#### Airport meeting

**SANFORD** — A joint meeting is to be held this afternoon at the Orlando-Sanford Airport. Scheduled to attend will be the Airport Advisory Board, Seminole County Commission, Sanford City Commission, and various staff members.

Purpose of the meeting is to present findings and recommendations of the economic development master plan, and to receive direction regarding issues in order to pursue them.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 1:30 this afternoon, followed by the Master Plan presentation and discussion beginning at 1:45. Items included are the industrial park development, airport environs development, water sewer and drainage service, entrance road overlay, marketing strategies, and other subjects.

The meeting will be held in the A. Kay Shoemaker International Terminal on One Red Cleveland Blvd.

#### Color guard needs \$\$\$

**LAKE MARY** — The Lake Mary High School Color Guard is preparing to go to national competition in Phoenix later this spring. It will cost the group approximately \$18,000 for the team to compete. This sum covers air fare, transportation and hotel rooms for three nights.

The group is also looking for help from local businesses and other organizations.

The group competes in the Winter Guard International season, which starts after football season. Known as the "Sport of the Arts," the competition combines the artistic elements of dance, music and drama with the physical elements of drill and the use of flags, sabers and rifles.

The group competed last weekend in the Miami Regionals, in which they finished second. This gave them an overall ranking of fourth in the nation.

Access to the county's web site is to be expanded later this year with the implementation of the Seminole On Line project.

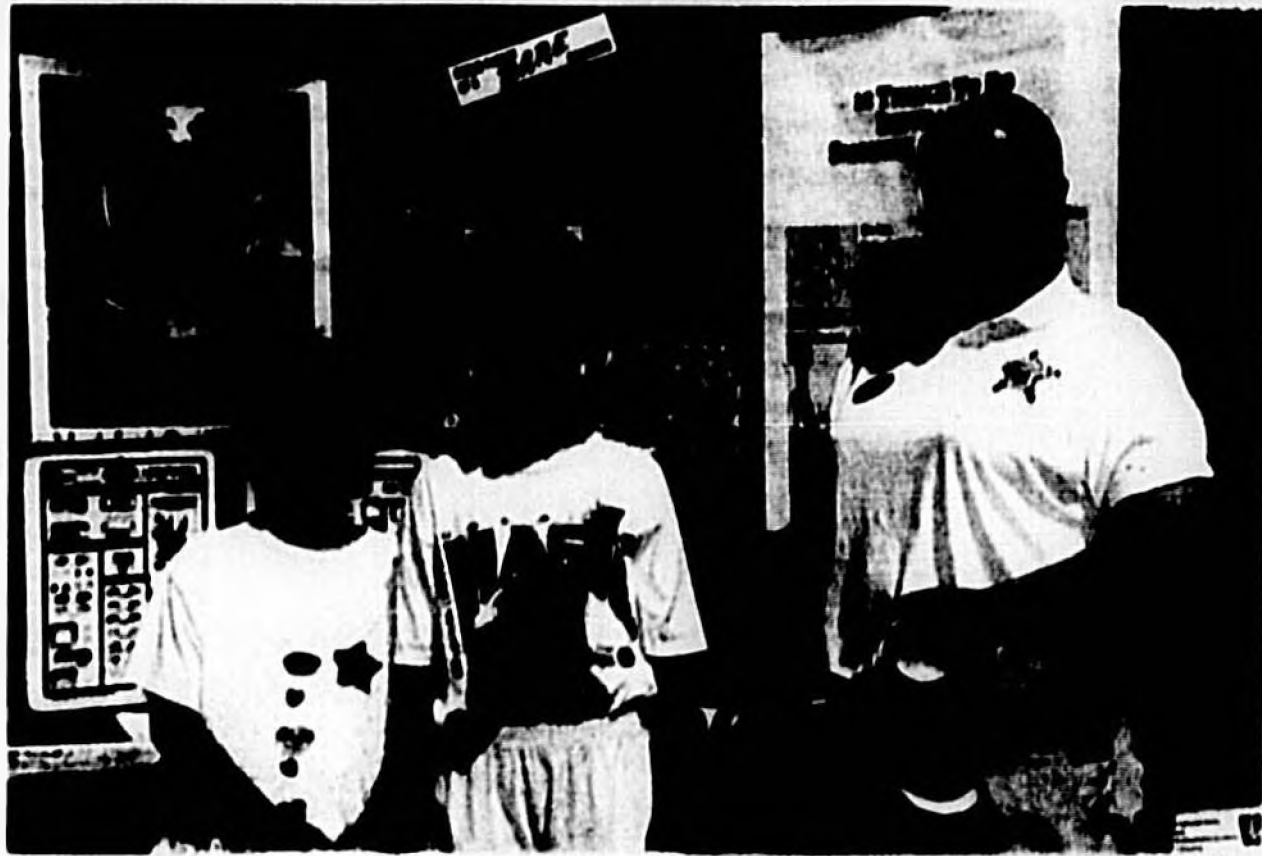

## Will SHS get a public pool?

**SANFORD** — It's been four decades since there has been a public swimming pool in Sanford. Several drives for a new pool in the area have already failed.

In July of 1990, the Seminole County Commission, School Board and Sanford City Commission held a joint meeting to discuss the possibility of a pool at Seminole High School.

It was determined that a state grant might be available through the PECO (Public Education Capital Outlay) fund. If the money could be obtained and the pool built, it would be used by the school during school hours, and open to the general public at night and non-school hours.

## Shortfall found in 1994 housing authority audit

**SANFORD** — While the most recently-released audit of the Sanford Housing Authority looks less than favorable, it's not as bad as it seems.

The audit, which shows an \$80,000 shortfall in the agency's cash account, was conducted for the 1994-95 fiscal year.

"Certainly, I was here for at least part of that fiscal year," said Timothy Hudson, who has been the Sanford Housing Authority's executive director since Oct. 1995, "but there have been substantial changes in the housing authority since that time."

Under Phyllis Richardson, the previous executive director of

the housing authority, there were allegations of improper use of agency money, employees and other resources for construction on Richardson's family homes.

Hudson noted that the audit made no reference to what might have happened to the missing cash. He said it was only a problem of "reconciling the general ledger."

He said better attention needed to be given to tracking which deposits were made in which accounts. Money which should have been put in the general fund, for example, was put into "section H" accounts and record keeping was more lax than now.

Hudson would not comment. See Audit, Page 5A

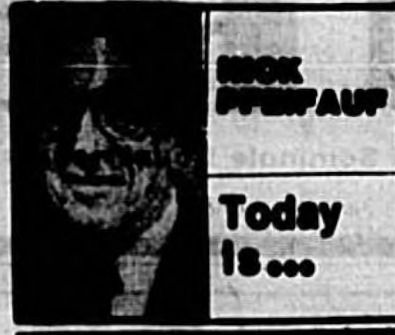
With its efforts, the I'm A Winner Program has brought encouragement to help students become better students and encourage

# Not much of a day, historically



On this date in 1831, Schick Inc. marketed the first electric razor. (I've been using one since I was a little shaver).

Grover Cleveland was born on this date in 1837. We mentioned him several weeks ago on the anniversary of his second inauguration as President of the United States.

At that time, we explained that he was listed as both the 22nd and 24th presidents, having served two terms but not consecutively.

Although things have changed since he served in the nation's highest office, at the time he was the first president to be married while in office (he married his 21-year old ward). He was the first (actually his wife was) to

have a child while living in the White House.

One other point, when he ran for re-election after his first term, he received a plurality of votes, but didn't win the electoral college vote.

The only reason we mentioned him the second time today, after having gone through this before, is because if we didn't, this column would have been too short.

John C. Calhoun was born on this date in 1782. He was the first vice president to resign while in office. According to one source, he resigned after being elected to fill a vacancy on the U.S. Senate. (Also senator's pay was better at that time).

"Jordan's Back" day. It was on March 18, 1985 that Michael Jordan, considered by many as one of the National Basketball Association's greatest all-time players, announced he was returning to professional play after a 17-month break. Jordan, who averaged 32.3 points a game during regular season play, led the Chicago Bulls to three successive NBA titles.

In TV land, the first episode of "Tales of Wells Fargo" premiered on March 18, 1957.

New Hope, Inc. is a specialized community resource for grief and loss. Its basic philosophy is to recognize illness and death as a necessary part of life.

They believe that understanding the grief response is considered essential for one to move toward hope, healing and renewal.

New Hope facilitates this journey by offering professional counseling for loss related to death.

They also offer caring volunteers to bring emotional support

for grief associated with life threatening illnesses.

In addition, volunteers provide community education and training services on grief and loss as well as fundraising activities.

New Hope offers services in the following areas and needs volunteers to serve in various capacities:

• **New Hope Counseling Center** The program provides affordable individual and group grief therapy by licensed mental health counselors.

• **Children's Wish Foundation** A program that grants wishes to children who have been diagnosed with a life-threatening illness and a family support program designed to help ease the day-to-day burdens of having

to deal with such illnesses.

• **Center for Grieving Children** A program designed to provide ongoing support for children who have experienced significant losses related to death. The programs that are a part of the Center will encourage children to express their grief verbally and through creative, positive play within a peer group setting. The group is facilitated by a qualified professional staff and trained volunteers.

• **Community Care Teams** This program offers training and materials to volunteer coordinators from faith communities, service clubs and other community agencies. The purpose of this training is to assist coordinators in developing care teams for those needing assistance in a given community or congregation.

• **Volunteer Services** This program manages and coordinates all volunteer opportunities for New Hope. Opportunities include support to four separate Thrift and Gift stores and direct support of day-to-day program operations and fundraising activities.

Right now, one of the more critical needs is in the Sanford thrift store where volunteers are needed to sort, price and sell merchandise and to pick up donated items.

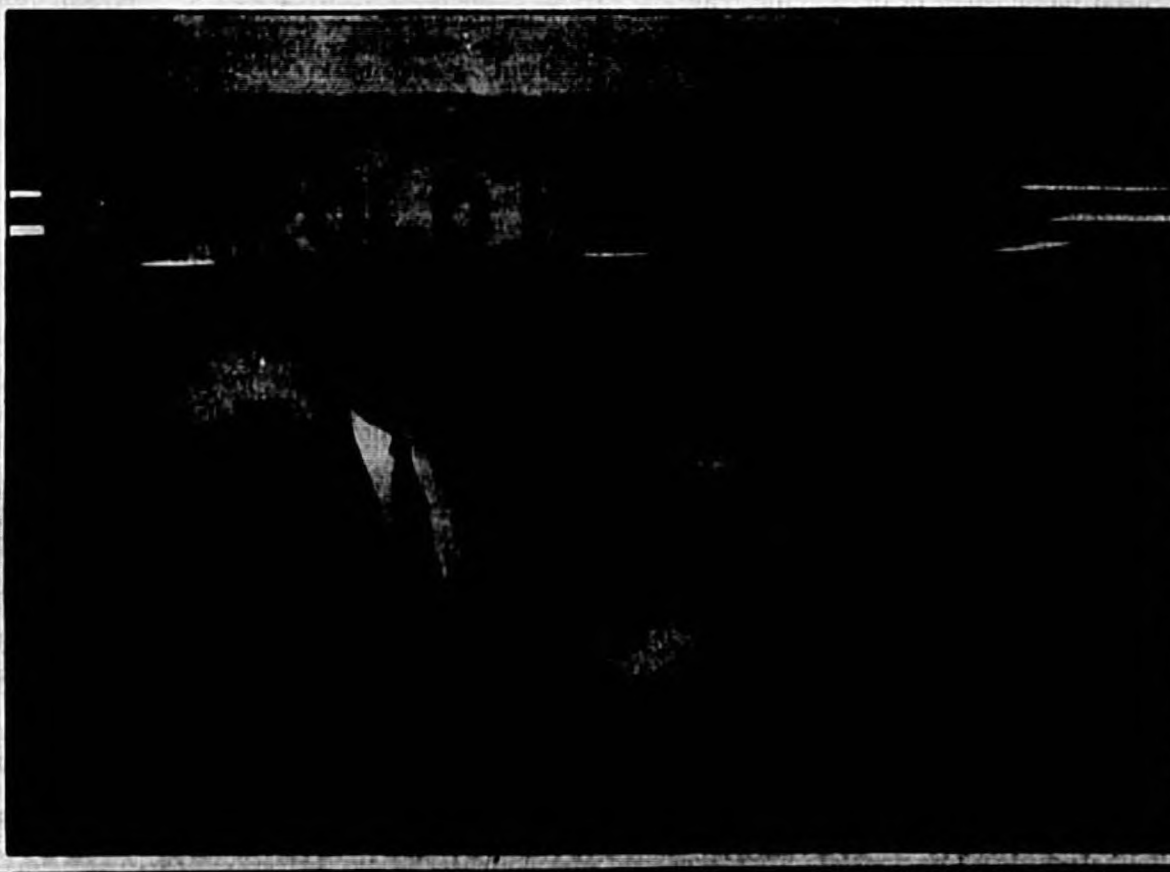

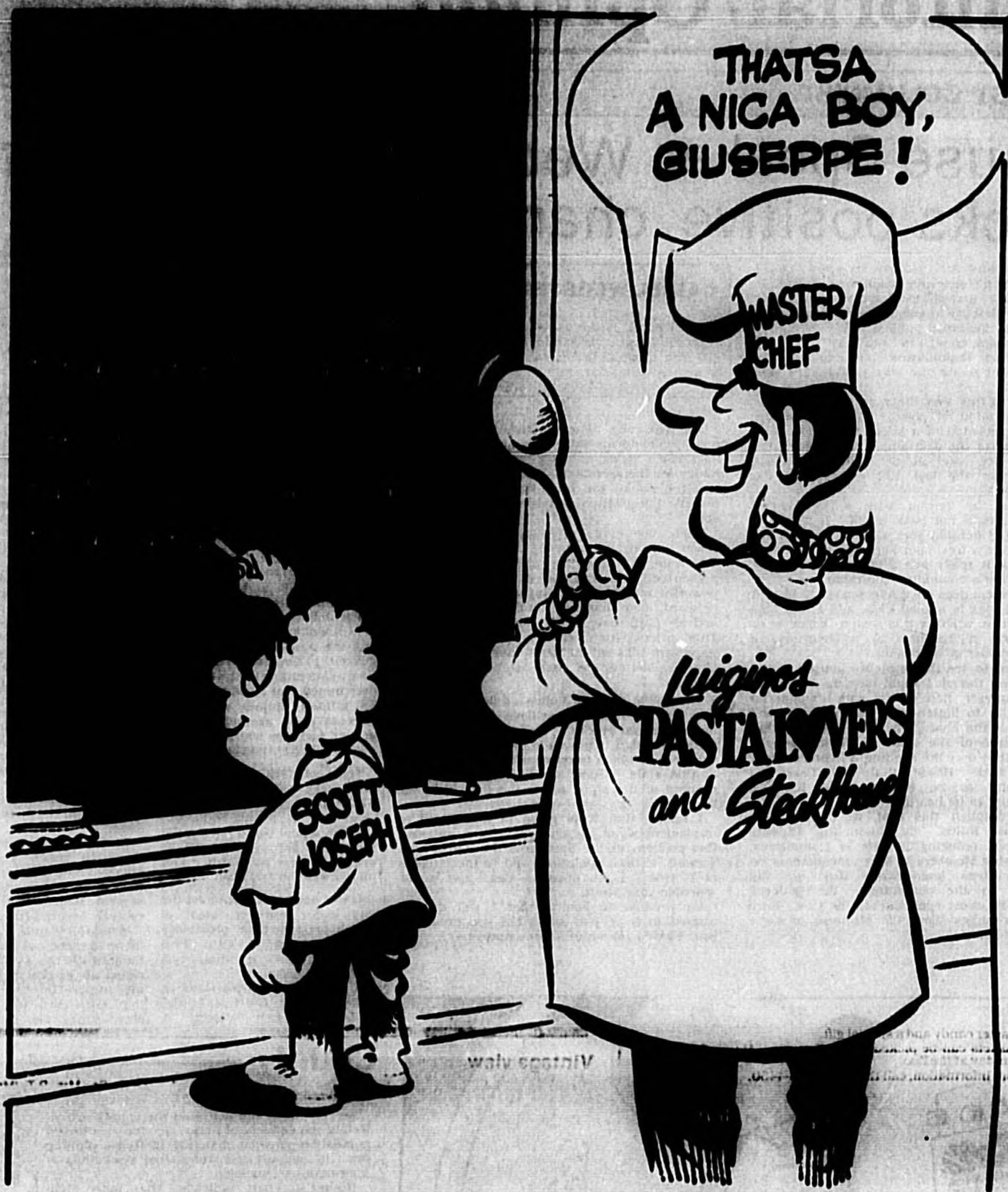

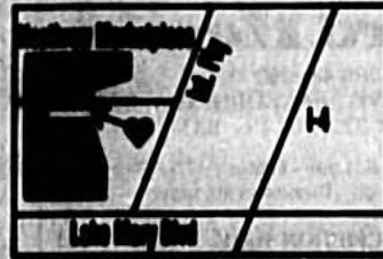

## House Speaker Webster backs positive change

When I was first elected 16 years ago, I dreamed of a House that would be different. Upon my arrival to Tallahassee, I was informed that "it's not a good idea for a Republican freshman to file a bill."

I was foolish enough to ask, "Why?" "Freshman Republicans bills do not get heard. That is just the way it works," I was told.

Observing this over the years, I termed this as the pyramid of power. The top of the pyramid consisted of a select few people who made most of the decisions. The issues were the next tier, and at the bottom of that pyramid, for the last 122 years, were the Republicans.

That is the reason why a Republican freshman could not pass a bill. If it was a good idea, it actually was a bad idea, because it came from a freshman Republican. If it was a bad idea, it really was a good idea, because it came from a committee chairman.

That system does not make sense. It should be a good idea is a good idea, and a bad idea is a bad idea, whether it is from a Democrat or Republican, a freshman or a chairman, a senior Member or a Speaker.

I wanted to see that system changed, but I really never thought I would have the chance to do it. However, here we are with a wonderful opportunity to flatten out that pyramid and spread out the base. The result will be that every citizen of the state of Florida will be assured that they are sending a Representative to the State House that will have the opportunity to be effective and has an opportunity to be heard.

To accomplish this goal, we have written new House Rules. By eliminating 72 subcommittees, reducing the size of committees, and allowing Members to offer amendments on all committees (even when they are not assigned to the committee), the process becomes far more open than in the past. Each of these changes allows the Members to make their vote count.



Our new rules also will end meetings by 6 p.m., avoiding the late night negotiations and back-room deals. There will be sufficient notice for the agenda of the House. Members and the public will have time to respond to proposed legislation well ahead of the actual vote.

Each committee is grouped in one of the seven bipartisan councils. Each council will determine the order in which legislation is presented. Instead of a small group of powerful members deciding which legislation is heard, more than two-thirds of the members actively participate in the House floor agenda. This prioritization ensures that the most important bills will be heard first and ends the chaotic, last-minute rush at the end of the session.

The public may not notice a difference in the way the legislation functions, but they will notice the end product. They will see that the legislation that is placed in the highest priority will be that which is relevant to the vital needs of this state. Come are the days when the naming of the state pie is the first order of business.

I realize that it is going to take time to implement all of the changes. I am entering this position as the Speaker of the House as a servant, to the Legislature and to the citizens of Florida. I am open to ideas and would welcome your input.

My promise to you is that I will do my utmost to serve you and make you proud of your Florida House of Representatives.

Not enough grant money was available from the FECD fund to build the pool, and the matter was temporarily dropped.

The following year however, joint financing between the city and the school board was suggested. The Sanford Parks Department at that time determined that a bond issue for \$3 million dollars would be necessary to accomplish the desired facilities which included additional recreation facilities.

The pool itself, to be built at SHS, was estimated to cost \$1,200,000. The city was to share the cost, paying \$600,000, and the school board paying the remainder through the FECD grant money available. The matter went on a city ballot.

It was one of four items on the city ballot however, most of which presented the possibility of increasing taxes. The swimming pool question was thoroughly debated.

A swimming pool was subsequently built at Lake Brantley High School in

Altamonte Springs.

Now, the pool suggestion is being brought back again. During a February goal setting meeting, the Sanford City Commission listed it as 18th in a 32 item list of goals. City Commissioner Velma Williams listed the need for a pool as her second priority, with the possibility of a community recreation center also included.

"There are so many reasons why we need a swimming pool in the north end of the county," said Tony Ackerson, swim coach at Seminole High School. "There needs to be a place where not only our school students but everyone in the community can swim."

He especially pointed out the need to teach very young children how to swim in order to help reduce drownings, such as several which have occurred recently here in Central Florida.

Monday, Wanda Kelly, executive director of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, called all parties together for a meeting at the chamber building. On hand were Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, City Manager

Bill Simmons, Ackerson, other officials from Seminole High School, a representative of the Seminole Family YMCA which has a swimming pool, and a group known as Seminole Hope, which has been working toward obtaining a public swimming pool in the area.

"Because so many of the different groups had their own private agendas toward getting a swimming pool," Ackerson said, "Wanda felt it necessary to call the meeting to find out if we were possibly on the same track."

"After listening to the different ideas and discussion," Ackerson continued, "I believe we are all on the same track."

He told the group that there was three and a half acres of property at Seminole High School which would make an ideal location for a pool. "Let's take it," he said. "The YMCA has a pool, but that is located out there next to Lake Mary High School, and I expect most of our youngsters don't want to travel out that far. They need a pool right here in the Sanford area."

program. A black achiever herself in 1980, Anderson said she knows how important it is that kids today have positive role models who expose them to the options that are available to them.

"The black achievers program allows you to impact youth's lives in a way that builds life relationships. Teaching students about the quality of life is one of the most important things you can give them."

Second on the agenda is a midnight basketball program, designed to take kids off of the streets and give them constructive activities in a safe environment. 300 teens will participate in the program, and gain social and community values through positive activities and role models.

The third initiative is a collaboration with the sheriff's department that will allow youths who have had problems with the law to improve themselves and develop healthy self-esteem through an incentives program. In addition to learning about the legal system and how it is set up to protect them and the community, kids that make a change for the better will be rewarded in various ways including riding mini bikes.

"In 60 years, Thomas said, 'the type of car you drive, the house you have, or the amount of money in your bank

account won't really matter. I've learned that what will matter is that the world will be different because you helped to improve the life of a child."

Tom Breck, Membership and Marketing Director for the Seminole YMCA, said that he was most impressed by the number of kids who are actually affected by the work that the organization does.

"We want to get to the point where we turn no family or child away who needs our help," Breck said. "We want to make a substantial difference in the community and improve

the quality of life for all of its members. There are a lot of concerns out there and we hope to be able to address them all. Our goals for 1997 are to be a supportive fixture in the community."

This year, the monetary goal is to award over \$200,000 in scholarships to those in need and another \$70,000 is slated for childcare alone. The

Seminole County YMCA is well on its way to achieving their initiatives and is already a supportive member of the community.

Forty years ago the pro at the country club where our high school golf team played its matches took me aside to share an opinion he had about the game. I'll never forget nor forgive him for what he said: "This is no game for women, coloreds or pimply-faced teen-agers."

Being one of the three he held in such low esteem, I vowed that once I received my varsity golf letter, I'd never again play at this club nor anywhere else.

As much as I enjoyed golf, and worked at being good at it, I was disgusted with the people who called the shots for the sport at that time. The country club pro was a bigoted jerk and so were most of the club members. The year was 1957. I was 17 and ticked off.

You would think that I would have forgotten this episode at Westbrar Golf and Country Club in Vienna, Va., by now - but I haven't. I never will. But I'm feeling a little better about the new attitude by the grand old forces in golf.

Something absolutely delightful happened at Bay Hill Club in Orlando last week, where Arnold Palmer and Tiger Woods became fast friends.

I doubt Tiger - no matter how super sensational he plays golf - would have been fortunate in 1957.

But here he was with the great Arnold Palmer, sharing precious Bay Hill moments that were a long, long time coming - and hopefully are indicative of the way things on every golf course in America.

Woods watched in awe as Palmer, 67, pulled out his clubs for the first time since undergoing prostate surgery eight weeks ago.

"I just want to watch to see how he swings," Woods said softly, his eyes focused on Palmer. "I mean, Arnold Palmer, man - he's unbelievable."

That his audience included the game's newest sensation - the unbelievable Tiger Woods - seemed to make Palmer all the more determined to regain his patented swing and spirit.

"Look out, Tiger," he roared, and the two golfers laughed.

You know what, I laughed, too. I laughed and I thought about that pro and what he said back in 1957. His first name was Ernie, I believe. I thought about how narrow-minded and mean-spirited he had been. The guy's probably dead and gone now. And that's worth another laugh.

Forty years, I waited for something as neat as Arnold Palmer and Tiger Woods to bring the sport of golf back to social par.

Here they were laughing, looking at each other eye-to-eye - the game's greatest legend and a young black athlete who promises to take golf into the next century and beyond.

"Are you enjoying it?" Arnold Palmer asked Tiger Woods.

"Yeah, because the thing is, I love to play golf," Woods said.

"Well, that's good," Palmer said. "It's a problem I've had for about the last 60 years."

So now, I'm thinking 40 years after vowing I wouldn't that maybe I might play golf again - even though I'm almost as old as Ernie and taking pills to fend off my own prostate problems.

I've still got an old wood-shaft putter and a 1-iron. I pitched the other clubs but kept the putter and 1-iron.

And just for the thrill of it, I pulled out my 1957 school yearbook and took a look at the picture of the McLean High School golf team. There I was a pimply-faced teenager proudly posing with my teammates. We sure had some fun despite the grouchy old guard at the course where we played.

Things aren't like they used to be....and we all ought to be grateful for that.

Here's to 1997 and a game of golf.

Volunteers are desperately needed to help in the thrift shop. To inquire about volunteer op-

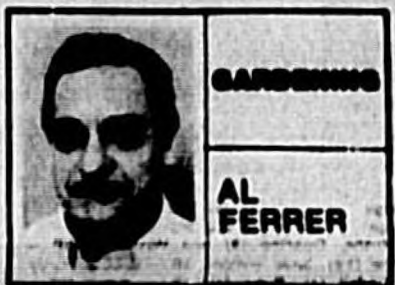

# How to fertilize your lawn correctly

The best way to go about fertilizing your lawn, is to take a sample of your soil and have a reputable soil laboratory do a soil analysis to determine the actual needs of your soil. The sample can be obtained by taking, from the top 6 inches of soil, 15 to 20 small plugs at random over the entire lawn. By taking all the plug samples, a composite sample will be obtained. About one pint of this sample should be sent to a soil laboratory for analysis. The University of Florida Soil Testing Lab will analyze a soil sample for \$5.00 and give you information on pH, and major nutrients like phosphorus and potassium and some of the other essential elements such as magnesium, copper, zinc, and manganese in your soil. (Kits for mailing soil to University may be picked up at the Extension Services Office, (across from Pine World), 280 W. County Home Road, Sanford, FL 32778, Monday thru Friday, 8:00 am-5:00pm).

Soil Reaction: Soil reaction of pH is a measurement of acidity or alkalinity of a soil. Readings above 7 measure levels of alkalinity, while values below 7 measure levels of acidity. Turfgrasses vary in their tolerance to soil acidity, for instance, centipede and

bahia grasses will grow in more acid soils (pH 5.0 to 6.0) than St. Augustine grass (pH 6.0 to 7.0). The soil reaction should be adjusted to the needs of the different turfgrasses. Dolomitic lime is commonly used to increase the pH values and to supply the nutrients calcium and magnesium to the plants. Dolomitic lime is applied at the rate of 5 lbs. per 100 square feet. Elemental sulfur can be used to lower the soil pH, use a maximum of 1.0 of sulfur powder per 1000 square feet per application.

Essential Elements: All living organisms require certain chemical elements to grow. These chemicals required for growth are called essential elements, and plants

require about 16 such elements. All essential elements except carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen, are obtained from the soil by the plant roots. Nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are required in greater quantities and are called macronutrients. Complete fertilizers contain these three elements, which is always presented in the same order and their content in the fertilizers is expressed in percentage. Calcium, magnesium and sulfur are called secondary elements because they are needed in smaller quantities than the macronutrients. Iron, manganese, zinc, copper, chlorine, molybdenum, and boron are required in very minute quantities and are called micronutrients or minor elements.

Fertilization: A good all purpose lawn fertilizer for the spring is a 16-4-8, preferable with micronutrients. Always follow the rule that nitrogen should be applied at rate of 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. Therefore, if you use a 16-4-8 fertilizer you will need 10 pounds to apply 1

pound of actual nitrogen to cover the 1,000 square feet or if you use a 6-8-8 fertilizer, you will need 16.7 pounds to cover 1,000 square feet of lawn. If more than 50% of the nitrogen source in the fertilizer is insoluble in water, the actual nitrogen rate can be increased from 1 pound to 2 pounds per 1,000 square feet. An high maintenance fertilizer program will require 4 fertilizer applications per year. For central Florida, it means one in March, May, July and September. A 15-0-14 fertilizer can be used in May and July instead of the 16-4-8 fertilizer. Iron may be applied in the summer (June) to give the grass a better color, and especially if some yellowing appears in your lawn. Apply 2 oz. of ferrous sulfate in 3 to 5 gallons of water per 1,000 square feet or use a chelated form of iron as indicated on the label.
