Mercury Found In Common Foods

By IRVAN SULLIVAN, ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — The poisonous metal mercury has been discovered in a wide variety of common foods in Canada, according to a new study by scientists at the University of Toronto.

A spokesman for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration in Washington disputed that, however, saying he would expect to find only "negligible" amounts of mercury in ordinary foods here.

\$3.5 Billion Agri-Bill Approved By Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, approving a three-year, \$3.5 billion agriculture authorization bill, has selected overhauling an attempt to impose a \$20,000 limit on subsidies paid farmers for not farming.

The action virtually assures adoption of a 150,000-acre crop limit on cotton, feed grains and wheat subsidies. No ceiling has ever been placed on the payments.

By a 44-20 vote, the Senate Tuesday reversed an earlier decision in which the \$20,000 ceiling had been written into the agriculture authorization bill, then passed by a 64-47 vote.

The bill now goes to a conference with the House which passed a different version. But the House bill also includes the \$20,000 subsidy limit.

Teacher Is Jailed On Narcotics Charge

By BILL SCOTT, A 26-year-old Winter Park Junior High School teacher was arrested by Casselberry police yesterday afternoon and charged with possession of hallucinogenic drug violations after a raid on her 724 Carriage Hill Drive home.

Rose Anderson, a physical education instructor, was charged after a cache containing 300 mefloquine tablets, a quantity of marijuana and hashish, all hallucinogenic drugs, were seized by six policemen.

Armed with search warrants issued by the county judge's office, the police, including Timothy McAvoy, Sgt. Harold Peck, Patrosina Ronnie Tamburo, Robert Hammet, Louis Colter and Hummel, struck at the plush house, finding Mrs. Anderson in the company of three other persons, whose names were not recalled.

Mitchell Meltzer's Fate Kept Secret By Arabs

As the wheels of diplomacy grind ever so slowly in an attempt to secure the release of some 54 hostages held by Arab guerrillas, Circuit Judge Velle Williams Jr., of Sanford, Fla., has entered the picture. Judge Williams is a close family friend of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Meltzer, whose 13-year-old son, Mitchell, is one of the hostages being held by the Jordan-based guerrillas.

U.S. District Court in Orlando. The Meltzer family at one time resided here in Sanford and currently resides in Orlando. The Meltzers are still uncertain as to the fate of their son who went to Israel this past summer to work in a kibbutz. It was on his start to return to this country that the kidnapping occurred.

Williams sent telegrams to the members of the Florida Congressional delegation in Washington. It was revealed in the Congressman Claude Pepper's reply to Williams' telegram that he had been informed by the immigration authorities they had no record of young Meltzer ever entering Israel. Even though Meltzer had obtained a passport from the United States, Williams said, he was not listed in the passport book. Included below is the text of Judge Williams' telegram and that of some of the replies.

September 11, 1970

Dear Velle:
Thank you so much for your telegram. I can certainly understand your concern over the welfare of your friend's son. I have been in contact with the State Department and can assure you that every possible alternative is being explored to secure the safe return of all of the hostages. This is an extremely difficult situation, as we are dealing with criminals and madmen. Of course, the first objective must be for the safety of the hostages. I will continue to follow this situation closely and hope that by the time you receive this letter, Mitchell will be at home with his family.

State Department advises that the Arab guerrillas won't release a list of hostages they hold. However, all indications are that Mitchell Meltzer is one of their captives. For this reason, I have sent the following urgent wire to Secretary of State Rogers: "Urgent in-

mediate steps be taken to secure the release of Mitchell Meltzer, 19, of Orlando, Florida, and all other American citizens held by Arab guerrillas. We can not tolerate the forced return of our citizens for any reason. If we fail to this cowardly form of international blackmail, it will only encourage further kidnappings and kidnappings in the future."

Commission Receives Flood Study Report

A status report on the proposed flood study, between the U. S. Geological Survey and Seminole County, was given to the County Commission yesterday by Subdivision Chief Joe Kimrey.

Kimrey told the board that the availability of Federal matching funds for the study in the amount of \$2,000 has not been determined, and that he hoped to have a more definite report in the next few weeks. Kimrey continued that if it developed that the U. S. S. S. could match the county's funds for the study, which included Lake Okechobee, the county would be prepared to enter into a formal agreement and program the study as soon as possible.

However, Kimrey said, should it develop that county funds cannot be matched in this fiscal year, the U. S. G. S. will attempt, in the interim, to assist the more pressing needs in the county through existing programs. Kimrey stated that he was, however, optimistic that the last option would not have to be exercised, and anticipates a definite answer concerning the matching funds by Oct. 13, Commission Chairman John Alexander said that the county was not prepared to proceed with the execution of a contract until it is ascertained whether federal funds will be available. Commissioner Greg Drummond questioned as to whether a contract could be readily expeditious and Kimrey said that the county attorney had a standard contract, although attachments were suggested.

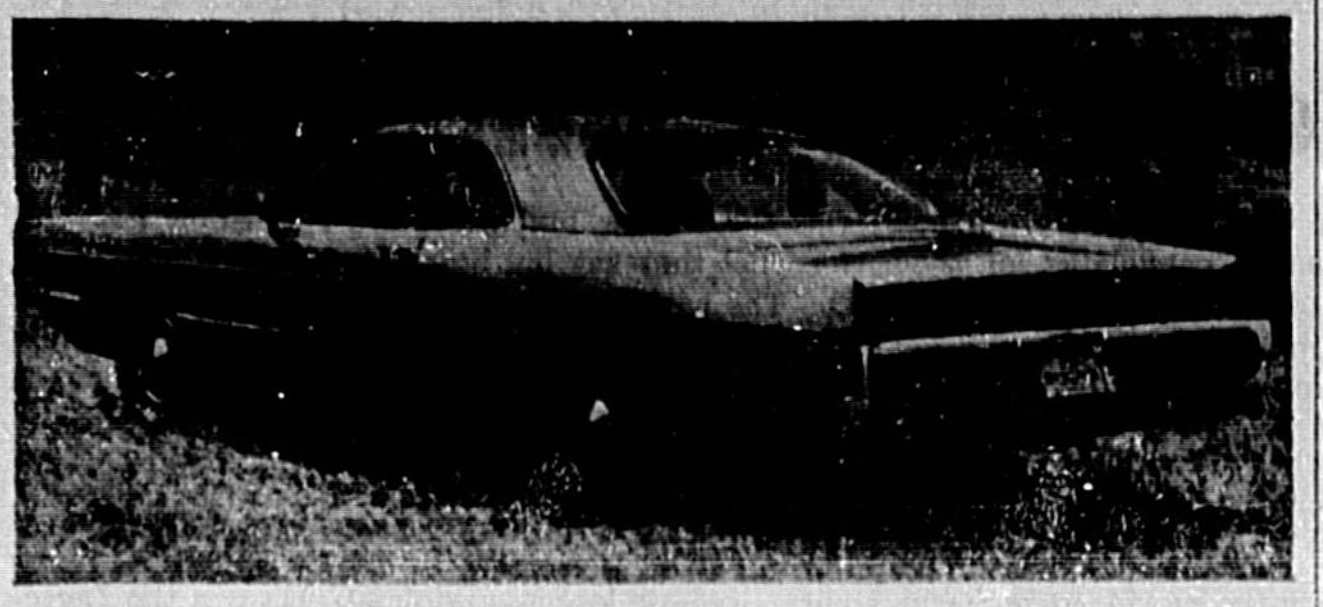

Water Hyacinths Are Difficult To Destroy

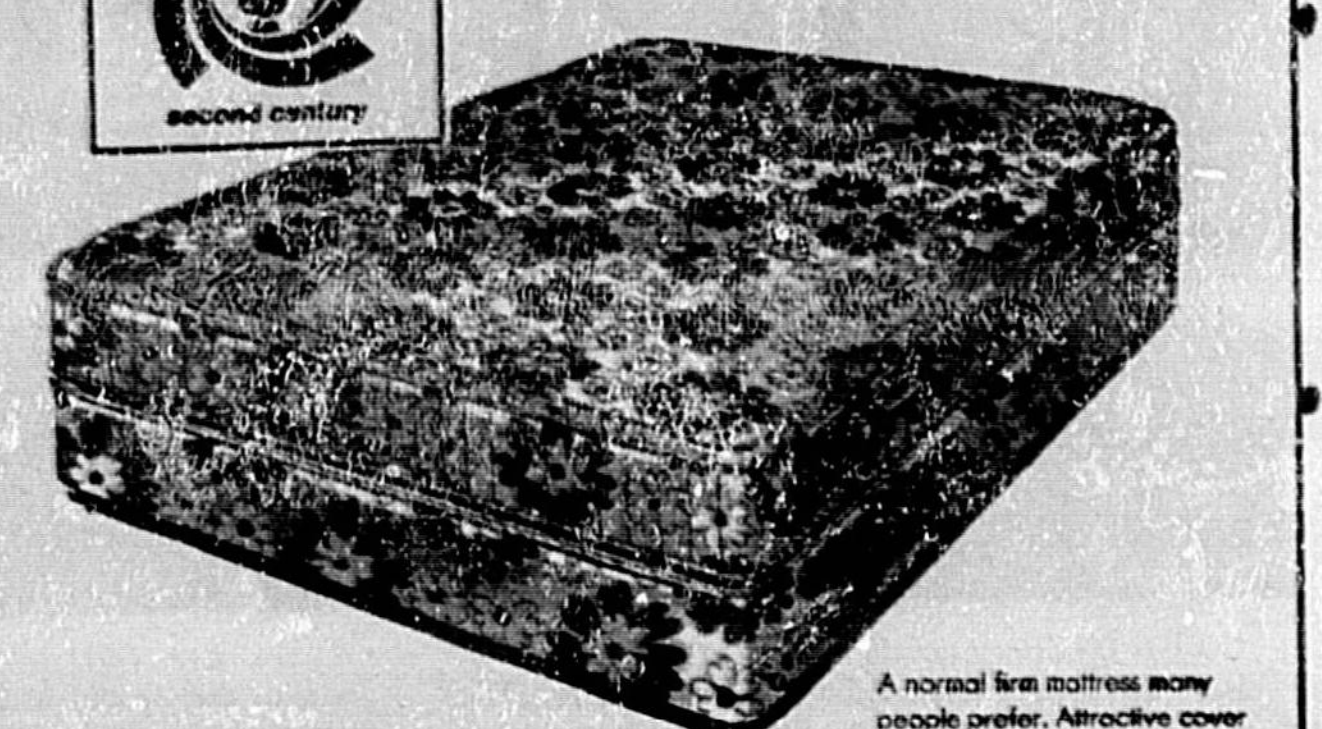
JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—After trying everything from weed-chopping to spraying with toxic chemicals, Florida's top aquatic weed control experts agreed that mechanical harvesters offer the best chance of beating the state's Purple Plague — the water hyacinth. At a meeting called by the U. S. Corps of Engineers, the experts Tuesday agreed to start an immediate harvesting pilot program on the St. Johns River in Osceola County. Chemical and biological controls will also be tried, but development of mechanical harvesters offers the best long-range solution, the experts said. Water hyacinths were introduced to the state in the late 1800s. One story says a lady from Palatka brought some back from Louisiana in 1884.

The pretty, purple-flowered plants looked so nice in her fountain that she dropped some in the St. Johns River. The results were spectacular. By 1898, the Corps of Engineers had produced its first mechanical water hyacinth harvester. James G. Smith of the Florida Department of Natural Resources said recent legislation placed the control of water weeds under that department. Smith said present funds to support research are inadequate but indicated legislation to increase the funds was being considered.

Upside Down

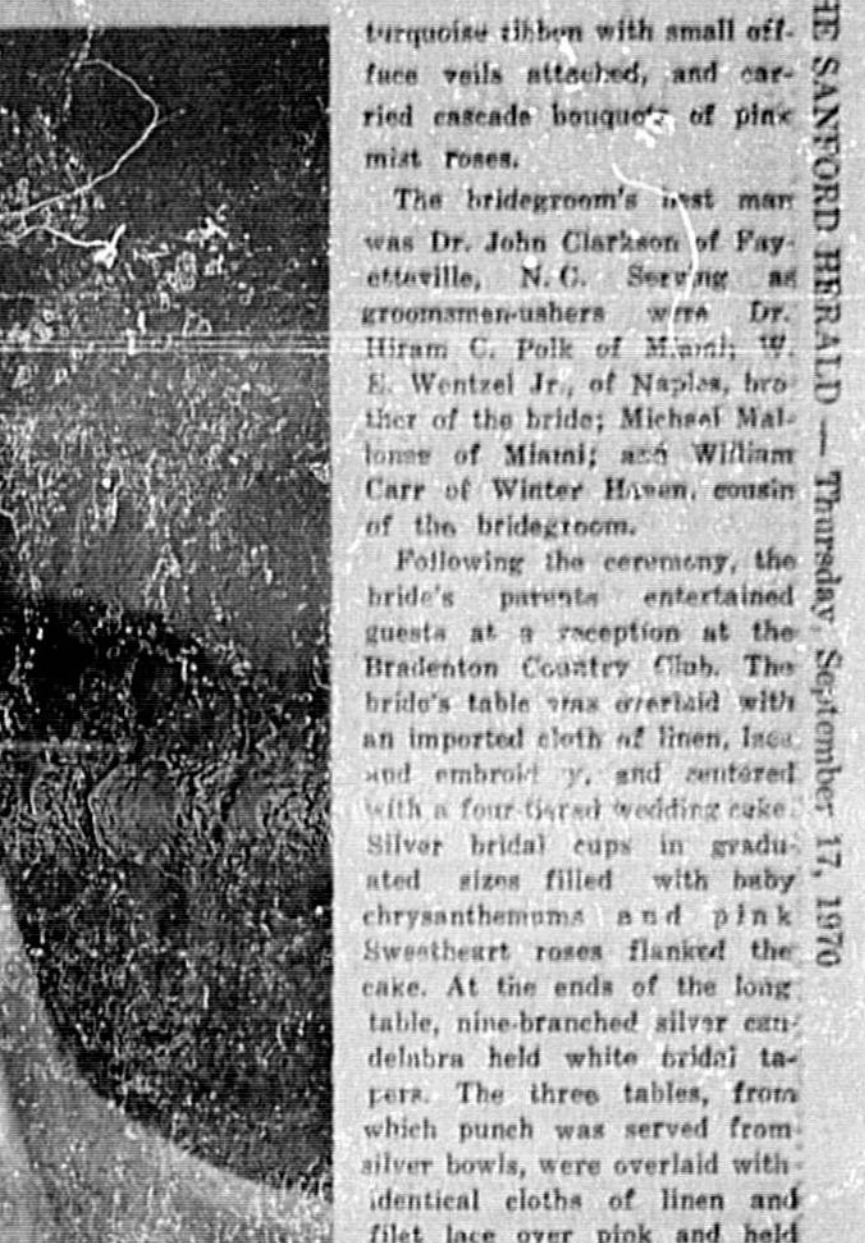

LONDON (UPI)—Neither high money at home nor threat of war has deterred thousands of American tourists from their appointed routes in Europe and the Mediterranean this summer. The Americans are spending liberally as usual, the director of the Sacher Hotel in Vienna, Rudolf Palla, said. He did not mean it sarcastically, for tourism is Austria's No. 1 industry. Not one European nation reported a decrease from last year in the number of tourists.

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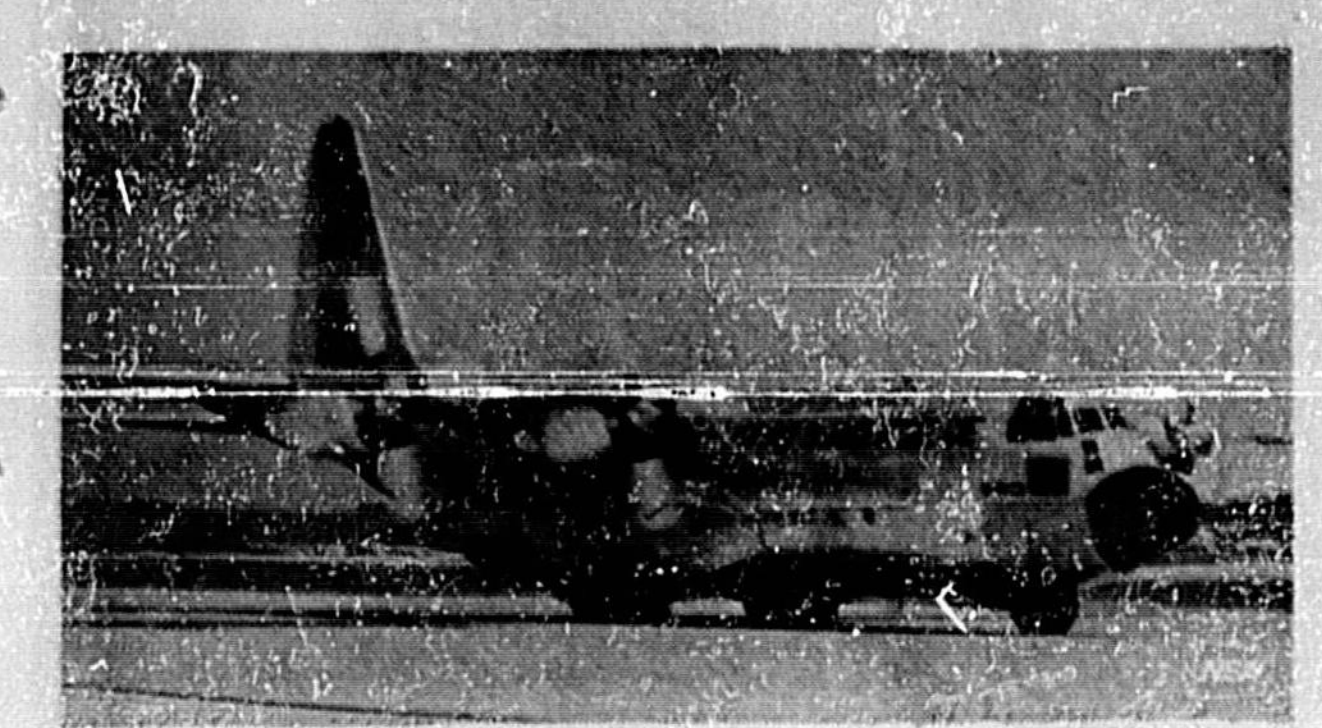

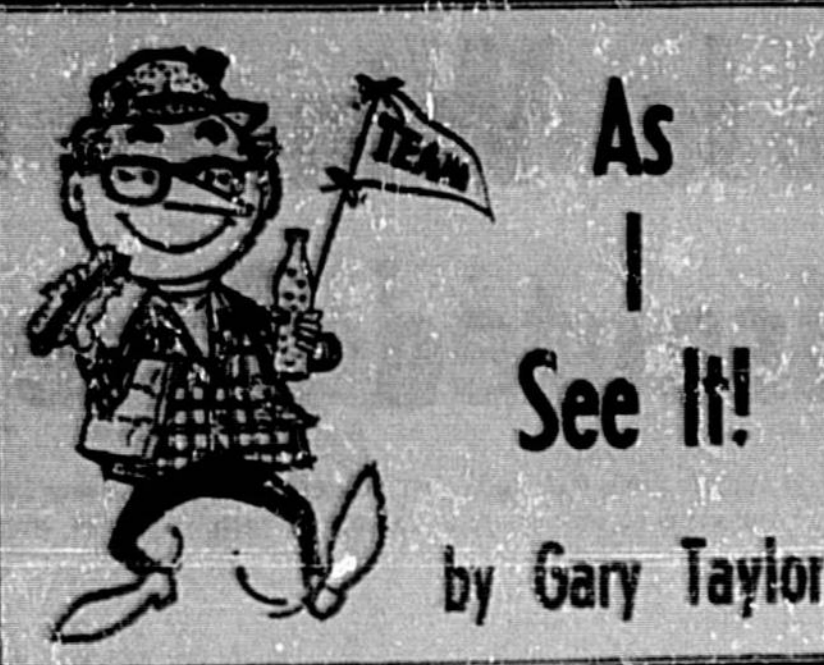

Dope Defendant Arrested Again

Zane Edward Clark, 30-year-old South Seminole resident who was found innocent of a charge of sale of narcotics Wednesday by a Seminole County jury, was arrested again last night on traffic charges.

Clark, who still has to face trial on a second charge of sale of a narcotic drug and conspiracy, had four pills at the time of his arrest, Deputy Sheriff Jay Leman said.

Chief Deputy Duane Harrell said the contents of the pills are still to be determined and one has been sent to the State Crime Laboratory at Tallahassee for testing.

Clark was charged with no driver's license and no inspection sticker last night but has since been released on bond.

Cassberry attorney Gene Stephenson represented Clark in the Wednesday acquittal and is expected to defend him again in the second trial.

Another complaint to Seminole authorities about Clark was filed by a man who said Clark threatened him at a Cassberry bar. The sheriff's office investigated the complaint filed last night and reported Clark said the man was just drunk. No charges were made against Clark as a result of the bar incident.

Sanford police reported an incident of a man trying to entice young children into his car in the Lake Gem area.

City detectives were assigned to investigate the report.

One-Way Thoroughfares Broached City Street Pattern Study Slated

City of Sanford will undertake a study of city street patterns with an eye toward closing certain streets, not needed, and making one-way thoroughfares.

This was decided at last night's zoning and planning meeting after a report from Martin Gainer, of Gerald Dake Associates, city planner, disclosed that city's system of street plating had excessive in small blocks and excessive land utilization.

Robert Karnes, planning member, said one-way streets should not be discounted in favor of widening streets, after Edward L. Blackbear, planning board member, asked about the possible widening of 23rd Street.

Gainer stated the board needed to look at the overall major street system to keep and then look at the minor streets which would not be adversely affected by closing.

The city planner said, "we will have to be careful not to close any streets that would result in downgrading the adjacent property values."

This could result in the city running into legal problems, such as have occurred in the Georgetown area where property owners opposed to paving have gone into federal court to enjoin the city from proceeding with an assessment program to pay for the costs.

Board will discuss the street projects at next Oct. 1 meeting and at that time will designate a probable area within the city for a concentrated effort to close unneeded streets and advocate one-way accesses.

A request by Garfield Walker to rezone from R-2 (multiple family) to C-1 (neighborhood commercial) by holding a public hearing was denied on a motion by James Dyeus, zoning member.

Gainer stated he could find no reasons to support rezoning the property located at 10 West 23rd Street, but could find many reasons not to rezone the section.

Schilke Resigns SIC Unit

Sanford City Commission will be looking for a candidate to replace Carl Schilke on the Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC).

Schilke, a long time member of the city's industrial branch, in a letter to A. K. Shoemaker Jr., SIC chairman, announced his resignation to devote more time to his position as president of Harcar Aluminum Products, which has been in an expansion program.

City Commission will be expected to name Schilke's replacement after a recommendation from the SIC.

Thomas McDonald, SIC member, as well as a city commissioner, said he felt the new member should be an industrial person, seeing that Schilke represented industry. Scott Burns, SIC member suggested names be brought up at the next SIC meeting.

David Kelley, SIC director, reporting on the status of Executive Airlines locating a passenger service at the Sanford Airport, said he had talked with Frank Wilkinson, Executive Airlines, and that firm expected a final decision determining whether the airline would remain at McCoy Airport in Orlando would be known some time next week. "Thus," said Kelley, "the project is still alive."

In another action, the SIC approved a recommendation from Kelley that Hall-McKensie Advertising firm at Orlando be named the SIC's advertising agency to prepare and place the industrial board's media advertising in various trade periodicals.

Kelley said the SIC would not have to pay the firm for placing the ads, since a 15 per cent commission is deducted by the agency when placing the account. McDonald moved to approve the firm with the provision to cancel at anytime.

Urban Renewal Request For Funds Is Approved

Sanford has approved urban renewal application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) asking for a planning and survey grant for funding a detailed study of a 35-acre section of Goldsboro. The City Commission approved the application and final studies are being added by W. C. Hutchison, city attorney, before the request for \$72,453 is forwarded to HUD's Washington office by Gerald Dake Associates, city planners.

City Manager W. E. Knowles said he expected the application to take from six to eight months before approval for the site study. The survey grant does not have to be repaid to the government, in the event a de-

Street Light District Before Oakland Voters

Qualified electors in Oakland Hills and Oakland Hills addition will have a referendum placed on the Nov. 3 election ballot to vote on a special improvement district for street lighting.

County Commissioners have approved placing the item on the ballot, with the notation by Commissioner Greg Drummond that the district will afford a bargain to this area in security and a community improvement item.

The special services which will be included in this district will include 28 street lights at a cost of \$77,25 light poles at a cost of \$12.50, and three existing poles free. Total cost will be \$89.50, and with the 10 per cent utility tax added will be \$98.45. Cost to the homeowner will be 54 cents per month.

The supervisor of elections certified that of the 10 persons signing the petition for the district, 84 are qualified electors. Lighting will be provided by a contractual arrangement with Florida Power Corporation.

During the public hearing on the matter, one resident of the area questioned a statement by Commissioner Greg Drummond, John Alexander that no homestead exemption would be allowed on the cost assessed to the property owners. Alexander explained that this was a special assessment and exemption was only allowed upon a property
