Jahncke Criticizes State Has Chance To Lead American Legions Parade

ocratic House of Representatives. Mr. Shouse praised the program, while denying its authorship.

"This constitutes a new lever in the Democratic chairman's efforts at misrepresentation. For even the most partisan of Democracy's members in Congress drew the line at attempting to claim credit for the Hoover program in their most bitter statements."

The assistant secretary said that two weeks after Shouse praised the leadership of Speaker Garner of Congress, the American people witnessed "the complete collapse of Mr. Garner's alleged leadership and saw the Democratic majority of the House in absolute revolt."

"The Democratic majority in the House could and did follow the leadership of President Hoover when he presented his program for emergency legislation, but it was unable or unwilling to follow its own leadership when action was necessary on the tax bill reported to the House by the Democratic Ways and Means Committee," the speaker continued.

"Mr. Rainey, (D., Ill.), characterized the action of his associates as bordering on communism and Mr. Crisp, in charge of the bill, moved that the House adjourn for the week-end so members could 'recover their sanity.'"

Mr. Jahncke declared failure of the Democratic majority to function in time of national emergency is not regarded by Republicans as an occasion for exultation, but cited it as a graphic warning to people of the United States in connection with coming elections.

"There is no question as to the fact that Democracy both as a party and through its leaders has failed to produce anything like a constructive program for presentation to the American public," he charged.

He pointed to disagreement among prominent Democrats as to a platform on which there have been the plea for Democratic administration.

The advocate of Mr. Shouse for participation in the League of Nations, he declared, appeals to Missouri, and other potential Democratic presidential nominees as "little shams of heresy."

He pointed to former Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York as favoring "beer and bonds" plank in the platform; Senator Joe Robinson of Arkansas, Mr. Jahncke asserted, "would most certainly take the beer out, while several other potential nominees are cool to the bond proposals."

The speaker contrasted the Shouse plan "for mutilation of our tariff act" with the fact that John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic national committee, favors a tariff "so close to the existing law that some Democrats characterize his tariff attitude as slavish imitation of Republican principle."

"Today the nation is asking 'What does Democracy offer which will compare to the established record of the present administration?' he asked. "The answer emanating from Democratic leaders is a babble of discord."

Secretary Jahncke praised President Hoover for cushioning financial blows resultant of the 1929 stock market crash and for his part in holding the United States economically stable during a world-wide depression—the shaking of the entire social structure of other nations.

He said he did not blame Democrats for present conditions—but did object to their laying at the door of the Republican party or its leader, President Hoover, the blame for the World War, the accumulation of debts, the lending of money to European governments, war time and postwar inflation, and temporary and false prosperity, when, he said, they occurred under a Democratic administration.

Serious Pests May Be Imported With Airplane Shipments

GAINESVILLE, Fla.—Airplane shipment of fruits and vegetables presents a real menace to growers, since dangerous pests are likely to be imported, warns Dr. Wilmon Newell, state plant commissioner.

Just recently, the Plant Board's quarantine inspector at Jacksonville seized a package of guava leaves enroute from Cuba to Chicago which was infested with green scale, cardin's whitefly, blackfly, and coconut mealybug.

"Blackfly, a relative of our common whitefly, is a serious pest attacking some 200 different plants in Cuba, the Bahamas, and the Canal Zone," he stated. "So severe have been the losses resulting from the depredations of this pest that the U. S. Department of Agriculture, at the suggestion of the State Plant Board, sent an entomologist into India and the Malay Peninsula for the purpose of collecting natural enemies and introducing them into the infested groves in Cuba. This expedition was very successful, and several species of the blackfly are now firmly established in Cuba and the Panama Canal Zone."

"Green scale is one of the many scale-insects infesting plants in the tropics. According to information supplied by entomologists and well-informed travelers, this scale would be very troublesome if introduced into the state."

Roosevelt has an imposing lead in the delegate total. The Illinois delegation is estimated at 125,000.

Illinois elects 60 delegates to each national convention Tuesday, all of them uninstructed. The victory of the state Democratic organization supporting Horner assured Senator Lewis the state's support for president, at least on the early ballot. Supporters of Roosevelt have said they could swing most of Illinois' votes after the first ballot.

The Illinois delegation's position in the Republican convention was less clear. The presidential preference vote was meaningless. No designations appeared on the ballots. Most of the delegates did not indicate their preference or platform. Most of the delegates, however, were members of party factions and most of the factions were registered as pro-Hoover.

Only one definite state was in the field for Republican delegates. It was anti-prohibition and anti-Hoover. Incomplete returns indicated 11 of its 15 members defeated.

Illinois state convention meets Apr. 22, the Republicans picking 11 additional national delegates and the Democrats eight.

In the Nebraska preference primary, three-fourths of the state's precincts gave Roosevelt a lead of nearly two to one over the com-

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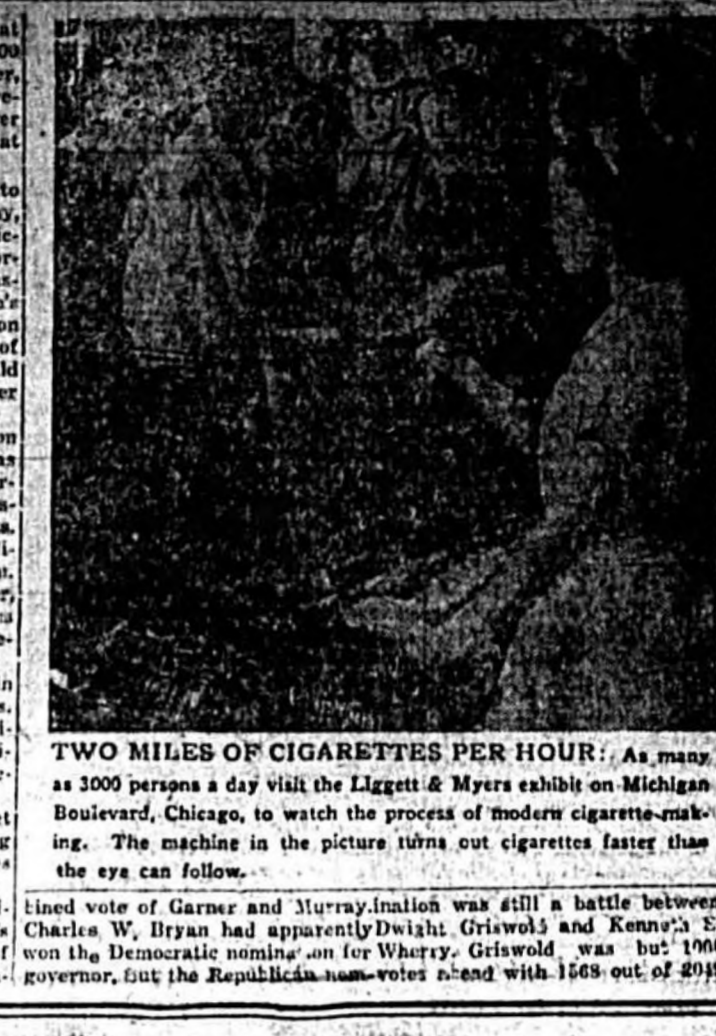
