

It is a far cry from the hasty departure of Ambients or Johnson in Nanking, following the Japanese waiting intended air raids, to the Chicago speech of President consevelt yesterday; almost as far in point of policy as in sal distance. That was an indication of political and omic isolation, a notice to the world that the United would not fight no matter what happened, that we withdraw within our own shells and leave the rest

But the President's speech yesterday was a warning international co-operation, a return to the principles of freedom of the seas, and American protection for American cans no matter where they may be. It sounded as if it might have been given by his great predecessor in office. Teddy" Roosevelt. It heartily disapproved of certain recent acts of other nations and promised to do something

Painting a vivid picture of what is taking place today, President Roosevelt said, "Without a declaration of
war and without warning or justification of any kind,
civilians, including women and children, are being ruthleasty murdered with bombs from the air. . ships are being attacked and sunk." Looking into the future with as
clear a vision, he paraphrased James Hilton, English author, "We foresee a time when man, exultant in the technique of homicide will rage so hotly over the world that

The President did not go into much detail as to just what he proposes to do about it or what the United States can do, but in so far as he spoke at all along this line, he said, "When an epidemic of physical disease starts to spread, the community approves and joins in a quarantine of the patients in order to protect the health of the community against the spread of the disease."

If thit means what we think it does, the President has in mind an economic boycott of those nations which in the sense that we mean it are "aggressors." It means

"All fires, however, are not accidents. Many of them, and some involving the greatest of economic waste, are directly attributable to incendiarism.

."The crime of deliberately setting fires is worthy of serious attention. With few exceptions, the crime of ard Justice Black's stock will son is perpetrated for the purpose of profit at the expense of the insurance company. As incendiarism usually is on property which has been overinsured, companies assert that incendiaries receive larger proportional damages than the interest of the honest victims of fires.

"While fire prevention education can cut down the number of fires from purely innocent causes, prevention of incondiarism involves also crime prevention, calling for cooperation between the police, fire departments, insurance agents and adjusters."

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
