



## Losing weight may cause skin folds

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 30 and weigh 320 pounds. If I lose weight, will my skin shrink to accommodate the change or will it be loose and saggy?

DEAR READER: Depending on the amount of weight you could lose, your skin probably would not shrink back completely. There is no hard-and-fast rule for this, however. Some obese patients lose many pounds and the skin manages to adapt. In other instances, even modest weight loss can leave a great deal of excess, sagging skin. I predict that you will have excess skin folds to deal with, because you really need to lose a significant amount of weight. Don't let my conclusion deter you from making the effort, however: Plastic surgeons are quite adroit at removing excess skin. So if you trim down and are still dissatisfied with your looks, see a plastic

DEAR DR. GOTT: Once my blood pressure returns to normal with medication, is it safe to stop taking the blood pressure pills?

DEAR READER: As a general rule, no. It is precisely BECAUSE of the medicine that the blood pressure becomes normal. Therefore, stopping the pills would permit the blood pres-sure to rise to pre-treatment levels.

on the other hand, an occasional case of hypertension may be temporary. For example, obese patients often suffer from a weight-related hypertension that will fall to normal as pounds are shed. I had a 250-pound woman with a blood pressure of 160/100. I put her on a low-calorie, weight reduction diet, and — bless her heart — she followed it. At 230 pounds, her blood pressure was 150/90; at 210, it was 145/85. Finally, after several months of committed dieting and emercies, she returned to her college weight of 175. Her blood pressure, without medication, was 140/80 and remained normal — as long as she continued to keep her weight under control.

Patients on antihypertensive med-

Patients on antihypertensive medications should have their blood pressures monitored. If the blood pressures fall to normal (140/90 or below), the physician might be inclined to make a reduction in the dose of medicine. Occasionally, under close medical supervision, patients might be

able to stop therapy altogether. This is a decision best made by the doctor. In my experience, thin hypertensive patients ordinarily require treatment for indefinite periods, but I try to heep an open mind about the decages and the necessity for continued therapy.



Another few insights to buy-ing on-line include: never give out your internet password; be weary if asked for personal in-

formation, it may be a scam; examine your purchase order closely to insure accuracy of purchase; and print a copy of your order, and confirmation number for your records.

fun and games. While in the
meantime, marketers are looking for a way to slip in the back door. As youth log on to web sites in search for adventures. they are encountered with several personal questions to access a game or activity. The in-formation the children give is then sorted and stored in a marketing database to be used at a later date in soliciting products to the parents. The Federal Trade Commission is encouraging the Children's Advertising Review Unit (CARU) and the Council of Better Business Bureau to develop stronger guidelines to protect

The CARU released current guidelines in April, which require Web sites targeting children to disclose what information they collect and to inform the CARU of how that informa-tion will be used. The guidelines also stress the need for parental consent in targeting children, in addition to displaying marketing language children can understand.

Many major marketers are simply ignoring CARU guide-lines as indicated by the Center for Media Education.



For your part, you must de-cide what you can accept and

what you don't approve of, and clearly distinguish them for your son. Let him know that you accept the fact that he needs to spend time with his friends, but you will neither accept nor approve of his hanging around with kids who are using illegal drugs. Have this discussion in a calm, open and non-threatening way, and be very clear as to what the conse-quences will be if he violates your expectations. Then, if a violation occurs, you must fol-low through consistently with the consequence. Kids and teens welcome and need the structure a caring, involved parent provides, even if they don't outwardly express it.
