A Dangerous Condition

The State Board of Health has called attention to the increasing hazards of polluted lakes and streams in Florida. The continued practice of emptying sewers and accumulated industrial wastes into our inland waters is one which if not corrected is sure to result in an epidemic of terrifying proportions and at terrific cost to Florida's reputation and eco-

The State's chief sanitary engineer has estimated that t will cost no less than \$186,000,000 to provide sewage disposal plants at all necessary points in Florida to remedy this condition. But he points out that the current loss to Florida of shellfish beds, seafood, recreation and so forth runs into many millions and a single epidemic, which might restrict or destroy our tourist business, would run the cost into hundreds of millions.

The Herald has frequently reminded its readers of the importance of doing something about Sahford's sewerage facilities. Large sections of our community are wholly without sewers of any kind or description and in rainy weather when water stands for days at a time over backyards where surface wells with primitive pumps are about the only source of drinking water, the existing situation is an open invitation to disease

In other parts of Sanford many of the sewers are deteriorating very rapidly and are badly in need of repair. Storm sewers are connected with residential sewers and all are emptied into Lake Monroe on the very edge of the business district. No attempt is made to treat it chemically to render it harmless or to prevent pollution of the lake. The more Sanford grows and the more people come here to live amployed in various areas.
