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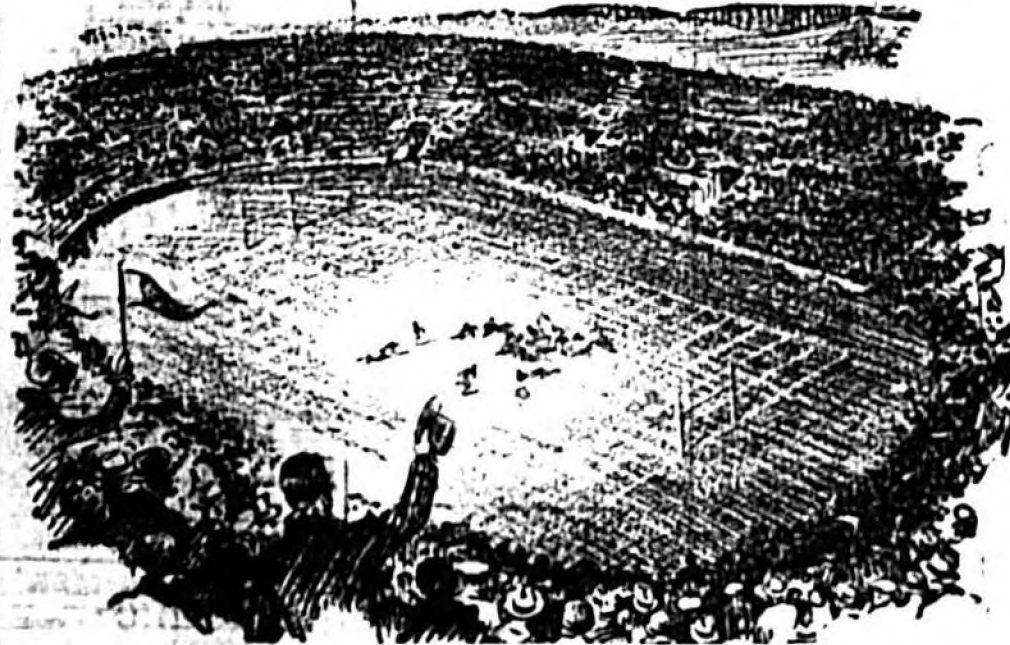

After the windy tumult of the year

Today is Thanksgiving. Be thankful for the many things you have to be thankful for.

Now if Georgia beats Georgia Tech—and this is a great year for us—Florida will be sitting on top of the world.

General Sumner says there are three and a half million men ready for any war emergency. This doesn't include, of course, those who got enough of it before.

What we gather from the testimony taken during the investigation into the sinking of the Vestris is that most of the crew were all set.

Nevertheless, Thanksgiving was celebrated here at that time with as much enthusiasm as the pilgrims gave to the original. People realized that the loss of money was not the end of the world. Those who had suffered the loss of money were thankful that they had been spared their friends and relatives. Those who had failed to harvest a good crop were glad that they lived where a warm sun and fertile soil would bring up fresh crops for them the following year.

So we were thankful then, but we must realize that we are to be thankful for today. These were the days of bankruptcy a year ago and we look back over the past days that spread out behind and that trail vanishing into the future and see what the future held for us. We look back with a far greater degree of enjoyment and appreciation of the future with a much surer sense of security. The past twelve months bring Thanksgiving to us this year with something more tangible for which to be thankful.

We have seen another celery season come at a good season which returned good prices on a large crop. We have seen the other products from this section coming to the markets in large quantities at the right time. We have seen the prices for citrus fruits soaring out of sight and the market for beans and peppers and lettuce the best for many years. We have seen new business houses opening stores in Sanford and we have seen new capitalists becoming interested in this section.

But what is more than that by far is the new spirit which we have seen permeating the people of this community. A spirit, which signifies unity of purpose in the task of putting Sanford on a sound financial basis and of working out its destiny through practical economic channels has at last taken hold and has resulted in many who have previously kept to themselves minding only their own affairs, now assuming the responsibilities of civic development and undertaking real community-wide programs.

So it is with a far greater degree of confidence that we look into the future of this year. We are a crystal gazer, we believe we could foretell many wonderful things for this city. We are almost certain that we would see it rising out of the smoke screens and muddy spots of the past into a thriving city of health and happiness where the moral fiber of its citizens would stand the test as surely as the celery stalks with which its fields abound.

### Limiting Navies

Congressman Britton's unprecedented proposal to Premier Baldwin calling for the assembly of two joint committees, representing England and the United States for the purpose of preventing a race of naval armaments may be a bold and radical move but it contains one feature which we believe would warrant more anxious than previous attempts have had.

Hitherto, councils for the prevention of big navies have been dominated or at least influenced by those who still held the tradition that the battleship is the backbone of coastline defense and that a large fleet goes hand in hand with security from war. Rightly do all navies take a keen pride in their service and naturally do they wish it to be as efficient and powerful as possible. Their lives have been dedicated to a romantic and glamorous occupation and their training ever has been to stand by the fleet.

When dignitaries gather to discuss limiting naval construction, about the most useless and usually the most conspicuous present are the Navy men. It is natural that they make every effort to curb battleship construction, but in many efforts to curb battleship construction have come to naught and that agitation is now rife for launching into a huge expenditure plan to keep abreast of England's sea power, and this in the face of the increasing deadliness of airplanes and the assurance of may experts that the battleship is helpless under a shower of aerial bombs.

No surcease will come in the way of lower taxation, by the curtailment of expenditures for powerful navies as long as that curtailment depends on men whose lives are given over to the very thing which they are expected to limit. The plan of Congressman Britton at least gives the assurance that the findings of the civil committee will not be biased by the tradition of the Navy or prejudiced by those whose interests are a little too personal.

IN SPITE OF the fact that the metropolitan newspaper now reaches into nearly every town and village and into many of the rural sections in the country, the local news paper in the United States is each year getting on a firmer foundation and becoming more and more useful in its home community. It may be said that the day of the metropolitan newspaper is at hand, but it is equally true that the day of the local newspaper is at hand too. The metropolitan daily with its world-wide news, its comic sheets and its magazine supplements, while essential in our modern civilization, cannot take the place of the home newspaper. The very fact that the big city daily must cover a broad field forbids its becoming local in any sense, and it is the local field where the home newspaper dominates and where it finds its true usefulness.—Jefferson City (Mo.) Post Tribune.

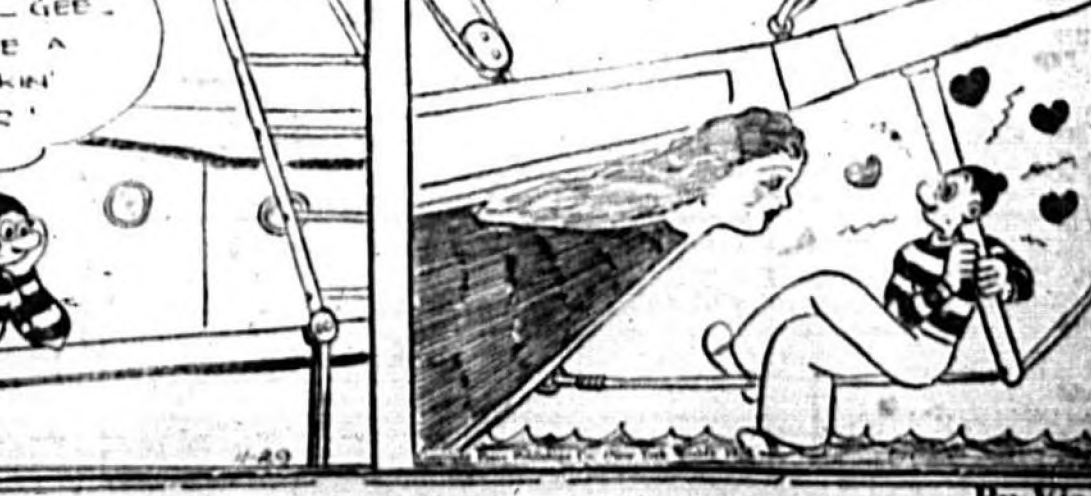
