

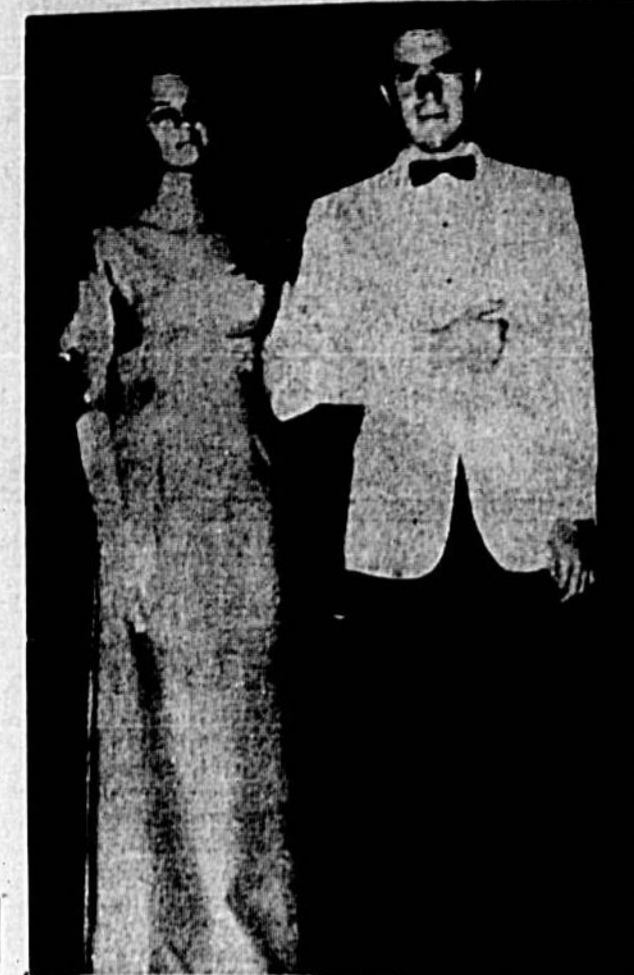

Hearing the testimony of many witnesses that a combination of garden sorrel,celandine, persimmon bark, "from the South Sea," the Tree and spring water had indeed cured them of cancer, the committee reported favorably. The House of Burgesses subsequently voted a 100-pound reward to Mrs. Johnson.

The story is told in "Cancer—A Cancer Journal for Physicians," published by the American Cancer Society, which says that remedies for cancer have been promoted and sold in the United States, from such simple things as a comb of polished and waxed hairpins and expensive and worthless medicines.

Many of those who pin their hopes on unproven remedies do so because of a desire to find a cure for themselves who were cured. Testimonials have always been highly compelling and have led to the hands of quacks of the uneducated.
