

Astronaut Ready For 22 Orbits

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - An anxious man, a fueled-up machina and unusually good weather today signaled a tentative go-ahead for an attempt to launch Astronaut In Gordon Cooper Jr. on America's most ambitious flight into space Thursday.

The man was Cooper, himself, a 36-year-old Air Force major who braved four years of waiting and a rash of "inner circle" opposition for the chance to make the prize flight of Project Mereury-a planned 22-orbit voyage around earth,

The machine was a silvery Atlas rocket that will boost the slender spaceman-elect into the sky at a speed of 17,500 miles per hour, if all



From the past record, few could doubt that they have ample money resources.

But a rather startling prediction that rightwingers will spend more in 1964 than both major party national committees combined may cast the right-wing effort in a somewhat new light.

The forecast comes from Wesley McCune of Group Research, Inc., an agency that keeps tabs on rightist

It is notable, too, that rightwing money evidently is being spent these days with more concentrated effect than before. There are persistent reports that powerful assaults are being leveled against a number of moderate to liberal politicians in the Mountain states - where a dollar may go a long way.

Furthermore, the rightist movement is attracting more "prestige" leadership than ever in its history. Ezra Taft Benson, former secretary of agriculture under Dwight Eisenhower, leads an organization called "We, the People!" Benson's son, Reed, is active in the John Birch Society in western areas. Retired generals and admirals are joining up in larger numbers.

Robert Welch, head of the Birch Society, who labels Eisenhower a Communist or a Red dupe, won warm response from a top business club in Chicago.

Nor is the right-wing discouraged by talk it is a fly-by-night thing which took severe lickings in 1962 voting and is declining.

Four John Birch candidates for Congress lost in 1962. But two got more than 45 percent of the vote and all got at least 40 percent. If New York's new Conservative party could duplicate later the 141,000 votes it got for governor last year, it could decide a close election.

Researcher McCune points out also that aggressive rightist activity did not start with President Kennedy's election in 1960. A whole host of organizations trace their history back to the 1940s and even 1930s. Even Gerald I. K. Smith is still flourishing in the field.

Right-wingers may be on the "fringe" in terms of relative numbers. But by a good many other meaaures, they are right in the thick of the nation's political combat.

Water Skiing Takes To The Air Via Chute

SILVER SPRINGS (NEA) - Parachute jumping may be the next wild sport to try behind a boat.

Fishing and swimming used to be enough. Then came aquaplaning and water skiing. Add barefoot skiing Jumping and flying with a kite and there would seem to be enough water action available for every-

But Dick Rowe, 32-year-old world ski champion on water, decided to give the sport the mir. The French had been experimenting with a kite that will pull you up into the sky, Rowe put on water skis and tested the stunt behind a boat. Take-off starts standing on the beach. At 24 miles an

hour the parachute and passenger become airborne. A 350foot line connects the skling flyer to the tow boat. With knough speed. Rowe reports, a parachutist might be lifted straight up the full length of the rope. This new switch on the rope

lrick is not too tricky to learn, or so says Rowe. But to decend, you first kick off your skis and let them drop. Then you let go the tow line, Suddealy, you are dropping free and fast. If you are high enough-and all goes well to reopen and slow you down the parachute will have time before you hit the water. Rowe has been experiment-

ing with his imported parachute at Wisconsin Della, Wis. and may add it to the Tommy Bartlett ski show he will manage there this summer. Rowe predicts a limited number of ski 'chutists will soon be dropping from the aky.

Falling free from several hundred feet up, however, can't equal the excitement of demonstrating American water skiing to crowds of thousands abroad, Dick Rowe claims. Part of a Bartlett ski show sent on tour by the State Department, Rowe remembers rivers and lake shores massed and Korea, Japan, the Philippines and Burms. Only skiing on water all summer at the Scattle World's Fair, Rowe reports, matched the crowd appeal overseas.

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



Administration **Aides Testify** On Civil Rights

WASHINGTON (UPD -Administration officials take over the witness stand this week to testify on new civil rights legislation before the House Judiciary aubcommittee,

Despite the violence in Birmingham, there has been relatively little interest displayed in the hearings which so far have been limited to testimony from members of Congress.

Chairman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) has predicted the bill will pass the House, but foresees trouble in the Senate. The measure has little relation to the issues causing demonstrations in Alabama.

As the only civil rights bill proposal by the administration this session, the measure would extend the Civil Rights Commission's life for four years beyond September, 1963; attempt to get faster action on lawauits filed by Negroes charging voting rights violations; and try to prevent the use of literacy tests to block Negro voting.


