.County Union Efforts Intensifying

Efforts to unionize Seminole County employes are intensifying in the wake of last week's signing of a collective bargaining law by Gov. Reubin Askew, and a county commission refusal to hike wages for road department laborers.

According to Francis Joyce, a janitor at Lyman High School and leader of attempts by the American Federation of State, Count; and Municipal Employes to organize the county, more than 200 pledge

cards have now been signed since the first meeting May 19.

However, Joyce said, rank and file disatisfaction with low pay rates, especially for laborers and school kitchen help, surfaced at the latest union sponsored meeting last weekend at Sanford Civic Center.

Joyce today scheduled a 3 p.m. Thursday meeting with Commission Vice Chairman Dick Williams to discuss the situation.

The commission last week approved an emergency

request from county road chief J.C. Lavender to help fill 25 vacancies by raising pay for equipment operators.

However, in granting hikes of up to \$4.20 an hour for the most skilled equipment operators, the board refused Lavender's request for a \$2.58 hourly minimum for laborers.

Saturday, Joyce said, several equipment operators attended and spoke in support of claims by 17 laborers they are the lowest paid road department employes, and should have had a raise at the same time.

Laborers presently get a maximum of \$2.39 an hour. while the new rates will see equipment operators receive an hourly minimum of \$2.83.

While strike rumblings were heard from some in attendence Saturday, others said the new collective bargaining law signed by the governor specifically bans strikes by government workers in return for union recognition.

The law also overcame a battle in the past five legislatures over so-called right to work legislation, which

would ban forcing a person to join a union to get a job.

The commission held a work session today on a study showing that some county salary scales range 15 per cent below jobs in other countiesand as much as 50 per cent below similar positions in private industry, particularly construction.

However, according to county staff, road department pay scales were not expected to be discussed today.

Saturday's Civic Center meeting saw an 11-member

"labor committee" named to assist Joyce and Miami union organizer John Gibson, an official with the Brotherhood of State, County, and Municipal Employes.

According to Gibson, claims by some public officials that 50 per cent plus one of the employes must vote for the union before it can attempt to organize are wrong.

Gibson told the 60 in attendance Saturday that any number of employes could organize and ask for recognition.

14-Year-Old Boy **Gets Prison Term** A 14-year old Sanford boy, the youngest person ever convicted

of a life felony in Seminole County, was sentenced today to sixmonths to 10 years hard labor by Circuit Court Judge Anthony

Matthew Falstreau, convicted by a jury March 14 of breaking and entering a private home with a deadly weapon, could have received a life sentence. Falstreau was placed on seven years probation for a companion

conviction of aggravated assault (reduced from rape) on a 19year-old Sanford housewife. Hosemann told the youth, five foot 10 inches tall, 140 pounds,

that if his attitude remains good he will be eligible for early parole.

During his trial, the seventh grade student repeatedly denied raping the woman after the Dec. 4 break-in, despite medical evidence supporting the possibility.

He was originally charged with rape but the one-man, five woman jury found Falstreau guilty of aggravated assault.

Prosecutor Bill Heffernan said he expected Falstreau, because of his age, to wind up in the state's youth offenders center in Apalachicola, although he was technically sentenced to Raiford State Prison.

Wheeler Gets 3 Years On Probation Violation

The state's probation and parole commission was accused today of never contacting one of the accused kidnapers of Sanford businessman George Jackson Jr., who was sentenced to three years hard labor for violating probation on a 1972 firearms case;

Franklin Lee Wheeler Jr., 24, acquitted by a Tampa jury two weeks ago in the Feb. 28 kidnap and \$30,000 ransom was formally declared guilty of the firearms charge and sentenced by Circuit Court Judge Anthony Hosemann Jr.

Also acquitted in Tampa was Wheeler's alleged accomplice in the kidnap, Jesse James Jones Jr., 23, also of Sanford, who faces trial next week on assault charges.

Wheeler could have received five years on the firearms

Today, defense attorney Newman Brock blasted the parole and probation commission for its failure to contact Wheeler during his two years probation by letter, phone or personal visit - despite its legal responsibility to do so.

Brock was careful to praise the individual efforts of Sanford parole and probation officers. saying his criticisim was a ne at those who refused to fundand staff the office adequately.

Judge Hosemann, agreeing "in this particular case there was very poor supervision of the defendant," said Wheeler himself should have attempted to contact his parole officer.

Lighter Sentence

In requesting a lighter sentence, Brock asked Hosemann to pass judgement "only on the charges before this court," and to remember Wheeler was acquitted by the Tampa Jury.

Hosemann did not mention the kidnap case.

Frank Lee Wheeler Sr. later commented "I am satisfied with what he got. All of this town was mad about him because of this other deal."

When news of the Tampa kidnaj acquitta' reached Sanford, public officials blasted the decision as a "miscarriage of justice."

Especially irate was Sanford Police Chief Ben Butler, whose department's detectives broke open the case 10 days after the

Jackson, abducted from the office of his Southern Shortening business, was released unharmed 26 hours after the abduction.

Legislature Passes Eight County Bills

Eight special acts affecting only Seminole County passed the Florida Legislature during the session's last day Friday "unless something happened that I do not know about," said Rep. Eugene Mooney, (R-Casselberry) today.

Mooney, chairman of the Seminole Legislative Delegation, said the bills include - the county commission sponsored comprehensive land planning act, - expressway authority, - a hospital act, one allowing consolidation of fire control districts.

Also, Casselberry's hot pursuit act, - the school board's repeal of requirements on \$1,000 pur-

chases, - repeal of the St. Johns Indian River Canal Authority and a prohibition of fire arms discharge on or across the Wekive River.

The statewide Environmental Land Management Study (ELMS) Act died Friday when the leadership did not place it before the Senate, Mooney said.

The county's comprehensive land planning act requires the county and its seven cities to have comprehensive plans completed Representatives of the cities and the county at a CALNO Council of Local Governments meeting in Altamonte Springs at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday will thrash out a method of im-

plementing the new law. The expressway authority bill

authorizes creation of an authority composed of city and county representatives to make decisions concerning any expressways built in Seminole.

The hospital bill limits Seminole Memorial Hospital board of trustees ability to levy taxes to .665 mill annually for operation and one mill for expansion. The trustees previously could require levy of five mills for each item.

The fire control district legislation permits the county to abolish fire control districts to create a single county-wide fire protection unit.

Casse'berry's hot pursuit act authorizes police officers to pursue law violators from the corporate city limits into Orange County.



Former Aide GOOD AFTERNOON Chuck Colson Pleads Guilty

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former presidential aide Charles W. Colson pleaded guilty today to a charge that he led an attempt to influence the outcome of the Daniel Ellsberg trial in

Colson pleaded guilty to a one-count grand jury indictment accusing him of obstruction of justice.

Other charges against Colson related to the break-in at the office of Ellsberg's psychiatrist were dropped in the surprise court development.

Indications were that charges against Colson in the Watergate cover-up also would be dropped.

The new indictment said Colson attempted to get the original Ellsberg case "tried in the newspapers."

Ellsberg, a former Pentagon analyst, had been accused of leaking the Pentagon Papers to the press.

But Ellsberg was freed in carly 1973 when Judge Matthew Byrne found misconduct by the government in the case.

Manufacturers Picketed

NEW YORK (AP) - Picket lines went up today at 700 manufacturers of apparel for men and boys across the nation as the first strike against the garment industry in half a century went into full gear.

On the picket list of the 110. 000-member Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America were selected manufacturers and factories in more than 100 towns in 30 states. About 40,000 of the pocketmakers, cutters, button-hole makers and machine operators striking in the wage dispute with the Clothing Manufacturers Association live in the New York City metropolitan area.

Other strikers were concentrated in Massachusetts, Illinois, Mississippi, Maryland, Virginia, Ohio, Missouri, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and California. 'The union is seeking a new labor contract containing higher wages, a cost-of-living clause and fringe benefits. Details of the demands were not announced. The employes earn an average of \$3.50 an hour.

Despite the aid of federal mediators, talks between the manufacturers and the union collapsed Saturday and the strike was called. No new negotiations were scheduled. The strike is not expected to cause any immediate clothing shortages. But the workers, most of whom have weekends off, walked out on the first real business day of a-week in which the garment industry planned to build up promotion for the fall fashion season.

Kennedy Leading Ford

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy would outpoll Vice President Gerald R. Ford if a presidential election were held now, according to the atest Gallup poll.

In a poll of 1,543 adults May 10-13, 50 per cent preferred Kennedy, 39 per cent favored Ford and 11 per cent were

Other Gailup surveys conducted this year identified the two men as the top choices of Democratic and Republican voters for the presidential nominations of their parties. The latest poll followed recent Gallup findings that 24 per cent of American voters identified themselves as Republicans, 42 per cent said they were Democrats and 34 per cent identified themselves as independents.

New Leadership Needed

LOS ANGELES (AP) - New political leadership is needed to correct the nation's economic woes, the president of the United Auto Workers union told delegates to the group's 24th constitutional convention. "The economic management of the country is in palsied hands," Leonard Woodcock said Sunday as he helped open the UAW's week-long gathering.

"As President Nixon stalls impeachment proceeding .. the situation worsens," Woodcock said. He added: "We look to the 1974 elections to correct this situation. We are in trouble in this country because the executive branch has abused its power. We seek to resiore a balance of power. We aren't asking for a veto-proof Congress, just

3 Soldiers Murdered

HODOC, S.C. (AP) - A sheriff says robbery apparently was the motive for the slayings of three soldiers whose mutilated bodies were found on a lake shore near here. McCormick County Sheriff J.P. Gable said the victims' pockets had been emptied. He said said the bodies were mutilated by stabbings, cuts, blows by a heavy instrument and ganshot wounds.

The victims' bodies were found early Sunday on the shore of Lake Clark Hill. Authorities said the three Ft. Gordon, Ga., soldiers were slain Saturday. The sheriff said at least two persons were involved in the slayings. One of the victims was identified as James Donahee, 18, of El Paso, Tex. The others were not identified immediately pending notification of relatives. They had been at the Army Signal School at Ft. Gordon about five months, Gable said.

The murders occurred in a heavily wooded area about 20 miles from Augusta and Ft. Gordon, accessible only by a dirt road. The lake forms part of the South Carolina-Georgia boundary.

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) - Better medical care for children could sharply reduce the number of childhood cases of functional blindness and deafness, a study by the Rand Corp. suggests.

Not enough money is spent trying to provide early detection of childhood hearing and sight disorders which can deteriorate into a handicapped condition, the study Some children could have been spared their im-

pairment by simply being properly immunized against diseases leading to sensory handicaps, the study said.

Gardener Wants His 'Weeds' FAIRFIELD, Ill. (AP) - Kenneth Kays is not your gov-

ernment-issue hero. His victory garden is full of marijuana, and he is determined to keep it as a symbol of his frectiom. Kays, 24, won the Medal of Honor and was honored at the White House for his heroism in Vietnam. A draft resister-turned-medic, Kays lost a leg in battle in May 1970 but repeatedly crawled past his lines to rescue and treat wounded comrades. Today he is battling over a 1,000 square-foot patch near his trailer in this southern Illinois town where he farms the illegal marijuana plants for his own personal use. Kays has been arrested twice and convicted once for possession and cultivation of

He was sentenced to one year of probation. Two weeks after his first arrest, the sheriff discovered Kays was still growing marijuana and arrested him again. "I don't wish to fight, but I'm not going to quit," he said.


Many Primaries Tuesday



WASHINGTON - A warning that oil pollution in seafood may encourage cancer, birth defects and other medical horrors has been censored from a scientific study of oil hazards. The 405-page study was prepared by the auguest National Academy of Sciences, which is supposed to be out of reach of oil

Yet the cancer warning was deleted like one of President Nixon's expletives from the draft report. It may be only a coincidence that scientists from Shell and Chevron oil companies

Until it is formally adpoted, the study is stamped "Privileged Information . . . Not for Publication . . . Do Not Quote or Cite." Nevertheless, we have obtained one of the 100 numbered copies of the confidential volume, including the censored cancer warning. There is evidence, declares this deleted passage, that oil pollution found in seafoods causes tumors in mice "even at low concentrations" and "may be the significant agents in human"

The dangers of charcoal-broiled steaks have received wide publicity. But the suppressed section tells of far higher concentrations of cancer-causing oil chemicals in codfish, sardines, The suppressed passage cautiously notes that "the

nechanism by which chemicals cause the induction of cancer is almost totally unknown and the situation is even worse with espect to the chemical induction of birth defects." The potential azard can only be measured "in indirect ways," it stresses. But the censored section warns: "It can be postulated that any significant increase in the amount of ingested PAH (a cancer

ubstance in oil) may increase cancer risk." PAH is also a suspected cancer-causer in cigarette smoke, burning refuse, power plant emissions, coke smoke and motor

These sources blow more PAH into the environment than comes from oil pollution. But the censored section contends: "Even if the probability of cancer induction of an individual is

very small, a society must not accept the risk." The research suggesting oil pollution possibly could cause cancer was omitted, without explanation, from the draft report. In its place, a powder-puff statement was substituted that "the effect of oil spills on human health appears to be negligible."

This infuriated the author of the suppressed section, Dr. James Sullivan of the Center for Science in the Public Interest. who fired off a letter to Richard Vetter, the staff chief in charge of reparing the oil pollution report. "Certainly," wrote Sullivan sharply, "the effects of marine

oil pollution on human health should have been the primary to speculate on the real agony the man must have experienced before deciding to aten down.
