BRITAIN HOLDS HIGH HOPE FOR NAVAL PARLEY

Premier MacDonalds Looking For Agreement That Will Be Effective At Once

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Great Britain has high hopes for immediate and eventual results from the forthcoming League naval arms conference, Premier Ramsay MacDonald revealed in a conference with representatives of the British foreign press at the foreign office today.

While Britain is hopeful that the results of the London naval conference will pave the way for a general disarmament conference under the auspices of the League of Nations, the premier said, the conference will produce an agreement which will be effective immediately.

Public opinion, the premier declared, expects a reduction of armaments. This reduction in naval strength can be obtained in three ways, he added.

Firstly, he stated, it could be obtained by the reduction of armaments already in existence.

If this were found impossible, he said, the second step to be taken would be the reduction of navy building programs which have already been sanctioned by the legislative bodies of the countries involved.

The third method of armament reduction, he said, would be the extension of the lives of ships already built under the agreement reached at Washington. In the premier pointed out, the life of a ship may be extended from 20 to 25 years instead of being scrapped at the end of the first period and replaced by a new ship, a material reduction in armaments would be effected.

Reductions must not enhance the feeling of national security, the premier said. The agreement reached should effect the equilibrium of naval forces as regards the ratio of naval craft which could effectively be used for the fleet.

In his conference with the press of the world, the premier declared that his government believed the results of the forthcoming conference could not be anything but beneficial.

He stated that if the agreement reached by the delegates of the five powers was in itself disappointing in necessities had the effect of stopping competitive building, it would still be a great agreement and indirectly of benefit to the world.

If on the other hand, no agreement at all was reached at the conference, the premier stated, it would mean there would be at least another 10 or 20 years of competitive building.

HOOVER'S DRY SCHEME FACES HARD SLEDDING

Outlook Seems To Indicate Only One Of Measures Will Be Acted On Favorably

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(INS)—President Hoover's program for tightening up on the latter-enforcing laws passed during the Congress in 1927, which have been the subject of much criticism, faces a hard sledding ahead, it is believed today.

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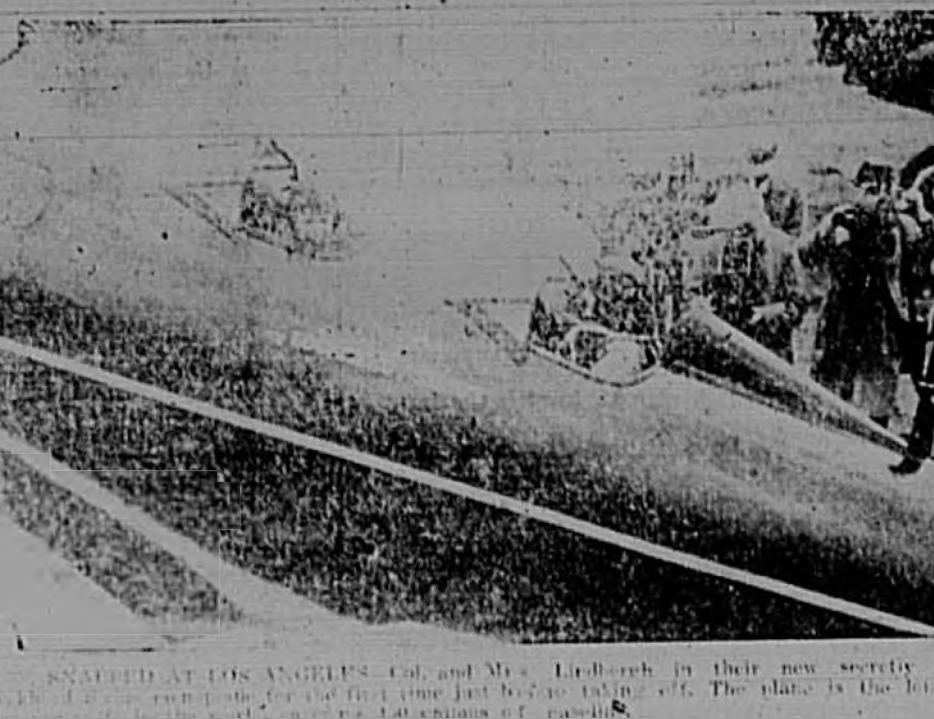
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FAMOUS FLYING COUPLE TEST NEW PLANE

The Prohibition Problem

For several years there has been a growing awakening in this country that all is not well with prohibition enforcement. Either the law is unenforceable, as the wets contend, or the government is not trying to enforce it, as the drys insist. To get at the bottom of the trouble, President Hoover, as one of his first acts, appointed a Crime Commission which for some months has been conducting an extensive investigation. Recently it rendered a preliminary report, and the Tampa Tribune puts it:

The commission finds that to guard 18,700 miles of mainland "at every point of which infection is possible," the government has a personnel of 23,000 agents, "only a small proportion of which is available for actual preventive and investigative work." This is offered as an excuse for confessed failure.

When it comes to practical measures for improvement, the Commission ventures to suggest four: Transfer of investigation and preparation of cases to the Department of Justice; codification of federal legislation applicable to enforcement of prohibition; provision for making so called padlock injunctions more effective; provisions for relieving congestion in the federal courts. So, the "preliminary" findings of the Commission may be summarized as follows:

There are not enough officers to stop the importation of liquor. Enforcement has been attempted by the wrong Department. The machinery of the federal courts has proved inefficient. Therefore: There must be more officers; enforcement must be turned over to the Department of Justice; the federal courts must be increased or facilitated.

The remainder of the Commission's report is a rather ponderous legal opinion on how the procedure of the courts may be speeded up. The Tribune is of the opinion that this report does not get us anywhere in the direction of better enforcement, but it seems to us that any change in the matter of enforcement must be for the better since it is impossible to conceive of any worse situation. It may be that more officers, speedier courts, and a different enforcement department will make a drier nation; but after all, we wonder if that's the goal desired.

"If I Had A Talking Parrot,—"

Last winter we had influenza; last summer the Mediterranean fruit fly—just at present we seem to be having a relapse of this dread malady—and this winter, horrible as it may be, we have psittacosis. The disease was first reported in Germany shortly after Christmas but soon a few cases were discovered in this country, in Maryland and Ohio. It is said to have been brought here from South America by parrots.

The birds were sent here by well meaning individuals who could think of nothing more original for Christmas presents—who could?—than parrots, and the disease was contracted from them by their owners when kissing or fondling their pets. So the various boards of health throughout the country are issuing warnings against the purchase of these birds and any too intimate association with them. Personally we have never had any real fondness for parrots since we asked one once, "Polly have a cracker?" and the bird replied with such utter frankness and vehemence in the presence of several ladies, that she didn't eat any "blankety blank blunk crackers," that we blushed for shame at her language. Recalling the story of the parson who asked his congregation, "What shall we do to save our souls?" and the one-time ship-wrecked parrot who replied, "Tump like hell!" we have no doubt that others have had similar experiences with this bird.

In an age like this when we have Victrolas which can give us the best voices in the world at any time, and radios, which provide us with every form of noise from static to "Amos and Andy," and talking pictures, whose scope in the realm of entertainment is unlimited, and when the greatest talkie of them all, woman herself, is still in her prime, we can see little use for the parrot. No doubt it has its place in the world, but it would seem to us to be in the jungle.

So beware of psittacosis! If you must kiss your parrot, get a health certificate first. You never can tell when germs are present.

WASHINGTON DAY BY DAY

Although she entertains more extensively in the White House than any of her predecessors, and enjoys, during it, Mrs. Herbert Hoover a winning reputation for vivacity.

She is not in any sense an actor-author who writes "fat parts" for herself. Her pleasure is in the planning. When she is sure all her arrangements are in order and everything is running smoothly she does not seem to have as much enthusiasm with her guests, and that causes those who do not know her to wonder why.

No White House guest ever would accuse Mrs. Hoover of aloofness; some say she is a bit too reserved. No guest at the E Street house in Washington or that out in Palo Alto ever thought so. Her complex seems to be to arrange nice parties for her husband's friends, to get him to relax from charts and statistics, and then to keep herself in the background while the center of the stage goes to him.

It is a quality so far removed from the forwardness of some women now prominent in political and social activities in Washington. Mrs. Hoover has a lot of the compliments, from persons of unimpeachable and some semblance of cultural background.

I don't mean any sly dig at her immediate predecessor, Mrs. Coolidge, because every one who has known her was an ardent admirer. It is just that all women cannot be alike, and Mrs. Hoover, a different type, has her own brand of style.

Mrs. Coolidge was at some pains to popularize her husband by being in the street to make up for his inactivity. Mrs. Hoover does her White House parties in such a manner her husband cannot help being the star whatever he does.

Mrs. Hoover has instituted an entirely new sort of informal White House dinner parties and other functions. She has sought to diversify the evenings so that the social aspects of the White House would not drop into the routine rut, and she is credited with having succeeded very well.

In the Executive Administration the social program was largely a product of the Executive Office. Mrs. Coolidge directed Mrs. Hoover's social and plan things she thought her husband ought to do to get away from business for a few hours. There is undoubtedly a lot in both systems.

Freedom Of Speech Is Important Issue At Stake In Minnesota

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Freedom of speech and freedom of the press which Societies taught 22 centuries ago and Milton three centuries ago will defend again before the supreme court of the United States...

"The general libel laws can be invoked against those for the charges are proven. Our fight is against allowing the truth to be suppressed, and newspapers ruled out of existence by a single judge, without a jury trial."

The Minnesota law is said to be unique in the United States.
