operating costs run between

\$10-12,000. The association currently has a guaranteed income of only \$5,100 per year. Of these funds, \$2,500 are derived from the city of Sanford, \$2,000 from Seminole County and \$300 each from Casselberry and Longwood. 

Jenkins estimates it will take from \$2,500-3,000 to ecomplete the work needed so the shelter can adequately handle the animals. It will be only through public donation that the necessary funds can be raised. Right now the humane society is operating with at least an \$115 monthly deficit.
