# School Board Gets Evidence Against Teachers

Evidence presented to the School Board of Seminole County Wednesday indicates that suspended Lake Mary High School teacher Wilson Gordon, Jr. sold cocaine to a Seminole County Sheriff's Department informant, and the transaction was video taped on December 1, 1984.

Statements from witnesses also indicate that a former assistant principal, Jay Stokes, who quit his job effective Wednesday, allegedly asked a student to purchase a "good bag" of presumed drugs in October of 1985, and that he also had a sexual relationship with a former female student.

Legal charges have not been filed against either educator, and neither

has been arrested. The two had been suspended by Superintendent of Schools Robert Hughes for misconduct in office and immorality in connection with their employment, pending Wednesday's board action.

After reviewing the evidence, presented to show probable cause for the school board's action, the board unanimously approved Hughes' recommendation to accept Stokes' repudiation of his contract, and suspend Gordon without pay pending dismissal proceedings. The action does not end the investigations against the two.

District Personnel Director Ann Neiswender said she received notice Stokes was quitting just before Wednesday's school board meeting. Stokes letter read:

"On advice of counsel I hereby repudiate my contract with the school board of Seminole County on the basis that I cannot substantially perform my contractual duties." The letter is dated April 16, 1986.

"That doesn't mean he's resigned," said Chris Ray, Sanford, Stokes attorney. "He has repudiated his contract... because publicity (surrounding the allegations of misconduct and immorality) has rendered his ability to act as a teacher or administrator ineffective," Ray said.

After the meeting, Ray, also helping Joel Dick represent Gordon, said of Gordon's case. "The school board and criminal justice system was never (meant) to see this case." He said that promise was made to Gordon by a law enforcement agency a year and a half ago, for Gordon's cooperation with them in the drug investigation.

According to a Special Investigator's Unit of the Seminole County Sheriff's Department report of investigation,

which was confidential until just prior to Wednesday's meeting, "Agents of the Seminole County Sheriff's Department utilized an informant to make a controlled purchase of cocaine from Wilson Gordon. The transaction took place in Gordon's vehicle which was parked on the north side of the ABC (liquor store) parking lot located on State Road 600, Sanford."

Ray described the informant as "a 20-year-old prostitute."

The report says on November 30, 1984, an informant told a sheriff's department investigator "that a Lake Mary High School teacher known to her as Wilson Gordon was dealing in cocaine."

# Justice Department OKs Schools Zoning

The United States Justice Department has okayed Seminole County's proposed middle school attendance zoning plan. The school board learned of the approval from board attorney Ned Julian Wednesday.

"We anticipated we would receive a positive response," said Superintendent of Schools Robert Hughes, "because they had no follow-up questions. We're very pleased."

Federal approval of school attendance zones in Seminole County is necessary to ensure the district stays in compliance with a 1970 desegregation order.

He said he thought the plan would be officially adopted by the school board April 23, and then it would be sent onto the federal court for final review, which would be a "routine matter" with the Justice De-

partment's approval.

Board chairman Nancy Warren responded, "It's what we expected. It's terrific."

Board member Bill Kroll, voicing the only objection to the proposed plan, known as Plan I Modified, said he is not through opposing the plan.

"The school board should look at this thing and say it's not done properly," Kroll said. "We should say there are other methods available, and let's do it."

"I will make that appeal to the other board members April 23," Kroll said.

"The problem is not at Greenwood Lakes, but at Lakeview," he continued.

He said he was concerned about the student population size, the socio-economic mixture, and the "potential lack of

strong leadership" because veteran Lakeview principal Ted Barker was being transferred to Greenwood Lakes.

He said the Tuskawilla and Jackson Heights zones would "not last five years" as desired in zone changes due to the population growth in the area, and "I say we still have time" to get more data, from a computer data analysis service.

In the letter of notification from William Bradford Reynolds, Assistant Attorney General of the Civil Rights Division and Joseph D. Rich, Deputy Chief of the Educational Opportunities Litigation Section, the Justice Department officials said, "our failure to object to a proposal should not inhibit the board from considering other proposals or studies if it deems such action

## Breakfast Of Champions Beats Chips For Salt

BOSTON (UPI) — A doctor warned today that many popular breakfast cereals have a higher salt content than potato chips and other snacks and can be dangerous to people prone to high blood pressure.

"Parents are giving something to their children without realizing they're giving them something so high in salt," said Dr. Steven W. Luger, a family physician in Old Lyme, Conn.

"If a child asked for a bowl of potato chips for breakfast they'd look at them and say, 'That's not good for them.' Well, some of the cereals are just as bad when it comes to salt," said Luger, who outlined his concern in a letter to *The New England Journal of Medicine*.

"You would be better off giving a child a bowl of potato chips than Wheaties if you're worried about salt," he said in an interview.

Too much salt may lead to high blood pressure among those people genetically susceptible to the disease. Hypertension can cause heart attacks and strokes later in life.

Luger examined the sodium content of several popular cereals after reading an advertisement for Cheerios that said the cereal was recommended by pediatricians as an ideal food for toddlers, he said. Sodium is a component of salt.

The sodium content of Cheerios was 330 milligrams per 1-ounce serving, compared to sodium contents of 190 milligrams per 1-ounce serving of *Wheat* potato chips, 300 milligrams in 1 ounce of *Lay's* potato chips, 230 milligrams in 1 ounce of *Fritos* corn chips and 300 milligrams in 1 ounce of *Chester's* cheese snacks. The same size portion of *Bachman* protein contains 410 milligrams of sodium, he said.

The sodium content of a 1-ounce serving of *Wheaties* is 570 milligrams, and *Kix* is 315 milligrams. One-ounce servings of *Kellogg's Corn Flakes* and *Total* contain 360 milligrams of sodium, he said.

# Khadafy Surfaces, Tells Libyans To Celebrate

TRIPOLI, Libya (UPI) — Col. Moammar Khadafy surfaced on television to discuss the U.S. air raids for the first time, dispelling rumors of his overthrow, and exhorted Libyans to "dance in the streets" in defiance of America.

In his 20-minute speech, broadcast around midnight Wednesday, Khadafy castigated President Reagan for "issuing orders to bomb children," and warned Italy and Spain that Libya would "escalate the self-defense (terror) operations" against them if they aided U.S.

military efforts.

There was no indication whether the speech was live or taped, or from where Khadafy was speaking. But a reference he made to a large pro-Libyan rally in Khartoum, Sudan, earlier Wednesday appeared to indicate the broadcast — if videotaped — was recorded sometime Wednesday.

On the day of the bombing, a French television station showed footage without sound it said was provided by the Libyan government after the raid, showing Khadafy

speaking with the Soviet ambassador.

Khadafy's first statement about the bombing touched off celebrations in the streets, in contrast to Wednesday's earlier sporadic machine-gun and artillery fire in the capital that fueled rumors of a coup against the mercurial leader.

"Turn back on the lights," Khadafy urged his countrymen. "Dance in the streets. We are not afraid of America. Start playing normal music on the radio."

About 10 minutes after Khadafy

left the air, electricity snapped back on in the capital, which had been blacked out since the 12-minute U.S. attack Tuesday — the largest U.S. air strike since the Vietnam War.

Traffic snarled in the streets, horns blared and people leaped from their cars, dancing. Many waved green Libyan flags and held up posters of Khadafy. Others leaned from windows, cheering: "Down, down U.S.A.!"

"I think he's great," said a white-robed young man hurrying toward the downtown square.

# Housing Authority, Scenic Board Members Appointed

Sanford City Commissioners have named local businessman Bob Ball to the Sanford Housing Authority Board of Commissioners and landscape architect Ray Priest to the city's Scenic Improvement Board.

Commissioner Dave Farr's recommendation that Ball be appointed to the housing authority board was unanimously approved Monday. Ball, 57, will fill a seat that has been vacant since January, when A.A. McClanahan resigned from the board over policy disputes with his fellow commissioners.

Ball is the owner-operator of Ideal Tune-Ups, 2800 Orlando Drive. The housing authority's other board members are chairman Alexander Wynn, a supervisor with the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; vice-chairman Robert Frazier, a retired railroad conductor; Velma Williams, coordinator of special services for Seminole Community College; and William Long, an employee of the Seminole County School Board and tenants' delegate to the authority board.

Commissioners received Ball's request to join the authority board late last week, following their

receipt of a like request last month from Ambrosio Acosta, 40, a bookkeeper for the non-profit Seminole Employment and Economic Development Corporation.

Farr cited Ball's business knowledge when recommending his appointment.

Prior to his present business venture, Ball managed the South French Avenue Bicycle Headquarters and, from 1970-83, owned and operated Western Auto at 310 West First Street.

Ball said one of his priorities as a housing authority board member will be improving authority business practices related to bid award allocations for construction and maintenance of housing property.

He also said he saw "no reason for there to be any personality clashes" as had reportedly been the case with McClanahan and his fellow board members.

"Unless someone does me under the table," Ball said, "I don't see where those kinds of problems would figure into my efforts on the board."

He also said he'll "be a good listener and ask a lot of questions" in an effort to ascertain "what I can do for the board and the housing tenants."

"I realize I have a lot to learn, but I'm willing to

devote the time," Ball said. "And I'm confident I'll be an asset to the board and its efforts."

The scenic board's new delegate was recommended to commissioners by chairman Sara Jacobson, who is also responsible for the creation of the landscape architect's seat on the board. At her request, last month the city commission approved a measure that enabled the architect's joining the scenic board by granting him the seat and voting rights that had been held by the city Planning and Zoning board's scenic board delegate. The P&Z position with the scenic board, held by Brent Carl, becomes an advisory one.

At last week's scenic board meeting, Ms. Jacobson appointed Priest to two of the board's sub-committees and also said his position as Cardinal Industries' site planning director would prove beneficial to the board's efforts. She also said Priest would make accessible to the board the services of the two site planners he supervises at Cardinal.

These statements were reiterated by Commissioner John Mercer on Monday night when he recommended the commission formally appoint Priest to the scenic board. Mercer's request was unanimously approved.

# Teen Killed In Drug-Stealing Spree

An Autopsy was scheduled today for a 19-year-old Altamonte Springs man who was shot to death around 1 p.m. Wednesday after he and two friends stole a bag of marijuana from a "street dealer" on North Street on the outskirts of Altamonte Springs.

Seminole County sheriff's Sgt. Ron Gilbert said today investigators have good leads on a possible suspect in the killing of Gregory Thomas Lochner of Orchid Lane, Altamonte Springs.

Two other Altamonte Springs men who were in the car driven by

Lochner when he was shot to death, Michael James Klipfer, 21, of 101 Wymore Road, and Kenneth Walowski, 20, of 416 Monticello Drive, have, according to sheriff's Capt. Roy Hughey, given this account of the killing:

The three had decided to go to North Street, an area known for illegal drug deals, with the intent to steal drugs from dealers.

Traveling east on North Street they stopped at the corner of Jackson Street and a dealer handed a bag of marijuana into the car. Lochner sped away without paying for the pot.

He stopped the car a second time to make another "deal" at the corner of North and Marker streets. While his car was stopped a car approached from behind and cut in front of Lochner's car.

The driver of that car got out of his vehicle, approached Lochner's car from the driver's side and fired several shots into the vehicle.

Lochner, who was hit in the side by at least one round from the small caliber handgun, turned his vehicle and drove west on North Street. He lost consciousness and the car crashed into a home at 120 North Street.

Klipfer and Walowski got out and moved Lochner to the backseat and then transported him to Florida Hospital-Altamonte Springs, where he was dead on arrival, Hughey said.

Sheriff's deputies were called to the scene of the shooting at about 1:15 p.m. Hughey said damage to the home and to Lochner's car was minor.

Lochner's father, Robert William Lochner Jr., of 615 Orchid Lane, said today that his son was a 1984 graduate of Lake Mary High School. He worked at Jiffy Lube in Altamonte Springs and was born in Melbourne, Florida.

## Medical Malady

It is ironic that skilled physicians, including medical specialists, are curtailing or abandoning their practice because of the high cost of malpractice insurance while phony doctors are preying upon unsuspecting patients.

According to the House subcommittee on health and long term care, an estimated 10,000 persons nationwide are practicing medicine with fraudulent credentials.

That translates to one fraud for every 50 legitimate physicians throughout the United States.

Most of these imposters have been able to penetrate the profession because of lax screening standards among state and federal agencies.

A case in point is Abraham Asante, who practiced medicine for six years until a private clinic discovered that his Czech medical degree was a forgery and alerted the American Medical Association.

Nothing was done, however, and he later surfaced as a chief medical officer in the U.S. Army.

On Aug. 23, 1983, nearly nine years after he was identified as a fraud, Mr. Asante administered anesthesia to a 47-year-old man at New Jersey's Walston Army hospital.

The patient's heart stopped. He is in a permanent vegetative state, and Mr. Asante is doing time in a federal prison.

This shocking case prompted the Department of Defense to tighten its screening procedures for physicians.

Other federal agencies, such as the Veterans Administration, are taking a closer look at their doctors.

And numerous state licensing boards now put prospective physicians through complex background checks.

Notwithstanding such safeguards, some imposters are still able to slip through loopholes in the screening process.

Clearly, effective measures are required to prevent phony physicians from endangering human life.

Each state is obliged to strengthen its medical review standards to ensure that every practicing physician is a certified graduate of an accredited medical school.

The states should also have access to a national computer center for cross-checking suspicious credentials.

Finally, the fraudulent practice of medicine should be a felony in all 50 states punishable by mandatory imprisonment.

Congress is considering three bills that ought to be enacted without delay.

One proposal would increase the criminal and civil penalties for mail fraud involving phony degrees.

Another would limit student loans for medical school to U.S. colleges and universities.

The third measure would make it a felony for hospitals or state institutions to accept Medicare funds for services rendered by fraudulent physicians.

It is as unconscionable as it is incredible that 10,000 phony physicians are plying their deadly trade in this country.

# My Goodness, Moderate College Students

Every year the U.S. government publishes what most observers agree is by far the world's best national data book — The Statistical Abstract of the United States. And every year the Abstract adds scores of new tables from a variety of sources in order to keep the new edition on top of things. So browsing through the new tables is a way of telling us what's going on.

If, for example, you looked at Table 254, you could find out what's happening to college freshmen. They are more likely — much more likely — to be studying business than ever before. Back in 1966, only 14 percent of the incoming freshmen reported that "business" would be their "probable field of study." But by 1984, that rate had almost doubled — to 26 percent. Over the same time, the rate of students opting for both "arts and humanities" and "social sciences" fell sharply from 32 percent to 15 percent. (I can live with fewer social scientists; too often, too much mumbo-jumbo. Now, if we could only cut the number of prospective lawyers — not tabulated in the freshman data — we'd be well on our way to

sensibly re-ordering priorities.)

Apparently, when students are of a mind to study business, they are — according to the data — less likely to regard themselves as political liberals. Back in 1970 more than a third (34 percent) of incoming freshmen called themselves "liberal." Today that's down to only 20 percent. But — despite all the talk to the contrary — the big gainers haven't been "conservatives." They've stayed about the same; the figure is 19 percent in the recent poll. The big winners — by far — are those who call themselves "middle-of-the-road." That view was cited in the student body in 1970 — and 58 percent in the latest survey. My goodness! Moderate college students.

There is bad news — or a lack of good news — on the seat-belt front. After all the publicity about how belts save lives, the latest data show that only 27 percent of Americans "always" or "sometimes" wear belts. (Too bad, 46,000 Americans die each year from motor vehicle accidents.)

What's the most popular leisure-time activity in America? You'll never guess. Flower gardening! Almost half of us (47 percent) participate.

By way of comparison, only 7 percent are water-skiers, 11 percent play tennis, 21 percent bowl and 30 percent go fishing.

Fear not. We will not all grow up doing nothing but growing flowers. Our children are growing up using micro-computers. Talk about a revolution! In 1981 — all the way back in those distant days of Ronald Reagan's presidency — only 18 percent of the public schools used computers for student instruction. Today, the rate has climbed to 85 percent!

Finally, look at marriage, always a useful topic for consideration. There has been much talk recently about projections that marriage rates will be going down in the future. That may well happen. But a new table, dealing with "Marital Status and Marital Dissolution," tells us this: Among those women who have already reached the age of 40 to 44, a remarkably high rate were, or had been, married. Almost two-thirds (63 percent) were in their first marriage. Another 12 percent had remarried. And yet another 20 percent had formerly been married. That adds up to better than nine in 10 marrying (even if many later divorce).

# Media Bias Evidence?

In the news coverage of the Illinois Democratic primary, in which supporters of Lyndon LaRouche were nominated for lieutenant governor and secretary of state, almost all reports identified LaRouche as "right-wing" or "ultraconservative." This makes no sense at all, except as evidence of media bias.

The LaRouche supporters call for the repeal of Gramm-Rudman, claim that Ferdinand Marcos actually won the Philippine election and demand that farm foreclosures be prevented by having the government confiscate the property. They support government subsidies for nuclear power plants and seem to be saying that most bankers are involved in drug trafficking. They say they are fighting a worldwide conspiracy that includes Nobel Prize-winning economist Milton Friedman, the Jewish organization B'nai B'rith and the queen of England. Their nominee for secretary of state in Illinois has pledged to put Washington Post staffers "on trial for Nuremberg crimes."

The lead story on the front page of the latest issue of New Solidarity, the LaRouche newspaper, is an attack on Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), accusing Helms of trying to install a Nazi as the ruler of Panama. On page two, a story about the nation's leading conservative broadcaster is headlined, "Pat Robertson Peddling Snake Oil for the KGB." Page six has a cartoon showing a demonic version of Sen. Phil Gramm (R-Texas) wielding an ax, and an article of page eight attacks Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.).

The anticongressive tilt of the LaRouche organization is not surprising. Lyndon LaRouche first became well-known when he was associated with the Students for a Democratic Society, the radical group founded by Tom Hayden and others. Under the name "Lyn Marcus" (taken from Lenin and Marx), LaRouche tried to take over the Socialist Workers Party; when he failed, he founded the U.S. Labor Party. LaRouche, who called himself "the American Lenin," was a Trotskyite — that is, his complaint with the Soviets was that they weren't communist enough.

According to a 1974 FBI report, the LaRouche group know, as the National Caucus for Labor Commitment described itself as an "organization of revolutionary socialists."

# Videotape Resolution

Knowledge and the means of transmitting it (or in other words, communications) are power. It follows, therefore, that technological developments like the audiocassette and videocassette, which offer brand-new avenues for the transmission of information, are of immense importance in both our domestic politics and our ongoing struggle with world communism.

It is estimated that a third of all American families now own a videocassette recorder, and that half will do so within a year. Mostly, of course, these are used to play rented movie tapes or to record desired programs for viewing at more convenient times. But potentially these machines offer political organizations a matchless opportunity to put their message before target groups without dilution or rebuttal. Currently, direct mail and radio or TV commercials are the only means of putting one's case before the voters without running it through the filter of our heavily liberal media, and both are regularly used to the point of saturation.

For the moment the limiting factor, as far as videocassettes are concerned (and they are, of course, vastly more riveting than mere audio), is cost. Even very large production orders could not be filled for less than several dollars per cassette — obviously far too expensive for any candidate to send broadside to his constituency. But such a figure is well within the reach of even small organizations, which can buy such a cassette and play it on a borrowed VCR to a meeting — even a meeting held in a private home.

That is exactly what California

conservatives are doing this year. In aid of their campaign to defeat ultra-liberal Chief Justice Rose Bird of the California Supreme Court in her bid for re-election. A group called the Law and Order Campaign Committee has sold 2,000 copies of an anti-Bird videotape at \$15 apiece, and these are being shown at political gatherings, meetings and parties all over the state.

One can only speculate how a similar videotape, widely deployed in the close battle over ratification of the Panama Canal treaties, might have affected the outcome of that struggle. Certainly, as a veteran of the Draft Goldwater Campaign of the early 1960s, I know that the availability of such a weapon of communication would have been absolutely galvanizing. There were literally thousands of small but dedicated groups of Goldwater fans all over the country who could have been mobilized effectively by such a means. (Of course, he won the nomination anyway, and I am not suggesting that even a videotape could have changed the election result.)

Even more interesting is the potential of such cassettes for clandestine use behind the Iron Curtain. Here the chief problem would be smuggling the relatively bulky VCRs themselves into communist areas. Once that was accomplished, however, the audience for cassettes depicting life in the Free World would be huge — and the peril to a hermetically closed communist society would be enormous. (Imagine the welcome such a message would receive among the resistance groups in Poland today!)

# Bureaucrats Know How To Do It

When is higher rent cheaper? Why, when a bureaucrat is trying to justify the lease of some posh office space, of course.

President Reagan's new budget director, James Miller, has asked Congress to rent fancy additional quarters in downtown Washington for the Federal Trade Commission, which he used to head. The rental property he likes is handy to the FTC's headquarters at Pennsylvania and Constitution avenues.

But the monthly cost would be \$41 a square foot, for an annual rent of \$4.3 million. Rep. Bob Young, D-Mo., chairman of the House Public Works subcommittee on public buildings and grounds, objected to Miller's sales pitch.

"We've been trying to get into less expensive lease space," Young explained, saying that Miller "is very aware of that." The subcommittee OK'd new office space for the

FTC two years ago — but only for less than \$32 a square foot.

So Miller and the FTC bureaucrats tried a new tack: The expensive space would save money because it's so close to FTC headquarters, and employees could share such things as conference rooms and photocopiers and....

So far, the subcommittee members are not convinced.

**CONFIDENTIAL FILE:** The International Committee of the Red Cross is quietly seething over the Soviets' stubborn refusal to let Red Cross inspectors visit Afghan prisoners-of-war, particularly in the infamous Pul Charki prison in Kabul. The prison is now believed to house thousands of mujahedeen captives and suspected sympathizers, but the Soviets have refused numerous pleas for Red Cross visitation. By contrast, Red Cross sources say, the freedom fighters are much more willing to let the inspectors visit the Soviet soldiers

they have captured.

—KHAD, the KGB offspring that cracks down on dissidents and other troublemakers in Afghanistan, is having surprising success in recruiting young Afghans into its goon squads. Our sources conjecture that the lure offered by the Soviet-run secret police consists of good salaries, fringe benefits and the promise of a secure career.

**BUTTER VS. GUNS:** Not all Americans agree with the Reagan administration's characterization of the Sandinista regime in Managua as a Red Menace. Countering the president's humanitarian aid to the Nicaraguan contras, volunteer groups are sending food and medicine to the Sandinistas by the shipload. The first cargo, 560 tons of food, arrived in Managua last month from Canada. In this country, both Burlington, Vt., and Manhattan's Lower East Side neighborhood have "sister city"

programs with Nicaraguan communities and have contributed food.

**SPACE WALK:** NASA, which propels rocketships thousands of miles into space, is trying to discourage its employees from using short-haul elevators in the agency's Washington headquarters. Signs urge workers to walk if they're going only one flight up or two down. The idea is to save electricity and help keep employees in shape.

**MINI-EDITORIAL:** We salute the good people near San Bernardino, Calif., who make a unique sacrifice whenever President Reagan vacations at his ranch up the coast. Their remote-control garage door-openers don't work because the president's command plane, sitting just outside San Bernardino, apparently jams the electronic door-openers with its communications scrambling gear. ## Surgery Pioneer Reflects On Life Of Ambition, Controversy

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — The dusty plains of Oklahoma remind Christiaan Barnard of the Karroo — the Great Plains of South Africa, where he grew up and first became fascinated with medicine.

Now, thousands of miles from home but in an oddly familiar landscape, this surgical pioneer is taking a new direction. True to character, it is an unpredictable one.

Arthritis in his hands forced him to quit surgery, which was expected; he has taken up a research and lecture post for the next few years at Baptist Medical Center; but, to everyone's surprise, he has also become a cosmetics peddler.

Glycell, a line of anti-aging skin care products bearing his endorsement, hit the market last month, and now, Barnard is in trouble — again. A good number of his colleagues, squawking privately and on network television, consider it a comedown.

He is used to it all. "My father told me something I have always remembered," he says. An Afrikaner expression, it means "the highest trees get the most wind. If you get a lot of criticism, you must know you are a high tree. So it really doesn't worry me much."

Long hours in the lab and a drive to beat the ills that claim human lives made Barnard the first to demonstrate the origin of intestinal atresia, an abnormality of the digestive system that used to be fatal to infants.

He is famous for the historic first heart transplant he performed Dec. 3, 1967, but he also developed a treatment for tuberculosis meningitis, two techniques for surgical heart repair and a synthetic heart valve. He was the first to introduce open heart surgery in Africa, and later pioneered the piggyback transplant — implantation of a second heart to boost the patient's own.

**Dedication**  
His admirers talk about his dedication and cite the case of an Irish girl born with only two chambers to her heart, when it should have had four. Barnard was advised not to operate because odds were she would die anyway, and that would be a black mark for him.

But when he went to see the girl, asked her what was wrong and she replied, "I have a broken heart," he left the room in tears and scheduled surgery. He studied her exposed heart for almost half an hour before it occurred to him how he could reconstruct it. The girl went on to live a normal life.

The man never seemed to stop. At one point, it was reported, he was doing open heart surgery on more than 300 people a year. When he wasn't in the operating room, he was teaching, or traveling, or lecturing, or doing research.

He attracted publicity — and controversy — wherever he went. His wide, familiar smile was seen in news pages around the world.

In a more reflective state of mind now, the surgeon — who has always looked too young for his years — sees his life more clearly.

"I think that the one thing I neglected was my family, especially my parents when they were older. I was at that stage — very ambitious and working very hard. They're both dead now. The one thing that I do regret is that I did not spend more time with them," he says.

"I also believe, especially, the children of my first family I neglected very much," he says.

His eldest son, then 31, died two years ago of "not entirely natural causes." He had been on painkillers after suffering compound fractures in an auto accident and was found dead in the bathtub. Barnard feels if he had spent more time with the boy, this would not have happened.

"I still think divorce is bad on the children. They need the stability of the mother and the father. He would have been more capable of coping with situations in life" had his parents stayed together, Barnard says.

"Even my wives, my ex-wives," Barnard says. "Sometimes there were things that I did as a result of my ambition which I think hurt my relations with family and my ex-wives."

"I miss my children a lot," he says, referring to a 12- and a 14-year-old who live in South Africa. "I think we have children too early in life — we have them when we're ambitious and busy and don't really have time to see them grow up," he says.

"If I could have things over maybe I would do it better. Unfortunately, you learn by experience and often experience doesn't give you a second chance."

Barnard retired altogether three years ago from Groot Schur hospital in Cape Town, scene of the transplant that thrust him into the limelight. He blamed the rheumatoid arthritis that has stiffened and swollen his hands, but also admitted the zeal he once felt when he began a heart operation had vanished.

He believes he should have retired earlier. He had already cut back on his operating schedule at the time of the transplant because of the arthritis and was occasionally quoted as saying he thought he only had a few more years left. But it was more than that.

"You see," he says, "to really be able to do something you must be hungry for it. You must get up in the morning wanting to do it."

Around 1980, he was burned out from responsibility and having "everybody looking over your shoulder all the time to see what you were doing and how

you were doing and whether you were doing it wrong, whether you would fail."

"I remember the days when just to put a pair of gloves on was just the greatest feeling in my life, you know, because I was hungry for it."

"To open the chest was a great event, even before I was able to do the open heart procedure."

### Less Important

"All that became less and less important, less and less exciting, to where it eventually became a drag to do another heart operation. At that stage, I should have quit."

At 63, Barnard looks 50. His face is barely lined and his hair is reddish. The famous smile appears often, but there is a barely perceptible edginess about him and a dullness around the eyes that could be testimony to 30 years of arthritic pain.

He is spending the next few years in Oklahoma City as "scientist in residence" doing research, helping to expand the transplant program and doing one of the things he does best — talking, with the goal of publicizing the need for donor organs.

Characteristically, he does not lack for female companionship of the type that raises eyebrows. Karin Setzkorn, a pretty blonde Cape Town model 41 years his junior, lives with him in a cottage behind one of the miniature estates in Nichols

Hills, Oklahoma's answer to Beverly Hills.

Barnard's voice, bearing heavy traces of Afrikaner, the Dutch-based language of his youth, swoops up to high notes and down again and becomes hoarse as he emphasizes a point.

He becomes emphatic when talking about South Africa. Barnard believes his country has been unjustly shunned in the world scene and has gotten too much bad press in comparison with other nations where discrimination is also a problem.

Former Prime Minister John Vorster considered him one of the country's most effective representatives, and Barnard was reimbursed by the government for his travels.

### Against Apartheid

Still, he compares his homeland's apartheid policy with Nazism. He says he is against discrimination in any form and once considered running for the South African parliament as part of the opposition. He later became disillusioned with politics, announcing that the right party had not yet been invented for him, and turned to writing books.

"To me, suffering of human

beings are the same, whether it's discrimination on color of skin, discrimination of religion or anything like that. It's the same," he says.

Barnard once transplanted the heart of a white girl into a black Kenyan man. At Groot Schur, many of his patients were black or mixed-race. The hospital billed on the basis of income, and those able to afford it were siphoned off to private institutions.

"There was absolutely no difference in the standard of treatment" for whites and other races, he says. "It was never an issue. We treated people, and whether they were white or

black did not come into consideration."

### Quality Of Life

Over decades of medical practice, Barnard has changed his view of the profession. Fresh out of medical school, he believed his role was to save life against all odds; now, it is to improve the quality of life.

This view has led him to outspoken stands in favor of euthanasia in cases where extraordinary means can only prolong suffering. He is against permanent implantation of the artificial heart "because it cannot give the same quality of life that a transplant can give."

Quality of life has as much to do with how people feel about themselves as their physical health, and this is how he explains his involvement in the Glycell venture.

"It's not a placebo. It works. All the experimental work proves that it works," he says.

He also needs the money. He considers his involvement in the venture a job "that was going to give me an income."

His hospital pension amounts to \$400 a month, he says. His top pay after taxes while at Groot Schur was about \$25,000. He has losses from two farms in South Africa. His two restaurants in Cape Town are enough to provide what he calls a "moderate income" for retirement but this, he says, is not enough.

While at the posh La Prairie clinic in Switzerland to try out arthritis treatments, Barnard heard of a substance called glycosphingolipid and started research to investigate its use in postoperative wound healing.

Glycosphingolipid, or GSL, is a fatty substance with a sugar molecule attached. Everyone is born with a finite amount, and it diminishes with age, Barnard says.

In studies at the Schaefer Institute, a commercial biotechnology firm, Barnard and other researchers found that it promotes healing in wounds in rats. It also stimulated genetic activity and protein production in immature connective tissue cells and in skin cells.

Barnard said he bowed out at that point. Further studies were conducted showing the sub-

# Successful Anglers Are Hooked On Deliberation

Due to the practicalities of earning a living and raising a family, most of us do not get to fish as much as we would like. It is critical, therefore, that we maximize our effectiveness while we are on the water.

Stories about the "big one that got away" sometimes tax the imagination of the most gullible angler. Most of us, however, have had at least one traumatic experience from losing a trophy fish. Sometimes the hook pulls free, but many times a fish is lost due to angler error or tackle failure.

Whether in freshwater or saltwater, there are always a few fishermen who generally catch more fish and larger fish than the majority of more casual anglers. These fishermen have not only refined their fishing skills, but they also pay careful attention to every detail while they are fishing.

Watch a good fisherman tie a knot. Does he get in a hurry so he can get back into action more quickly? Definitely not. You will see that he ties the knot slowly and deliberately. He will proba-

bly moisten the knot so it will pull down easily and evenly. The expert fisherman will always cinch the knot down with a firm pull.

The serious fisherman will also check the first few feet of line many times during the fishing day. This is because he realizes that the first several feet of line are often subjected to the most wear and tear. He will also cut off a few feet of line and re-tie after every large fish is caught. He knows that the first several feet of line receives a great deal of stress while playing and landing a large fish.

Highly successful anglers also pay careful attention to their hooks. Hooks are sharpened before each trip, not at the last minute while bobbing around on the water. The attentive fisher-

man inspects his hook(s) after each fish is caught and re-sharpen them with a file when needed.

Successful anglers also treat their tackle with a great deal of care. Reels are well lubricated and the drags work smoothly. Reel spools are filled to capacity with fresh line. Rods are frequently examined for any hint of

wear. Any tackle repair is accomplished as soon as possible. Anything less than perfect performance is not tolerated.

Good fishermen do not get sloppy. The can't stand to lose a fish because of carelessness on their part. That would be totally unacceptable and hard for them to deal with.

The difference between the good fisherman and the casual fisherman is a matter of attitude and philosophy. The expert angler takes his time on the water seriously and does not leave anything to chance. His fishing trip begins days before he takes to the water. Tackle is repaired, hooks sharpened, and fresh line is put on reels well in advance of the actual fishing trip.

Paying careful attention to details and keeping tackle in

good working condition is critical in order to become a successful angler.

Your fishing time is a precious commodity. Why not make the most out of it with a little preparation and a lot of attention?

**SHUPE'S SCOOP** — It is a good practice to repair fishing tackle or fishing equipment as soon as possible, preferably before the next fishing trip. Putting off needed repairs will eventually come home to roost and cause you some problems on the water.

**WEEKEND FORECAST** — Ron Rawlins from Highland Park Fish Camp reports that speckled perch have slowed down, but schooling bass have picked up in Lake Weedruft. They are schooling on menhaden minnows that begin to mature this time of

year.

Dell Abernethy at Osteen Bridge Fish Camp said that bass fishing has picked up considerably with the good weather. Many bream are being caught on grass shrimp near the pilings of the new bridge. Speckled perch have probably peaked for the year and action with specks will continue to taper off.

Snook action is still hot at Sebastian Inlet. The one-ounce Red Tail Hawk is still the most productive lure, with the chartreuse Maverick being a close second. A few redfish are being caught with live shrimp or finger mullet. The north jetties has been the best spot for both species of fish.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that fishing has improved tremendously with the stable weather. Many dolphin are being caught in 115 to 150 feet of water. A few scattered cobia are being caught off the beach, and flounder and bluefish are biting well inside the Port. Trout action has picked up on the Banana and Indian rivers. Large numbers of fish are being caught, with many under-sized fish being released.

Fishing at the New Smyrna jetties has been good. Crowds of fishermen on the weekends have been catching sheepshead, redfish, bluefish, and a few flounder. Live shrimp is the best overall bait, but fiddler crabs are very effective baits for sheepshead.

# The Question Remains Unanswered: What Made The Bay Of Pigs A Fiasco

**Editor's Note:** Twenty-five years after the Bay of Pigs invasion (on April 17, 1961) the United States is still debating how to oppose communism in the Western Hemisphere. The focus of the current debate isn't on support for Cuban rebels but on the level of backing for Nicaraguan rebels.

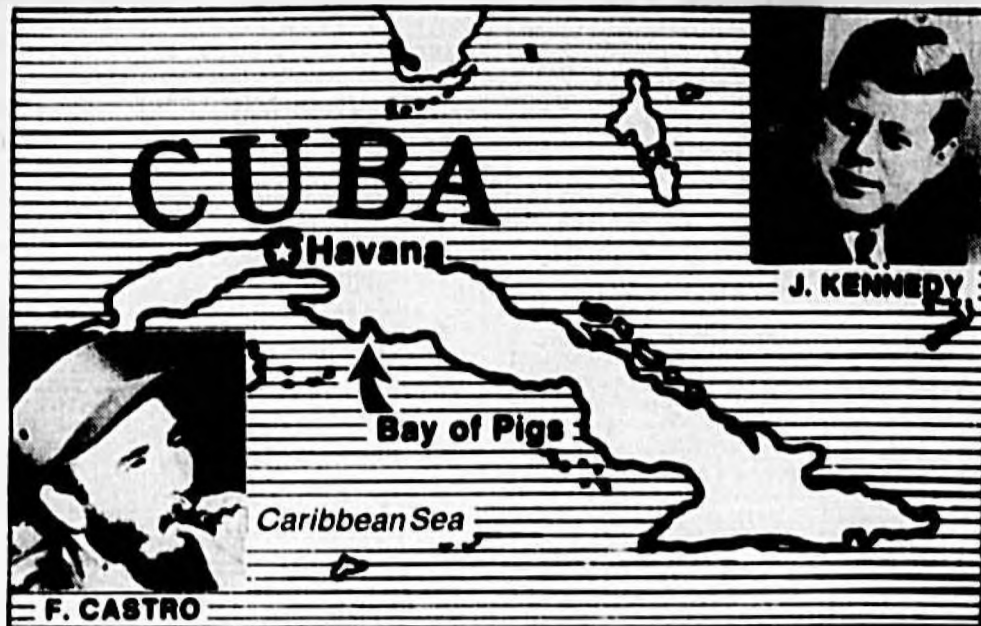
MIAMI (NEA) — The first thing Evello Borrego heard about the matter was in the form of a whisper. The word was going around that the United States was about to recruit a force of Cuban exiles, train them in military tactics, and subsequently use them to topple the communist regime of Fidel Castro.

That was in 1960. Today, 25 years after the plan was carried out as the Bay of Pigs invasion, it's clear that the rumor should have been a forewarning. If people were talking about the secret mission on the streets of Miami, the subject was likely being discussed as well by officials in Havana.

But nobody thought of that then. And Borrego says it's little wonder. Castro had seized Cuba in 1959, forcing thousands to flee to Florida for their lives and well-being; now the United States was willing to help reverse the unpleasant chain of events, and the exiles were happy to accept the risks of patriotism.

Evello Borrego, for one. He had been an Army officer in the old Cuba. He had therefore opposed Castro even before he took over the island from Fulgencio Batista. Borrego was staunchly anti-communist and anti-socialist, and so he was one of the first of the exiles to answer the U.S. call for a clandestine army of Cuban freedom fighters.

That call came initially from the Central Intelligence Agency. President Dwight Eisenhower had asked the CIA to look into ways of countering Castro, and he tentatively approved the invasion plan on receipt. John F. Kennedy followed him into the White House, and decided to go along with the military commitment.



The United States recruited 1,400 to 1,500 men for the operation. Borrego, then 30 years old, was put in charge of a naval artillery unit. He says the invasion force trained in Central America, for the most part — in Guatemala and Nicaragua, specifically — and the CIA provided groceries, uniforms, arms and equipment.

Borrego remembers it was a rigorous time. Long days and disciplined nights. Some men were paid, most were not, and there was also the apprehension: "We were all scared. Very scared. But we were dedicated to the mission. Besides, we all knew, or thought, that the U.S. was behind us all the way."

Borrego says the invasion force was designated as Brigade 2506. And when it left for Cuba during the second week of April in 1961, it was following a remarkably simple plan. The exiled army was to rendezvous at the Bay of Pigs, on the southwest side of Cuba, then establish a beachhead at that position.

And that was it. The exiles were not supposed to overrun the entire island or push the communists into the sea. Instead, the landing was designed to create a general uprising

against the Castro government, and the commanders thought that millions of people would take to the byways to impose democracy.

The invasion began early in the a.m. of April 17. And Borrego says there were some early successes. The brigade sent men ashore to warn civilians of the operation, and paratroops set up a few strategic footholds. Borrego says exile troops also captured the Bay of Pigs airstrip for the purpose of resupply.

But the tide of battle soon turned dramatically. And hindsight gives the reason. Castro had received advanced information on the invasion and was ready with a solid defense. He had arrested 100,000 Cubans who might aid the exiles,

and he dispatched a potent and superior armed force to the Bay of Pigs.

Borrego says Castro's fighter planes attacked most of the landing ships. They also drove the brigade's air force from the skies. Hundreds of invaders were thereupon cut from their lines of logistics, and there were serious shortages of rifle and artillery munitions by the end of the first day.

Worse, the United States refused to come to the rescue. President Kennedy ruled out direct intervention. Exile commanders pleaded for further air support, and Pentagon officials warned of the perils of betrayal, but Kennedy said he had told the exiles repeatedly that the United States would not align its military with the operation.

So the invaders were forced to surrender after 72 hours of wasted effort. Castro regained control on April 19, and 1,200 exiles were taken as prisoners of war. Borrego was one of the latter. The prisoners were eventually released to the United States, after 23 months, for \$53 million worth of food and drugs.

Borrego says more than 100 exiles were killed during the invasion. Others died in Cuban jails. Eight hundred of the survivors now belong to a Bay of Pigs Association in Miami, where, on this 25th anniversary, they will gather to dedicate a new clubhouse and talk of things that might have been.

They will also talk of things that still may be. Many of the people who belonged to Brigade 2506 believe Cuba can still be recaptured for the West. They are getting on now. Evello Borrego has retired as a colonel in the U.S. Army, but he continues to think of the Bay of Pigs as an unfinished business.

"I have to say that I no longer want to return to Cuba to live. I am an American citizen today, this is my country, and Cuba is secondary. But if you ask if I would do it again, if I would invade the island, if I would fight against Fidel Castro, I say yes, emphatically yes, and the sooner the better."

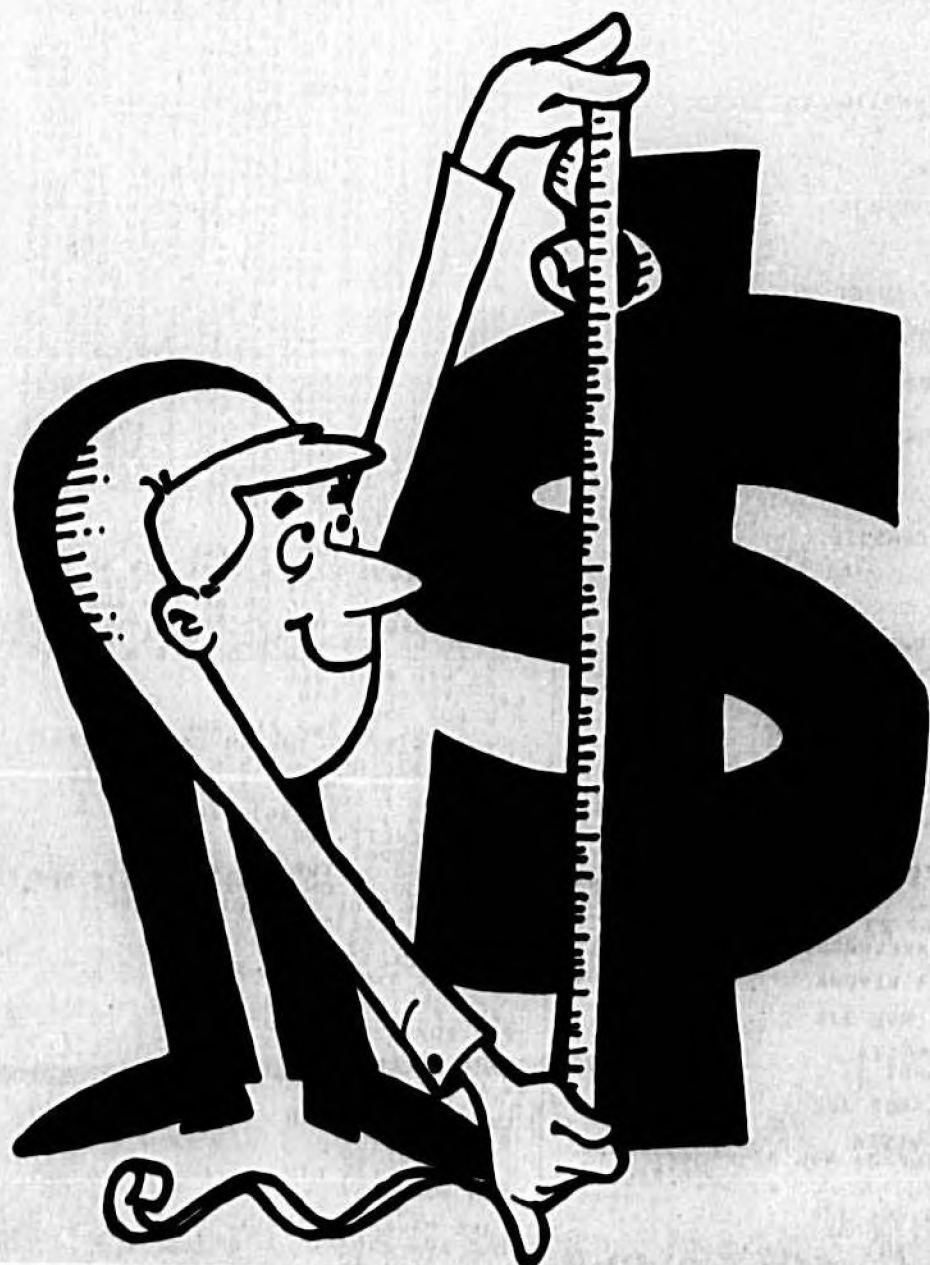
