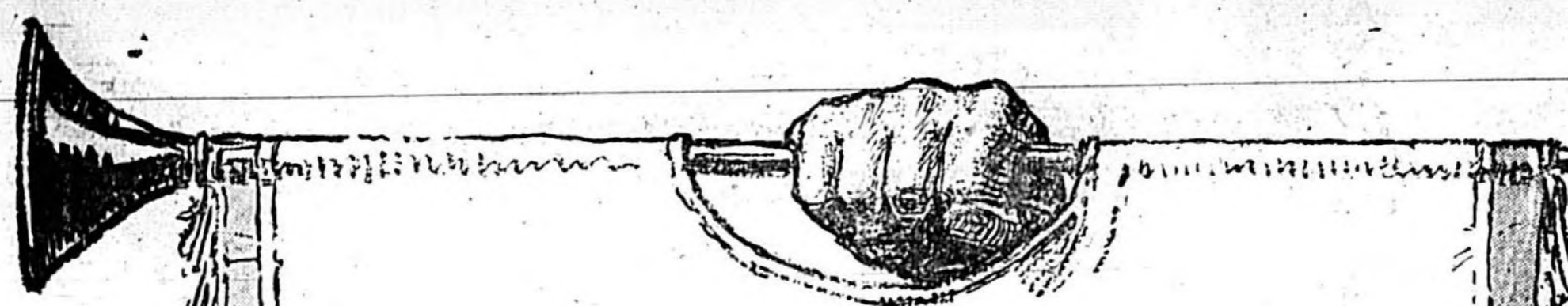

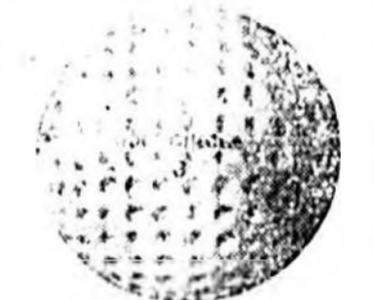

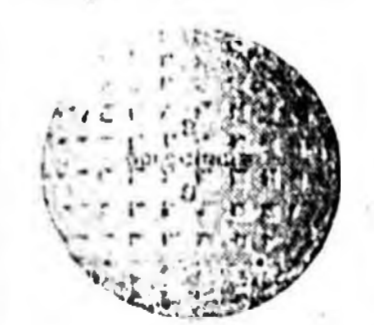

Experiment To Determine How Far Army Can Go With Motors To Be Conducted

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(INS)—Experiments to determine how far the Army can go in providing motorized transportation for its many different units will be held at Camp Meade, Maryland, during the coming summer.

According to a War Department announcement, the tests will be conducted "with a view to developing correct doctrine with respect to the motorization and mechanization of appropriate units of the Army. As far as practicable, the force (to be assembled at Camp Meade) will be equipped with motor vehicles of the latest approved design. Its operations will include work over terrain sufficiently varied and difficult, and under such conditions of weather as will determine the powers and limitations of motor vehicles as compared with animal-drawn transportation under similar conditions."

The following will take part in the experiments. One battalion of the 34th Infantry, Fort Eustis, Va.; the second platoon of the 4th tank company, Camp Meade; the second battalion, less one battery, of the

6th Field Artillery, Fort Hoyle, Md.; one battery of the 61st Coast Artillery (anti aircraft), Fort Monroe, Va.; one company of the 1st Engineers, Fort Du Pont, Del.; the 1st signal company, Fort Monmouth, N. J.; a medical detachment from Carlisle Barracks, Penn., and the motor elements of the 1st ammunition train, Fort Hoyle.

In addition the commanding general of the Third Corps Area, under whose direction the tests will be conducted, may also require the participation of the 16th and 17th tank battalions, Camp Meade, and an observation squadron of the air corps stationed at Mitchel Field, L. I. A troop of the 3rd Cavalry, Fort Meyer, Va., will also be trained in the use of mechanical equipment.

The equipment will be issued early in March, when all units composing the force will be relieved from their normal training and permitted to concentrate on development into mechanized and motorized units. The force will be assembled at Camp Meade soon after July 1, for the tests.

Fascist Militia To Be Regular Troops

ROME, Feb. 3.—(INS)—"In view of probable events," Premier Mussolini announced today, the Fascist militia will be incorporated into the Italian regular army to provide "storming troops" in event of war.

Addressing the militia men on the occasion of the celebration of the fifth anniversary of the militia's foundation, Mussolini said the militia had completed the political work which it set out to do and must now become a part of the first line of national defense. This decision, he said, had been made by the Italian general staff.

U. S. Death Rate Is Decreasing Despite Violence Increase

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—(INS)—The number of fatalities resulting from automobile accidents, and a decided increase in other forms of violent death, the death rate for the United States as a whole, from all causes, was lower during 1927 than for any previous year on record, according to statistics compiled by 52 leading life insurance companies.

According to these figures, the death rate among policy holders in these 52 companies was 823.5 per 100,000 for the year, a decrease from the 878.1 per 100,000 registered for 1926.

Fatal automobile accidents showed an increase of more than 9 per cent over the previous year; homicides decreased by 1 person per 100,000 but suicides increased 11 persons per 100,000.

In comparing the 1927 death rate with that of the previous year, the report noted the fact that the 1926 rate was itself well above the trend of recent years and, if taken by itself as a basis of comparison, would unduly emphasize the decrease of 1927. The real significance, the report stated, lay in comparing the 1927 report with that of 1926, whereby a decrease of 12.2 persons in the insurance death rates was registered, and with the 1921 report.

FEDERAL BUREAU MADE TARGET OF JANVRIN ATTACK

Long Range Forecaster Says Weather Chief Marvin Has No Standing As Meteorologist Among Scientific Circles

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(INS)—The weather prophets are at it again.

Charging C. F. Marvin, chief of the United States Weather Bureau, "has no standing as a meteorologist in scientific circles," and "is incapable of making a weather forecast by himself," Herbert Janvrin Brown, of Washington, a long range forecaster, has launched an attack on the weather service. He asserted, reports showed the Weather Bureau last year averaged less than 50 per cent in accuracy.

In a letter to Secretary of Agriculture W. M. Jardine, Brown said the seven day forecasts of H. H. Clayton for Boston and Massachusetts during the year were "far more reliable" than the U. S. reports. Clayton, he said, "is justly regarded as one of the world's leading meteorologists."

Wife And Paramour Get Life For Murder

HOMER, La., Feb. 3.—(INS)—Mrs. Essie Jowers, 39, and her paramour, Elisha Swift, 43, were sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of the woman's husband, H. W. Jowers, 49, Baptist minister, whom they beat to death with a hammer and threw his body into a creek.

The life sentences were pronounced by Judge Richardson immediately after not guilty pleas of the couple were withdrawn and they pleaded guilty on recommendation of a sanity commission appointed to examine them.

Marine Operations Normal In Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Feb. 3.—Marines in the El Chipote district are proceeding normally and according to plan, said Marine headquarters today. Marine aviators scouting over the El Chipote reported isolated groups, supposed to be rebels, but no large organized bands. A message from Corinto said that Gen. Lejeune, commander of the U. S. Marine Corps, was reported for Panama.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 3.—(INS)—Headed by Mayor William Hale Thompson and 500 enthusiastic Chicago sport men who arrived here on three special trains last night, thousands of turf followers gathered at the fourth renewal of the \$75,000 New Orleans handicap race here today.

The track was fairly fast and almost all the 100 nominated had to pay their \$1,000 entry fee. The horses will go to the post at 2:30 for the mile and one sixteenth race.

Another Big Plane Sent To Nicaragua

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(INS)—Another merchant transport plane, with Lt. George H. Towner at the controls, hopped off early today for Nicaragua. A stop will be made in Miami late this afternoon.

It is the third large plane to be sent to Managua in two months. It will be used to transport supplies from marine headquarters to field troops fighting General Sandino.

Result of Long Fight

The outburst against the government was the result of a long fight between the Weather Bureau and Brown, and was directly caused by a report recently by Marvin to the effect that forecasts other than the government's were largely guess work, and that long range forecasting of a reliable nature would be made by the government as soon as practically possible.

"Scientific weather forecasting is making rapid progress all over the world," Brown said. "Its successful demonstration points to the early downfall of the present pseudo scientific fossilized control of the United States Weather Bureau. Assuredly it will not be Mr. Marvin who will pass the final judgement on long range weather forecasting. Not many years ago his predecessor was summarily removed from office by a "forced resignation for gross violation of the obligations of his position. Mr. Marvin has been guilty of even graver violations, and is still surrounded by the same inner circle of officials who should have gone out with his predecessor, and he used them to the same nefarious ends."

Charges Filed

Brown denied the Weather Bureau is making proper efforts to ward long range weather forecasting, and said Marvin's claim that he has made scientific research in this field is unwarranted; that, on the contrary, he has "fought it with every instrumentality in his power."

"He has turned the American Meteorological Society into a political organization under the control of the Weather Bureau officials," Brown said. Brown had filed charges against Marvin with the senate agricultural committee. Senator McNary, (R) of Oregon, introduced them to Secretary Jardine for a report.

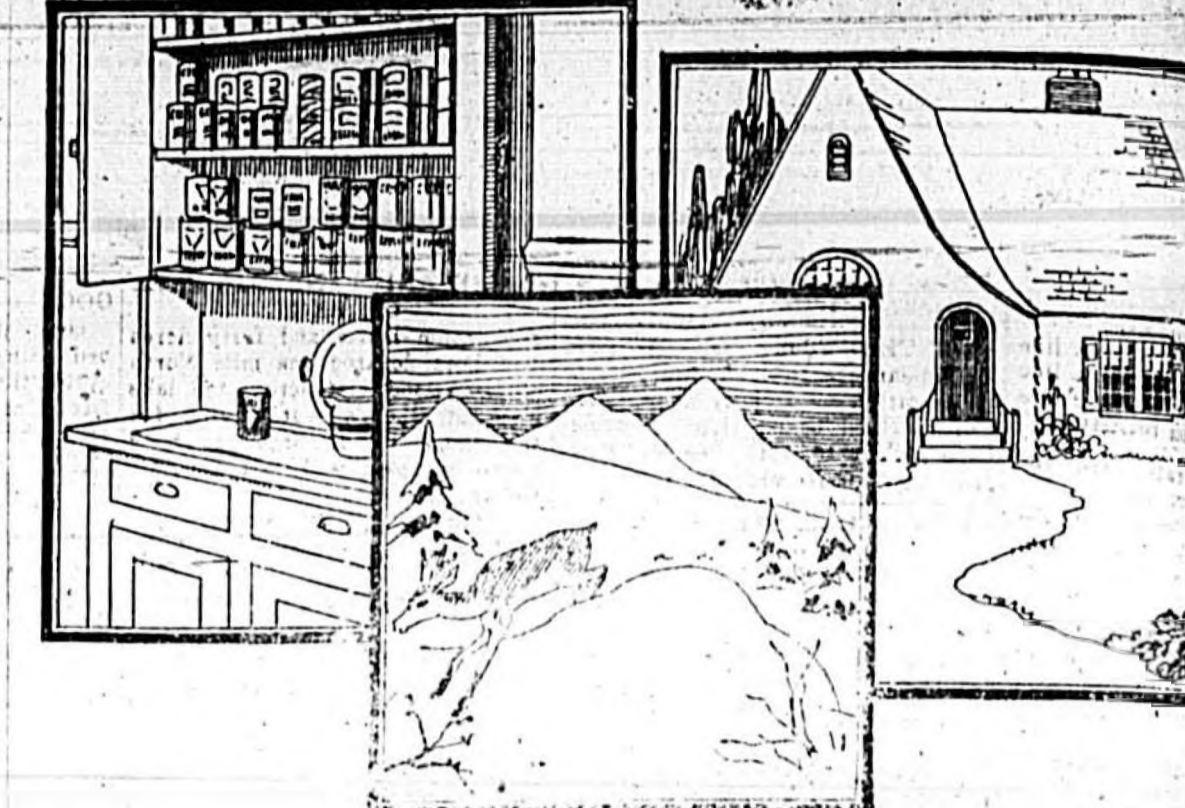
