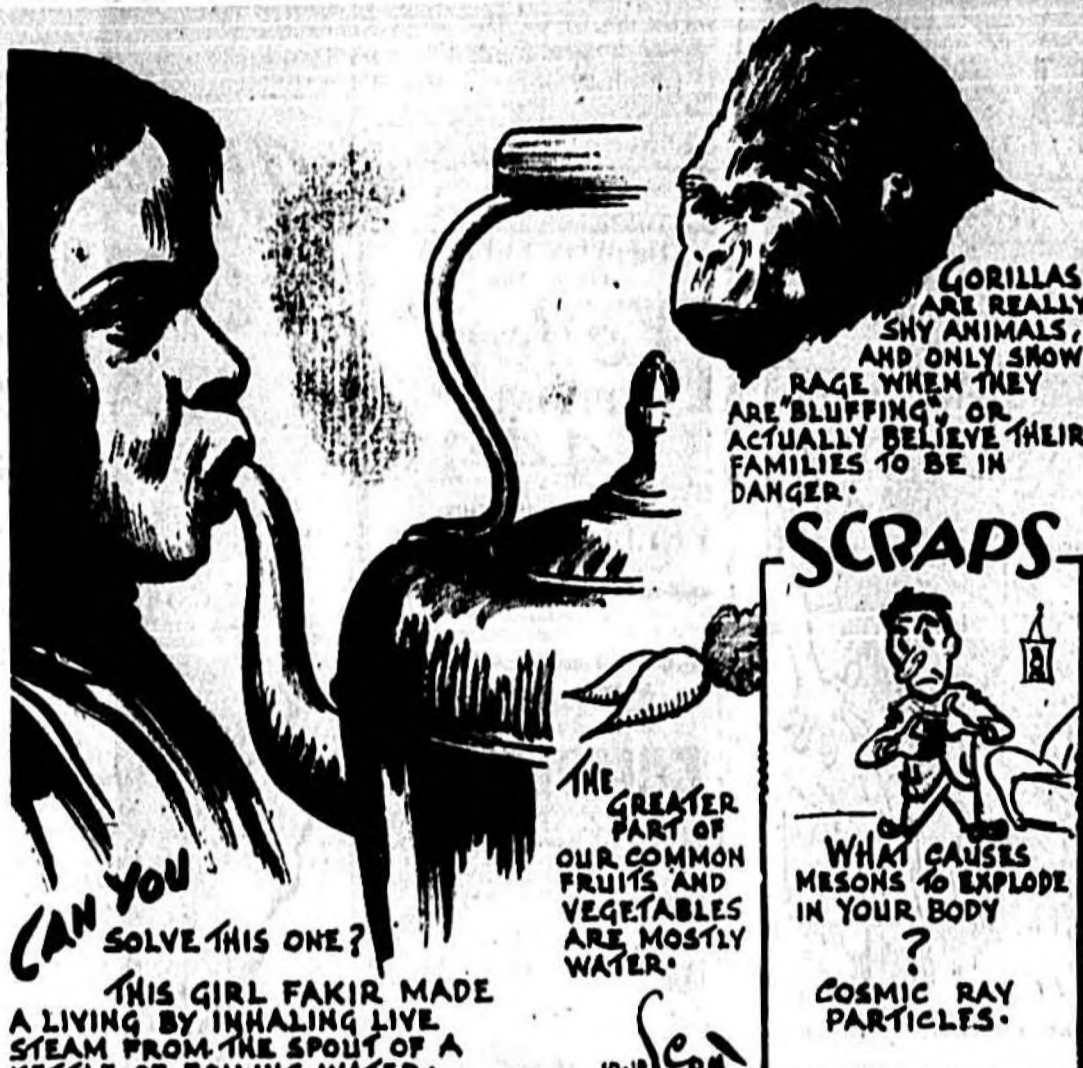

in the cost of publishing a news-
paper during the past few years.

big as his neighbor, we would like
to point out that we could prob-
ably make some improvements in
paper if we had a million and
a half every year to play with.

The large number of candidates

would be done under our present City
Commission if some time there should
be more candidates for the
Commission in each group. Sup-
pose a thousand votes were cast,
each candidate got 200 votes.
But only one would be elected. But
if only 200 votes were cast,
each candidate got 200 votes

the question that should be asked
of the Commission.

Home Ownership

Under the peculiar conditions of housing scarcity in
the post-war period, home ownership apparently is becoming
substantially more widespread than would have been the
case had houses remained more plentiful. No really accurate
figures can be made as to the number of families which have
bought homes in the past two or three years primarily be-
cause they needed housing and could not find it for rent.

Ownership is becoming so popular that some leaders
in the banking business talk of home ownership by 75 per
cent of United States families as a goal which might be
reached within five years or so.

Whether this high rate of home ownership will be a
blessing or a curse remains to be seen. Large numbers of
the families who bought homes since the war have bought
places they could not afford by previously accepted budget
rules. While there is increasing pressure on the building in-
dustry to provide lower-priced houses, it continues to be
hard to find a house which suits the needs of a family at
the price the family can afford to pay.

If the present period of prosperity should lead to a
depression like that of the thirties obviously trouble would
be in store for many of the new home owners. If the income
level continues to be high until a substantial portion of the
debt can be liquidated the high proportion of home owner-
ship should thereafter be a strong influence toward economic
stability and security for the family.

Hunter's Decalogue

Planning a hunting trip this Fall? Many sportsmen are,
and they are also planning to observe sensible rules of
safety to be sure they return home alive and without bullets
in their body.

There are others with a minimum of experience who
also may be thinking about trying their luck in field and
forest. Those in this category would do well to follow the
example set by hunters of experience, and observe strictly
the ten commandments of safety drawn up by the Sporting
Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers' Institute, which de-
clares that no one who follows them will ever take a life or
jeopardize his own. Here is the suggested Decalogue:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the cardinal rule of gun safety.
2. Carry only empty guns, take down or with the actions open, into your automobile, camp and home.
3. Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble.
5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.
6. Never point your gun at anything you do not want to shoot.
7. Never leave your gun unattended unless you unload it first.
8. Never climb a tree or a fence with a loaded gun.
9. Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water.
10. Don't mix gunpowder and alcohol.

The first step toward observing these rules is to memorize them. By doing so you will return home safely yourself, and permit other hunters to do likewise.

Meanwhile check the hunting accidents of which you read with the ten commandments of safety, and in each instance you will find the violation.—Times Union.

Hearing Distant Stars

Distant stars can be heard which cannot be seen. This
report comes from a conference on the new science of radio
astronomy held at Cornell University. The instrument of the
new science is a radio telescope which picks up the electrical
waves which celestial bodies transmit. It may thus locate
stars and galaxies which even the largest regular tele-
scope cannot reveal.

To the great relief of astronomers the new device costs
only \$80,000, whereas the new telescope recently installed at
Mount Palomar, Cal., the largest in the world, cost \$6,000,000.

Dewey and Ferguson | Stassen and Brewnell's
Dewey Cabinet Choices? | Chances Appear Good

WASHINGTON—GOP presidential candidate Thomas E. Dewey,
with the thoroughness characteristic of his campaign, already
has decided on some of the key members of his cabinet in event of
his election Nov. 2.

It long has been indicated that Dewey would appoint John Foster
Dulles, his long-time foreign affairs adviser, as secretary of state.
Dulles' flying visit from Paris to Albany to confer with Dewey
quieted reports that Senate Foreign Relations
Chairman Arthur Vandenberg would get the post.

High GOP sources say Dewey has promised
Harold R. Stassen the post of secretary of de-
fense. Herbert Brownell, Jr., Dewey's campaign
manager, is slated to be postmaster general. Sen-
ator Homer Ferguson (R), Michigan, an investi-
gator in the Senate, is being considered as
attorney general.

ARMED FORCES BUDGET SLASH—Regard-
less of the outcome of the presidential war,
there's going to be a deep cut in the national
defense budget next year.

The nation's defense chiefs already have agreed
John Foster Dulles they'll need in the neighborhood of 15 billion
dollars for the year starting July 1 and that's
the figure President Truman will send to Congress
next January.

But on the receiving end of the estimates is economy-minded
John Taber (R), New York, chairman of the House appropriations
committee.

Taber, who believes there is not going to be another war, at least
not in the foreseeable future, is going to hack away at the com-
bined Army, Navy Air Force figures with what he terms "a meat-
ax." He has the backing of Senate policy leader Robert A. Taft
(R), Ohio.

DOWN TO THE SEA—The Navy and the Maritime commission
on the one hand and the State department on the other currently
are reported to be in a no-holds-barred battle over whether Amer-
ica's supremacy in merchant shipping should be maintained at all
costs.

The State department takes the view that America can't compete
in the long run, because United States merchant seamen must be
paid double or triple what others draw to prevent them from seek-
ing more remunerative jobs. State says we can rely on friendly
ships for shipping.

Navy and the Maritime commission take the opposite view that
no country is completely defended if it has to rely on another nation
for such a basic essential as ocean transport. They want to sub-
sidize the merchant marine as much as may be necessary.

Unless Congress can be convinced into doing something about it on
a big scale, it seems likely that the State department view will
prevail.

Too Late To Classify

Among the things you will be
called on to decide when you go
to the polls Nov. 2 is whether or
not the pay of our legislators
should be raised from the present
\$6 per day to the proposed \$10
per day plus an additional \$7.50
for subsistence.

Florida's senators and repre-
sentatives are the poorest paid of
any in the country and they
haven't had an increase in salary
since 1870 when the present re-
muneration of \$6 a day was estab-
lished.

Now six snuckers may have
been a lot of money in those days,
but it doesn't go very far today.
Trying to make ends meet in Tal-
lahassee during a legislative ses-
sion on such a pittance is like
trying to swat a fly with a tooth-
pick, and can't be done.

Even in the "good old days"
when they had two-for-a-nickel
cigars, 25¢ dinners and \$1 a week
rent, I imagine the boys had to
watch their pennies to come out
even; but now, with rooms, if you
can find 'em, bringing from \$5 to
\$15 a day, meals from \$2 to \$3.50
and ordinary cookin' liquor being
dished out at 50¢ an eyecup, a guy
can't go in for much high living
on an allowance of six lousy bucks
per diem.

When you consider the time and
effort a member of the legislature
is called upon to give to his job
during a legislative session and the
responsibility they carry, it
would seem that even the pro-
posed increase is not enough.

The amendment covering this
small increase in legislators' pay
is No. 4 on your ballot and if you
feel as I do you will vote for it.
Your senator and your representa-
tive will appreciate your support
of the measure and your action
will help them immensely.

Certainly if we think enough of
a fellow to elect him and send
him to Tallahassee to represent
us, we at least ought to be willing
to pay his expenses while he is
there and even at the new scale
that's just about all it will amount
to.

I'll bet if you were to check on
the lobbyists who go to Tallahas-
see and stay through the session
you'd find that they spend from
\$25 to \$50 a day, and if the folks
who hire them consider it a good
investment it ought to be an even
better one for the people to pay
their representatives a decent
wage.

You can't expect a man to do a
hang-up job day in and day out
for 90 days if he has to sleep on
a park bench, do his own laundry,
eat doughnuts and coffee for
breakfast, a bottle of Coca-Cola
for lunch and an apple and milk
for supper. That's about all \$6 a
day will provide in Tallahassee
during a legislative session and
it don't leave anything for shoe
shines or pants pressing.

And while we are on the sub-
ject it might be well to consider
the pay of attaches, for their
living expenses while in Tal-
lahassee are just as high as anyone
else's. I realize that there are a
lot of them on the payroll during
a session that aren't worth over
the \$6 per day they receive, but
there still are hundreds of clerks
and stenographers who work like
beavers and without them legisla-
tors would be helpless.

If the legislature could send out
the attaches and pay them a
decent wage and pay a
decent wage to the clerks
and stenographers, it would
be a big step toward making
the legislature more efficient.

But governmental operations
and politics being what they are,
we will probably always have a
lot of people on the payroll who
don't do much more than get in the
way of the folks who are really
working.

As it stands now, any person
who is really capable would be
willing to take a job in Tallahassee
for two months at \$6 a day when
they can make twice that at home
and have a permanent job as well.

I recall that during the last session
legislators had a hard time finding
able and experienced help because
of the poor pay and high cost of
living.

If those who work through the
session were paid on the basis of
ability at a wage equal to or bet-
ter than is offered by private em-
ployers, I think legislators would
find they could get along with a
lot less attaches than they now
employ and at the same time the
work would be more efficiently
done.

But governmental operations
and politics being what they are,
we will probably always have a
lot of people on the payroll who
don't do much more than get in the
way of the folks who are really
working.

Anyhow, we can take care of our
senators and representatives by
voting for Amendment No. 4, and
when they get up to Tallahassee
next Spring maybe they can do
something for those deserving
attaches who really put out during
the session.

Georgia Tech Leads SEC In Offense And Defense Play For '48

ATLANTA, Oct. 20, (AP)—The Georgia Tech Engineers again lead the Southeastern conference in offense, defense and forward passing.

Tennessee is the new passing defense champion.

Figures compiled by the Southeastern Conference Publicity Association show that in four games Tech gained 1,425 yards for an average of 356.3 yards per game. In total defense Tech has allowed opponents to advance only 490 yards on an average of 122.5 yards per game. Tech passers have thrown 87 times and connected 51 times for a total gain of 805 yards. Eight passes have been scored.

The Vols have broken up all except 29 of the 75 passes thrown against them. Opponent's passers have gained but 288 yards and two were for touchdowns.

Behind Tech in total offense are Alabama, 1218 yards gained; Florida, 1194; Georgia, 1081; Kentucky, 1014; Tulane, 965; Tennessee, 961; Mississippi, 891; Missouri State, 873; Auburn, 771; Vanderbilt, 726; and T.S.U., 679.

Total defense of other teams are: Mississippi State, allowing 653 yards advance by opponents; Tennessee, 730; Mississippi, 638; Georgia, 638; Tulane, 625; Auburn, 598; Florida, 530; Vanderbilt, 584; Alabama, 501; Kentucky, 463; and T.S.U., 4108.

Florida's fine health is due to the fact that Coach Dodd isn't doing two things this week in preparation for the Gators. Tech may lead the Southeastern with four straight victories but Dodd isn't looking on the re-vamped Florida team as a set outfit for substitutes.
