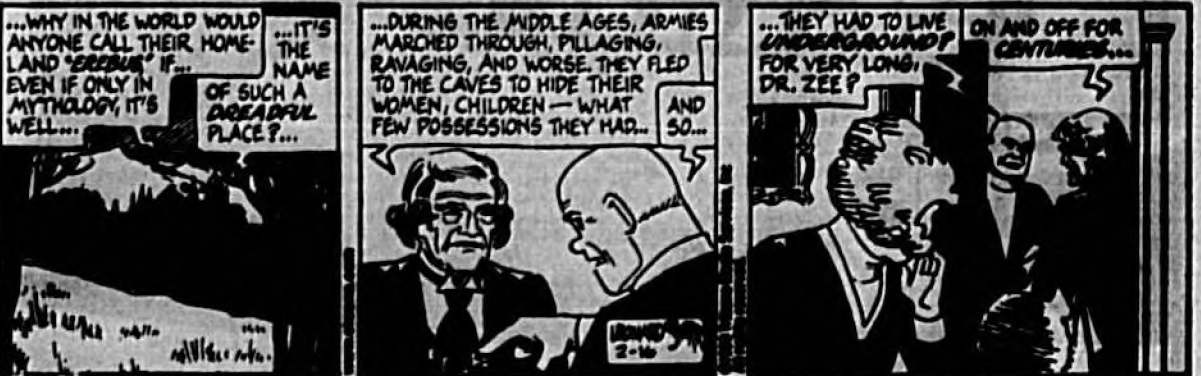

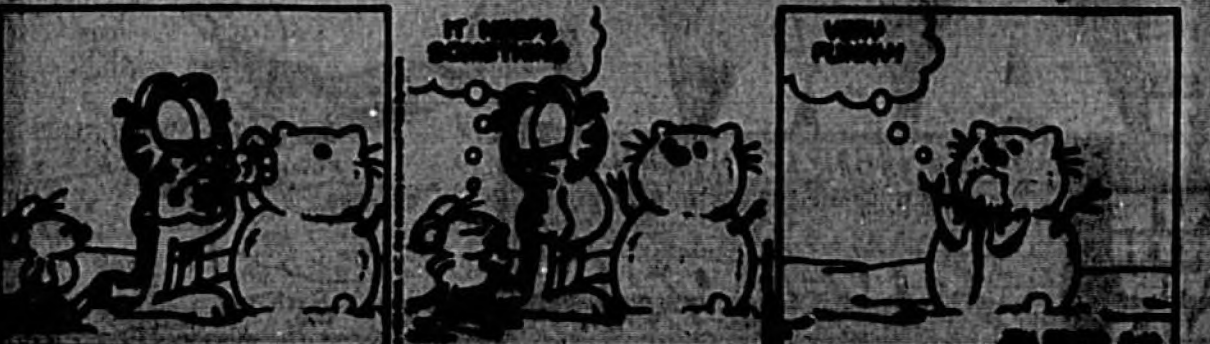

WIN AT BRIDGE

The elements of a takeout double

If your right-hand opponent opens the bidding with one of a suit and you double, usually you will have a hand worth an opening bid that is short in the suit he named and has at least three cards in each of the unbid suits. The ideal distribution is 4-4-1-1; and with that perfect shape, you may have as few as 10 points.
You are asking partner to name his longest suit, so that you can find your best combined fit.
If partner is going to name his longest suit (rather than bid no-trump), he does it without a jump when having 9-8 points, makes a single jump with 9-11, or two-bids the opener's suit with 12-plus.
In this deal, North doubles because

he is short in diamonds. It is also excellent that he has four cards in both unbid majors. South jumps to two spades to show approximately 9-11 points and four-plus spades. (Distribution points may be included, although here the South hand has none.) North takes a shot at game. Remember, you can often make game with less than the normal point requirement when you know where the missing honors lie.
West starts with three rounds of diamonds, or only two rounds followed by a heart switch.
This deal revolves around guessing the club suit correctly. Always try to leave the critical suit until last, so draw the trumps and find out who holds the heart ace. Now check the points. You are missing only 10, yet West opened the bidding and East had the heart ace. Ergo, West must have the club queen.

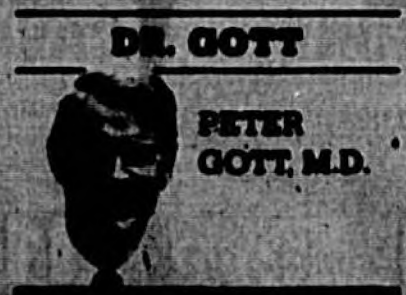

ASK DR. GOTT

Most herbal remedies are ineffective

DEAR DR. GOTT: I recently received a few about an herbal remedy that the manufacturer claimed would enable me to lose weight without dieting. What do you think?
DEAR READER: I receive many questions about herbal medicines. I suspect this happens because many manufacturers, who want to be big fish in the health business, actively promote their products. Also, companies of health and stress inevitably try to convince their customers that one or another herbal remedy is either a substitute for prudent living habits or an alternative to modern prescription drugs.
In general, these substances are not effective. Most are harmless, although some — such as ephedra and certain contaminated Chinese herbs — have caused fatalities. Studies have shown that synthetic vitamins are more effective as the "natural" ones. Prescription doctors can check your weight than the herbal vendors. In my opinion, disease and symptoms are best treated by orthodox methods under the supervision of qualified medical personnel.
Despite these misgivings, I try to maintain an open mind about traditional herbal medicines. Asian cultures have used such compounds for centuries, and I think that some may be useful in one form or another. Therefore, I do not make a blanket indictment of herbal supplements; rather, I appeal to people to seek medical attention for problems, and

exercise healthy skepticism and good sense in evaluating the advertisements and claims of health-food cures.

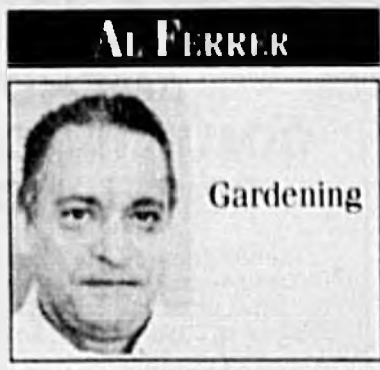

Plants can be sensitive to pests

One of the criteria often overlooked on deciding what kind of plants to use in the landscape, is their resistance to pests. Decisions over plant materials for the landscape are usually based on their virtues on color and shapes, but with little or no consideration to their susceptibility to pest problems. Pollution, pesticide regulations, and costs should make us think about the need to reduce the use of pesticides, and the need to increase the use of pest resistant plants in the future.

Native and exotic plants: Native plants are considered by many to be more pest resistant than exotic plants, but this concept is often misleading. Native plants in the wild may seem to be more pest resistant because limited light, nutrients and water cause the plants to change their biochemistry and growth patterns as adaptations to survival. In the urban environment, the same native plants can become more susceptible to

pests due to exposure to other environmental factors and cultural practices such as fertilization or pruning. On the other hand, introduced exotic plants may be free from pests, common in their natural habitat, but non-existing in their new environment.

Plant pests: The number of plant pests is related to the number of plants with a high degree of botanical relationships. Plants with lots of nearby relatives generally are affected by more insect pests,

but plants with few close relatives have small number of pests. For example, oak trees in North America are affected by about 300 European imported pests, this is possible because plants in the same genera are affected by the same pest problems, no matter where the plant is growing. This means that the relationship between native plants and native pests is complicated by introduced pests from closely related plant species.

Native plants in the landscape: Native plants are very valuable for wildlife such as birds and bees, and in their natural habitat they survive very well without human intervention. However, in the urban landscape some of the inherited values for survival are compromised, especially when considering the usually narrow genetic base of nursery propagated materials. It is a fallacy that people can replicate a natural site simply by planting an urban landscape entirely with native plants.

Diversity: Generally, as the number of species at a site increases, pest problems decrease. One explanation for this general principle is that pests are suppressed in a natural site because they have a more difficult time finding their specific host-plants in a diverse or mix group of plants. Diversity also increases the food, shelter, and other requirements that sustain beneficial organisms.

Insectary plants: Insect susceptible plants may be used in the landscape to attract beneficial organisms by providing shelter or alternate food sources in the form of pollen, nectar or host-specific pests

that won't infest other plants. One such plant is the crape myrtle, which is commonly infested by a specific aphid, that serves as food for beneficial insects. These insectary or magnet plants increase the natural biological control in a landscape by providing food and shelter for beneficial organisms.

The challenge: All evaluations of landscape plants should include a rigorous evaluation of their pest susceptibility. A good evaluation program should identify pest-resistant species, ecotypes or varieties. This information should be carried out under different ecosystems and regional climates because plant use and pest complexes are strongly influenced by site, climatic and seasonal factors.

Recommendations: It is very important that horticulturists and consumer select and use plants based on their horticultural characteristics but emphasis should be placed on their relationships with pests and beneficial organisms. The debate about the use of native or exotic plants should be secondary to the consideration that plant materials used in the landscape should be pest resistant and will require fewer pest-control measures, thus reducing the impact of pesticides in the environment.

SANFORD - Last Friday, right around 7:30 p.m., the Seminole High School girls basketball team and their parents pulled out of the school parking lot to begin an eight-hour journey to Pensacola.

To face one of the best teams in the state with their playoff hopes on the line.

Everyone still alive in the FHSAA state soccer and basketball playoffs have to deal with the reality of a long, long bus ride or two, but the way the state system is set up has some serious problems.

First of all, there's no way that Seminole should have been forced to play last Thursday and Saturday.

Seminole won its district and probably didn't have too much of a chance against powerful Pensacola Washington Saturday night.

But the way the schedule was arranged, the 'Noles had to beat Ocala-Forest at home Thursday night, then go to sleep without knowing whether or not they had an eight-hour bus ride the following day.

Because of the Thursday-Saturday arrangement, Seminole had to scramble to find a bus Friday that would take them to Pensacola. (If Washington would have lost its game Thursday against Buchholz, Seminole would have been home Saturday).

The way the FHSAA sets up the playoff system dictates, fairly, that sometimes a team has to make a long road trip in the regionals.

But to have to arrange to take the entire team to Pensacola in one day while the players went to school not knowing where they would sleep that night, wasn't fair.

Seminole wasn't the only county school that had to turn into road warriors the last two weeks.

The Winter Springs girls basketball team has survived a nightmare schedule the past two weeks and are heading for The Lakeland Center on Wednesday for the first Final Four in school history.

But, because the Bears lost in the district finals to Cocoa Beach, they've had to travel twice to south Florida and once to the Gulf Coast, spending more time on the road than a touring rock group.

Okay, Winter Springs could have saved itself some problems by beating Cocoa Beach to win the districts, but their road itinerary has been ridiculous.

Remember, these are high school kids missing days from school. It's a nice thought that they can study on the bus and make up missed school work, but in honesty, it's tough for a bunch of high school kids on a long bus ride to open the books.

Other school have had similar predicaments. Last year, in fact, the Lake Mary girls soccer team had to go on the road the entire post-season after losing the district final to Oviedo, and they came out of it as state champs.

But this year, the Lake Mary girls and Lake Mary boys soccer teams and Winter Springs girls soccer team have been going an awful long way to stay alive because of the way the system is structured. Basically, this is going to get a bit complicated, but here's how it works:

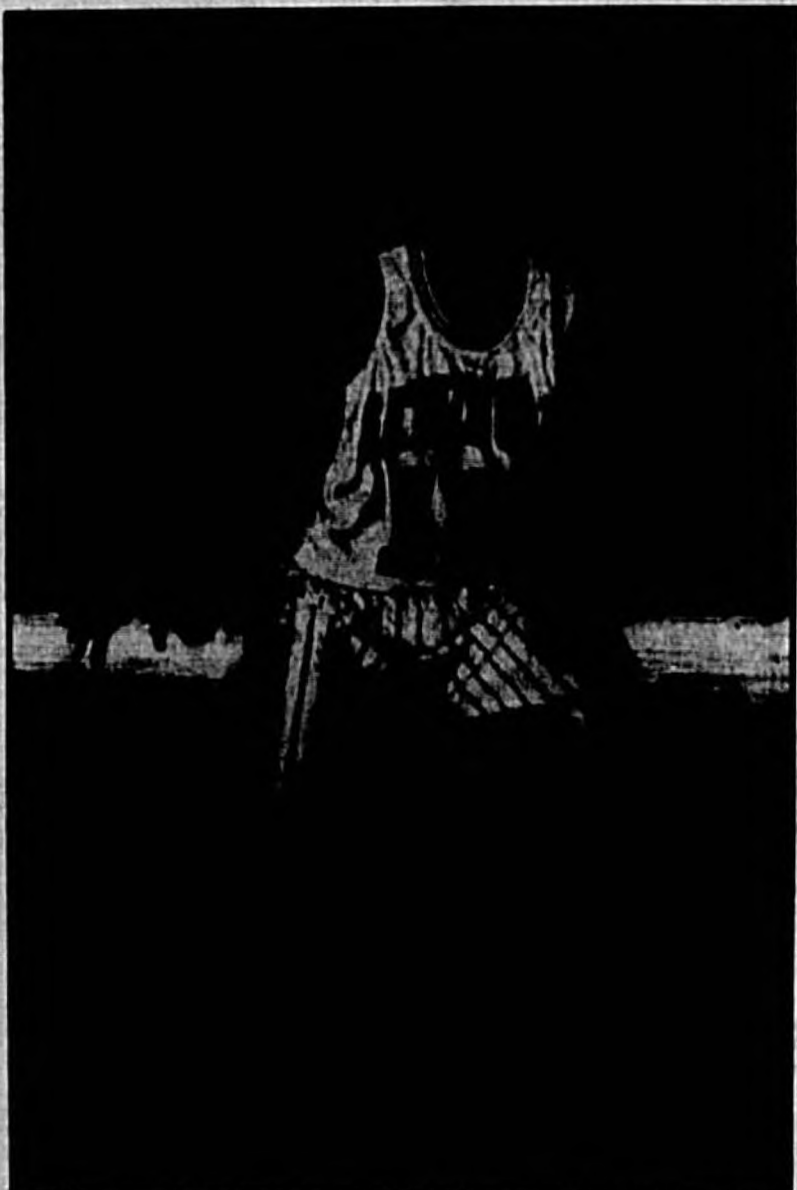

that her stepfather was a "quiet, generous man with a good sense of humor." She said he was a laborer, who spent most of his early life working in the orange fields.

"He liked to plant trees and told everyone that if they wanted to plant a tree, they should plant ones that would bear fruit," Mike said.

Although Miller was one of the organizers or directors at the Good Samaritan Home, he gave financial support and helped do work at the place. "He did this very quietly, not looking for reward or recognition," Mike said.

Martin said that in addition to following the Dodgers baseball team, her dad enjoyed sitting in his rocking chair at his residence on 12th Street and recalling great moments with his brother, Moddie. "They never talked about anything that happened after 1947," Martin said.

"Daddy told everyone when he retired that he intended to sleep in as long as he wanted each day. Sometimes that was to three in the afternoon. Then, he would get up and have breakfast. If it was 3 p.m. or 4 p.m. or later, he would have bacon, eggs, grits, coffee, or-

ange juice and water. An hour or two later he'd eat supper."

Martin said that her dad lost his eye sight seven years ago and lived the last three years at the health center. He never needed a wheelchair, however. "It was remarkable how he got around," she said.

Miller's wife, Nellie Mae, died five years ago. Many in the family lived long lives. Miller's mom living until she was 107. She was born in 1886. Beatrice Martin said, "We are trying to trace back the family's roots," she said. "My dad would like that. I'm sure."

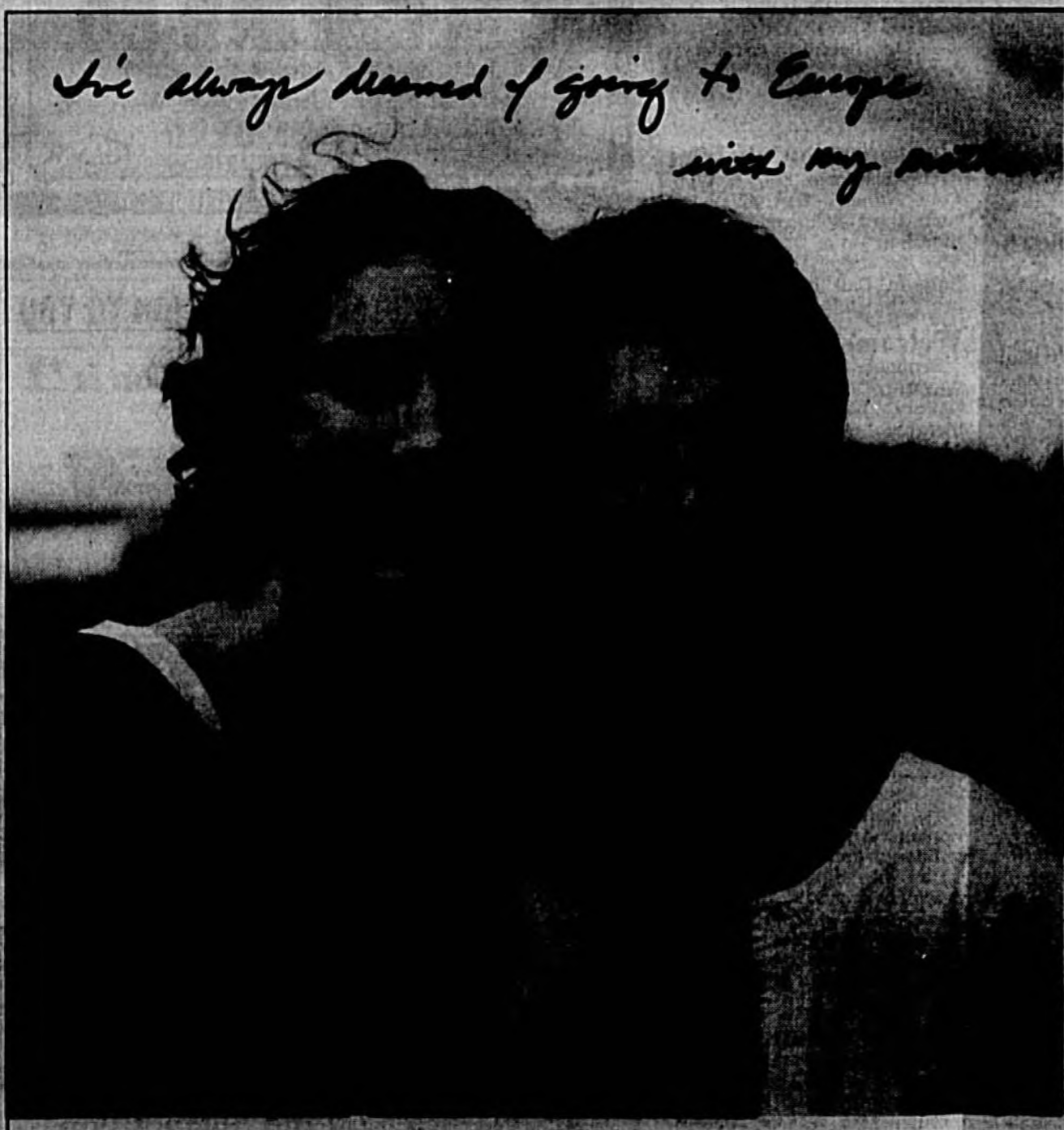

If no petition is filed, this Notice of Intent shall become final agency action.

If a petition is filed, other affected persons may petition for leave to intervene in the proceeding. Dead gunman could have ties to extremists

FERN PARK - Investigators have yet to determine whether there is a link between a man who was fatally shot while pointing a loaded assault rifle at Seminole County deputies early Sunday morning and right-wing extremist groups.

John Richard Evans, 32, was shot by deputies David Nagowski and Robert Brown around 3 a.m. when he pointed his bayonet-equipped assault rifle at the deputies from 6-8 feet away, according to Seminole County Sheriff Don Ealinger.

"He was turning to face the deputies," Ealinger said. "Our deputies were within 6-8 feet when he panned toward them. The weapon very clearly could have penetrated the deputies' vest."

Ealinger said that eye witness statements and physical evidence investigated by the Federal Department of Law Enforcement support the deputies' version of the incident that occurred outside Evans' home at 136 N. Lakewood Circle in Maitland.

Following the shooting, investigators received a tip that Evans and Richard Raymond Counts, 31, who deputies captured less than two minutes before the shooting, were involved with right-wing extremist groups. Ealinger said investigators have not found any literature at the residence to support that claim.

"We're still conducting an investigation on that issue," Ealinger said. "We have some information, but I'm not releasing it because it may hamper our investigation."

Deputies found five firearms, including a Mac-11 submachine gun with a laser sighting device, and 280 rounds of ammunition inside Evans' house, according to Seminole County

Sheriff's spokesperson Deanna Brown. Evans' wife and four juveniles, possibly Evans' children, were also in the house, officials said. Victim advocates are assisting the wife and children, Ealinger said.

Counts, an Orlando resident, was captured minutes before the shooting outside Evans' home carrying a loaded 9 mm semi-automatic pistol, officials said.

Evans and Counts have extensive arrest records throughout Central Florida, dating to the mid-1980s, Brown said. Criminal charges against Counts, who is on probation for burglary, are pending based on the investigation. He is being held in the Seminole County jail.

Investigators are waiting for a toxicology report to determine whether Evans or Counts were intoxicated, Ealinger said.

The two deputies are on administrative duty pending the outcome of investigations by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the sheriff's office. Neither deputy had been involved in a fatal shooting before Sunday, Brown said.

Deputies were responding to 9-1-1 calls reporting gun shots in the area early Sunday morning. They surrounded Evans' home after hearing a series of rapid gun shots. Deputy Kevin Wilkinson and Sgt. Mike Weppert captured Counts after he walked into the driveway carrying a pistol, officials said.

Evans walked toward Deputies Nagowski and Brown in the side yard carrying an assault rifle in a ready to fire position. Nagowski announced that he was from the sheriff's office and ordered him to drop his weapon, officials said.

When Evans turned the assault rifle toward Nagowski, the deputies fired multiple rounds at Evans. Emergency medical services declared Evans to be dead at the scene, officials said.

Amnesty day attracts record waste products

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County residents took advantage of a recent opportunity to dispose of hazardous waste for free.

When Seminole County held its 18th annual Amnesty Day for residential households, 808 residents attended the event to dispose of 37,580 pounds of material.

This is 66 percent more than the 218 people who participated in last year's Amnesty Day, according to Amnesty Day Coordinator John Houserman. The event was held Feb. 7 at the county's Central Transfer Station on State Road 419. Residents were able to dispose of hazardous waste for free, without fear of punitive actions from the county.

"We really had some people who just needed to get rid of some waste," Houserman said.

"It went very well. The people were nice, and we were busy. People still have banned substances lying around that they need to get rid of, such as DDT."

For the day, 2,850 gallons of paint were disposed, including 330 gallons of oil based paint and 2,520 gallons of water-based paint. Residents disposed of 2,000 pounds of flammable aerosols, 11,800 pounds of flammable liquids, 3,750 pounds of pesticides, 4,945 pounds of corrosives, and 500 pounds of oxidizers such as pool chemicals.

Residents disposed of 1,200 pounds of auto-batteries, 4,800 pounds of used oil, 600 pounds of non-flammable liquids, 2,575 pounds of auto coolant, and 100 pounds of small sealed lead acid batteries. 90 propane gas cylinders, 80 ferrous metal, and 100 55-gallon drums of kerosene were also disposed.

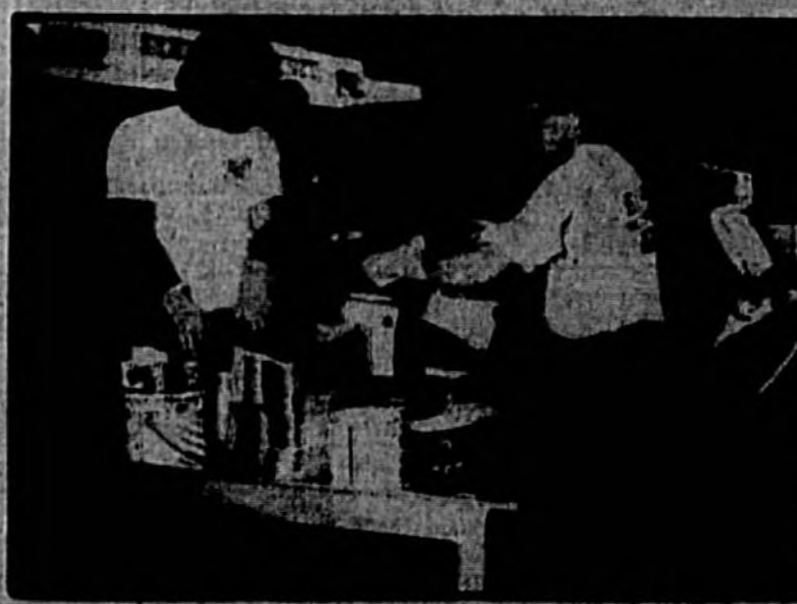

"We the American public just love to throw things away and get new things," Houserman said.

Residents can still bring household waste to the Central Transfer Station, 1824 SR-419, Longwood, or the County Landfill, 1824 County Road, Geesville, or dispose at the waste site of choice.

The Central Transfer Station is open Monday through Saturday, from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The County Landfill is open seven days a week, 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.
