Yankees And Giants Open Series Play Tomorrow

Series Will Be 5th Inter-City Baseball Battle

Carl Hubbell Will Face Vernon Gomez In Series Opener

NEW YORK, October 5.—(AP)—New York's fifth baseball rivalry begins tomorrow at the Yankee Stadium, with all signs pointing to the bitterest kind of strife for prestige and profits, but the gathering clouds hardly could prove it today by either the headlines or evidence of civic classes.

This year's world series is being taken pretty much in stride.

The debate no doubt has already broken out violently on many a main street and may very well spread to Broadway, by the time the combats spring at each other. Twenty-five years ago also they made considerable difference in the temperature of the average baseball fan's blood. But to date there has not been such outcry or any stampede in the region of the box office.

The series will be played in the two biggest ball parks in the major leagues but neither is likely to be jammed unless there's a sudden and belated rush by the cash customers. Offices of both clubs report a pickup in advance sales of reserved seats today, do not amount to a bulky weather.

Daytona Beach, Celery Feds And Lions Of Tallahassee Regarded Sure Bet To Win Junior Florida Title Honors

The Northeast High School Football Conference opens in earnest this Friday when 12 of the 13 league clubs mingle in conference.

The schedule pits Sanford vs. Lake City, Daytona Beach vs. New Smyrna Beach, Ocala vs. Eustis, Deland vs. Palatka, Leesburg vs. St. Paul's and Live Oak vs. Leon of Tallahassee. In the only other game St. Augustine plays Cross City.

Sanford, which lost to Landon earlier by 27-20, beat Eustis, 18-7. Leon Lawson and Darrell Ferguson, a brace of big backs, led Coach Leonard McLusca's heavyweight team.

During the past week, the outlook in the conference has changed like a chameleon's color. The D. B. Buccaneers had their prestige punctured by Orlando, 18-0, leaving the masterful Tally co-favored in consideration of team and the Feds of Sanford conference strength.

By interrupting the 18-game winning streak of the Landon Lions of Jacksonville, Coach Godbee's Tally team shook the state with surprise. The Tally club thoroughly beat Landon, 21-0, producing a great backfield star in Bobby Benson. The strong Tally eleven took the wraps off a massive line, led by John Sullivan and Capt. Franz Warner, both above 200 pounds, and the Clemons twins, George and Tom. In the backfield, Benson was assisted nobly by the Mitchell brothers, Harry and Fordon. Godbee's football men completely subdued Landon's vaunted Charlie Tate, brilliant broken-field runner.

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A Warning To Aggressors

It is a far cry from the hasty departure of Ambassador Johnson in Nanking, following the Japanese warning of intended air raids, to the Chicago speech of President Roosevelt yesterday; almost as far in point of policy as in actual distance.

But the President's speech yesterday was a warning of international co-operation, a return to the principles of freedom of the seas, and American protection for Americans no matter where they may be.

Painting a vivid picture of what is taking place today, President Roosevelt said, "Without a declaration of war and without warning or justification of any kind, civilians, including women and children, are being ruthlessly murdered with bombs from the air."

And so Roosevelt says, something has got to be done to prevent the warlike ten percent of the world from overwhelming the peace loving ninety percent.

The President did not go into much detail as to just what he proposes to do about it or what the United States can do, but in so far as he spoke at all along this line, he said, "When an epidemic of physical disease starts to spread, the community approves and joins in a quarantine of the patients in order to protect the health of the community against the spread of the disease."

If that means what we think it does, the President has in mind an economic boycott of those nations which in the sense that we mean it are "aggressors."

Fire Prevention Week

As this is national Fire Prevention Week, everyone should give some thought this week to the importance of preventing fires, and children especially should be taught the dangers and the economic loss attendant upon fires.

"As with many accidents, whether traffic or domestic, most fires with their consequent economic loss can be prevented," says the Miami Herald.

"The crime of deliberately setting fires is worthy of serious attention. With few exceptions, the crime of arson is perpetrated for the purpose of profit at the expense of the insurance company.

"While fire prevention education can cut down the number of fires from purely innocent causes, prevention of incendiarism involves also crime prevention, calling for co-operation between the police, fire departments, insurance agents and adjusters."

League Warns Japs Against Further War

The League of Nations today issued a warning to Japan against further aggression.

Official comment was lacking in Moscow, but it was pointed out that President Roosevelt's remarks coincide with the Soviet viewpoint on the necessity of peace-loving nations to cooperate against aggression.

French diplomatic and political quarters expressed the greatest satisfaction with the Chicago address, which they considered a timely warning to trouble makers.

Italian thought was expressed tonight by a qualified official of the Italian government who characterized the Roosevelt address as "too demagogic and vague."

"Apparently," he said, "the president is not thoroughly informed. There is only one grave danger in Europe today and this is bolshevism."

"We want friendly relations with the United States," he concluded. "Speeches like this can be only the result of lack of comprehension."

David Baker, escaped prisoner, was charged with destruction of City property and was given 6 days in addition to the 60 days remaining in his old sentence.

C. P. Parker, charged with violation of the City's Ordinance No. 252 was dismissed and Ike Frasier, charged with violation of the Sanitary Ordinance, was also dismissed.

When England asked Mussolini to withdraw Italian troops from Spain in the interest of European peace, he promptly sent his own son over there to head the attack on Valencia. If that doesn't mean "What's the use", what does it?

A number of constitutional questions will come before the Supreme Court in this term. Among them being: do PWA grants for public power projects violate private utilities' rights? Is there an unconstitutional delegation of authority to the SRA? Can the Federal Labor Relations Board require an employer to dissolve a company union? Has the EPC the right to subpoena private telegrams?

The tax revision league explains the present low balance in the General Revenue Fund, in the first place it points out that the combined totals of all state funds are actually \$7,330,040 this year compared with only \$5,364,381 last year. Furthermore, it says that school monies are not paid direct into the public school fund instead of into the general revenue fund, which accounts, partly for the present low condition of the general revenue fund. No need for a special session of the Legislature on that account, it would seem.
