Senior Civic Organizations—First place, Anna Miller Circle; second, Lake Mary Woman's Club; honorable mention, City of Longwood.

Junior Civic Organizations—First place, N. Orlando 4-H; second, Seminole T.M. in g Assn. (Only two entries).

Religious Floats—First place, St. Luke's P.T.L.; second, First Methodist Church MYF; honorable mention, Girl's Auxiliary of the Elder Springs Baptist Church.

Large School Floats—First place, Lake Monroe PTO; second, Lake Mary School; honorable mention, Westside Grammar School.

Small School Floats—First place, Southside School; second, Altamonte Springs Elementary and Midway Student Council.

Jaycee Parade Chairman Bob O'Neill and all the members of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees took an active part in the parade, selling balloons and peanuts, serving as parade marshals and keeping things running smoothly all along the long parade route.

Neil Phillips Given Air Force Honor

Airman 1/C Neil C. Phillips of Sanford has been awarded the Airman's Medal, one of the highest awards given during peacetime, for "outstanding courage."

Phillips son of Mr. and Mrs. Neil C. Phillips Sr. of Sanford, is stationed with the Tactical Air Command's 15th Field Maintenance Squadron at MacDill AFB. He was presented with the medal by Col. George L. Jones, commander of the 15th Tactical Fighter Wing in a special ceremony at Tampa.

The citation notes that Phillips distinguished himself by voluntary risk of his life June 3, 1961, while stationed at Goose Bay Air Base, Labrador.

Phillips was engaged in recovering an L29 aircraft after its forced landing on the Kenama River. The mooring ropes had been torn loose and the aircraft was drifting on the flood-swollen river.

Although instructed to abandon the aircraft and escape by an available rubber raft, Phillips, with disregard for his own safety, elected to stay aboard and attempt to save the aircraft from destruction in the rapids downstream.

He guided the aircraft for two miles through a series of rapids, then paddled it to shore without further damage.

Big Storm Eases Off East Coast

MIAMI (UPI) — A fierce storm moved farther into the Atlantic today and chilly tourists along the Florida Gold Coast hopefully began shucking coats.

"Temperatures probably will go up into the 70s in southern Florida today," said the Miami Weather Bureau, "and unless the storm changes direction, the seas will subside some."

Gale warnings which had been in effect from Daytona Beach north were taken down, but small craft warnings remained in effect for rough seas the length of the Florida coast.

White-capped waves and high tides made Florida coastal highway A1A impassable in some spots Wednesday, and dumped water and sand into front yards and cabanas of plush resort hotels.

The storm also sent temperatures plunging into the unseasonably low 40s all along the east coast.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida legislators flew to Miami today for a big weekend party after winding up a futile 30-day special session on reapportionment.

The Legislature's dismal failure "voted the reapportionment bill back to a three-judge federal court in Miami. The court is expected to set an early hearing."

Gov. Bryant said today he would not call the legislature back on reapportionment unless he was convinced it could accomplish something "and right now, I don't see any great possibility of that."

Bryant said he will be in Miami this weekend and will contact the leadership to see what the prospects might be for another try at the knotty problem.

"I would do anything honorable to effect a solution to this dilemma," he said.

The Legislature could call itself into session under a self-starter provision of the Constitution, but a number of key members, including Senate President Wilson Carraway, doubted if the problem ever can be solved by the lawmakers.

House Speaker Mallory Horne, however, said a "cooling off" period might ease some of the bitterness and give the legislators a new outlook.

He said he will ask the federal court, which threw out Florida's present apportionment and ordered a reshuffle to give more representation to the urban areas, to allow him to argue the Legislature's side of the problem when the hearing date is set.

He said he would like to appear as a "friend of the court" to tell of the problems that would be presented by a House enlarged substantially beyond the present 30 members.

He said he will also tell the court he has the necessary 27 signatures of legislators to start a poll of members to see if they want to come back early next year and try again.

The session ended on a bitter note, with the House blaming the Senate for the failure and the Senate calling the House stubborn.

Most legislators expect the court to reapportion the Legislature and used this warning as a major argument in urging a compromise.

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope John XXIII, confined to bed with illness for the first time in his four-year reign, spent a "very tranquil" night and was "much better" this morning, high Vatican sources said today. The nature of the 81-year-old Pope's illness was not clear.

There must be a main artery of traffic running right through Sanford if the community is to survive, John Krider, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, told Kiwanians Wednesday.

"Are we going to sit here without one little piece of major highway?" he asked, and went on to warn that "Hwy. 17-92 will be reduced to a strictly local highway unless something is done."

The "something" to be done is the proposed causeway across Lake Monroe, from the foot of French Ave. through Enterprise and past the new Deltona development being built by the Mackle Interstate.

Nothing is being done to only lower the value of property on Hwy. 17-92, by what he estimated could be "as much as \$10 million."

"No plans now under consideration by the State Road Dept. take in four-laning any further than the Lake Monroe bridge," Krider said, emphasizing that "now is the time to ask for what we want."

"We must do everything and anything we can do to preserve traffic through the city. Local shopping and retail sales stores need the boost and the requirements of any industry demand that good traffic arteries be maintained or bringing in of supplies," he said.

In the line of scenic attraction, Krider mentioned that "there's nothing to see on a super-highway, but people will drive for miles to go over a causeway."

He also explained that the Chamber of Commerce had proposed the pumping of two 50 acre recreation parks along the causeway.

Krider said that the causeway would be strictly a state-federal deal and would not involve county road funds.

He commended former state senator Douglas Stenstrom for Stenstrom's recent remarks concerning the four-laning of east-west highway to the Cape and said that Stenstrom had "done more to unify the county than anyone else in the last few years."

Traffic Artery Called Key To City's Future

Dr. Leonard Munson, a member of the Kiwanis Club who has offices in DeBary, and who was present at the meeting took exception to Krider's proposal for the causeway saying:

"The people in DeBary are opposed to the building of this causeway. They feel that they will be by-passed, and they are upset about it."

Krider replied that he and Munson must have been talking to different people as he (Krider) had the feeling that the people of DeBary would like to see it as a retirement city and get rid of the heavy truck traffic.

Causeway Brings DeBary Protest

Many DeBary residents fear that a proposed Lake Monroe causeway might by-pass their town and they are opposed to such a causeway, Tom Armae, head of the DeBary Chamber of Commerce, said Wednesday.

"The residents of DeBary are definitely opposed to the proposition that a causeway be built across Lake Monroe to tie into a new road just south of Orange City."

"We feel that routing the road past DeBary would be detrimental to both business and residential property as it would devalue the land."

"As a counter-proposal to the causeway, we feel that the best interests of both communities can best be served by four-laning the present route and beautifying the lakefront."

Armae said that the DeBary Chamber of Commerce has about 200 active members and Armae said that the Civic Community organization, which has about 600 members, "is lined up 100 percent with us against this causeway."

Mayor Awaits Word On Power

North Orlando Mayor Frank Fasula said this morning that he would make no comment until after next Tuesday night's Village Council meeting concerning the fact that street lights and current to the Community Building were turned off last Friday by Florida Power Corp.

He did say, however, that he assumed the company's action resulted from lack of payment by the village on the more than \$2,000 power bill which has accumulated since all village business was turned over some time ago to the council by the North Orlando Co.

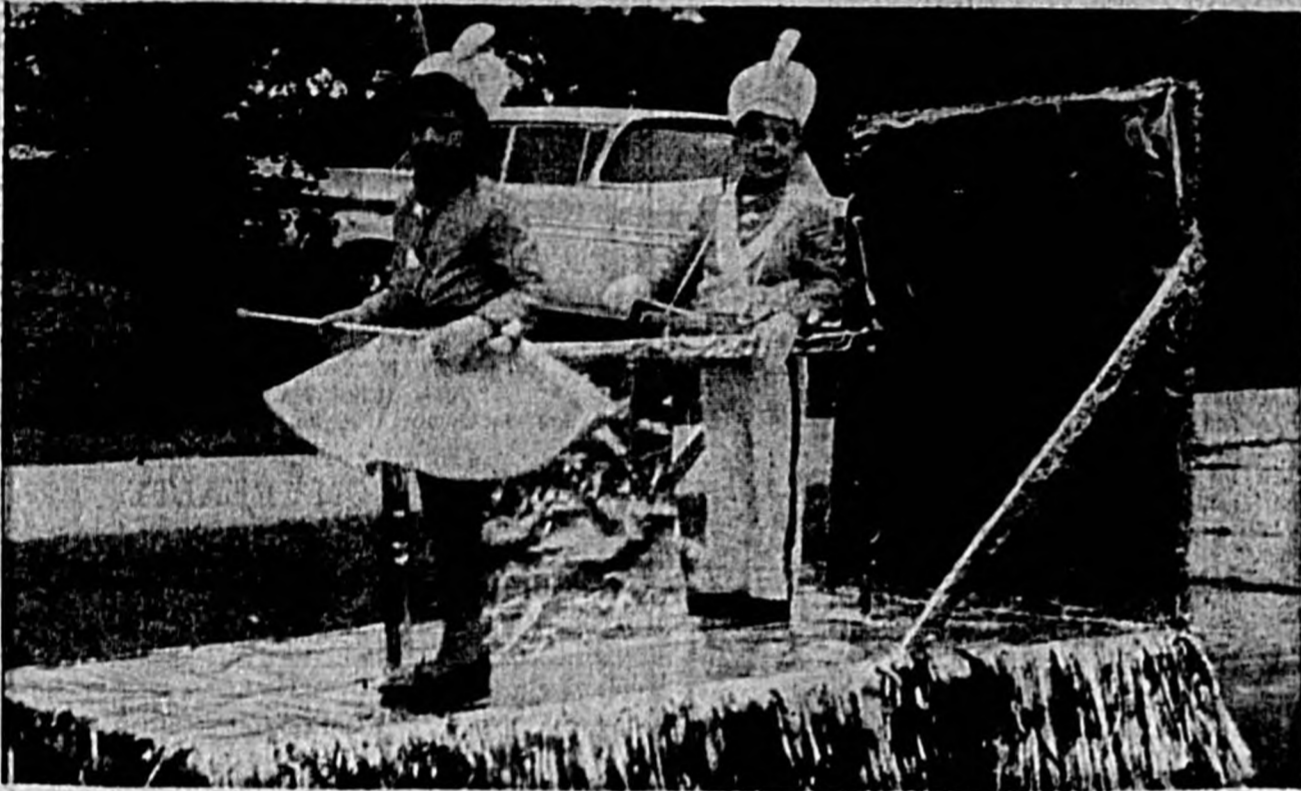

Atomic Energy Finding Uses In Police, Revenue Work

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atomic energy is now solving murder mysteries.
 It also is putting the finger on mislabeled brandies and exposing the origin of contraband opium.
 Examples of how radioactive atoms can help the police, not to mention the Internal Revenue Service and the Bureau of Narcotics, were presented at the annual meeting of the American Nuclear Society.
 The Atomic Energy Commission and a number of private companies, including General Dynamics Corp. of San Diego and Technical Measurement Corp. of North Haven, Conn., are developing means of identifying criminals by means of tell-tale radiations.
 One of the new tools is called neutron activation analysis. It can identify bits of evidence thousands of times too tiny for detection by any other method.
 According to General Dynamics, the FBI and many police laboratories are interested in the new identifica-

tion system. The Internal Revenue Service and Narcotics Bureau already are using other atomic sleuths in their work.
 Material to be analyzed is placed in an atomic reactor and subjected to high-intensity bombardment by neutrons. This makes it radioac-

tive, and the rays emitted tell the scientist what the material is.
 Gun powder residues from the hand of a person who has recently fired a pistol are easily detected by this method. General Dynamics said traces of gun powder as small as 10 billionths of a

gram "have been exposed, identified, and measured" this way.
 The Technical Measurement Corp. said bits of dust almost vanishingly small can be identified as having come from a room where a murder was committed.

"Preparation is prime factor in cow's adjustment to hot weather, says USDA scientist." That was the headline heralding the work of J. E. Wiley, a dairy husbandman of the Agricultural Research Service, who has been studying the perspiration traits of cattle. "Evaporation of water from the skin of cattle through sweating is the most important way these animals dissipate heat from their bodies," Wiley reported. "Cows differ widely in their ability to sweat, he added, and the more they perspire the better they adjust to constant high temperatures. The next step in the research is to determine whether sweating is hereditary, but I strongly suspect that is only a 'cover' story." "Fertility. Otherwise, the farmer's plant would produce no harvest." It now appears that fertility research genes have been discovered. The hope is that this will make it possible for sterile plants to recover their own fertility, and thus increase the yield. Indeed, it is wise to see that 8th grade graduates also receive this very useful gift, for it will help boost their school marks all during high school and thus be good insurance that they can get into college. A rebuilt typewriter can be purchased at about half price, which means less than \$100. And many business men trade in their used machines for about \$35 on new ones, so if you have access to such firms, you can pick up a fairly useful machine for \$35 to \$50. A typewriter not only stimulates your child to write home more often while he is away at college. But it also helps improve his spelling, for as he strikes the different keys he becomes more attentive to the internal arrangement of the letters within the words. The greatest dividends from a typewriter, however, come from the higher school marks he will receive on his English themes and term papers. For the average college professor gets snowed under by the avalanche of such assignments.

Since most students write so poorly it is difficult to decipher their childish scribbles (even in college) the professor subconsciously draws a sigh of relief whenever he sees a neatly typewritten paper. So he tends to become somewhat biased in its favor. Thus, a paper that might rate a "C" grade when scrawled in the usual longhand script, may be given at least a "B-" if typed. Since competition for getting into college and also for staying there, will become more severe with each passing year, every time you offer a gift to a student that will help raise his marks, you are doing him a lasting favor. 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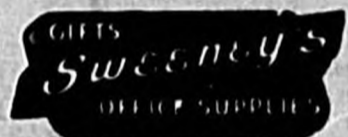
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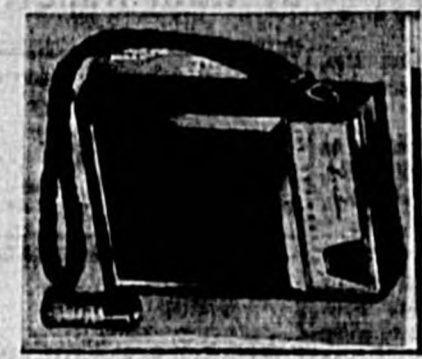

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (UPI) —Baseball suffered from a splitting minor league headache today over the disposition of five franchises in the distressed American Association.

Officials trying to solve the problem were hopelessly deadlocked after meetings that lasted far into this morning and scheduled further conferences in the hopes of arriving at a workable alignment of the nation's 20 Triple-A franchises.

The minor leagues were due to wind up their phase of the winter meetings with a vote on the "save the minors" proposal and recommendations for a new bonus rule. The major league meetings start in New York Friday.

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (UPI) — Florida State League President Bill McKechnie said Wednesday that Orlando will probably be added to the Class D league next year and the league will probably expand to 16 teams.

He said Orlando will have a working agreement with the Minnesota Twins, who use the city as their spring training site. He did not identify the 14th team in the league.

The PCL was ready and willing to take on Denver of the American Association as an eighth team. But what about the association's four other franchises — Indianapolis, Oklahoma City, Little Rock and Dallas-Fort Worth?

Next, it was proposed that Denver be added to the UCL and the four other clubs join the IL making it a 12-club league with two divisions. The majors agreed to defray some of the added transportation costs involved. Again the IL vetoed the idea.

A third plan suggested that Salt Lake City of the PCL be shifted to the American Association, making each a six team circuit.

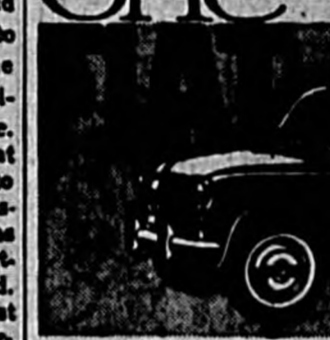

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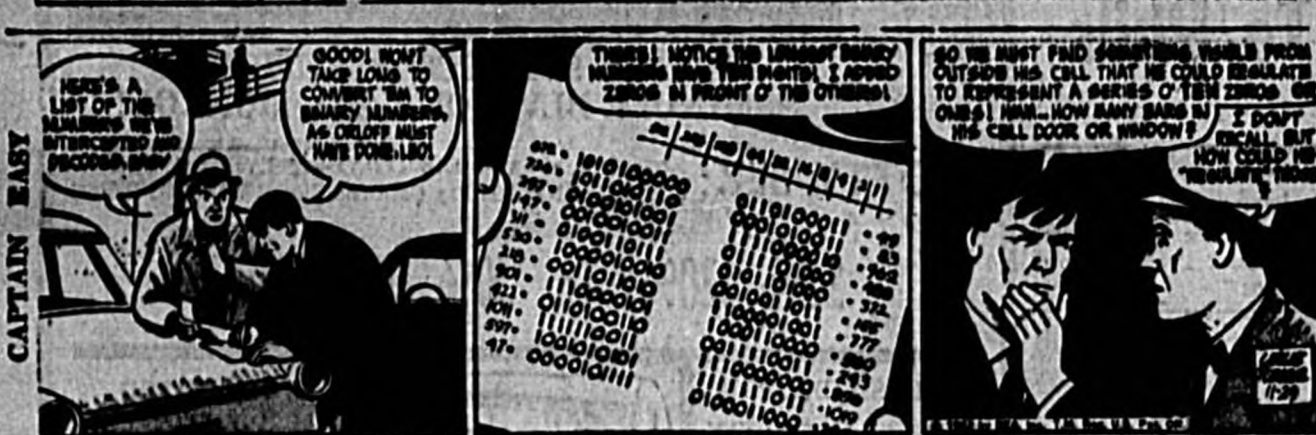
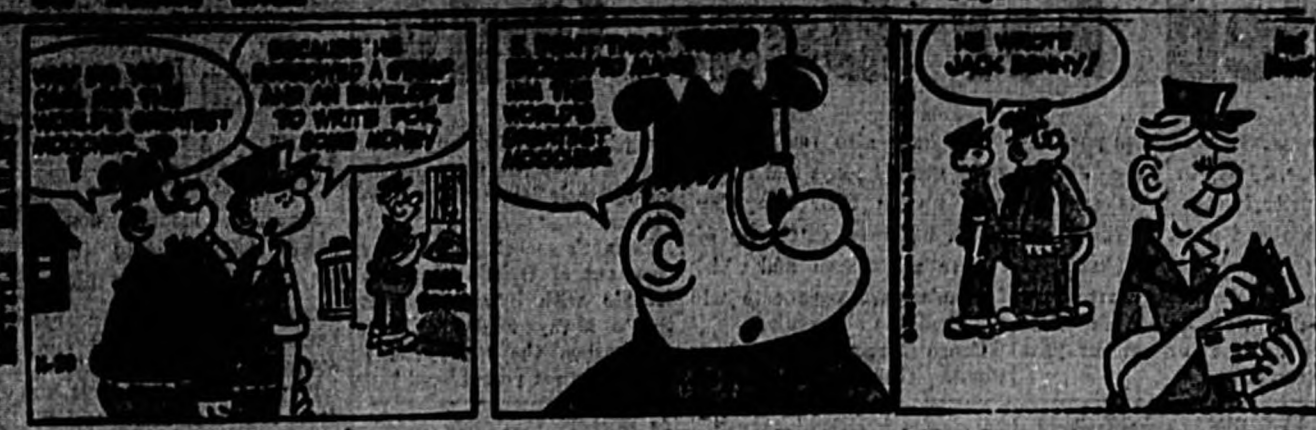
