PERSON ROLLS WILL GET BIG SLASH TODAY

Roosevelt's Economy Program Will Pare Vet Expenditures By Nearly One Half

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—The personal rolls will be lightened by almost one-half today by the Roosevelt economy program. The beginning of the new fiscal year brought veterans' expenditures down from 1932 appropriations that aggregated \$227,249,000 to estimates totaling \$51,986,000 for the new year, a reduction of \$175,263,000.

GEORGIA ROW TO BE DECIDED BY ONE JUDGE

Jurist Will Rule On Whether Highway Group Should Be Given Injunction

ATLANTA, July 1.—(AP)—A three-judge federal court ruled yesterday that no constitutional questions are involved in the feud between Governor Talmadge and two men he removed from the highway board by martial edict. The three-judge court decided that one federal judge should rule on whether the ousted members of the highway board are entitled to an injunction restraining Talmadge and two men he removed from the highway board by martial law decree. Judge Samuel H. Sibley of the circuit court of appeals and Judge William I. Grubb of Birmingham, retired from the hearing and left Judge Marsh Underwood, of Atlanta, to rule in the case.

Treasury Books At End Of Year Relate Story Of Big Deficit Despite Economy

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—Treasury books at the end of a fiscal year yesterday related the story of a \$1,760,000,000 deficit but every government department showed the extent of the economy in process to prevent its happening again. The government's program for the fiscal year beginning today calls for a reduction of about one billion dollars in the ordinary expenditures of government. This means, in addition to the 18 percent pay cut affecting every federal employe, that several thousand will be separated entirely from the payroll. It was the third successive year in which the government has spent more than it collected and a glance at the public debt gave further evidence of what depression has done to Uncle Sam's pocketbook. Since June 30, 1930, to the end of May this year, the debt has increased by \$5,668,000,000 to the total of \$21,833,286,981. In the year which ended yesterday, the debt swelled about \$2,000,000,000.

The storm is reported to be moving at a rate of 12 miles an hour.

Working Buttonholes

In working button holes, use the best thread, preferably six-cord, if the fabric is black or white, so that it will stand wear and not fray. Take a thread twenty times the length of the buttonhole and tie a knot in one end. Over-stitch around the buttonhole using short stitches. Then insert the needle from the underside, throw the thread over the point, and draw up the needle until the thread forms a pearl. Make the stitches even and close together. Continue around the buttonhole and take several over-stitch stitches on the wrong side to finish off the buttonhole.

CLUBS TO HELP INTERNATIONAL TIES PLANNED

Groups in Preparatory and High Schools Being Formulated

PRINCETON, N. J., July 1. Plans for the formation of a series of international relations clubs in preparatory and high schools are being formulated by the executive council of the American Whig and Clovepole Club of Princeton University.

The aim of the societies in sponsoring these clubs is to afford increased opportunity to students of high school age for contact with public and international affairs. At present they are showing an ever increasing interest in these matters, and the formation of such clubs would give them a chance to express themselves, to hear speakers qualified to speak on the subjects of contemporary international relations and to hold informal discussions.

Each year delegations of two to six representatives from each of the clubs would meet in a general assembly for interchange of ideas and plans. Present tentative plans call for an organization roughly corresponding to that of the international relations clubs now existing in colleges and universities throughout the country. At least these hold model League of Nations assemblies every year, at which each member represents some nation in the League.

No schools have as yet been approached officially with regard to formation of clubs, but much interest has been expressed in the plan, and it is believed that it will be carried out. Next fall all eastern preparatory schools and neighboring high schools will receive letters on the subject from the committee which will be appointed to supervise the project. It is hoped that the Carnegie Foundation in New York will aid the new organization.

"Caste System" Is Capitalistic Aim, States Educator

CHICAGO, July 1.—(AP)—Charges that capitalists sought to destroy educational facilities for the masses and "create a caste system of peasants" were made last night as the vanguard of 8000 school teachers gathered for the National Education Association's annual convention.

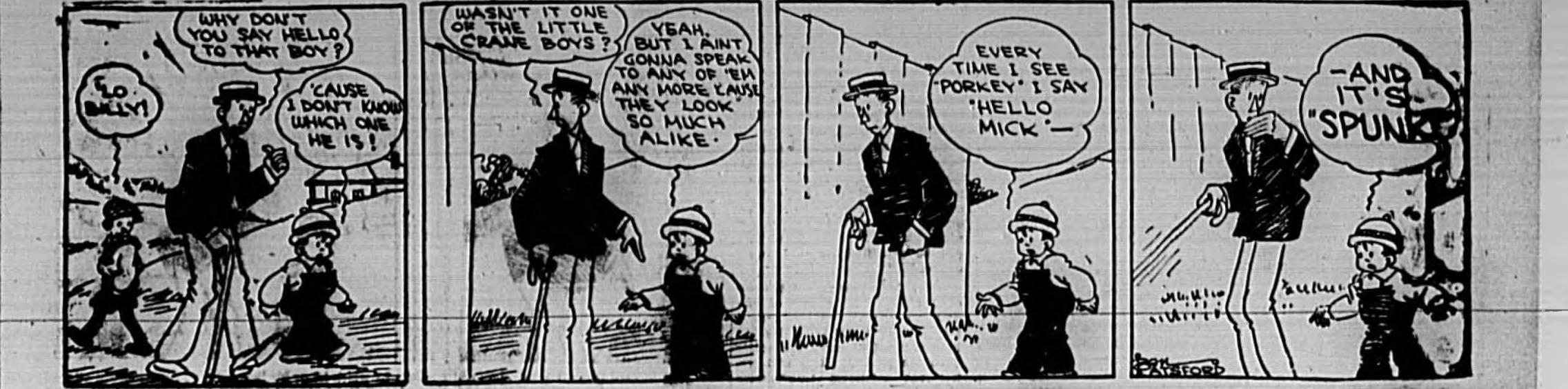
The statement expected by the teachers to be a central point of discussion at the seven-day convention beginning today, was voiced by Joy E. Morgan, of Washington, D. C., director of publications for the association, at a meeting of the National Council of Education, organization of leading educators.

"America is in the midst of a struggle between Democracy and a caste system fostered by the great financial czars, the gigantic mechanized industries and the privately owned utilities," Morgan said.

"School men and women of the nation are aware that preservation of Democracy is dependent on preservation of our system of free schools."

Morgan said "even the most preparatory and high schools, but after the executive council of Whig and Clovepole had discussed the matter with various members of the Princeton faculty, it was decided that this plan was inadvisable on account of the financial difficulties involved, as well as the difficulty of obtaining judges satisfactory to the schools. It is expected, however, that in many of the schools where there is already great interest in debating the new clubs will be in very close connection with the existing forensic organizations."
