





Newspapers in major foreign capitals spared no space in telling the story of the crash that took the lives of Will Rogers and Wiley Post yesterday. Reaction in foreign capitals followed. London—All afternoon papers carried banner lines on the tragedy in Alaska. It was the greatest disaster of interest in British journals after Hitler's announcement of the re-arming of Germany. One newspaper referred to the tragedy as "The funniest case in America and the world's worst."

**Will Rogers**  
A missing motor in a little Idaho camp near the Arctic circle was the cause of an accident which comes as a personal tragedy to millions of people throughout the world. The startling announcement of the death of Will Rogers and Wiley Post yesterday was a shock from which it is not easy to recover. No one can guess more universally loved, or will be more widely missed than the versatile cowboy comedian.  
Everyone was his friend. Highboys and underdogs alike seemed to feel that in Will Rogers they would always find a sympathetic understanding. He joshed with kings and queens, captains of finance, senators and intellectuals, and he met them all on his own terms, with a stick of chewing gum in his mouth and a twinkle in his eye. And when he went among his cowboy friends on the plains to have a few huffers or do some whittling, there were men and women who had to be discarded for the moment. Will Rogers was always just himself.  
In spite of the tremendous popularity of the man it is doubtful if his real genius is even yet fully appreciated. Here was a row hound born in a backwoods Oklahoma community, with no educational or financial advantages whatsoever, who reached the very pinnacle of success in half a dozen fields of particular endeavor. He was among the first two or three most widely read newspaper writers in the country. He was probably the most popular movie actor, and before that he was in Ziegfeld's Follies, and he should be recorded that being a star in Ziegfeld's Follies does not necessarily qualify one for the movies. He excelled as a radio broadcaster. He was an great demand as an after-dinner speaker. Perhaps his greatest feat was his sound common sense which made his words the guide of statesmen and the terror of demagogues. He was the nation's No. 1 humorist and philosopher. And more than that all that he was doing of the best cattle rangers and bronco busters that ever rode off the plains. He always said, "There's a lot of sense in a horse's tail." And he was a great success in many other fields. I am glad to see that art is recognized as well as literature.


