Results Of The Freeze

Although it is too early for any accurate estimate of crop damage resulting in Florida from the recent freeze, the duration of the cold as well as the lowness of the temperature both presage serious consequences for farmer and grower alike.

With almost two weeks of cold weather, something almost unprecedented in Florida, and with the mercury dropping night after night below freezing, and in some instances even in the central portion of the state to as low as 20 degrees, it goes without saying that the damage to citrus has been heavy, while tender vegetables, ferns, gladioli and so forth have been largely destroyed.

As far as we have been able to learn the losses suffered by celery farmers are negligible, and will probably be more than offset by the improved prices. It is recalled that in 1917 a similar freeze slightly damaged the celery, one of the hardest products grown, and wiped out practically everything else, but served as a great boon to the growers because of the high prices which resulted.

Another advantage which is sure to accrue from the freeze is the elimination of bugs and other pests which usually are a great nuisance to the farmers during the early Spring and often run the cost of production to great heights. Even the boll weevil in Georgia, we are advised by the Associated Press, has been wiped out. A good freeze now and then gets rid of most troublesome insects and reduces the damage caused by them to a minimum for months to come.

A significant factor, it seems to us, during the past two weeks was that Sanford temperatures invariably ranged four or five degrees higher than all other points in a similar latitude. The mercury in towns 100 or 150 miles farther south fell as low as it did here, while in neighboring towns, famous as tourist resorts, the weather was four degrees colder.

This, it seems to us, is something worth mentioning in appealing to tourists or new residents. There was actually less damage to fruit, vegetables and flowers in the Sanford area, than in most towns considerably farther south, and though most of us have felt the cold pretty severely during the past few days, we have not had it nearly as bad as most other Florida cities. The suffering among our residents from the cold has not been as great nor has the damage to crops been as severe.

There is something to be thankful for and something on which we might capitalize in the future.

NO THIRD TERM NEW YORK HERALD TRIBUNE

In the midst of the hectic speculations about a third term for President Roosevelt it is encouraging to find a voice which is at once sane, rational and friendly. The Louisville Courier-Journal, long a leading Democratic newspaper, has been among the most active supporters of the New Deal. Its present editor, Mr. Herbert Agar, well known in New York as a Pulitzer Prize winner, has been insistently defending Mr. Roosevelt against his enemies in both parties.

"The Courier-Journal" still devoted to Mr. Roosevelt, has come out against a third term for three reasons: (1) the third-term issue would make the campaign intensely bitter; (2) Mr. Roosevelt, if re-elected would find himself head of a divided, bitter people at a moment when national unity is of utmost importance; and (3) the country needs a success from arguing about Mr. Roosevelt, his family, his qualities and his policies. To this "The Courier-Journal" adds that in retirement Mr. Roosevelt could be an even greater force for liberalism than in a third term.

A threat of war, in the opinion of the Louisville editor, is the only thing which would induce him to run again. But it can well be argued that the very presence of a third term, if the country is not at war, would have an even greater force for liberalism than in a third term.

Jobs In U. S. Show Increase Over '39

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP) The American Federation of Labor estimated yesterday that 11,335,000 persons had jobs in the United States in December, 1939, an increase of 1,257,000 over the same month a year ago.

Describing this as an "important employment gain," the federation said it had reduced the army of unemployment by nearly 800,000, "that is, enough jobs have been created to provide for more than 550,000 added to the working population, and to give work to nearly 800,000 of the unemployed." The labor federation said the

increase in jobs had reduced the unemployment total to 9,270,000 in December, 1939, from 10,166,000 in December, 1938.

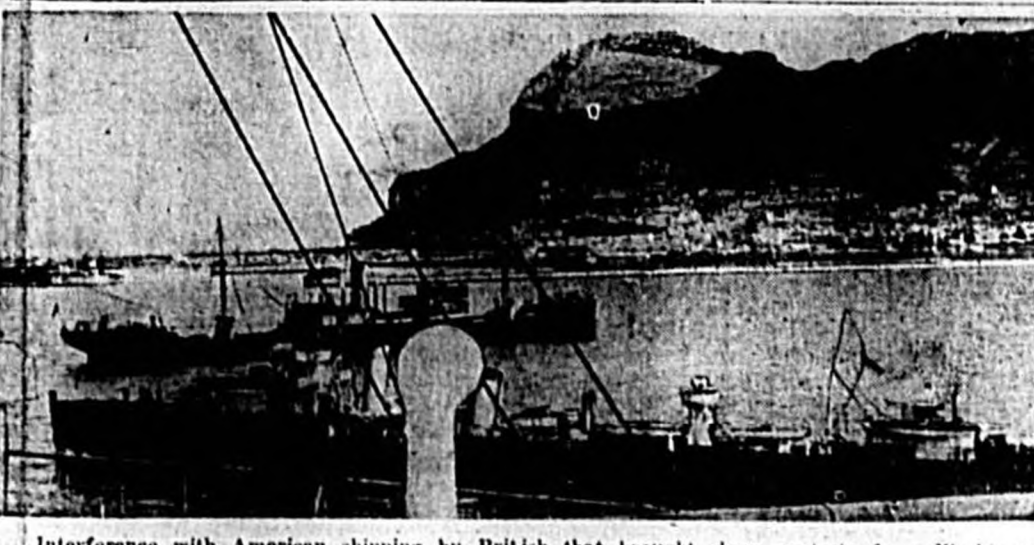
