Brumley Wins Feud With Mayor Blow

With an overflow crowd looking on and five on-duty policemen standing by, Casselberry's Police Chief Donald Brumley received an overwhelming vote of confidence by that city's council last night. The vote came following Mayor Curtis Blow's attempt to have Donald Stanley, presently police chief of Safety Harbor, west of Tampa, installed as police head of the city, which has gone through three police chiefs in the past three years.

Blow has been attempting to unseat Brumley for the past two months. "Documented evidence," according to Mayor Blow, was sent to Council Chairman Napier, regarding the accusations against Brumley, but last night Napier continued his firm support for the chief. None of the mayor's accusations have been made public.

Also on hand last night at the meeting was Sanford Attorney Roger Berry, representing Brumley.

A letter to the City Council, signed by the entire police department, advised the council that the personnel of the department were "proud" to work for Brumley and termed him an "efficient and considerate man."

Mother Freed On Bond

The mother of a deceased infant was released on \$10,000 bond this morning from Seminole County jail after having been indicted along with her second husband on second degree murder charges yesterday.

Charles Bennett Powers, 22, of Lake Gene Drive, Longwood, was arrested at 11 p.m. last night at her home by Seminole County deputies after the indictment was returned by the county grand jury late Monday.

Mrs. Powers joined Ronald Frank Powers, her 33-year-old mechanic husband in jail but in separate cells as the jury continued its probe into the injuries that caused the death of Lana Bennett.

Powers was arrested nearly two weeks ago on murder charges in the same case. All yesterday, a parade of witnesses entered the jury room to give testimony in the little girl's death.

Dr. Thomas Heggett, Orange County medical examiner, led the list of persons that included neighbors and Louis Bennett, seven-year-old brother of the deceased.

Dr. Heggett performed the autopsy on the child's body after she died in Orange Memorial Hospital of what Heggett said was a ruptured spleen and stomach injuries.

Several doctors from Orlando Naval Hospital, where the child had been taken with previous injuries, appeared yesterday to give information. A number of sheriff's investigators were also called into the closed room by the jurors. Finally, a report was forthcoming and both Powers and his wife were named in the indictment.

Powers had been under \$25,000 bond on second degree murder charges, but this amount was reduced to \$10,000 by Judge Volie Williams in line with the bond set on the wife.

Powers is the step father of the girl and married Mrs. Pow-

ers, mother of four children upon her divorce from George Bennett, now in the Air Force.

This morning, a Winter Park attorney for which Mrs. Powers works brought a \$10,000 cashier's check to the county jail to secure her release. A preliminary hearing for Powers was set for today.

\$15,000 Request Is Made

Dr. Michael Gutman, county psychiatrist, requested \$15,000 from the Seminole Board of County Commissioners this morning for the Mental Health Facility in Longwood Plaza, stating that the Board of Public Instruction had given their approval of \$15,000 for the facility and \$5,000 to \$10,000 is expected to be raised from the community. A total of \$70,000 is needed for operation of the facility and the state is expected to contribute matching funds if the county gives \$30,000.

Funds would be used to employ a full time clinical psychologist a clerk and secretarial staff, a social worker, along with a state paid social worker and additional time from the psychiatrist.

Gutman stated a full scale program will be initiated at the clinic encompassing primary treatment — prevention; secondary treatment — diagnosis and tertiary treatment — rehabilitation. Currently the county is providing only secondary treatment and Gutman said that the Seminole County Mental Health Center can not move into the new facility until the state knows that the county funds will be provided.

He stated that he presently sees 15-20 patients per week at the Seminole County Health Center on French Avenue, and that he saw 500 new cases in 1969. This did not include 200 referrals to Miss Barbara Denison, mental health worker.

Mayor Hints Of Shopping Center 'Tank Farm' Rezoning Near

Sanford City Commission last night moved ahead with rezoning the so-called "tank farm" areas of the city from M-1 (Industrial) to C-2 (commercial) after hearing attorneys and oil firm representatives plead to have the present designation undisturbed.

By a four-to-one vote, with Commissioner J. H. Crapps the only commission member to heed the plea, the body voted to have W. C. Hutchison, city attorney, prepare an ordinance for the use change.

Commissioner Thomas McDonald moved for the rezoning after an hour of discussion that marked the appearance of Sanford attorneys Vernon Mize

and Thomas Freeman, who spoke on behalf of their clients. Mize represented Standard Oil Company and Eastern Standard Petroleum; Freeman is employed by Murphy Oil Corporation and all three firms are owners of tanks and property in the area north of Fulton Street, between French and Myrtle Avenues.

Standard Oil's operation is now closed for tank storage but last night there was an indication that plans were in the offing to again open the firm's tanks for storage of fuel oil, possibly by lease to Murphy Oil, which is now engaged in a like operation.

Freeman spoke first and discussed the commission of "try-

ing to do indirectly what you cannot directly do." The attorney said, "You can take the property by eminent domain but you must pay for it."

Both attorneys indicated a willingness by all clients to improve the appearances of the properties by some means of beautification. McDonald disagreed that the rezoning was for beauty purposes only and said the change would not keep those existing firms from continuing operations.

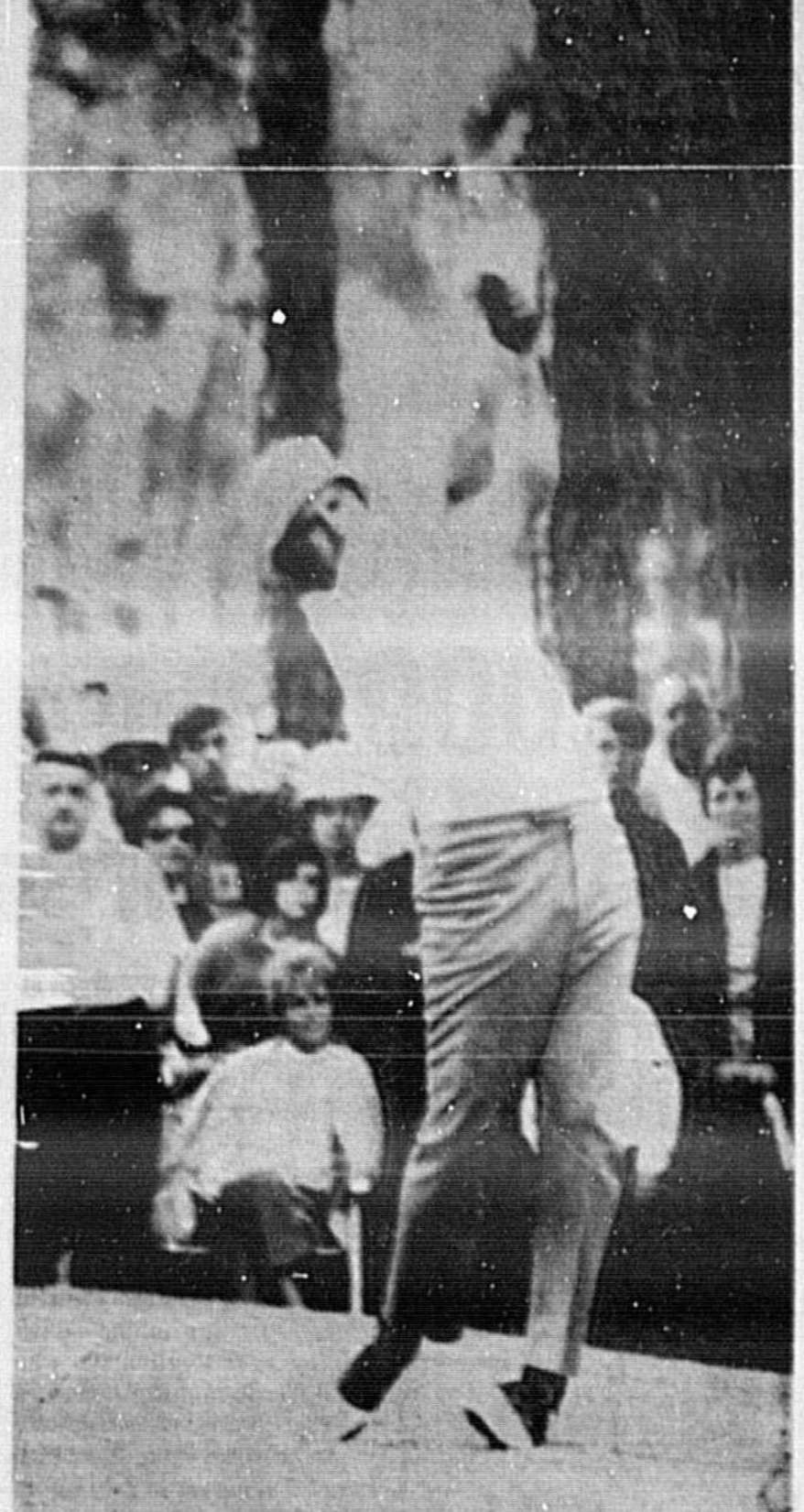

Teachers' Pay Hike Dims, Angel Opines

Chances that Seminole County teachers and other school personnel receiving a pay raise for 1970-71 term appeared rather dim after a Monday meeting of the school salary committee with administrative officials and board members.

Teachers were being asked that beginning first year teachers receive a \$7,000 starting salary with an index figured on this base to cover all instructional and non-instructional school employees but after the finances for next year were explained by Walter Teague, assistant superintendent, it appeared this request and any other might be too much for the system to finance, and to fund already committed expenditures.

Another \$300,000 might come from federal moneys, but this fund is to be withheld because of the de-segregation problems or the possibility that it will not even be funded this year by the federal government.
