#### Lovers commit suicide

BEIJING - Two star crossed Chinese lovers blew themselves up with a homemade bomb atop the tourist-packed Great Wall in an apparent suicide pact that also seriously injured a New Zealand woman, officials said today

The couple, apparently involved in an extra-marital affair, were hugging each other when the bomb when off and killed them Monday morning at the popular Badaling section of the Great Wall. 43 miles northwest of Beijing, the official Xinhua news agency and witnesses said.

Dozena of foreign tourists were in the area at the time of the explosion.

A New Zealand Embassy spokesman said Colleens Wong, of Auckland, received the "full force" of the blast and suffered serious head injuries. She underwent several hours of surgery Monday night and was listed in "very serious condition" today at Temple of Heaven Hospital in southern Beijing.

#### Stealth bomber unveiled today

PALMDALE, Calif. - The Defense Department refused for years even to acknowledge the existence of the Stealth strategic bomber, but is suddenly bringing the revolutionary warplane out from under wraps.

Last week the Pentagon released a photograph of the dull black "flying wing," and today the Air Force planned to put one of the revolutionary \$450 million warplanes on display for the first time.

# Officials say storm will strike west coast tomorrow morning

MIAMI - Tropical storm Keith moved today toward Florida's west coast where it was expected to roll ashore Wednesday morning with top sustained winds of 65 mph and forcential rains, the National Hurricane Center.

Forecasters said Keith was not expected to grow into the season's sixth hurricane, although its winds still would be capable of causing wide damage and delaying the launch of the next space shuttle mission.

The storm, born Thursday, first swept west across the Caribbean, battering western Cuba and Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula with heavy rain and high winds Sunday and Monday, said Bob ... Bee Storm. Page 5A

As expected, Keith started moving to the northeast Monday night, forming thunderstorms over the lower Florida Keys, and continued turning toward the east today.

Tropical storm warnings were issued for the western Florida coast from Cape Sable south of Naples to Cedar Key, 80 miles north of Tampa.

The present motion of the storm would bring the center over the west coast of Florida early Wednesday," forecaster Bil Clark said.



# Local man who knew JFK recalls the events of 1963

SANFORD - Nov. 22, 1963. the day President John F. Kennedy was assassinated is a scar on the collective American memory. But for those who knew the president, the memory is perhaps more intense.

"It upset me. I cried like a baby," said former Oviedo Police Chief Wesley Place, 70, of Sanford. Place, who for one week in 1961 served as the official White House photographer for Kennedy, said he was a Seminole County sheriffs deputy on duty at the fall when he got word that Kennedy was dead.

Place, who was working for Sheriff Luthur Hobby, said another deputy told him to listen to the radio, because that deputy knew Place had worked for

'The radio was playing loud. They said John Kennedy was assassinated, I didn't believe it when I heard it. I was shocked.

"Other people had similar reactions, but having known him personally, I think I felt it more

so. I just had to get over it. That's all. I had a job to do bere. But it hurt so much to know the man I thought so much of had been killed uselessly.

"I think Kennedy was the finest man with the highest

ideals. Nobody could make me believe differently. If he hadn't been assassinated we wouldn't have the problems we have today," Place said.

"He was a wonderful man. That's what I thought of him. He was a man. Far more so than most anybody else I every met. He was so exacting - wanting things done right the first time. You couldn't help but think the world of him."

Place, a U.S. Navy photographer from 1941 through 1961, said he met Kennedy when he was assigned to fill in for the vacationing White House photographer in 1961. He was stationed near the White House and had the required security clearance that allowed him to join the stall.

"I sure did have patriotic feelings in the White House. It's quite expansive. Something you Bee JFK, Page 5A

#### State panel to back drug testing

TALLAHASSEE. Fla. (UPI) - Gov. Bob Martinez' ad hoc committee studying drugs in the workplace probably will recommend pre-employment and for-cause drug testing for state employees, committee chairman Doug Hughes said.

But Hughes, who is Martinez' counsel on drugs, said Monday the panel may not seek random drug testing of state workers because of strong opposition from labor unions, particularly the American Federation of State. County and Municipal

Hughes said it was essential for Martinez to be able to offer the Legislature a statewide drug policy that had across-theboard support from state agencies and employees.

Anything less would make it very difficult to persuade

lawmakers to approve the financial investmen' enacting a statewide policy would require, he said, adding estimates of the program's cost have not been made.

The ad hoc group was appointed by Martinez last week and charged with recommending the nation's first statewide drug policy by Dec. 16. Hughes said meeting that seadline would not be difficult, but getting the paner's recommendations implemented would be.

#### 'Mrs. Santa' gets aid after fire ruins home

JACKSONVILLE - The woman known as "Mrs. Santa Claus" for her Christmas toy giveaways for underpriveledged children received help from volunteers after fire destroyed her

An electrical fire in the air conditioning unit gutted Dorcas Drake's house Monday, destroying her furniture and many of her personal belongings, Jacksonville fire officials said.

Drake, 72, has coordinated the annual Christmas party for thousands of needy children in Jacksonville for more than 25 years and despite the setback, she said preparations for this year's toy drive were underway.

The Jacksonville Fireman's Credit Union started a fundraising drive to replace her furniture and clothes, since she did not carry fire insurance, a fire spokeswoman said.

Volunteers gathered near the house's charred frame in the Jacksonville's historic Springfield area.

"This is my old neighborhood and knowing her for so long and knowing what she's done for kids, I just had to lend a hand," said volunteer Jack Sims

#### Hunters find body in shallow grave

FORT MYERS - Lee County Sheriff's deputies covered the scene of a possible murder Monday as a precaution against distructive winds and rain that associated with tropical storm

Hunters discovered a partially decomposed body in a shallow grave in a heavily wooded area in south Fort Myers Monday morning, said Capt. Michael Rymer with the Lee County

Sheriff's Department. Rymer said authorities have protected the area until crime scene specialists from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement arrive Tyesday. "We have it secured We have it

"We hope to have (the scene) processed before the storm reaches us." Rymer said.

#### "no idea" who put it there or how long it has been buried. Shelter opens for families and mothers

ORLANDO - A modest shelter built without government money opened for homeless families and single women with children living on the streets in one of America's fast-growing. prosperous cities.

"It's frightening what's happening to families." Brother Andrew Bratcher with the Human Services Council said at the Monday opening. "Families are sleeping in underpasses and parks. Our biggest problem is that families are more afraid to come to shelters than young men because of what could happen to their children.

Officials estimate at least 600 homeless people will knock on shelter doors every night when winter's chill arrives next month. The city has only about 370 shelter beds, and only a few are designated for families.

Built with private donations and money from charitable foundations, the \$1.4 million Orlando Union Rescue Mission added 55 beds and hot meals for indigent families sleeping in abandoned buildings and vehicles.

# **GAO** criticizes NASA on costs

WASHINGTON — A government report criticized NASA Monday for failing to report the full cost of its space station and other projects to Congress and called on the agency to develop a long-term plan for space

exploration.

The transition report, released Monday and prepared for the Bush administration and the new Congress by the non-partisan General Accounting Office, estimated NASA's costs will triple by the turn of the century, to \$32 billion or more, taking into account construction and operation of a moon base and a manned mission to Mars.

It also called on the space agency to launch unmanned interplanetary probes on schedule, noting delays coat taxpayers millions of dollars.

"NASA does not have yet a strategic long-term plan nor does it consistently report the full costs of its projects," the

1 said. "If NASA is to provide the technological leadership necessary to put the United States at the forefront of advancements in aeronautics, space science and exploration, it must develop a strategic

NASA does not have yet a strategic long-term plan nor does it consistently report the full costs of its projects,

plan which clearly states its vision for the future and the steps to reslize that future in an affordable mainer."

But it added. "One thing NASA must do is to report the full picture of resources required to develop and operate specific projects. ... NASA does not typically report the full costs of its projects to Congress.

As an example, the GAO report cited the proposed space station Freedom, which NASA hopes to begin building in 1995. Once complete, the permanently manned orbital outpost will serve as a research station and, possibly, as a staging base for flights to the moon or Mars.

In his 1984 State of the Union eddress. President Reagan said the station would cost \$8 billion. Following the Challenger shuttle disaster, however, NASA restructured the project's management and Even so, the GAO said Monday the figures

were still misleading.
"In 1987, NASA told the Congress that
the space station would cost \$14 billion,
leaving out an additional \$14 billion needed

to launch and assemble it in space," the report said. "Omissions of this type are not unusuai. "The project cost estimates reported by

NASA typically have not included such directly related project costs as launch and assembly, personnel and facilities, and work provided by other U.S. agencies."

A spokesman at NASA headquarters said Monday the space agency had yet to receive a copy of the report.

The document also presented suggestions for keeping costs under control, maintaining "It is imperative that NASA employ a management system that identifies design proposals which minimize costs over the space station's 30-year life."

"There are, however, intense pressures to hold down current government spending. increasing the risk that NASA will select design uptions with low front-end development costs even though they may require much higher outlays over the life of the project," the report said.

# Mortgage bankers predict good year

TALLAHASSEE - Florida mortgage bankers said they expected 1969 to be a good year for home construction and sales. but added they remained cautious about the policies of President-elect George Bush. Florida home sales have been

among the nation's best in recent years, largely because of the state's stable economy and continuing growth. While unlikely to reach the high sales levels of 1986. Mortgage Bankers Assuciation of Florida spokesman W.D. Acosta and other mortgage bankers predicted continuing good home and commercial sales next year.

"In many other areas of the nation, they've had slowdowns and economic slumps for over a year." Acosta said Monday. Plorida has been very successful and is continuing to enjoy growth.

Manhers are heeping a close watch on how Bush deals with the immense federal budget. If concerns about the deficit lead to

high inflation and rising interest rates. Acosta said, the industry could be badly hurt.

Acosta and others predicted interest rates would increase from 1 percent to 2 percent next year. That increase, they said. should not discourage con-

numers from purchasing.
"We feel very comfortable if rates stay in the 10 to 11, perhaps 11.5 percent range, that we won't have the big affordablity problem we had when rates were much higher," Acosta

"We feel these rates are acceptable to facilitate housing."

While Florida's economy remains strong. Acosta said poor economic conditions and related factors in other states could hurt housing sales.

# Crawford: Senate will tackle drug problem

TALLAHASSEE - Senate President Bob Crawford announced the formation of a select committee headed by Sen. Arnett Girardeau, D. Jacksonville, that will step up the war on drugs over the next two years

"by 1990, I want the Senate and the Legislature to have passed a major drug program." said Crawford, D-Winter Park, at a Monday news conference in which he also named Girardeau

Senate President Pro Tempore. 'I'm going to call on the protempore to develop a comprehensive drug policy to deal with the drug problem in the state," Crawford said.

Girardeau said the committee

will use "everything at our disposal" to tackle Plorida's increasing drug problem. especially the abuse of crack cocaine, a drug he said has had a "devastating effect" on the black

community in the state. But Girardeau stopped short of endorsing a sweeping drugtesting program proposed last week by Gov. Bob Martines. saying he wanted to "take a look at the program" before taking a stand on the controversial issue.

Girardeau did say he thought care should be exercised in the implementation of any such proposal because "I would suspect you're striking at the freedom of the people a little bit" by requiring mandatory or random drug tests.

Martinez said he wanted drug

tests for state employees in "critical" occupations that had a direct effect on public safety. He also said he would support testing prospective state employees The governor also is consid-

ering whether to have Florida designated as one of four pilot states where, under federal statutes, drug tests would be mandatory before a drivers license could be issued. Crawford said there is no

question "that the drug problem is probably the No. 1 crisis on people's minds." but he said he thought the biggest priority for lawmakers in the coming session would be the budget.

"I think overshadowing all problems will be a budget dilemma of burgeoning needs electing people to office.

and limited resources." Crawford said

He said he could not see "anything out there that's even an option" for increasing state revenues and that the key to keeping or increasing the level of state services would be a more effective use of existing funds.

Crawford said he expected the Legislature to have a "very cooperative" relationship with the governor and that he did not think partisan politics would be much of a factor in the coming legislative session.

He said he also thought some type of election reform measure should be studied because "it's time we sat down and reevalutated how we go about

Police said the car Bruce Johnson drove to the bank Monday had been reported stolen in Winter Park that same day.

The check police said he tried to cash was drawn on the account of Clayton Johnson. Bank workers at the time of the attempted transaction received a computer report that the check was stolen, police said.

Johnson was arrested at 12:41 p.m. at the bank on U.S. Highway 17-92. He is charged with forgery, uttering a forged instrument, resisting arrest without violence for refusing to give police his name, possession of a stolen car and assault on a police officer. Police said while inside a police car Johnson sprayed a can of mace at a policeman. He was initially jailed John Doe, but jail officials have identified him.

# Hepatitis on rise among neterosexuals

WASHINGTON - In order to stem the growing tide of hepatitis B. federal officials say they are considering widescale efforts to vaccinate the general public against the potentially deadly disease.

Although it is rarely fatal in the short-term, hepatitis H causes up to 80 percent of all primary liver cancer and is second only to tobacco as a known human carcinogen.

It is expected there will be 300,000 new cases of hepatitis B in the United States in 1988, up from 200,000 in 1978.

Among the evidence supporting extensive vaccination are statistics showing a sharp upswing in hepatitis B infections among sexually active, non-drug using heterosexuals.

Those heterosexuals made up about 35 percent of the hepatitis H cases in 1988, compared to about 15 percent in 1982. Dr. Harold Margolis told a national forum on AIDS and hepatitis B on Monday.

Margolis, chief of the Centers for Disease Control's hepatitis branch, said his agency has presented data to a Public Health Service advisory panel suggesting "universal vaccination" of children or adolescents to protect against hepatitis B

may be desirable. Hepatitis B is transmitted by contact with blood, by sexual relations or oral contact with an infected person, from mother to child, or by contaminated necdle. Hepatitis A is a milder form of infection transmitted by water or food.

A vaccine against hepatitis B has been available since 1962. It uses a killed form of the virus, so it cannot transmit hepatitis to people receiving it. The vaccine costs about \$120 for the necessary three shots.

Some 1.8 million people who have received the hepatitia B vaccine to date, with about 90 percent of them health care

In recent years, health officials have urged all those considered particularly at risk, including homosexuals, intravenous drug users and health care workers. be vaccinated. But Margolia said only about 3 percent of people in all risk groups are now vaccinated and just 24 percent of doctors have bothered to get the

The hepatitis B virus has been around since ancient times, but Margolis said the latest upswing is not just a reflection of better medical reporting. "That increase is real - much of it can be attributed to lifestyle changes," the doctor said, adding the key is to vaccinate people before they start using

intravenous drugs or having sex. Both types of hepatitis cause severe flu-like symptoms of fever and aches, along with jaundice. The virus attacks the liver and, depending on the severity of disease, can cause liver failure.

Intravenous drug users accounted for 28 percent of cases in 1987 and homosexuals made up about 10 percent, although their infection rate is declining due to the growing use of condoms as a result of the AIDS epidemic.

# Candidates air out the issues Prospective commissioners

discuss a variety of topics

BANFORD - Candidates for city commissioners in the Dec. 6 election offered differing opinions on a variety of issues at a candidate forum Monday night but most agreed that:

Youth recreational sites should be offered throughout the city instead of at a single recreation center, that population growth is needed, that the city should investigate a paramedic program for the fire department, and offering land near Geneva as the site for a federal prison should not be done hastily.

District I candidates James Sweeting III. Jay Malone and Lon Howell also said they are willing to meet in a debate if anyone invites them.

Sweeting, who is interim at-torney for the Sanford Housing Authority, said he is aware of the appearance of a conflict of interest if he is elected to the city commission, even though he will end his association with the SHA if elected.

"Because of that appearance. if elected I will not only resign my position with the housing authority, but I will also resign from the law firm I am associated with because of its connection with the authority,"

The District I candidates, and Bob Thomas Jr., the incumbent District II commissioner, all endorsed growth for the city.

The other District II candidate. Storm Richards a planner by profession, said the city doesn't know where growth is occurring or where it should occur, and the comprehensive plan doesn't address growth. Thomas said he is not against growth, but it should come with additional jobs. "We need jobs with good pay and benefits that people cen support families on." he said. "Too many of our young people see dealing drugs as the best comment on the proposal.

paying jobs in the city."

Sweeting said growth for Sanford is inevitable and the city is at a crossroads concerning trying to remain a small community or moving forward. "We see the growth south of us and we must take the best of what has been done to handle it there. and reject the worst that has happened as a result of growth there. City leaders have some hard choices to make

He also advocated agressively recruiting industry to the city to provide more jobs.

Malone said growth must be fueled by additional jobs that would, in turn, increase retail commercial business. He agreed the city needs more industry. Howell agreed that "high tech" industry is needed, but said Sanford should try to retain its small town atmosphere.

Four of the candidates also endorsed training a corps of paramedics within the fire department.

Richards, of District II, said only that the cost-benefits of such a plan should be investigated.

Malone said he had a heart attack about 18 months ago and was lucky to be alive because it. took three hours for emergency crews to respond and transport him to a hospital. "We do not have an adequate system for emergency treatment of the elderly and impaired and establishing a paramedic system. would be one of my top priorities if elected." he said.

Sweeting said the city does not have state licensing for a paramedic program and does not have the required medical director to obtain a license. This is something that needs fixing." he said.

Thomas said a paramedic program is needed but the costs must be investigated as well as the wishes of the residents of the city.

Howell, of District 1, did not

also endorsed recreational facilities for young people and most agreed they should be at scattered sites.

Howell said recreational facilities and tutoring programs should be available in several neighborhoods.

Sweeting said the city should have an outreach program in the neighbrhoods to attract children who come home from school to empty homes to participate in supervised recreational programs.

Malone also agreed that recreattonal factities at several sites are needed but how to finance such a program has to be investigated.

Thomas also said an alternative to kids hanging out in parking lots must be provided, and Richards suggested working with the school district to use school property for recreational programs after school hours.

Richards and Howell also strongly opposed locating a federal prison on city-owned land neal Geneva.

Howell said he could see no benefit to the city of doing so because few Sanford businesses would be able to compete with larger companies for contracts for supplies, and prison employees would be closer to other areas to live and shop. "I also don't like jamming it down other people's throats," he said referring to residents of the Geneva area.

Richards said the prison probably would attract development along State Road 46 for which the city would have to provide services.

Malone said he wouldn't make up his mind whether to support or oppose the proposal until more studies were done and public hearings were held.

Sweeting said he doesn't favor offending Geneva residents by locating a prison near them. Sanford has to form a closer relationship with all communities in the county in light of the county charter that was just approved," he said.

Only Sweeting and Richards

offered suggestions on how to improve relations between Sanford and Seminole County governments.

Sweeting, who headed an unsuccessful petition drive last summer to place a proposition on the banot regulring county commissioners to be elected from districts, said Sanford should push for such a proposal. "Sanford needs to increase its influence with the county and single-member districts would give the northern part of the county more representation on the county commission," he

suid. Richards said the city should carefully choose the issues to fight the county on. "We should work with the county to reach an agreement on annexation agreements because the county has more staff and legal resources and Sanford will lose more fights that it wins in that area," he said.

Several of the candidates also think the Monroe Harbor launch fee is a mistake.

Sweeting said the county retains a percentage of fees collected for boat trailer licenses and the city should get a portion to help maintain the ramps. Richards agreed that the city and county should negotiate the fees. Howell is flatly against the fee, saying it reduces business for downtown merchants. Malone said someone has to pay for ramp upkeep but offered n alternative to the launching fee.

Richards favors investigating what federal block grants and economic development grants are available for housing programs in the city. His opponent, Thomas, favors "getting on with the WINS (Westside Improvement Neighborhood Strategy) program.

In District I, Sweeting said new housing solutions must be found, utilizing private and public money and getting businesses and banks involved. Malone said he favors investigating whatever financing is available and Howell said neighborhoods must work together to find solutions to the problem.

# Paulucci proposes land swap

SANFORD - Seminole County commissioners will review an offer by developer Jeno Paulucci to swap 1,950 acres at the junction of the Wekiya and Little Wekiva Rivers for about 100 acres in the Lake Forest development west of Interstate 4 near Sanford during their meeting at 7 p.m. today at the County Services Building

If approved, the exchange must also be reviewed by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council and the Florida Department of Community Affairs. Lake Forest is a joint venture between NTS Properties. Inc., and Paulucci International, Ltd. The 100-acre site is northwest of State Road 46 and Oregon Avenue.

If commissioners approve the swap, the developers would grant the county, without cost, an inspection easement to 1,200 acres at the junction of the two environmentally-protected rivers. Another 750 acres. located between the proposed county easement and the NTS Sabal Point development, would be deeded free to the St. Johns. River Water Management District for preservation.

Separate from the swap is NTS plan to turn over 350 acres, adjacent to the water management district land, to the Audubon Society:

The 1.200 acres will be fully deeded to the Nature Conservancy for protection and possibly a nature walk with raised walkways and other low-impact uses.

David Weeks, director of development for the Nature Conservancy, said the organization currently is negotiating to purchase about 900 acres of the site. If the negotiations are successful, he said the land would be turned over to the district or the state for preserva-"This is a very important

site," Weeks said. "It includes a hydric hammock and hardwood swamp in pristine condition. It encompasses a wide range of wading birds, reptiles and other species indigenous to those habitats.

In return for the swap, NTS wants the county, district and state to allow them to build on 106 of the 150 acres of wetlands on the development site. After a retention pond is dredged. another 14 acres of littoral Jeno Paulucci

wetlands will be developed around the edge of the pond. County staff said the swap is a

good one because protection of the land at the two rivers would serve to protect them.

Deputy county administrator Jim Bible said he was uncertain how much of the 2,300 acres would be developed under strict state Juidelines which require setbacks of up to 350 feet from the rivers.



# Memories focus on Kennedy's life

WASHINGTON - For many people, the 25th anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's assassination was a time to focus more on his life and less on his death.

His family was trying "very hard to refocus attention on the day of his birth rather than on the day he died. ... They are trying not to relive November 22nd." said a spokeswoman in the office of Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., the president's brother.

Only one member of the extended family, brother-in-law Sargent Shriver, planned to attend a public event today on the anniversary of Kennedy's death. Shriver was scheduled to go to a commemoration service at St. Matthews Cathedral where the funeral mass for Kennedy was held in 1963.

The service today, led by the Rev. Theodore Hesburgh, was to mark the end of a 24-hour vigil by former Peace Corps volunteers. Shriver was the first head of Peace Corps, started during the Kennedy administration.

The spokeswoman said she did not know where former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy would

be and said Kennedy's two children. John and Caroline. would be in New York City. Edward Kennedy was to spend a 'totally private" day in London.

Ethel Kennedy visited the grave of Robert F. Kennedy at Arlington National Cemetery Sunday, the date of her late husband's birthday, and also visited the nearby grave of John Kennedy.

The only other activities planned in the Washington area. to mark the day were at Kennedy's grave. The non-profit "No Greater Love" organization, the Green Berets and the "Hibernians" were to place wreaths at the grave in separate ceremo-

Like the family, many others were remembering Kennedy's life and accomplishments.

Since the early 1960s, thousands of people have heard Kennedy's call to service and marched to the farthest parts of the world as Peace Corps volunteers. This year, many of them were paying Kennedy a special tribute.


About 500 Peace Corps volunteers from every state held a 24-hour vigil for the slain president in the Capitol rotunda, where Kennedy's body lay in

# **Dust requires** good cleaning

Among the numerous due-bills lying on the Oval Office desk, bills demanding Presidentelect George Bush's immediate attention, is one that for some time has been gathering dust - radioactive dust, if you will. We ignore it at our peril.

Recent disclosures about accidents, radioactive emissions, pollution and management difficulties at nuclear-weapons plants and laboratories are disturbing reminders that we have a massive cleanup to do. That cleanup involves more than nuclear waste. It involves management procedures apparently gone awry in the Department of Energy.

The cleanup won't be cheap. The Energy Department has estimated that it will cost between \$66 billion and \$110 billion to dispose of nuclear waste and upgrade nuclear-weapons facilities. Congressional estimates have run as high as \$170 billion.

Four major plants in the 14-facility nuclear-weapons manufacturing complex already have been affected. The Savannah River plant in South Carolina and a plant at Fernald. Ohio, have been closed for safety reasons. The facility at Hunford, Wash., and the Rocky Flats plant near Denver have been partly shut down. A new \$700 million nuclear-waste repository in New Mexico remains closed indefinitely because of questions about safety.

Stories being leaked about safety violations and health dangers border on the horrendous. A congressional panel reported, for example, that government officials have known for 'years that the Ohio plant was releasing thousands of tons of radioactive uranium waste into the environment. Runoff from the plant reportedly carried tons of the waste into underground water aupplies, drinking-water wells and a nearby river.

According to a recently released Energy Department memorandum, 30 significant reactor accidents have occurred at the Savannah River plant since 1957. On two occasions, nuclear fuel has melted. That could have led to a core meltdown, a rare and dangerous occurrence the general public first heard about in the movie "China Syndrome."

The Energy Department decided to close the Rocky Flats nuclear facility in October because of several "very serious" violations that occurred only days earlier and left "no margins" for safety.

These and other incidents are symptomatic of what U.S. Rep. Mike Synar, D-Okla., has called "a frightening breakdown in management" by the Energy Department. Resolving the department's management difficulties must be a high priority.

The safety violations constitute a more immediate crisis. We would recommend that the newly created National Defense Safety Board be given authority to close any Energy Department nuclear facility it considers not in compliance with effective safety procedures. Congress created the board under the defense authorization bill for fiscal 1989 to monitor the Energy Department's nuclear-weapons program. The board has no powers of enforcement.

We also urge the Energy Department to craft new policy regarding secrecy at our nuclear-weapons facilities. Obviously, security must be tight, and the management breakdown that Synar has warned about includes security lapses. But national security also involves health and safety matters. which must be public information.

# Bad news and amazing coincidences

WASHINGTON — It always is amazing to note how many small pieces of bad news somehow manage to pop to the surface in Washington as soon as a national election is over.

It may be wickedly cynical to suggest that these negative nuggets were held back for political reasons until the voters had selected a new president. But try as one will, it is hard to believe that all of the following developments just happened to be ready for public announcement less than a week after Nov. 8:

1. The Justice Department filed a brief asking the Supreme Court to overturn its landmark Roc vs. Wade decision permitting women to have abortions during the first phases of pregnancy without breaking the law.

2. The Labor Department announced it would permit individuals to do piece work at home in several industries where such activities have been banned for decades because of a history of sweatshop conditions.

3. The Department of Transportation announced a program of random drug testing of employees in the transportation industry whose jobs involve public safety or security.

4. The Parmer's Home Administration began

sending out notices to 80,000 farmers that they must pay their delinquent loans or face foreclosure action.

5. The Office of Management and Budget announced that the fiscal 1990 budget, which under the Gramm-Rudman law may not be more than \$100 billion in the ...d. now appears to have a \$132 billion deficit. \$21 billion higher than the last pre-election estimate. Oddly enough, a huge increase in the expected budget deficit also came to light a short time after the 1984 presidential election. None of these ac

tions constitute a major surprise policy decision for the Reagan administration and it seems very unlikely that any or all of them announced before Nov. B would have changed the course of an election in which the winner got 7 million more votes than the loser and carried 40 states.

But while neveral of the Items above might please as many people as they outrage, it is only common sense to suppose that no politically savvy public official would purposely risk allenating even the smallest pocket of voters just before an election that is expected to be close.


The simple fact is that the tirning of these announcements is just another example of how the party in power tyles to remain in power.

# Don't worry, be happy

WASHINGTON - George Bush's only clear campaign pledge was to continue President Reagan's policy of borrow-borrow, spendspend, elect-elect. That is what "No new taxes" means. So we know that answer to the central question of the 1992 election. The question is: Are you better off than you were in 1988? The answer will be: No. To see why, consider the following.

Although it is hard to look up to a man in that position, candidate Bush placed his ear to the ground and announced triumphantly: "By two-to-one Congress is blamed for these deficits." The polls are right about who the public blames but the public is mistaken.

Congress' disagreement with Reagan has been marginal and mostly about the composition rather than the amount of spending. In the six budgets before the post-crash Reagan-Congress "summit" agreement, defi-cits averaged \$184 billion and Reagan budgets proposed at least \$139 billion of that.

Bush will now get to name two members to the National Economic Commission, which will make deficit-reduction proposals to Bush. He can choose either people who think his "flexible freeze" is a solution, or people who

Bush promises to halt the four-year decline of defense spending, which is 27 percent of the budget. Entitlements and other mandatory programs are 47 percent. (All in favor of cutting them signify by saying, "I choose not to seek re-election.") Interest payments are 14 percent of the budget. (They will be more once the dollar's decline causes interest rates to

That accounts for 88 percent of the budget. In 10 months Gramm-Rudman requires reduction of the deficit to \$100 billion (with \$10 billion leeway). If it is to be done without taxes, it will require at least \$35 billion in cuts. There is not a single vote in Congress-not one-for a budget that would take that from the 12 percent that is discretionary spending.

Besides. Bush pines for child care, longs to be the "education President" and is 'haunted" by the plight of poor children. Are his pinings, longings and hauntings as strong as his taxophobia? (Never mind the scores of billions required for the savings and loan bail-outs, for the crists in nuclear facilities. for...)

A Republican close to the President-elect recently said to a senior Democratic senator, 'He'll have to veto a couple of your tax increases" before he accepts one. Oh, my. Are there really Republicans silly enough to suppose the Democrats are suicidal enough to accept this division of labor: They beg for higher taxes. Republicans reluctantly agree? As Bennett Johnston (D-La.) says, "We're not going to get the blame while he gets the

Some Republicans seem to think the problem is just one of split-second timing. The theory is that Republicans will put entitlements "on the table" at the instant Democrats put taxes, and by some immaculate conception a proposal will be born that will have on it neither party's fingerprints.

But that is prestidigitation, not politics. Besides. Democrats won't play. Why should they?. Bush is the first Republican in history to win the White House while his party was losing strength in both houses and Congress. He will soon hear this from Democrats: Read our lips-you move first.

They will say: You had jolly fun in the campaign and now

Social Security trust fund you get Air Force One and the Marine Band and Camp David. But you are expected to lead. Begin by submitting a budget. We need a laugh and we'll get one from any budget purporting to hit the Gramm-Rudman

We probably are in for more government by Mr. Micawber and Scariett O'Hara: "Some-thing will turn up." "We'll think about it tomorrow." Tomorrow is apt to be a lot like today-Bush promised as much. # FBI probes arms dealer

WASHINGTON - If the Pentagon procurement system has run amok. American defense contractors aren't the only ones who are cashing in on the situation. An Israeli arms dealer. Shlomo Zabludowicz, has also tanded lucrative military contracts and has come to the attention of federal investigators.

On June 14, the PBI searched the home of Melvyn Pataley, former assistant secretary of the Navy. Among other things, they were

looking for indications that Pataley had helped Zabludowicz obtain military contracts between 1961 and 1968. Painley is a central figure in the Pentagon procurement pruhe, but no tharges have been

The fatest Penlagon contract given to Zabludowicz's firm, Soltam Ltd. was announced in March Soltam, in a oint venture with Martin Marietia Corp., won a \$270 million contract to build 120mm morturn for the Army.

The decision to buy the Israeli-designed mortars came after four years of wrangling between Congress and the Army. In 1984, Congress authorized the Army to pursue a mortar contract. Zabludowicz celebrated by hosting a party at his Washington home for the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, a committee staffer and other

sources told our associate Jim Lynch. The cozy relationship apparently bothered Sen Barry Goldwater, R Ariz, Immediately after he replaced Sen. John Tower, R-Texas. as Senate Armed Services Committee chairman in January 1985, Goldwater sent a letter to Army Secretary John Marsh Jr. The congressional authorization bill had included some conditions that appeared to make Zabludowicz the only possible supplier. Goldwater said that wasn't what Congress had in mind. "There was clearly no intent to slife competition or to accelerate the acquisition process to the point where adequate testing was not possible." he wrote. After the Goldwater letter, at least two other companies entered the mortar competition before losing out to Soltam this year.

Throughout the years that Zabludowicz waited in the wings, Rep. Joseph McDade. R-Pa, went to but for him. McDude, the ranking Republican on the House Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, was looking out for his constituents back home.

United Press International recently reported that Soltam had assured McDade that it would put the production plant in McDade's district if Soltam won the contract. A spokesman for McDade said there was "no proof of such a deal and that the production alte has not yet been chosen. But he noted that Soltarn has strongly considered building the plant near a lesting facility owned by Pocal Industries in Scranton, Pa., which is in McDade's district. Zabludowicz is one of the principals in Pocal Industries.

We have obtained Army records which Indicate that McDade budgered the Army with at least six letters, trying to hasten the selection of a mortar contractor. Army records also show 14 telephone conversations between McDade and Army Undersecretary James Ambrose from May 1985 to May 1987.

McDade maintains that he pressed the mortar leave because the Army needed to upgrade its antiquated systems, and that he supported open competition for the contract.

Zabludowicz refused to talk to us about the federal investigation or the mortar contract.

"I have always opposed the route through Sanford and my position was well known." Smith said.

"Which was worse," asked Morris. "voting for the route or not knowing that you did?"

When candidates were asked their views on the proposal to locate a federal prison on the 2.200 acres. Smith said she is awaiting the results of studies and public hearings on the proposal before making up her mind. She said she has grave reservations about locating the prison outside the city fimilis where residents have his recourse to vote for or against the city officials who take the action.

Morris criticized the city commission for buying the property. I am more concerned about the \$3.5 million the city spent for land without being sure that it can be used," he said. The city bought the property as a site to dispose of treated wastewater that cannot be disposed of on public and private property in Sanford.

• EMPTY BUILDINGS DOWNTOWN - Smith said attracting people to the downtown commercial area is part of a larger picture. Downtown business will be improved "by beautifying the city and making Sanford a nice place to live," she

Morris said "We need a population base to improve downtown business. We also need an attraction there to draw people and better marketing by downtown merchants.

• YOUTH RECREATION -Smith supported current plans to decide on a site for a youth recreation center and investigated financing to build it...

Morris did not comment. except to agree with a statement by District I commissioner candidate. Jay Malone that scaltered supervised sites are needed throughout the city, but the cost of such a program must be investigated.

• MONROE HARBOR RAMP FEE - Smith said "Someone has to pay for the upkeep of the rampe, either Sanford citizens through taxes, or outside users." She added that the ramp fee was approved as an experiment, and could be modified.

Morris said the \$5 fee to launch a boat is unreasonable. He said Sanford should get its share of boat license fees collected by the county to halp pay for the ramp upkeep.

PARAMEDICS - Morris said the present EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) system should be upgraded but did not address whether the city should create a paramedic system in the fire department. Smith did not comment on the question.

#### Death toll in floods climbs to 10

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia - Monacon rains pelted eastern Malaysia for a fifth day Tuesday, claiming four more lives and flooding thousands of homes, while an armada of helicopters set out in search of stranded villagers. The discoveries of the four latest victims, all of them children, raised to 10 the death toll from five days of torrential rains and high winds. Two of the dead were a young brother and sister whose bodies were found in a storm drain, and the other two were brothers who were swept away by strong currents while playing in a canal in flood-ravaged Kelantan state.

Authorities said at least 35,000 people were forced to flee their homes because of flooding, and even the Kota Bahru Hospital, the major medical facility in Kelantan, was surrounded by water, hampering efforts to treat the injured.

With more rain predicted through Wednesday, officials feared the number of dead and missing would continue to rise.

#### Thailand to sign Chinese weapons deal

BANGKOK. Thailand - In a move condemned by Vietnam. the Thai army's commander in chief departed Tuesday for a weeklong visit to China, where he is expected to sign an arms deal for \$300 million worth of Chinese weapons.

Gen. Chavalit Yongchaiyudh was scheduled to sign an agreement Wednesday for the purchase of 30 T-69 tanks and 800 armored personnel carriers, a member of Chavalit's delegation said.

Also in the 11-member Thai delegation is navy commander Adm. Prapet Krisanachant, who is to inspect four frigates the That navy bought for \$12 million last July. Prapat also is expected to discuss the purchase of submarines designed for operations in shallow waters, such as the Gulf of Thailand.

Official Vietnamese media had condemned improved cooperation between the Thai and Chinese militaries. China and Vietnam frequently clash on their common border and Beijing arms Cambodian guerrillas fighting the Hanoi-installed regime in Phnom Penh. The rebels often operate from bases in Thailand.

#### Vote to come on Baltic reforms

MOSCOW - The Communist Party daily Pravda accused Lithuanian nationalists today of trying to bully local legislators into opposing Kremlin-backed changes to the Soviet constitu-

The accusation, similar to those made last week against nationalists in the neighboring Baltic republic of Estonia, came as the third Baltic republic, Latvia, prepared to vote on the proposed changes. The amendments would, among other things, rescind the republics' symbolic right to secede. Pravda said leaders of the Popular Front for Perestroiks in

Lithuania had started "exerting pressure on deputies" of the regional parliament, which voted last week not to take a stand on the proposed amendments when the issue is raised at a Nov. 29 meeting of the Surpeme Soviet, or national parliament.

Pravda said pressure by nationalists had prompted the Lithuanian Communist Party First Secretary Nikolas Bazaukas to appeal for calm in a recent television address.

#### OPEC trying to forge Iran-Irag agreement

VIENNA - OPEC ministers held intense negotiations in their effort to reach a compromise between Iran and Iraq over oil production quotas for the two archenemies at the cartel's year-end ministerial gathering.

Despite little progress Monday, oil prices stabilized on world markets as traders around the world awaited the enterme of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' crucial talks on reducing the cartel's runaway production.

West Texas Intermediate - the benchmark U.S. crude gained 7 cents to close at \$12.98 a barrel Monday on the New York Mercantile Exchange, while oil prices posted sharp advances in European trading.

Analysis said the gains reflected traders' renewed optimism that the 13 OPEC ministers will manage to put together an

agreement to cut back output. OPEC's widely diaregarded official production ceiling is 17.4 million barrels a day. While worldwide demand for the cartel's oil is estimated at 19 million barrels a day, its output has

climbed to more than 22 million barrels a day. Analysts warned that if no agreement is reached, prices could fall below \$10 a barrel, providing a temporary windfall for motorists in the United States and other Western nations.

#### Former president to apologize

SEOUL. South Korea - Disgraced former president Chun Doo Hwan prepared today to humble himself on nationwide television, reportedly agreeing to apologize for abuses of power and corruption, abandon his Seoul home and live in internal exile.

Aides to the former general who took power in a military coup said Chun would break months of stience Wednesday and the state-run Korea Broadcasting System said it was planning to broadcast a speech by Chun at 10 a.m. (8 p.m. EST Tuesday).

The exact content of his speech was unknown, but aides sketched a plan whereby Chun would apologize for abuses of power and corruption, call for an impartial investigation of his assets, return his Seoul house to the state and accept internal exile.

The speech would mark a stunning fall for Chun who, in exactly eight months, went from a president with nearly absolute power to a man abandoned by his political allies. dogged by his formerly banned opponents and trammeled by the pace of democratic reform.

Chun was the first president in South Korea's 40-year history to voluntarily step down. The others have been forced from power through military coup or civilian uprising. One, Park Chung Hee, was assaustnated in 1979 by his chief of intelligence.

#### China, Arco to develop major gas project

BELJING - After years of negotiation, China and the U.S. oil company Arco have reached an agreement in principle on developing a major natural gas field in the South China Sea. officials said Tuesday.

The agreement, between the China National Offshore Oil Co. and Atlantic Richfield Co. of Los Angeles, is expected to be signed on Wednesday, spokesmen for both companies said.

The accord will open development of the Yacheng 13-1 gas field in the Yinggehal Basin, south of China's Hainan Island in the South China Sea. The field has reserves of at least 100 billion cubic meters.

Arco China Inc., the China subsidiary of Arco, discovered the gas field in 1983, but negotiations on developing it have been held up for years by disagreements over pricing and on how the gas is to be marketed.

A spokesman for Arco China's Beijing office said details of the agreement would be released in Los Angeles after the signing and declined further comment.

Arco holds a 34 percent interest in the project, with another 15 percent held by the Kuwait Foreign Petroleum Exploration

A CNOOC spokesman. Wu Xunduo, told the official China Daily newspaper that gas is to begin flowing from the field in 1993 with an annual output of 3.25 billion cubic meters. Maximum daily output is to reach 500 million cubic meters.

# Conservatives win in Canada

OTTAWA - Prime Minister Brian Mulroney scored a convincing win for his Progressive Conservative Party and the U.S.-Canada free-trade agree-ment, even though the election results showed a majority of Canadians still oppose the trade

pact.
With all districts reporting unofficial results, the Conservatives captured 169 of 295 seats in the House of Commons. enough for a majority and quick approval of the agreement when Parliament reconvenes in three weeks. The anti-free trade Liberal Party garnered 81 seats and the socialist New Democratic Party won 45 seats.

But the popular vote in an election that was a virtual referendum on the trade agreement indicated that most Canadians are still opposed to it. The Conservatives garnered just 43 percent of the popular votc. compared to 32 percent for the Liberals, 20 percent for the New Democrats and 5 percent for other parties.

Despite the opposition to free trade with the United States, the Liberals and New Democrata promised not to obstruct the agreement in Parliament.

Mulioney, 49, told supporters in his home district of Bale Comeau on the north shore of the St. Lawrence River that Canadians had expressed a clear desire for "the road they wish to follow" and he would proceed quickly to implement the trade had already assured the prime sovereign."

Business pleased by free-trade assurances

TORONTO - Canadian business hailed the re-election of a majority Conservative government as a guarantee that the U.S.-Canada free-trade pact will be implemented to secure the vast American market for Canadian exports.

"What this does for the country is give us more security to our major market." Roger Hamel, president of the Canadian Chamber of Com-merce, said of Monday's election results. "This means that our members, Canadian businesses across the country. can plan for future development."

Hamel, whose group represents 170,000 businesses. said the business community

hod feared the trade deal would be lost had Prime Minister Brian Mulroney's Conservatives won only a minority government. Canada's two opposition parties opposed the deal and would have killed it under that aconstin.

"It's a chapter in Canada's history that has a happy ending." Hamel said. "Free trade means a much stronger economy that should benefit all Canadians. We're just breathing a sign of relief."

Stephen Lewis, Canada's former ambassador to the United Nations and once a provincial socialist politician, cited millions of dollars that business interests pumped into the campaign to back the trade deal through advertisements.

The Liberals captured 20 of 32 seats in the four Atlantic provinces and held the Conpervatives to 12. But they could not stop the huge Conservative organization from claiming a majority of seats in Quebec and Ontario.

Liberal Party senior campaign aide Patrick Gossage acknowledged that the anti-free-trade sentiment stoked by Liberal leader John Turner had not been enough to push the party over the top.

"The fears the Liberals saw in the campaign about closer ties to the United States are not felt by the majority of Quebeckers or the rest of the country," Gossage

JERUSALEM - Israel's 12th parliament met for the first time in a tumultuous session that saw nearly two dozen members walk out because the presiding speaker advocates the forcible "transfer" of Arab residents in the occupied territories.

As the first session of the parliament, or Knesset, got under way Monday, several hundred protesters demonstrated outside against a coalition of right-wing and religious parties likely to form the next government.

Nearly two dozen members of the newly elected Knesset staged a brief walkout during a lengthy speech by the presiding speaker, Yair Springak, Springak is a member of the ultra right-wing Moledet party, which advocates forcibly removing, or "transferring." Araba from the West

Bank and Gaza Strip. Later, 15 Knesset members, most from

left-wing and communist parties, refused to be sworn in by Sprinzak.

"I don't want to be sworn in before someone who wants to throw me out of the country," shouted Mohammed Miari, an Arab laraeli representing the Progressive List for Peace party.

As each of the 15 members challenged Sprinzak, the parliament erupted into catcalls and shouts

To each member that denounced him, Springak calmly responded. "You did not swear in." According to custom, the oldest member of the Knesset presides over the opening session. Later, Likud member Dov Shilansky was elected permanent speaker of the Knesset.

At one point, the chamber nearly dissolved into chaos when sergeants at arms mistakenie thought they had been ordered to eject Cilizens Rights Movement member Your Sarid. The Knesset clerk called them off as they surrounded the left-wing politi-

Throughout the stormy swearing in ceremony, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, head of the Likud Party, and Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, the Labor Party leader, sat quietly side by side Likud narrowly defeated Labor in the Nov. 1 elections. winning 40 Knesset seats to Labor a 39.

After the session. Peres raid Labor leaders would decide soon whether to join a coalition with Likud Peres, who sounded pessimistic about the prospect of a coalition. said he would not join a government that failed to include an international peace conference in its peace plan.

Although debate in the 120-member Knesset is often bitterly partisan and raucous, the shouting match during the opening session, attended by dignituries and diplomats, shocked some members "You have mocked the Knesset."

Treasury Minister Moshe Nissim yelled at his colleagues.

#### Bhutto gets chance at coalition

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan -President Ghulam Ishaq Khan told a Cabinet meeting today that opposition leader Benazir Bhutto "should be given the first chance" to form the next gov-

ernment, official sources said. Four sentor government sources speaking in separate interviews said Ishaq Khan confirmed before the Cabinet Bhutto's claim to have enough support from independents and small parties to command a

National Assembly majority. Bhutto's opposition Pakistan People's Party gained the largest number of National Assembly scats in Nov. 16 general elections but failed to secure an absolute majority.

The president is to appoint a prime minister from whichever party he believes can command a majority in the lower house of Parliament.


The sources said Ishaq Khan expressed the opinion that although various combinations of coalitions were possible to form a government. Bhutto must be asked before any other political leader to try and put together the next administration.

"Bhutto should be given the first chance to form a government," one source quoted the president as saying.

Bhutto maintains she has enough support from independents in the assembly to form a government.

Justice Minister Wasseem Saflad announced Sunday that lshaq Khan would meet separately with Bhutto, government-backed Islamic Democratic Alliance leader Nawaz Sharif and the leaders of other major parties starting Tuesday "to discuss matters relating to the formation of a government."

Despite results from weekend provincial elections that showed her trailing the government alliance in three of four provinces. Bhutto appeared confident the president would ask her to form a government and make her the first woman prime minister of a Moslem nation

#### Garcia, wife charged in Wedtech scandal

NEW YORK - Rep. Robert Garcia, D-N.Y., the second Bronx congressman implicated in the Wedtech scandal, said his long-expected conspiracy indictment in the case means "this period of trial by grand jury leak is finally over."

Garcia, 55, was indicted just three days after former Rep. Mario Biaggi was sentenced to eight years in prison for taking bribes from Wedtech, Biaggi, a Bronx Democrat, resigned from Congress after his August conviction in the case.

Garcia, his wife, Jane Lee, 48, and Ralph Vallone, 42, a lawyer from Santurce, Puerto Rico, were charged with conspiracy to obtain some \$181,100 in cash and loans as well

as jewelry from Wedtech. The indictment handed up in U.S. District Court in Maniattan accuses them of trying to hide the payments, which were allegedly designed to buy Garcia's influence, through a variety of runes.

#### Witness: LaRouche never repaid loan

Sexton, the government's first witness in the fraud and conspiracy trial, said she loaned the \$100,000 to the Caucus Distributors Inc. after LaRouche fund-raiser Joyce Rubinstein. a co-defendant, told her the money was safer with the group

The witness testified that she admired LaRouche for his anti-drug stand and that she also was prompted to loan CDI the money because she was promised an annual interest of 17.5 percent, compounded quarterly.

#### 'Wanted' posters for the whales

ANCHORAGE. Alaska - Curtous scientists who helped rescue a pair of gray whales trapped by arctic ice are sending out "Wanted" posters of the giant mammals in hopes of finding out if they make it to sunny California.

The photos are being sent to the companies that operate popular cruises along the Pacific Coast in which tourists pay for the opportunity to watch migrating whales swimming down the coast toward their Mexican breeding grounds.

With the help of the photos, the marine biologists hope tour operators will apot the whales and report their whereabouts. The whales - nicknamed Siku and Poutu - are identifiable by their battered shouts, which were cut by the jagged ice as they struggled to breathe through small holes in the frozen sea off

The whales were international front-page news for three weeks, but when they were finally able to swim free on Oct. 28. they disappeared from human view.

Now the scientists who labored with local Eakimos. Russian satiors, the National Guard, oil companies and Greenpeace environmentalists in a massive rescue effort that cost an estimated \$1 million want to know if the whales are OK.

## Jockeying begins in 1989 race for mayor of Chicago

CHICAGO - Jockeying for position in the race for mayor of the nation's third largest city was underway today, following an Illinois Supreme Court order for a special election in 1989 to All the unexpired term of the late Mayor Harold Washington, the city's first black mayor.

The decision was met with enthusiasm by the five announced candidates, and Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley, who is expected to enter the race in two weeks. Daley's father, Richard J. Daley, served 21 years as mayor until his death in 1976.

The court upheld a Cook County circuit judge's ruling that special elections should be held in 1989 to fill the term of Washington, who died of a heart attack last November - with 41 months left in his term of office.

"The Election Code not only provides for the date of an election, but also which officials are to be elected, especially for the position of mayor of the city of Chicago," Justice Joseph Cunningham wrote.

The justices also said state law guarantees the voters' right to cicci a mayor whenever the unexpired term exceeds 28

Observers expect the election to be the most racially divisive political contests of the year. Race issues have dominated the last two mayoral elections, and pressure has mounted for months for the black community to agree on a single. "unity candidate," a role Washington assumed in his successful campaigns in 1983 and 1987.

Acting Mayor Eugene Sawyer. also expected to seek a full term. had fought for an election in 1991 instead of 1988, but said he would "hit the ground running today."

Sawyer, who had been hoping to finish Washington's term so he could build a stronger political base, said he would immediately mount an "aggressive" campaign. He already has collected \$3 million in campaign

Sawyer was elected mayor during a marathon City Council meeting, a week after Washington's death, with the help of a group of white, anti-Washington aldermen. However, he is regarded by many as an ineffective leader and polls show

him to be an early underdog. Alderman Tim Evans - a chief rival of Sawyer's whose campaign was instrumental in financing the "let the people decide buit" calling for a 1989 election - termed the ruling a great victory for all of the citizens of the city of Chicago."

The four other announced candidates, three white and one black, also were overjoyed with the decision.

"It's great news," said Alderman Lawrence Bloom, one of the announced white candidates for the post. "It's good for the people. The public would not have understood a court decision that said 29 members of the City Council could elect their mayor for three years. I'm glad the court both read the law correctly and understood the intent of the legislation."

"We're very pleased," said Danny Davis, also an alderman. 'It came as we expected."

# Judge prods White House

WASHINGTON - If the White House is afraid former aide Oliver North may reveal government secrets at his conspiracy trial, it should take preventive action soon, says the judge hearing the Iran-Contra case.






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

WASHINGTON - The season for giving is fast approaching and watchdog groups, concerned about the health of children, are warning adults that some toys could burt youngsters.

As the Consumer Product Safety Commission prepared to release its annual list of recalled and dangerous toys, the group Americans for Democratic Action was alcady sounding an alarm.

Monday, ADA charged that baby walkers, crtb gyms and inflatable sleds top the list of Christmas toys that pose dangers to children.

In its report of "hot" toys by major American companies, the ADA's Consumer Affairs Committee said it "is sad to report that dangerous and potentially dangerous toys are more availThe ADA is a liberal organiza-

tion whose consumer committee has surveyed the best and worst. toys for the last 17 Christmas seasons. Committee members. led by Chairwoman Ann Brown. displayed their 1988 selections at a news conference Monday and then tossed them into either a "Trash Box" or a "Toy Box."

Baby walkers, cloth seats on a frame with wheels that help babies learn to walk, were deemed dangerous. Brown said. because serious injuries increased from 15.623 children in 1984 to 20,790 in 1987.

Crib gyms, toys on a cord tied across a crib, caused 674 reported injuries since 1984, the ADA committee reported.

Manufacturers voluntarily place warning labels on packages advising removal from the crib when a baby can pull up to hands and knees. However,

warnings "Crib Gym" by Blue Box Toys and the French made "Baby Toy" by Educatus. Other "Trash Box" toys Included Army Ants by Hasbro.

# Customs war erupts in Eastern Europe

WARSAW, Poland - A customs war has broken out among the supposedly fraternal nations of Eastern Europe. sparked by consumer-goods shortages that are prompting shoppers to raid storehouses across the border.

Poland turned up the heat Monday in the week-old feud by demanding that Czechoslovakia halt practices that are causing long delays for Polish travelers at the border.

On Nov. 15, Czechoslovakia which until recently enjoyed one of the widest ranges of consumer goods in the Soviet bloc imposed new customs rules to protect such products as tea and coffee, meat products, spices and footwear from export by consumer goods-hungry travelers.

The result was delays of up to five hours for train and autopassengers on the Polish-Czech border and confiscation of tonsof goods.

The phenomena has threat-

ened to spread to East Germany, which hinted in its official newsmedia it may begin strict enforcement of its own customs laws, which its says are even tougher tha Czechoslovakia's.

Czechoslovak Chief Counsel Peter Hlavacek was summoned to the Polish Foreign Ministry Monday and asked to explain the incomprehensible practices. of the Czechoslovak customs service with regard to Polish citizens," Foreign Ministry spokesman Stefan Staniszewski said.

"At the same time a demand was made for an organization of customs controls by the Czechoslovak side that would not cause such hardships for Polish citizens," Staniszewski

Polish authorities noted, however, that no retaliatory customs regulations have been issued.

The Polish train Silesia, which travels from Prague to Warsaw, has been routinely delayed for

more than five hours. "It's prohibited to take out

almost anything," Polish television reported Monday over film of a warehouse full of confiscated goods. "But still, quite a number of Poles hope they can succeed somehow.

Czechoslovak television reported that items confiscated at the border town of Petrovice included 90 packages of cocoa from one traveler and crates of bananas and apples from others.

On Friday, East German newspapers printed articles detailing customs restrictions on an extensive list of goods in that country, ranging from raisins and curtains to topographic

The East German rules were announced in the 1960s and 1970s but had not been enforced. The newspaper articles were seen as a warning, mainly to Czechoslovaks who come to East Germany for shoes and foodstuffs. For years. Czechoslovaks enjoyed one of the widest ranges of consumer goods in the Soviet bloc, rivaled

only by Hungary.


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
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
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
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#### Israel accuses Egypt of violating Camp David accords

JERUSALEM — Israel Monday accused Egypt of violating the spirit of the Camp David accords by recognizing the proclaimed Palestinian state: while PLO chief Yasser Arafat conferred with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak on the next Arab move in the wake of the declaration.

Egypt, the only Arab nation to make peace with Israel. Sunday joined some three dozencountries in formally recognizing the independent state in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip declared by the Palestine National Council, or parliament-in-exile, in Algiers Nov-

The independence declaration, rejected by Israel and the United States, came amid a raging Palestinian uprising against Israen occupation. and after Jordan severed its ties with the West

Israeli soldiers shot and wounded at least six Palestinians in scattered clashes Monday in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Palestinian sources said. The Israeli army confirmed an 8-year-old boy was shot in the back at the U.N. run Jabalia. refugee camp in the Gaza Strip.

Foreign Minister Shimon Peres summoned Egyptian Ambassador Mohammed Bassiouny and told him Egypt's action "is not consistent with the principle of a negotiated settlement of the dispute to which both Egypt and Israel are committed," the Foreign Ministry said.

The moderately worded statement, which did not mention the Camp David Accords but pointed to the principles set down in the 1978. agreements, also said that Peres "expressed regret at the Egyptian move."

The Camp David Accords, a prelude to the 1979 Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty, called for negotiations, not unilateral action, to determine the status of the territories seized during the 1967 Arab-Israeli war.

A Foreign Ministry source said the Cabinet would meet Wednesday to decide what, if any, action Israel would take in response to Egypt's decision.

WASHINGTON - Before competing in his first game for Georgetown. Alonzo Mourning was evoking memories of the player mainly responsible for leading the Hoyas into college basketball's elite.

Mourning, a 6-foot-10, 235pound dynamo from Chesapeake, Va., is drawing comparisons to Patrick Ewing. who led the Hoyas to the 1984 national championship and appearances in the title game in three of his four seasons.

Playing against meny prominent college upperclassmen. Mourning excelled in the U.S. Olympic trials and was the last cut from the U.S. team coached by John Thompson, his coach at Georgetown. The experience practicing against the likes of David Robinson, J.R. Reid and Danny Manning during the trials gives Mourning ample preparation for the rigors of the Big East schedule.

"It definitely cannot hurt him and it defintely cannot hurt us because he's had some experience with the system. Thompson said of Mourning's Olympic trials practice. "I think it gave me a better insight of him and him a better insight of me.

# Alabama State-Tuskegee to renew rivalry

MONTGOMERY, Ala - Businessman Sam Cook last year asked Alabama's governor to fire Alabama State and Tuskegee university trustees because they had cancelled the oldest black college lootball fivalry for the account year in a row

Gov. Guy Hunt declined, but Cook's point must have been made because the Alabama State-Tuskegee University game is once again scheduled as the Turkey Day Classic Thursday in Cramton Bowl, and Cook couldn't be happier.

'lt's a big game," Cook, 53, an Alabama State University alumnus, said Monday. "That's why I spent \$700 to give tickets to people to go to the game."

The matchup between the two predominantly black schools has been ASU's traditional homecoming game for 60 years. But because of a dispute, Alabama State played Clarke College in 1986 and Johnson C. Smith University last year.

ASU always received 65 percent of the gate receipts. But two years ago when the schools couldn't agree to a 50-50 split, they didn't play. Last year, the two school presidents recommended the split, but the ASU board turned them down.

Cook then took a letter to Hunt demanding that he fire the trustees of both schools because of their inability to agree to play the game that "has not only local interest but also national interest."

Cook was so mad that he called for a boycott of the replacement game between ASU and Johnson C. Smith. He said the low

turnout of 14,000 fewer fans than the 25,000-seat stadium holds was the result of his call for a boycott, although ASU officials

ASU and Tuskegee, just an hour down the interstate from Montgomery, should have played no matter what the payoff, Cook

"Ten percent of anything is much greater than 100 percent of nothing," he said last week. "And that's what they got last year -

The trustees this year agreed to a two-year contract, but terms weren't disclosed, said

ASU spokesman John Knight. "I think everybody involved is happy that

this game is renewed and the contractual differences have been straightened out." Knight said. "The contract will be beneficial to both schools.

Cook gave ASU business services director Clarence A. Wilson Jr. \$700 to buy tickets for poor children in Montgomery who ordinarily wouldn't have a chance to see the

"I'm happy," Cook said. Tuskegee, 3-5, holds a 36-22-3 series edge against ASU, 6-3.

A homecoming parade with up to 30 floats and bands precede the game, scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. CST. The game will be televised on a delayed basis Saturday by Black Entertainment Television, Knight

#### MISSOURI COACH RESIGNS

COLUMBIA. Mo. - University of Missouri football coach Woody Widenhofer resigned Monday two days after the Tigers ended the season with a 3-7-1 record.

Athletic Director Dick Tamburo met Sunday with the coach and said Widenhofer wanted to quit.

'He was most concerned about the players and the university." Tamburo said at a news conference. "You can tell what a first-class guy he is when he's thinking like that."

Tamburo declined to say whether he would have asked for Widenhofer's resigna-

"In our conversation, that's what he wanted to do," Tamburo said.

The Tigers went 12-31-1 in four years under Widenhofer. It was the lowest fouryear winning percentage (.284) since Frank Carideo went 2-23-2 (111) in the early 1930s.

"I want to thank my football team and coaches for hanging in there," said Widenhofer, who declined to answer questions after a brief statement. "It's been a rough week, and they worked really hard. I've made friends from Missouri that I'll have for the rest of my life. I'll always be a Missouri Tiger."

Widenhofer, 45, was under fire all year. He promised good results and spoke of bowl appearances. Missouri has gone five seasons without a bowl invitation, the longest postseason drought since the 1950s, when it was a football power.

But the Tigers did not beat any of their seven bowl-bound foes - tying Indiana 28-28. This season, Missouri defeated Utah State, Kansas State and Kansas, teams with a combined 5-28 record.

Other members of the Tigers on the team are: sophomore running back Stacy Danley, senior defensive linemen Tracy Rocker, Benji Roland and Ron Stallworth, senior offensive lineman Jim Thompson and senior punter Brian Shulman.

In addition, Auburn's Pat Dve. the league's most successful coach the past half dozen years. was named SEC Coach of the Year. His team is favored to beat Alabama Friday to wind up 10-1 and SEC co-champion with Louisiana State, sending the Tigers to New Orleans to defend their Sugar Bowl crown.

The SEC Offensive Player of the Year was junior running

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had bypass surgery a year ago. I was sent home with 10 different pills to take. I was sick all the time and the doctors have changed some of the medicine, I was admitted back into the hospital because of constipation and was told I had diverticulosis or maybe appendicitis. I was given conflicting advice in regard to surgery, I now go 14 days between bowel movements. have no appetite and am losing weight. Why would a heart problem make me constiputed?

DEAR READER: I'll bet you the bottle cap from your milk of magnesia that you are conatipated because of the medicine taking

When my patients return to my care after having had coronary bypass surgery. I am usually astounded by the amount of medicine they are taking In medical parlance, this is called "poly-pharmacy." It usually takes several weeks for me to sort things out. However, when the patients and I cooperate, fam usually successful.

Unquestionably, some drugs are beneficial and necessary, but too many medications produce a variety of uncomfortable side effects, of which extreme constipation is one of the most

First of all, you need to be under the care of a physician who is going to be on your side and who will resist intimidation by medical center specialists. Each drug you are taking needs to be scrupulously analyzed from the standpoint of necessity and side effects.

Then, your doctor, in conjunction with the specialists, can begin the process of cutting back

Of course, each patient's situation is unique: therefore. I cannot give specific advice about your case without knowing more


