canvassing Board certified last week's presidential election, but not without controversy surrounding several thousand Republican applications requesting an absentee ballot. Democrat Party supporters claim Republicans illegally altered the applications after the forms were mailed to the Seminole County Supervisor of Elections

Office. They also claim Sandra Goard, the county's supervisor of elections, improperly alerted Republican officials that their applications were incomplete. Republicans don't deny they added information to the applications. They do, however, disagree

that the action was improper. In certifying the election, the canvassing board found no reason to disqualify any absentee ballots and rejected a protest from a Democratic Party executive committee member.

"We have absolutely satisfied our concerns as to whether this was a fair and accurate election," said Ken McIntosh, a member of the canvassing board. Before the Nov. 7 election, Republicans mailed thousands of applications for absentee ballots to party faithful in an effort to boost absentee returns. The party used databases available through public records to fill out most of the required information, leaving voters with the task

## Pan Am expands flights

Direct service offered from Sanford to Allentown, Pa. and Bangor Maine

SANFORD — Pan American Airways announced this week that it will expand current domestic flight offers Jan. 8, 2001 to include Clipper Class Service between Lehigh Valley International Airport and Orlando-Sanford International Airport and Bangor, Maine.

The morning departure to and late afternoon return from Orlando-Sanford will be priced at \$120.

The announcement comes on the heels of Pan Am's launch this week of scheduled passenger service to Lehigh Valley International Airport with service routes with Chicago-Gary, Portsmouth (NH) Boston, and St. Louis Mid-American Airport.

The Lehigh Valley International Airport in Allentown, Pa., serves a population base of 2.4 million people who live within 40 miles of the airport. The region includes northern New Jersey and the northern suburban areas of Philadelphia. In addition, center city Philadelphia is within 50 miles, and the Newark and New York markets are within a 90-minute drive.

"Pan Am sees the Lehigh International Airport as a keystone to our growing service and route system," Dan Fink, Pan Am's president said. "Adding this market to our Orlando-Sanford service will present a fantastic opportunity for leisure travelers who are

## Police nab four in Lake Mary robbery

SANFORD — Four men, suspected of carrying out an armed robbery Friday night, have been apprehended by Seminole County sheriff's deputies.

Sanford police are also investigating the possibility they may have been involved in four similar robberies in Sanford on Nov. 9.

The incident occurred at Pebble Creek Apartments near Lake Mary. Two men, both armed with

handguns, reportedly accosted a woman exiting her vehicle in the parking lot. They took her purse and fled in a sport utility vehicle in which officers believed there were other persons.

Deputy Stephen Spears saw the vehicle on Lake Mary Boulevard, making a turn onto Rinehart Road. The vehicle fled when the deputy attempted to stop it. During that time, Spears said he saw one of the men discard the victim's purse from the vehicle.

At Airport Boulevard, near

Bungalow Boulevard in Sanford, Deputy Spears used the Precision Immobilization Technique, (PIT maneuver). The fleeing vehicle subsequently spun out of control rolled over.

Four persons in the vehicle, all Sanford residents, were arrested. They were identified as Bruce McCray, 22, of Bethune Circle, Shawn David Green, 21, Terrance Levar McQueen, 21, and Willie Devise Lawrence, 17.

All four were initially taken to Central Florida Regional Hospital

for evaluation of injuries in the vehicle.

At the John E. Polk correctional facility, deputies said a small plastic baggy was found in McCray's shorts which contained a substance which tested positive for cocaine.

All four men were charged with robbery with a firearm. McCray was also charged with possession of cocaine, having no drivers license and fleeing and attempting to elude a police officer. His bond was set at \$3,000.

## County board lends support to Youth Commission

SANFORD — The Seminole County Board of Commissioners gave unanimous approval Tuesday to adoption of a Resolution in support of the concept and establishment of the Seminole County Youth Commission.

The Youth Commission will serve as a community advocate and catalyst in identifying and promoting services and opportunities for youth from birth to 18 years old.

Following appointment of a Board of Directors later this year, the Youth Commission, operating as an independent 501c(3) Corporation, will provide continuous and on-going assessment of the variables that affect the quality of life for

youth in Seminole County. The Commission will encourage partnerships, collaborations and cooperation between and among the various private and public resources that affect youth. The Youth Commission will seek funding from the Seminole Vision program, local, state, and federal governments, businesses and foundations, as well as grants to fund specific projects.

According to the University of Florida Bureau of Economic and Business Research, there are more than 85,000 young people in Seminole County, representing approximately 24 percent of the county's total population. The commission is seeking to address far ranging topics that affect youth, including research

### Is it really time to get lit?

It was a tradition. People didn't start decorating for Christmas until the Thanksgiving weekend was over. The Friday and Saturday following Thanksgiving are the busiest shopping days of the entire year. That's when folks buy new Christmas lights and decorations as well and get into the spirit of the upcoming December holidays.

Now, we are starting in early to mid-November. Taking a look across the nation, we find Nov. 16 as the kick off for Christmas in Cape May, N.J.; Christmas in Seattle; Fantasy of Light Parade in Wheeling, W.Va.; Garden of Lights in Norfolk, Va.; Grand Illumination night in Lahaska, Penn.; Light Up Weekend and Christmas Extravaganza in Pittsburgh; plus other lighting events in Belleville, Ill.; Norman, Okla.; Pella, Iowa; Cincinnati; Madison, Wis., and many more.

In Sanford, at least, people are waiting until after Thanksgiving. Light Up Sanford, the official lighting of Christmas decorations in the downtown area will be Dec. 1, followed by the Sanford Historic Trust "Home for the Holidays" event, the Christmas Parade on Dec. 2 and the Holiday Tour of Homes.

For those of us who live in the sticks, where often, neighbors or passers-by can't even see our houses, the tendency might be to overlook outdoor decorations. No, such is generally not the case. We light up our own homes, not for others, but to give ourselves a feeling of the spirit of the season.

Some folks go all-out. One home on Waverly Way, just off Palm Springs Drive in Altamonte Springs has, for years, had one of the most outstanding holiday light displays in the entire County, complete with moving characters and music. There are many others which come to mind as well.

I believe driving through the streets of Central Florida in December is a real treat. I love to see the light displays. Some people are real light-decorating artists.

Keep in mind though; light wires don't last as long as one might think. Even though they may have been listed as "outdoor" lights when you bought them (years ago), time causes wear and poor wiring often leads to unexpected fires. No one wants that. ## Election 2000 The new Yugoslavia

The new U.S. electoral map looks like the old Yugoslavia. Whoever takes the presidential oath next January will have to deal with this stark, disturbing fact of American politics: The country is divided as much by geography as by party.

On the coasts, West and East, there was not much of a contest on Nov. 7. It wasn't close in California, where Al Gore triumphed by more than a million votes, nor here in New York, which the vice president carried by 60 percent.

That vast continent in between was equally one-sided. George W. swept every state, Tennessee and Arkansas included, where people speak with a Southern accent. Westward, he broke the 60-percent barrier in Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas.

The political geography carries enormous freight for the next man, Bush or Gore, to take the presidential oath.

If it's Bush, he will need to govern from a city that voted 85 percent for Gore, covered by a media rooted in Washington and New York, capitals notorious for Democratic loyalty and at least some degree of East-Coast elitism.

If it's Gore, he will need to lead a continental nation the great expanse of which voted for the other guy. Boarding Air Force One, he will be able to fly from Washington to the California border without passing a single state that voted for him.

If these two worlds — the bi-coastal nation of pro-choice, somewhat hip, ethnically diverse Democrats and the inland nation of culturally conservative Republicans — are to live and act as one, it will take a leader who matches his strength with humility. He will need to convince both followers and opponents that his first and foremost interests lie in meeting the needs of both.

The danger is that both winner and loser will proceed in the direction he took in carving out his half of the electorate on Nov. 7.

Bush, an Ivy League-educated Texan of obvious charm, failed to exploit his personal gifts in winning support up North. He lost Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York and Connecticut because he failed to crack the all-important suburban vote.

There were two reasons for this failure: the perception that he is not articulate or smart enough to be president and the perception that he is surrounded by right-wing Republicans who will dominate his selection of Supreme Court justices.

Bush could have won up North, especially in Michigan and Pennsylvania, both of which he lost 51 to 46 percent, had he picked either John McCain or Pennsylvania governor Tom Ridge as his running mate. Given a chance to bridge the gap between North and South, he failed to take it, relying instead on the safe choice of Dick Cheney, another Texas oil man.

Gore also blew his chance to be a national unifier. He could have run a campaign that exploited the economic progress of the last eight years. He chose instead to run a campaign of anger at the country's ongoing economic injustices. He could have run to the political center, continuing the New Democratic movement of President Clinton. Instead, he tilted leftward, playing to the old Democratic pressure groups, not the moderate voter who wanted nothing more than to continue the successful fiscal and trade policies Clinton had begun.

The result is a country whose coasts voted one way and whose great heartland voted the other, a country whose future will now be dictated by the troubling vote count in Florida, the one state whose polyglot, oddly integrated population puts it in neither of the great geographic factions that now wrestle each other for power.

## Neither candidate will be a winner

As the days unfold, the strategies of the two parties in the Florida election brouhaha are slowly becoming clear.

The Republicans take the position that the first statewide vote count showed Governor Bush narrowly but clearly ahead, and that the subsequent recount confirmed this. All that remains, they insist, is to count and add to the totals those overseas absentee ballots postmarked on or before Election Day and received by Friday, November 17th. Whoever is then ahead will have won Florida and its 25 electoral votes and, with them, the presidency of the United States.

The Democrats, professing to be disturbed at the allegedly large number of voters who were misled by the ballot's design into casting their votes for Buchanan rather than Gore, are refusing to accept the results of the original count and the recount, both of which were conducted by machine. Instead, they have prompted the local election officials in four heavily Democratic counties (who are, of course, predominantly

Democrats themselves) to order a third, manual count of all the votes in those counties. No uniform rules govern these officials in determining which votes to count, or for which candidates. They are simply to inspect each ballot, note the condition of the holes punched (or not punched, or partially punched) for the candidates, and arrive at a subjective judgment as to whom the

voter was trying to vote for. Given the circumstances, the politics of the officials and the huge Democratic majorities in the counties in question, the outcome will inevitably be an increased margin for Mr. Gore, sufficient to put him ahead of Mr. Bush statewide, even (they hope) after any Bush margin in the overseas absentee ballots is considered.

To this, the Republicans respond that human beings are more fallible, and certainly far more prejudiced, than machines, which is why the uniform trend in elections has been to count the returns by machine. The Democrats are simply trying to massage the ballots in selected counties until they get a satisfactory

result. But how can the Republicans prevent this? They have sought an injunction against the manual count in the federal district court, arguing that such a count violates the federal constitution. If that argument falls (and the judge who will decide the case is a Clinton appointee), the decision can be appealed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 11th Circuit in Atlanta, and thence to the Supreme Court of the United States.

Alternatively, the Republicans might agree to a manual recount of the votes cast in the entire state of Florida. That would run counter to their stated and persuasive objections to a manual recount anywhere, but would at least enable them to counter biased manual recounts in Democratic counties with equally biased ones in Republican counties.

All in all, it seems hard to escape the conclusion that this mess will eventually end up being decided by a court somewhere, no matter how much everybody professes to dislike that idea. If so, one can only hope the court in question won't be the Supreme Court of Florida, which is heavily dominated by im-

sioned liberal Democrats. (They recently barred from the ballot an initiative banning affirmative action in state education, contracts and employment, which polls showed was strongly favored by the voters.)

However it all turns out, one wonders whether the presidency thus won will be much of a consolation to the "winner." If it is Mr. Gore, he will have to confront a Republican-dominated Congress without having the slightest mandate worthy of the name. If it is Governor Bush, he may have a better relationship with the Congress, but will, like Mr. Gore, have to battle widespread doubts as to the legitimacy of his claim on the office.

And either man will know that his defeated opponent is out there, thirsting for a rematch in 2004.

Of course, Mr. Gore might have serious competition from a lady recently elected to the Senate.

## Why does either man want the job now?

I, too, want a do-over at the ballot box. Given another chance, I'd cast a write-in vote for Josiah Bartlet, the fictional president in NBC's "The West Wing." He would display the maturity, grace and integrity that neither of the prospective leaders of the World's Remaining Superpower — Al Gore or George W. Bush — has been able to muster so far.

OK, OK. Bartlet is a creation of Hollywood. Here in chaotic and often unsatisfying real life, we're stuck with Bush and Gore. So couldn't one of them be a grown-up?

Apparently not. By supporting a court challenge to the Florida results, Gore has chosen a path that makes Richard Nixon look honorable. (Though he suspected fraud, Nixon did not challenge John Kennedy's hairsbreadth victory in 1960.) A lawsuit would plunge an already divided country more deeply into chaos.

Though it now seems likely that a plurality of Florida voters wanted Gore as president, the threat of a court challenge sets a dangerous precedent that will haunt us in close elections to come. Given our antiquated voting procedures, every close election from now on could be contested because of confusing ballots, broken machines and bad counts. The nation's tradition of an orderly transition of power will be sorely tested.

As for Bush, he has already given the lie to his pledge to be

a "uniter, not a divider." He has sent out his partisan attack dogs to defend his arrogance in setting up a transition team, even though the vote count is not over and the election has not been certified. In one memorable moment, Sen. Robert Dole went on television to call on the Democrats to lower the rhetoric, all the while keeping up a harsh and bitter attack against the Gore team.

Remember Bush's favorite line during the election campaign? "I trust the people?" Right. By the narrowest of margins, it now appears, the people — vox populi — voted for Gore. So now Bush has put his faith in an archaic constitutional device, the Electoral College.

Indeed, neither man would assume the office with much credibility, much less a mandate. Even if Bush had won Florida clear of controversy, he would be the first president since the 19th century to win the Electoral College and lose the national popular vote (if current estimates hold).

Gore, on the other hand, has the popular vote by a thread. The nation is cleaved into halves.

That divide is also reflected in Congress, where the Senate is as close as it has been in decades. The GOP will hold control of the upper house by a margin of one or two votes, which is no control at all. The House of Representatives is similarly split, with the GOP retaining a



majority with a mere handful of votes.

That scenario raises this question: Why does either man want the job? This is likely to be a one-term presidency because governing will prove impossible.

Partisan rancor will be even more intense than during the impeachment of President Clinton.

Gore's inability to communicate with the nation effectively would severely test his ability to gain consensus for any Democratic initiative.

As for Bush, he doesn't have the knowledge, experience or backbone to govern under these circumstances. (When faced with Gore's election night phone call retracting his earlier concession, Bush could only summon the specter of his younger brother, Jeb, to try to

make Gore give in. So what will he say when faced with the obstinacy of Putin, Arafat or Jiang Zemin?)

If I were Al, I'd let Bush have it. I'd call a press conference and announce that I would accept the results of the recount, whatever they might be. I'd say that I was unwilling to risk plunging the nation into political or constitutional crisis, and I'd discourage Democratic voters from pursuing court challenges to the election results. And I'd promise to work with President Bush in any capacity he chose to restore confidence in the democratic process.

If nothing else, that would lay to rest any questions, among all but the most partisan observers, about which is a man of character and integrity.

## Broccoli: The green vegetable for the cool season

Broccoli is a hardy, easily grown, highly nutritious crop that is very popular with Florida gardeners. Broccoli is closely related to cauliflower and both are grown for the clusters of unopened flower buds and tender flower stalks. It is similar to cauliflower except that it is green and has a more open head. Unlike cauliflower, sprouting broccoli continues to bear throughout the season and requires no blanching.

white "curd" like that of cauliflower and is called "heading broccoli" or "cauliflower broccoli." This latter form is usually grouped with cauliflower, leaving the term "broccoli" restricted to sprouting varieties. Like the other close relatives of cabbage, broccoli is native to the Mediterranean area and Asia Minor, but it has become popular in the United States only during this century.

**Culture**

Soil preparation, bedding, liming, fertilization, and irrigation practices are similar to those for cabbage. Start broccoli in the beds by using four to five week-old transplants. Set plants 18-24 inches apart on rows that are 36 to 40 inches wide. Broccoli is well adapted to all areas of the state when grown during the coolest months of the year. Plant in the north and central dis-

tricts of Florida no earlier than September and continue through December. Although broccoli is a cool season vegetable, it is susceptible to cold injury especially when the plants are tender and not conditioned to withstand low temperatures.

**Varieties**

Varieties of broccoli vary considerably in garden performance. The old standard 'Waltham 29' still is a top choice.

It is ready to cut from 80-100 days from transplanting, and continues to form side shoots (secondary heads) after the main central head is cut. Other varieties for Florida gardeners are 'Green Mountain,' 'Spartan Early,' 'Atlantic,' 'Green Sprouting,' 'Green Comet,' 'Italian Green Sprouting,' 'DeCicco,' 'Green Duke,' and 'Packman.'

Cauli-broc has the tender texture and sweet flavor of broccoli, but has a lime-green head similar to cauliflower.

**Cultural Practices**

Soil preparation, bedding, liming, fertilization, and irrigation practices are similar to those for cabbage and collards. Since direct seeding may result in poor stands, start broccoli by using healthy, vigorous four- to five-week-old transplants. Set plants 18-24 inches apart on rows that are 36-40 inches wide. Watch for cabbage loopers and imported cabbage worms that are especially troublesome on broccoli.

**Harvesting**

The edible part of a broccoli plant is the immature heads of unopened green flower buds and stems, along with the tender leaves. With most varieties, the heads are ready to harvest between 60 to 100 days from planting. These heads should be cut with about 6 inches of stalk. The central head should be harvested first when it is still tight and compact, with no opened flowers. Do not allow the stems to become tough and woody. After the central head is

removed, side shoots will develop. Although smaller, these should be harvested at two- to four-day intervals. The entire harvest period may run from 40 to 80 days, depending on the season, crop condition, and locality.

**Pests**

Watch for cabbage loopers and the imported cabbage worms, both can be very destructive.

The imported cabbage worm is 1 inch long when mature and velvet-green in color. The adult butterflies are white with three to four black spots on their wings. You can use Dipel, Thuricide or any other insecticide containing Bacillus thuringiensis to control these insects.

**Description**

Broccoli has two different distinct forms. One is "sprouting broccoli," which makes a somewhat branching cluster of green flower buds atop a thick, green flower stalk, and smaller clusters that arise like "sprouts" from the stems. This form, is the most commonly grown form in the United States. The other type of broccoli makes a dense,

I'll keep that promise, and continue to fight the tobacco industry's targeting of children with every last bit of energy I have. I will also do everything in my power to educate young people about the dangers of tobacco.

Teen-agers and pre-teens: Smoking isn't "cool"; it's dead-

ly! If you don't smoke now, PLEASE don't ever start. If you do smoke, quit NOW — if you can. Tobacco products of all kinds are silent killers. By the time you find out you have a tobacco-related illness, it's usually too late. Approximately 465,000 people in the United States die of tobacco-related diseases each year. I'm sure each and every one of them thought, "It won't happen to ME." That's exactly what my sister thought. Sadly, she was wrong — dead wrong. Thanks to her addiction, she'll miss her sons' graduations, she'll never attend their weddings or see the faces of her grandchildren. She won't

grow old with the husband she loved, and who adored her. Abby, our family is devastated. We miss my sister with all our hearts. Please help me spread the word.

**HEARTBROKEN SISTER, CONCORD, CALIF.**

**DEAR HEARTBROKEN:** I'm pleased to do it, but first permit me to offer my condolences for the loss of your beloved sister.

Your letter is a timely one because tomorrow is the 24th Great American Smokeout. For anyone who may not know, the Smokeout is an upbeat, good-humored one-day campaign to encourage smokers to quit smoking for 24 hours — just to prove to themselves they can do it.

In 1999, 21 percent of smokers (approximately 10.8 mil-

lion) participated in the Great American Smokeout. Of those participating, 11 percent (1,188,000) reported they were smoking less or not at all one to five days later. That's more than a million people who are on their way to healthier, smoke-free lives — thanks to the American Cancer Society.

This year, because more than half of all smokers begin smoking before age 14, the focus of the Great American Smokeout is on teen-age smokers. It's necessary because the tobacco industry spends more than \$6 billion a year — that's \$200 a second — promoting a product to young people that's lethal when used as intended.

A majority of teen-agers who smoke have tried to quit, but find themselves "hooked." According to the experts, more than 70 percent of daily teen-

age smokers who "think" they won't be smoking in five years are still smoking seven years later. Tragically, of the more than 3,000 young people a day who begin to smoke, ONE-THIRD will eventually die from a smoking-related disease.

While I'm on this morbid subject, I should mention that flavored cigarettes ("bidis") have recently become popular among young people. This may be due to their candylike taste, or their relatively inexpensive price (\$1.25 a pack), or the fact that they are rumored to be less harmful than tobacco. Not true! What teens don't realize is that the sweet flavor of bidis masks the harsh, cancer-causing chemicals inside. Bidis have THREE times more carbon monoxide and nicotine, and FIVE times the amount of tar

as American cigarettes have. And so, dear readers of all ages, if you're hooked on tobacco and have been saying, "One of these days I've got to quit," why not join the Great American Smokeout and quit tomorrow? It won't be easy, but it'll be the best holiday present you can give yourself and the people who love you.

Teen-agers are invited to visit [www.Y2Kidz.org](http://www.Y2Kidz.org) to learn what they can do, such as signing a pledge not to start — or to stop if they are smokers now — and to send virtual post-cards to people they love who are addicted to tobacco.

Indeed, after a number of years, this new center has improved the aesthetic of the area and does make for a better involvement, community improvement.

This state-of-the-art facility will serve the many youth suffering from substance abuse and crime problems.

The public/private partnership, through the help of the Greater Orlando Construction Specifications Institute (CSI), a group of construction design professionals, materials suppliers and contractors. Through this group, the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice and the Grove Counseling

Center, Inc., a local non-profit provider of substance abuse and delinquency rehabilitation service, our community offers service.

of signing the card and returning it to the election office. However, the Republicans' application card omitted a line for the voter registration number.

Under Florida law, request for absentee ballots must include the individual's:

- name
- date of request
- address where the ballot is to be mailed
- last four digits of the Social Security Number
- voter registration number
- signature, if the request is made in writing

While election officials in surrounding counties were less stringent about the requirements, especially the voter registration number, Goard, a Republican, refused any application that failed to provide all of the information.

Several weeks before the Nov. 7 election, Republican officials went to Goard's office to add the voter registration numbers to the preprinted application cards. The officials worked out of Goard's office for as many as 10 days.

"The only thing the were provided was a chair," said Seminole County Judge John Sloop, a member of the canvassing board. "They brought their own laptop and had their own databases."

Altamonte Springs attorney Harry N. Jacobs filed a protest on

Nov. 12 claiming the "altering of said applications for absentee ballots resulted in the election results of the Nov. 7, 2000, election being erroneous."

Though he did not cite it in his protest, Florida Statute 104.012(4) makes it a third degree felony for a person to alter "the voter registration application of any other person, without the other person's knowledge and consent."

There are questions whether the statute would apply in this case, however, since the applications altered were for absentee ballots, and not for voter registration.

"I've satisfied myself that the election was fair," Sloop said. "I find there is no foundation for Mr. Jacobs allegations."

During Monday morning's canvassing board meeting, Jacobs also intensely questioned Goard as to whether she informed Republicans about the incomplete applications.

"I notified no one at all," Goard responded tersely.

Goard did say during primary elections her office, as a courtesy, had sent out a form letter to all voters who did not file a complete application for absentee ballot. She said her office was unable to provide that service during the general election.

"We were swamped," Goard said. "We were getting so many applications, that it was literally impossible to follow up."

McIntosh asked whether

Goard was required to send a letter. "You're not required to write them a letter and blow their noses and tell them all the things to complete their applications, right?"

"No," Goard agreed. After motions by McIntosh, the canvassing board unanimously certified the election.

Since the appropriate paperwork had not been typed, the board reconvened at 5:30 p.m. Monday to sign the certification.

During that meeting, board members were aggressively questioned by two out-of-state attorneys, Chris Hunter and Tim Hensler, who are members of the Democratic Recount Committee.

Hunter and Hensler repeatedly accused the board of fraud, interrupted board members with rapid-fire questions and attempted to delay the signature process by talking as the board conducted a final check of the vote tallies. At one point Hunter and Hensler became so belligerent, six Sanford police officers were called to ensure order was kept.

Jacobs, who did not attend the evening meeting, said he was unsure what he would do with his protest.

"We're working on it right now," Jacobs said Tuesday afternoon. "We're in the middle of trying to decide where to file (a lawsuit) or even if we will file."

## Lake Mary hero is for the birds

Frank DeMary, 50, a Lake Mary fisherman, may be considered a hero in the world of herons. He is credited with probably saving the bird's life.

with the loop.

He was then able to secure the bird and cut off the twine and balloon from the heron's bill. The bird was then released and at last word, was still hanging around in the area of Reflections Park.

The bird was not injured.

If a petition is filed, the purpose of the administrative hearing will be to present evidence and testimony and forward a recommended order to the Department. If no petition is filed, this Notice of Intent shall become final agency action.

If a petition is filed, other affected persons may petition for leave to intervene in the proceeding. ## FWC officers cross-training to solidify new agency

Until last year, two state agencies policed hunting and fishing in Florida. Now there's just one agency, and the law enforcement officers are training each other.

While former wildlife officers are getting their feet wet, checking for violations in

scallop beds, former marine patrol officers are learning how to enforce hunting regulations on dove fields. Both kinds of officers now work for the 16-month-old Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

Col. Bob Edwards, director of the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement, said inland officers and marine officers will still specialize in their respective fields, but with 570 officers now working for the agency, inland officers and marine officers, with proper training, can lend a hand to each other.

Currently, inland officers are climbing into boats with marine officers in an area between Dixie and Gulf counties to enforce boating safety laws, oyster harvest regulations and net limitations. Similar joint law enforcement operations are taking place around the state, and officers also are getting classroom instruction at the Pat Thomas Law Enforcement Training Academy near Quincy.

"The ability to combine our law enforcement efforts and to concentrate manpower when necessary is one of the greatest benefits of establishing the new agency," said John Walker, chief of the FWC's Bureau of Marine Law Enforcement. "We've already had assistance from inland officers during the lobster season down in the Keys and they've helped us make snook cases in south Florida."

Bureau chief Paul Hoover, who is in charge of inland patrols by uniformed officers said marine officers have helped enforce migratory bird hunting laws already this year and will pitch in to enforce other hunting laws when deer and fall turkey hunting seasons begin.

"We're making the most efficient use of the law enforcement manpower we have," Hoover said. "We can be much more effective than we could when we had 360 inland officers and 320 marine officers under two agencies with different missions."

Edwards said that aside from uniformed officers, other resources, such as aircraft, undercover investigators and communications equipment, are available to move around the state much more swiftly when necessary, because it no longer requires the coordination of two agencies.

"Resource law enforcement has never been a boring profession," Edwards said, "but the new challenges associated with this kind of cross-training and working in a new environment has made our officers' jobs even more rewarding."

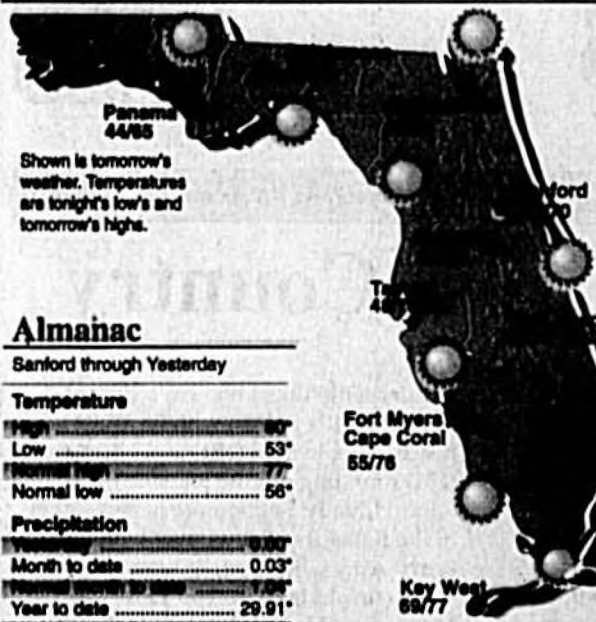

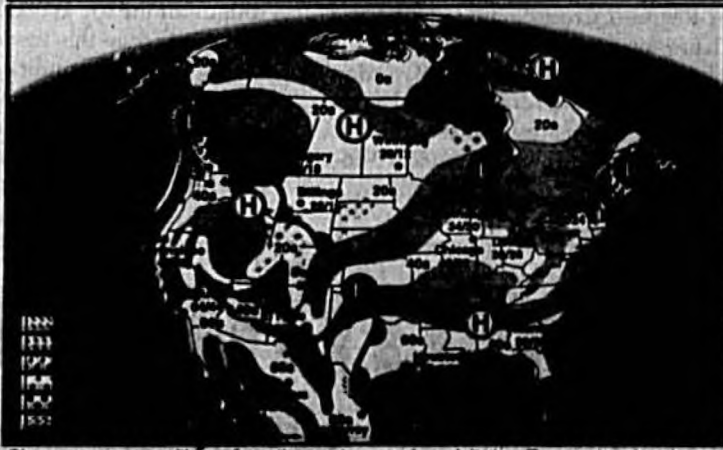

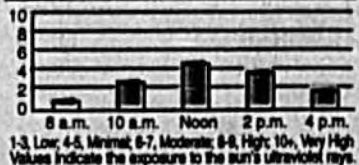

red gills and clear eyes. These two characteristics are hallmarks of fresh fish.

FISHING FORECAST  
Bass fishing is getting better by the day. Cooler air temperatures combined with low water levels make bass easy to locate in the river. Most stretches of river look alike, so I always like to target irregular features. Steep banks, deep bends, sand bars, creek and slough mouths, pilings, and weed beds are all good places to look for river

bass. The vast majority of river bass tend to hold in such spots. Large shiners are hard to beat this time of year for heavy-weight bass.

Sebastian Inlet has good action with snook, flounder, trout and redfish. Large live shrimp or finger mullet are top baits. Huge "doormat" flounder will soon be making their annual winter appearance. Trout are also hitting on the grass flats just inside the inlet.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral wants to pay careful attention to the marine forecast before plan-

ning an offshore trip. King mackerel and cobia will be roaming 8 A Reef and Pelican Flats. Dolphin and wahoo are scarce. Inside the port, expect a few snook around the jetties and pilings, along with sheepshead and flounder. Trout and redfish are rated as fair in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet has dependable action with sheepshead, drum, redfish, jack crevalle, and a few flounder. Live or dead shrimp is the top bait. Trout and redfish are rated as fair in the Mosquito Lagoon.

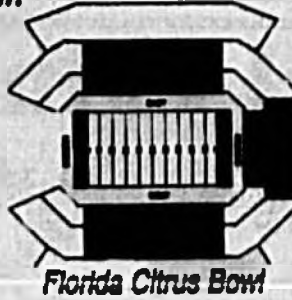

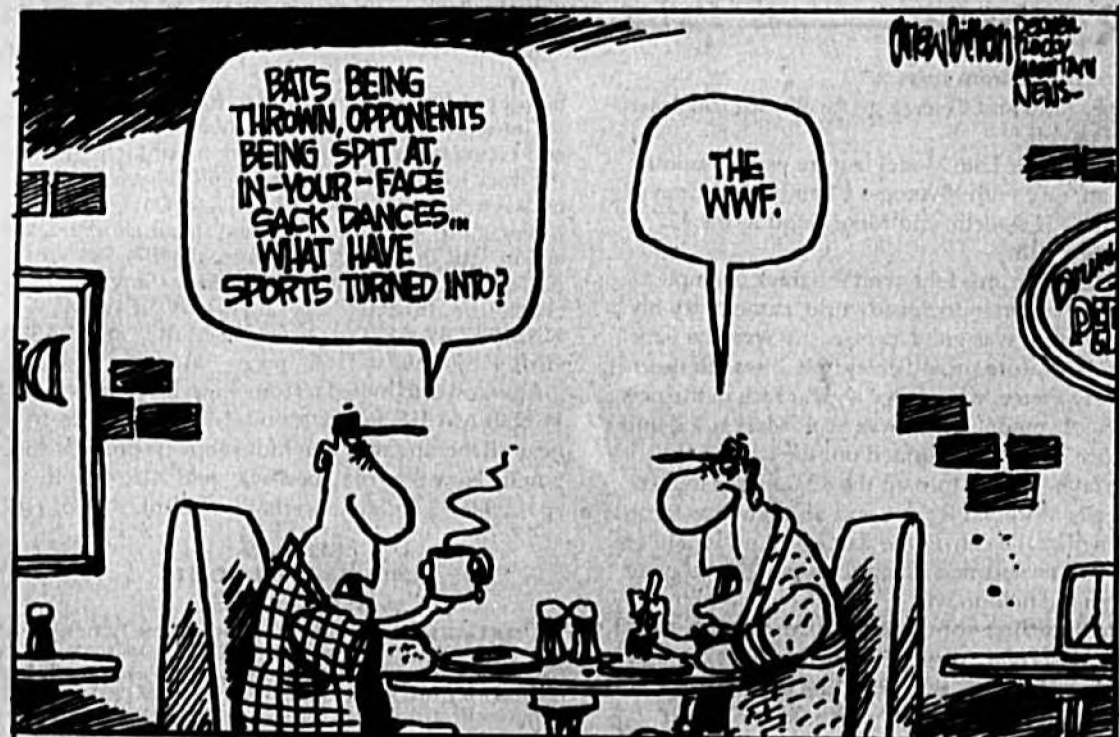

# Drivers are distracted by more than just cell phones

Cell phones use while driving the tip of the iceberg of accident-causing driving distractions, according to a survey by Response Insurance, a national auto insurer.

As many local governments are seeking to restrict cell phone use on the road, new information from a national survey of more than one-thousand drivers was just released that also paints a clearer picture of the typical cell phone driver.

Response Insurance is the company that sponsored the survey that launched the national debate on driving distractions.

Thirteen percent of drivers who talk on cell phones behind the wheel say it had caused them to get into an accident. Overall, cell phone usage was reported by 29 percent of all drivers in the Response Insurance National Driving Habits Survey. But the survey also found that 76 percent of drivers engaged in one or more distracting activity while driving. In many cases those distractions resulted in accidents or near-accidents at an even higher rate, including reaching across the passenger seat, arguing with a passenger, spilling coffee and turning around to speak.

"The real problem is in the drivers who seem to think

they're sitting in their living rooms, rather than behind the wheel. They're eating, talking on the phone, listening to the radio, reading and combing their hair — everything except paying attention to the road," said Mory Katz, chairman of Response Insurance.

But whose doing the cell phone talking while driving? Newly released survey results revealed:

- Parents do it more than those without children, 38 to 24 percent.

- Drivers from western states call/drive more than those in the northeast, 33 to 26 percent.

- Men edged out women on the phone, 31 to 28 percent.

- Baby-boomers 35 to 44 years old ranked highest at 40

percent, as compared to drivers 65 years and older at just 10 percent.

- Drivers earning more than \$50,000 a year call and drive more than those in the \$15,000 to \$25,000 range, 46 to 15 percent.

"Distractions come in many forms and talking on a cell phone is just one of the activities that can result in inattentive driving," Katz stated.

Alarming, the survey revealed that 20 percent are so busy multi-tasking behind the wheel that they have steered their car with their thighs.
