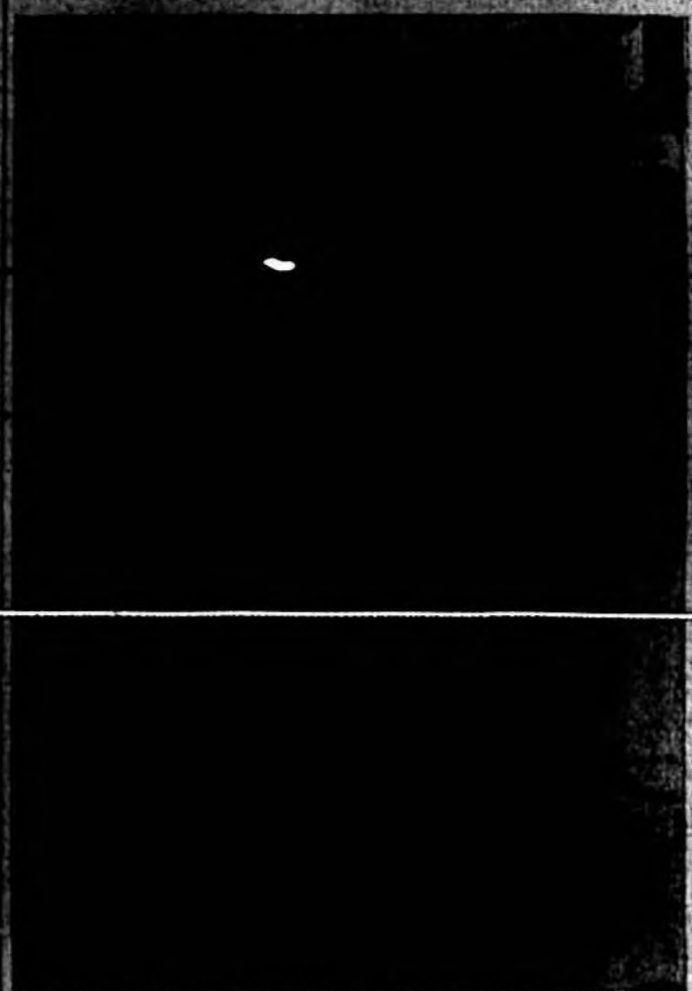

## New Sanford Folder Is Studied At Meeting Of Chamber's Directors

A study of a new folder for the Chamber of Commerce was made at a meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce held at the Chamber building last night. Secretary Edward Higgins presided.

The folder was prepared by the advertising committee of the Chamber and Mr. Higgins said that it is the plan of this committee to distribute 50,000 of these folders at the fair during the summer months. The folder will be supplemented at the fair by a larger booklet giving more in detail the points of interest and other information about this county.

Mr. Higgins told the directors that the folder will be distributed to the Chamber of Commerce in this county and to the Chamber of Commerce in other counties. ## Reasons For Dill Removal Again Cited

### State WPA Chief Was Removed On Study Of Tax Matters, Harrington Asserts

WASHINGTON, May 15.—(AP)—WPA Commissioner Harrington told a House committee today that Dill was removed as Federal administrator after investigation of his "position" involving the state's federal relief program. Dill was succeeded by Roy Schroeder, March, 1939.

Harrington's testimony was made public today with other proceedings, affidavits and reports by the House committee investigating the WPA. A long list of projects and complaints were involved in reports of the investigators.

The commissioner upheld the investigator's findings in relief employment of 18 members of the University of Florida football team, although more than 500 certified relief clients awaited assignments in Gainesville.

It also upheld the report that William B. Lewis, Jasper, "well-to-do and independent proprietor" of a wholesale grocery concern was employed at Dill's direction by the WPA as supervisor of a road project.

## Anti-Allied Acts Of Italians Is Cause Of Concern

ROME, May 15.—(AP)—New anti-Allied demonstrations, capped by the burning of British and French flags on a mock raft in front of the British consulate in Naples for Greece en route to New York, and Italy appropriated nearly 2,000,000,000 lire (\$100,000,000) for extraordinary expenses of five ministers to meet the "international situation."

Some observers said they believed the sailing of the Conte di Savoia was a sign that Italy would stay out of the war, at least two weeks. Others recalled that the Germans went to war last September with the liner Bremen on the high seas.

Several thousand shouting students burned the coffin with the flags after they shouted against the Allies and for Hitler and German submarines three times loudly acknowledged their cheers from his Palazzo Venezia balcony.

France lodged a diplomatic objection to the anti-Allied campaign, but comments on the French stand was withheld by both officials and the press while the demonstrations continued unabated.

Some cabinet and legislators advised their nationals it would be wiser to leave Italy if they did not have a good reason to stay.

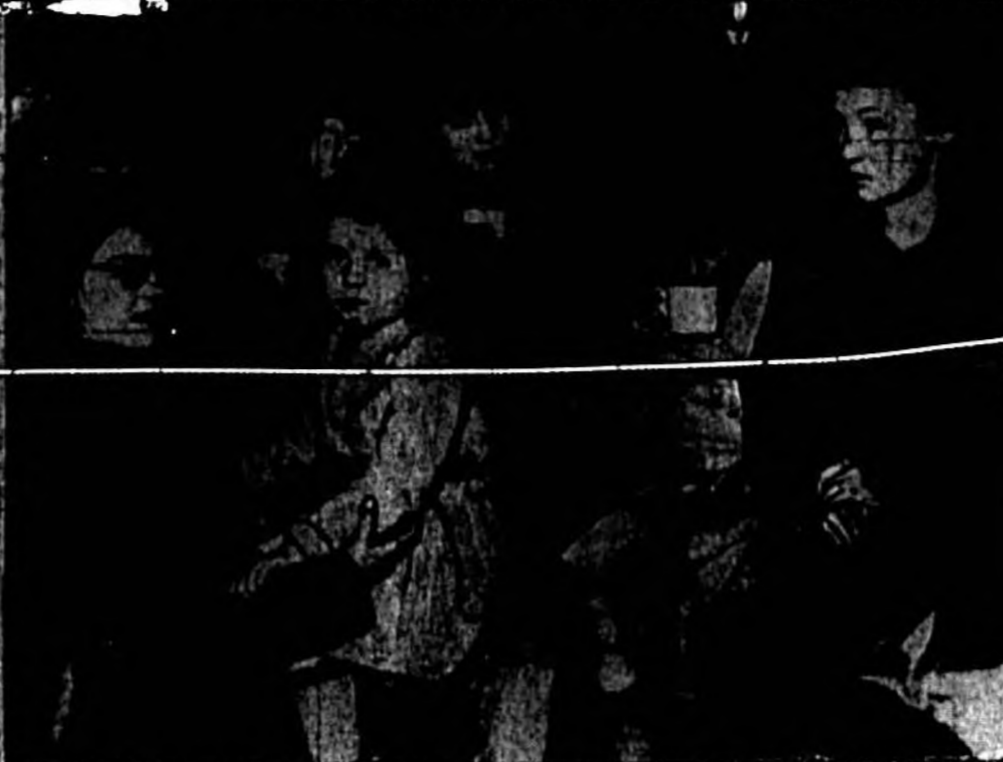

German troops sweeping into France have "pierced" the northwest extension of the Maginot Line, the German high command reported today. The Nazi claim was disputed in France.

The French high command admitted the Nazi legions have crossed the River Meuse under the impetus of a massive attack—both by land and air—but said the German tide had been stemmed and hurled back six miles.

German forces originally had penetrated 10 miles beyond the Meuse—25 miles into France—but the French said the German thrust has been repulsed to a 4-mile salient south of the river by a fierce French-counter attack. The British air ministry described the battle raging around Sedan, France, as "terrific."

The air ministry said British fighters strafed enemy troops, and tank concentrations in several low-flying attacks with "highly successful" results and shot at least 15 German planes, which were destroyed.

British losses were placed at 35 planes, which the air ministry said was "not considered excessive" in view of the German motorized troops pouring into the Haghe, Dutch capital, which capitulated late yesterday when the Netherlands high command declared Holland's resistance was broken.

The Netherlands' foreign minister Eelco van Kieff, estimated his country's army had suffered 100,000 men killed, one-fourth of its total strength of 400,000.

The Netherlands government at the same time announced through the Paris legation that the kingdom would carry on its fight against the Germans.

Germany besought Belgium to follow the Netherlands' example and lay down her arms and threatened Britain with a blitzkrieg from the Dutch coast. The Belgians showed no signs of compliance.

The war appeared to be stabilizing into a conflict of positions along the bloody banks of the Meuse and Albert canal—from France's fortified zone of the north, through the Ardennes mountains to the Belgian coastal plains.

Britain sped resupplying of a home front army to fight any German parachute invasion.

The Netherlands' capitulation to Germany set Adolf Hitler for a frontal assault on Great Britain.

"A dagger aimed at the heart of England," is the way Napoleon once described Antwerp, in neighboring Belgium. That term may be applied today to Rotterdam by the Germans, who also are aiming at Antwerp.

The Dutch coast is dotted with covers providing bases from which Nazi submarines could strike at the Allied channel ports of Dover, England and Calais, France, through which British supplies flow into France.

With the German using the Netherlands base for air and sea assaults on Britain, the British no doubt would reply by bombarding at their shipping points.

## 31 Refunding Bonds Retired By Commission

### City's Debt Has Been Reduced By \$92,000 During Fiscal Year

Acting on the authorization of the City Commission, City Clerk H. S. Sayer yesterday retired \$92,000 in City of Sanford refunding bonds, bringing to a total of \$92,000 the amount of the City's bonded debt retired to date in the fiscal year which began last Oct. 1.

The price paid by the City for the refunding bonds and attached interest coupons ranged from 25 1/4 to 27 3/8.

Since the refunding program was inaugurated several years ago, the City has retired over \$330,000 of its \$5,000,000 bonded obligations and has kept the interest paid in full.

Contributing to the large amount of bonds retired last year was the collection of delinquent taxes on Sanford property while the debt service levy of 18 mills which is paid by all property owners in Sanford has raised sufficient revenue to pay the interest obligations when due.

Because of poor tax collections to date this year, however, the City is experiencing some difficulty in obtaining funds for operation of the City government, including the police and fire departments and the street department which includes the collection and disposal of garbage. As a result each of these departments has been asked to hold expenses to the lowest possible point in order that the budget for the fiscal year will not be over-expanded.

Because of this shortage of funds for operating expenses, the City is also unable at present to pay its share of WPA projects for improvements.

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## NEBRASKA

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With the capitulation of Holland, another of the most democratic, enlightened and progressive nations of the world has been added to the list of victims of Nazi aggression. The list already included Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Norway, and Denmark, all of which, with the notable exception of Poland, represented peoples living under the most advanced stages of civilization, as we Americans understand that word.

There are only a few remaining bulwarks of democracy left in Europe and these comprise Belgium, already half overrun by German legions, and France and England, and tiny Switzerland. The Swiss represent no barrier at all to Nazi aspirations, so the only thing standing between us and the apparently overpowering forces of international gangsterism is the strength of Britain and France, which are being put to the severest test in their history at this writing.

Americans have counted pretty heavily on these two friendly democracies to defeat Germany and thereby save the embarrassment of being bullied and blackmailed if not directly attacked. Faith in the ability of France and England to stem the tide has received a jolt during the past few days and realization that we are totally unprepared and incapable of protecting our interests without the British and French has suddenly dawned on us.

As a result we are hearing a great deal of talk about getting prepared, building a two-ocean navy, increasing the size of our army, our air fleet, and building up reserves of materials. There is no question about it, our war equipment will be inferior to that of our enemy. Congress is contemplating making huge appropriations to carry on a great preparatory effort.

However, it looks as though we have delayed too long in getting prepared. The fate of Europe, and our own, may be decided in the next few months and may, heaven's help, be decided in the next few weeks and days. Our only hope is that the Allies will be able to stall the German war machine long enough to give us the opportunity to mend our military fences and to put our industrial hour in order so that we will have the capacity to turn out the necessary instruments of warfare. In the meantime, beginning as soon as we should use all our energies in the construction of warplanes, which we can either sell or give to the Allies in such quantities that they may tip the balance against Germany.

A Call For Help

The local chapter of the American Red Cross is launching a drive in Seminole County to raise funds for relief in Europe with an assigned quota of \$1,500. This may seem like a large sum, but when we consider the suffering and hardships which innocent peoples in the invaded countries are being subjected to the amount does not seem so large, and we believe that our citizens here will respond to this appeal with all their capacity.

In making a plea for its city, the St. Augustine Record points out that "in many Red Cross chapters in different parts of this country, war relief work has been under way for months in the work rooms. Women have been knitting, rolling bandages, and making all sorts of arrangements for civilian relief and hospital use. In the meantime, the German war machine has been rolling on the outskirts of our cities. We have not been asked to do anything.

"Now, the call has come. The need is urgent, with brave men fighting being harassed, as they stand steadfast, striving to stem the German hordes, which seek to overrun their lands; bomb their cities; seize their rich stores of foodstuffs, raw materials, and gold, and eventually to reduce them to the status of vassal states, because they have dared to defy the German war led in a stand for freedom. The damage to civilian property is enormous. People are being driven from their peaceful homes in villages, towns and cities. Often they are forced to flee without taking the commonest necessities of life. Casualties calling for hospital attention must be plentiful.

"The American Red Cross must aid, and that right speedily.

"We hope that Sanford and Seminole County will answer this plea for assistance in the same worthy manner in which, unasked, the people of this section contributed nearly \$200,000 for Finnish relief.

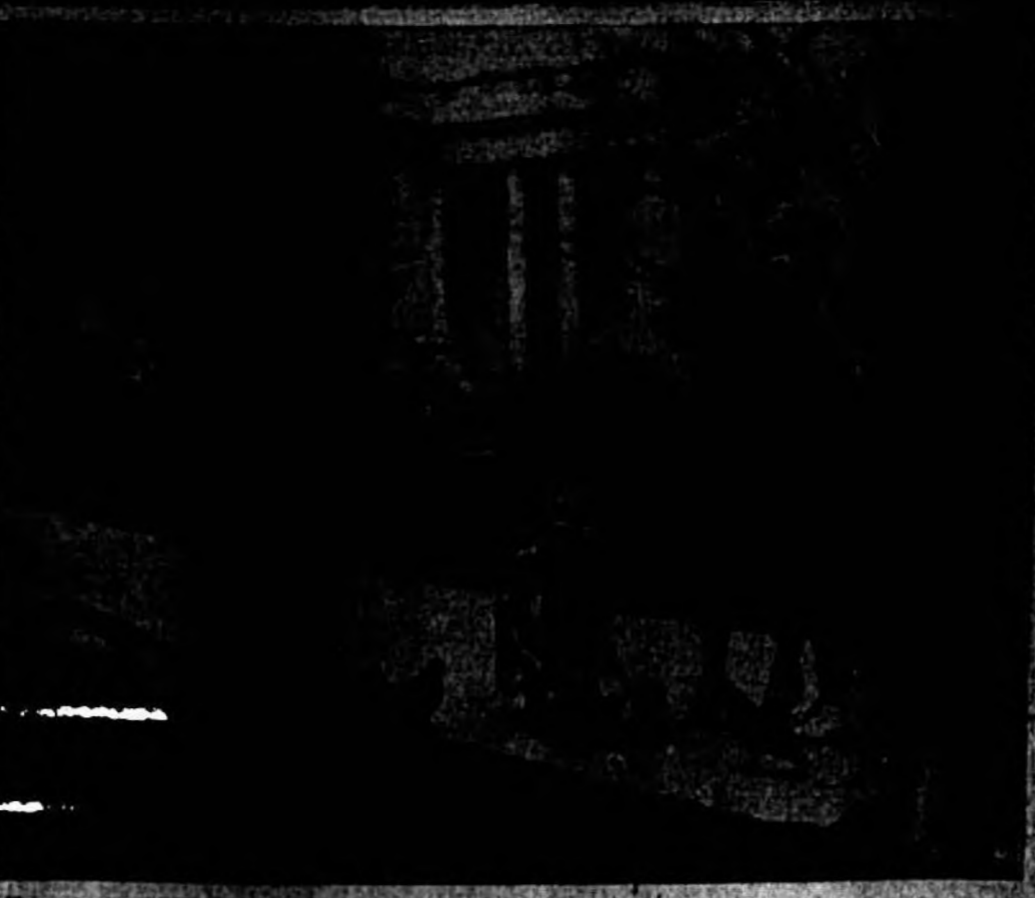

### Mechanized Forces Of Both Sides Break Through And Attack At Rear Of Enemy

French say Nazis continue to gain. Roosevelt sends plea to Mussolini to prevent spread of war.

A fast shifting war of movement—embracing thousands of warplanes and gliders—battered along the 110-mile Western Front from Antwerp, Belgium, to Sedan, France today as the Nazi juggernaut hammered at Belgian defense lines and the north wall of France.

Mechanized units from both sides cut loose from infantry and drove forward to strike at the enemy rear. At least 600,000 troops, evenly balanced, were engaged.

A French war office spokesman acknowledged that the German advance was continuing to push forward. A British military spokesman said the Great Britain forces in Belgium still were holding out.

### Schools Benefit From War Book Binding Project

One of the most serviceable WPA projects so far as the schools of Seminole County are concerned is the WPA book binding project which is being conducted at the Seminole High School, Superintendent of Schools F. W. Lawton said today.

In this project employment is given to a supervisor and two assistants, one full time and one part time. Their task is to repair and bind books used in the various schools throughout the county, Mr. Lawton said.

During the past year they have repaired 2024 books, a number of which have been fully or in part rebound and the others printed on them. There are at present 1920 books and magazines in the various schools awaiting repair.

The project, Mr. Lawton said, has been almost indispensable since the majority of the repair work was done on books which were no longer usable and the school board had no funds with which to make replacements.

The salaries of the workers are paid by the WPA while the school board pays the cost of the materials.
