Losing weight may cause skin folds

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 30 and weigh 320 pounds. If I lose weight, will my skin shrink to accommodate the change or will it be loose and saggy?

DEAR READER: Depending on the amount of weight you could lose, your skin probably would not shrink back completely. There is no hard-and-fast rule for this, however. Some obese patients lose many pounds and the skin manages to adapt. In other instances, even modest weight loss can leave a great deal of excess, sagging skin. I predict that you will have excess skin folds to deal with, because you really need to lose a significant amount of weight. Don't let my conclusion deter you from making the effort, however. Plastic surgeons are quite adept at removing excess skin. So if you trim down and are still dissatisfied with your looks, see a plastic surgeon.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Once my blood pressure returns to normal with medication, is it safe to stop taking the blood pressure pills?

DEAR READER: As a general rule, no. It is precisely BECAUSE of the medicine that the blood pressure becomes normal. Therefore, stopping the pills would permit the blood pressure to rise to pre-treatment levels.

On the other hand, an occasional case of hypertension may be temporary. For example, obese patients often suffer from a weight-related hypertension that will fall to normal as pounds are shed. I had a 250-pound woman with a blood pressure of 160/100. I put her on a low-calorie, weight reduction diet, and — bless her heart — she followed it. At 230 pounds, her blood pressure was 150/90; at 210, it was 145/85. Finally, after several months of committed dieting and exercise, she returned to her college weight of 175. Her blood pressure, without medication, was 140/80 and remained normal — as long as she continued to keep her weight under control.

Patients on antihypertensive medications should have their blood pressures monitored. If the blood pressures fall to normal (140/90 or below), the physician might be inclined to make a reduction in the dose of medicine. Occasionally, under close medical supervision, patients might be able to stop therapy altogether. This is a decision best made by the doctor. In my experience, thin hypertensive patients ordinarily require treatment for indefinite periods, but I try to keep an open mind about the dosage and the necessity for continued therapy.

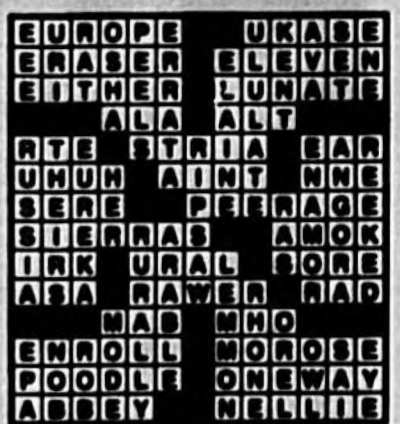

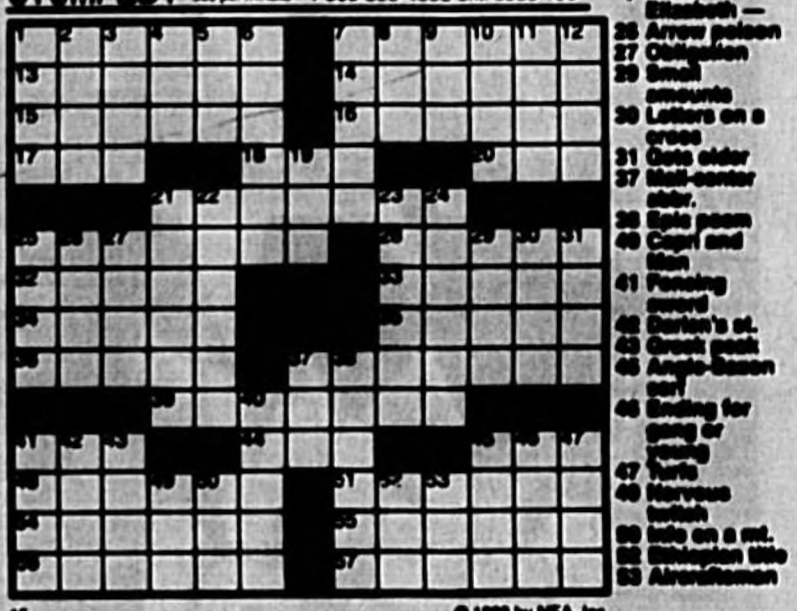

Don't eat the carrot

Sydney Smith, an English writer and clergyman, had a wry sense of humor. (Not "rye," as I once saw in a newspaper. Where was that columnist's copy editor?) For example, Smith said to someone, "I have the most perfect confidence in your indiscretion."

Well, while on that subject, which fruit and vegetables supposedly tempt humans into indiscretion? Now to this bridge deal. How would you play in four spades? West leads the heart two. North's three spades is a limit raise, showing 10-12 support points and at least four-card spade support. For those of you still using the jump raise as forcing, what would you respond with that hand? Take up the limit raise!

It is tempting to finesse the heart queen at trick one. However, if East is in mid-table form, you will go down with this layout. After winning with the heart king, he will switch to a club. Then the defense is ahead in the race. You have nine top tricks (six spades, one heart and two clubs), and can establish a 10th in diamonds, but the defenders will collect four tricks (one heart, two diamonds and one club) first.

The guaranteed line is to win trick one with the heart ace, draw trumps (keeping the king in dummy) and attack diamonds. Now you win the trick. You establish the key diamond trick before the defense can get its potential club trick. Adam and Snow White are indiscreet spies (though the latter did all right in the end), but strangely enough we seem to concentrate on carrots. Are there any others?

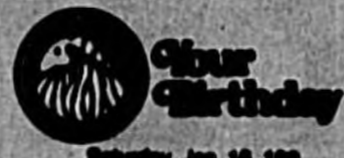

Words may get in the way of worship

The travel editor for the Los Angeles Times recently wrote of an occasion when she was sitting in a pew at the 11th century church of St. Leo's in Venice "wondering what the sermon delivered in Italian was about."

I had a similar experience once when I worshipped at St. Rocco's Catholic Church in Cleveland. I got to the church early and sat up front. I need not have bothered. The service was in Italian. Every word, *O memento mi!*

But Italian is a beautiful language, and I really didn't mind sitting through a service in a language I didn't understand.

I felt the same way while attending a Croatian service in a Catholic church. Actually I got more out of the Croatian service, even though I didn't understand a single word — except "Amen," which is the same in English and Croatian, for some reason. The Croatian service was like something out of the Old World.

When I parked in front of the little consecrated stone across the street from the church, little groups of people were standing at the bottom of the church steps, talking and enjoying each other's company.

A well-dressed middle-aged woman a few pews ahead of me took off her shoes and stood throughout the service in her stockings and feet.

The fact that I enjoyed the service in Croatian (which I don't understand)

more than the service in English (which I do understand) leads me to assume that the impression a worship service makes on the worshiper is more important than the words spoken.

Words may actually get in the way when it comes to conveying a religious, otherworldly feeling. The Croatian service transported me out of this world of time and all things familiar and, for a brief hour, made me feel eternal. In such a setting, words are often unnecessary.

It reminded me of a story about an Italian peasant who used to sit for hours in the Catholic church in his village just looking at Christ on the cross.

One day the padre asked him, "What do you say to our Lord all day, my friend?"

"I just say nothing at all," replied the peasant. "I only look at him and he looks at me."

Getting back to the service at St. Rocco, one thing that caught my attention was a large painting of a man and a dog above the altar. That must be St. Rocco, I said to myself. But why the dog?

I later looked up the story of St. Rocco in the encyclopedia.

He was a 13th century French saint who tended the sick during a plague in Italy and effected miraculous cures. Then he himself fell ill of the plague

and withdrew into the forest, where he would have perished had it not been for a dog that supplied him with bread. Isn't that a touching little story? The pastor of the Croatian church talked to his people like a Dutch uncle during the sermon. He scolded them (particularly the men) for not offering more help with the coming weekend's parish banquet and picnic.

"Some of you don't lift a finger in this parish beyond coming to Mass," he said. "I suppose some of you are saying, 'If you're going to talk like that, Father, don't count on me to help.'"

"Well, if that's the way you think about it, don't come. But if we don't get more cooperation, we won't have any more banquets."

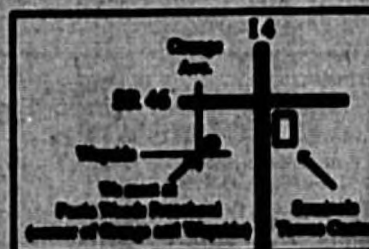

Both teams have excellent shots at a state title in their respective classes, but this one is for bragging rights in the Seminole Athletic Conference. Earlier this season, Winter Springs became the first SAC team to knock off the Rams in three years and did it with a powerful defense at home.

This one should be different. There's no stronger home court advantage in the county than at Lake Mary when the band starts rolling and the gym should be packed. The Rams have four losses already this season, but the one at Winter Springs was the most surprising. Forward Mary Leah Sutton missed that game with an injury but she's back along with starters Lauren Bradley, Ashlee Ballance, Bryn Mosler and Becky Pedro as well as the county's deepest bench.

Winter Springs is on a roll. Going into last night's home game against Seminole, the Bears were 19-2 with a win last week over district rival Cocoa Beach, one of only two teams to beat them this season.

Mary Lou Johnston, Jen Forst, Becky Giagdanino, Kris Dedelow and Bev Dedelow round out the Winter Springs line-up.

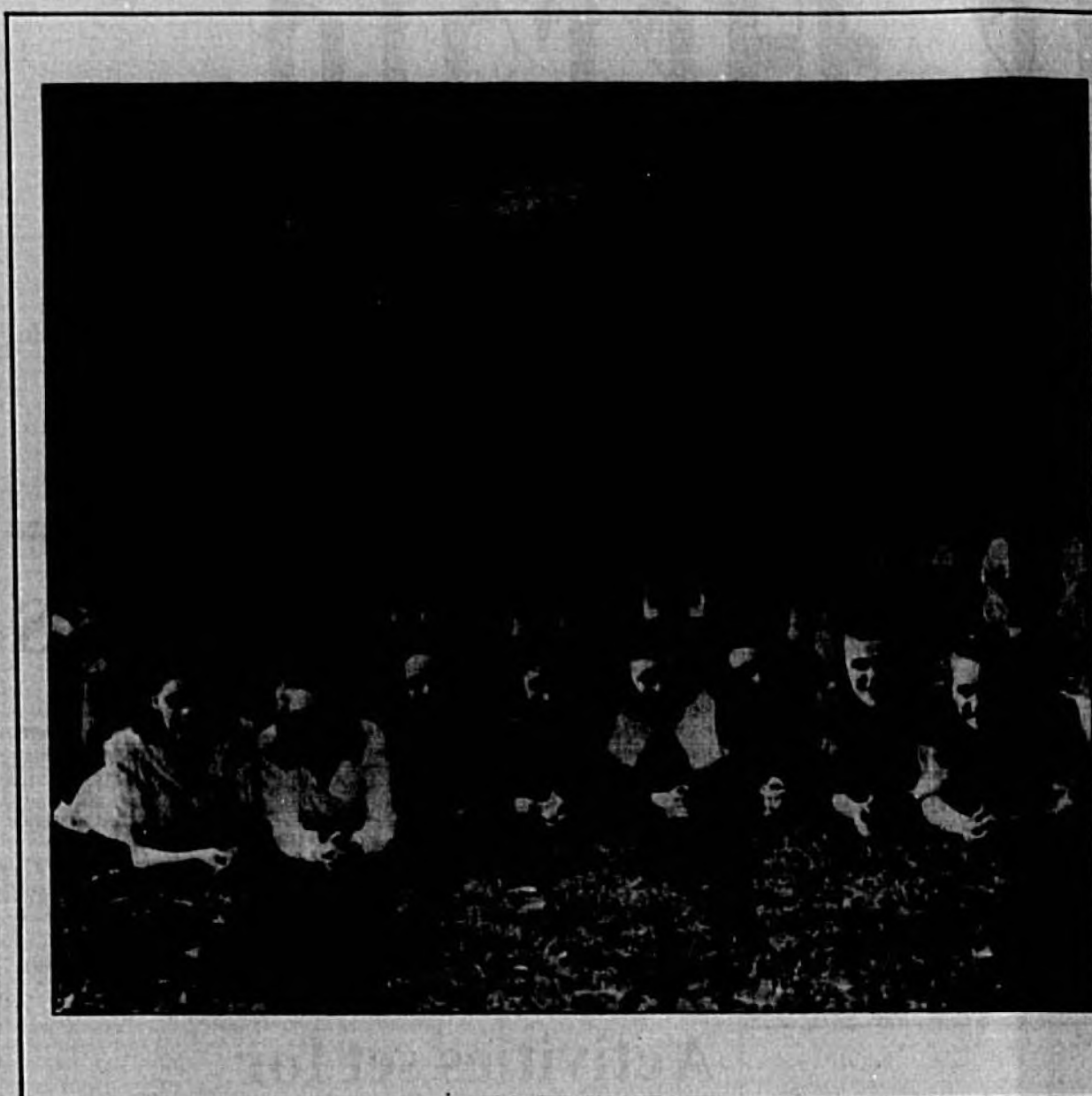

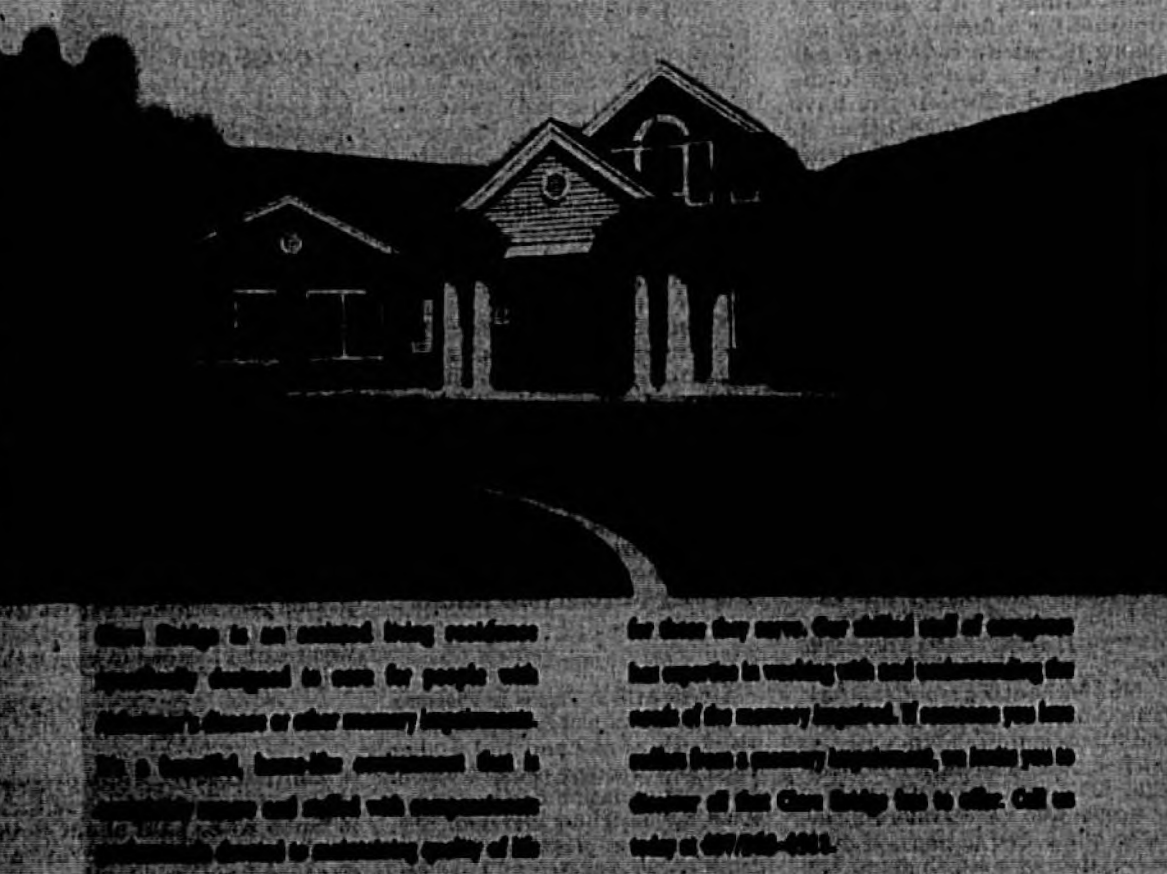

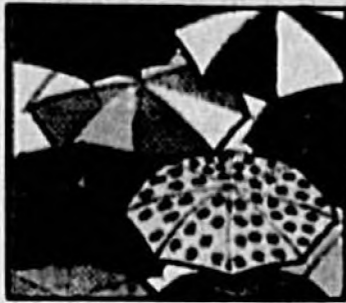

Wednesday in the Altamonte Springs area. After a lengthy foot chase and search of the area, Ploehn was not located. The sheriff's department has recovered the vehicle.

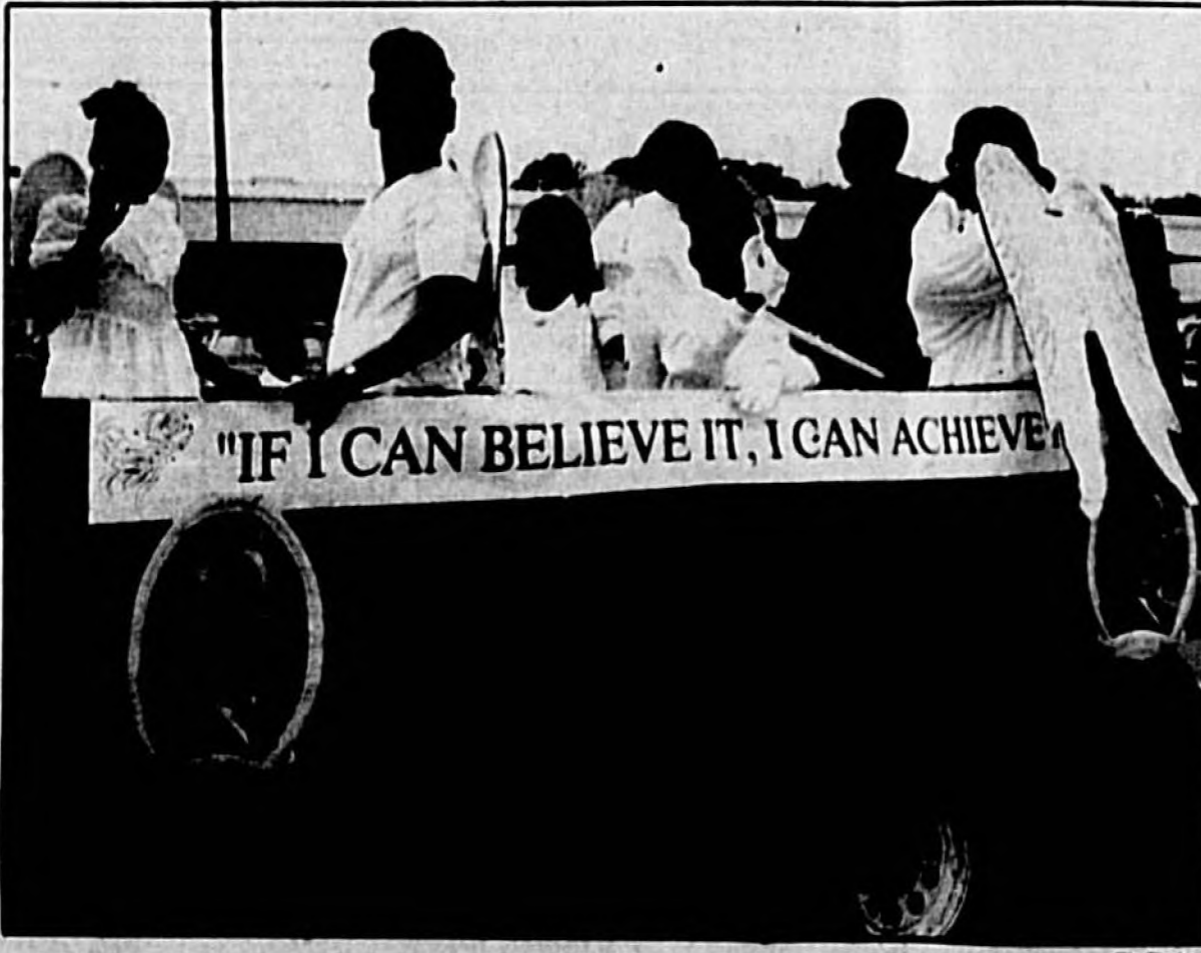
Ploehn has a criminal history of grand theft auto and burglary.

A contractor, Dale built his mother a home in Cardinal Oaks of Lake Mary 19 years ago. Because of poor health, she became a resident at the health care center. Mrs. Dale suffered from Alzheimer's disease and Parkinson's disease.

"We took her to the hospital the Monday after

Christmas," Dale said. "She had Alzheimer's for awhile, and the Parkinson's just kind of crept up."
