Huge War Tax Bill Is Before Congress

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3. (AP)—A \$9,610,000,000 war tax program "to be felt in every American home" was laid before Congress and the nation today by Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau.

The new taxes will be severe, the Treasury chief told the House Ways and Means Committee.

Mr. Morgenthau asked the doubling of most people's individual income tax, rates so stiff that a single man with a \$2,000 a year salary would pay \$230 tax; if he made \$10,000 he would be allowed to keep only about \$100,000.

Part of the tax probably will be deducted from paychecks. Mr. Morgenthau also recommended higher taxes on corporations, and new and higher excise taxes on such items as soda pop and cigarettes, liquor, estate and gift taxes, plus \$2,000,000,000 additional social security tax.

Germans Admit Great Attacks By Massed Reds

Plight Of Trapped Nazis In Staraya Area Is Desperate

The Germans today admitted unprovoked attacks by newly massed Russian troops all along the front.

The Russians reported last night they were steadily frustrating airborne attempts to supply the German Army trapped in the Staraya Russa sector, were entering their free zone around Leningrad 140 miles to the north, and were mounting a new attack on Kharkov in the south.

The fact that the Germans are so persistently attempting to supply the encircled 15th Army in Staraya Russa by air was interpreted as an indication that the 90,000 men there were in increasingly desperate straits. The Red Army already was in sight of ruined buildings of that one-time popular watering place and the Germans had converted into a communications base.

German planes were said to have observed great columns of Soviet troops and enormous supply trains moving up behind the Red Army's advance lines.

At some points, Russian attacks already were reported to have been described by German military spokesmen as "on a scale not reached hitherto in the war."

The Berlin correspondent who reported the German military spokesmen said that the Red Army was attacking in several sectors, and that the soldiers showed no hesitation, regardless of the cost.

He said the Soviet Siberian units admitted were demonstrating "almost unbelievable stubbornness."

There can no longer be any doubt, he wrote, that the Soviets are massing all their forces in men and material for a fantastic effort to bring about a decisive battle.

In Lisbon, Portugal, a foreign military expert told the Associated Press that "the Germans must retreat to positions west of the big rivers in Russia before the thaw begins, or they will run the great risk of being crushed by the Soviets for lack of communications."

Former Osceola Man Dies At New Orleans



WASHINGTON, Mar. 3. (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee today recommended that Congress prohibit the Commodity Credit Corporation from selling its farm stocks at less than parity, a provision President Roosevelt opposed unsuccessfully in the Senate last week.

After sending the \$696,065,859 supply bill for the Agriculture Department to the House, the committee accused the Farm Security Administration of carrying on experiments in collective farming under a plan "which appears to resemble the practice of collective farming in Communist Russia."

The Farm Security Administration is in charge of the federal program, which will be announced later.






