Breakfast Confab May Decide Issue Airport Authority Decision Due

A Friday 8:30 a.m. breakfast meeting at House of Steak between the Sanford City Commission and Sanford Industrial Commission was scheduled Thursday for the city commission meeting after Mayor Lee P. Moore advised the two groups need to get together to discuss implementation of Sanford Airport Authority Act.

Moore said, "We don't know what will come out of the meeting but the ball is still in the air on whether the airport will be operated by an authority or a city department."

The mayor said the situation is now more complicated by the resignation of Don Rathel, industrial commission director. Rathel announced last week his intention of leaving his position after Jan. 15.

The breakfast session between the two city boards resulted after Earl Fairclain, state attorney general, announced his decision on whether the city is required by law to implement the authority act as passed by the Legislature last summer. Fairclain said there is nothing in the act to indicate that the Legislature intended to compel the city to activate the Sanford Airport Authority and the Industrial Development Authority in order to perform these functions and duties.

In view of this ruling, it is apparent that sentiment to implement the act is still strong in some city groups and their opinions along with views of appointment, also prevalent in some city groups, will be aired Friday before a permanent solution for operation of the airport and its industrial applications is achieved.

Cards Urge Release Of GI POWs

Sid Vihlen Jr., president of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees, today announced plans for local Jaycees to send Christmas cards to North Vietnam officials, urging the immediate release of all U.S. prisoners of war.

According to Vihlen, the project is a nation-wide effort by The United States Jaycees to focus attention on the "inhumane treatment of American servicemen captured in Vietnam by the Communists."

Official sources indicate that more than 1,300 American servicemen are either missing in action or held captive by the Communists and 200 have been missing for nearly four years, a period longer than any American held prisoner during World War II.

In addition to local Jaycees participating in the project, all residents of Seminole County are urged to send greeting cards to "Project P.O.W., Box 2000, Washington, D. C. 20013. Inside the card you should list your name, address and a short message asking North Vietnam to release all American prisoners immediately, to immediately release the names of prisoners now being held and to afford prisoners proper treatment in the meantime.

Altamonte Drops Suit Against City's Mayor

Altamonte Springs Mayor W. Lawrence Swofford emerged victorious with dismissal of a controversial law suit to recover \$500 which council alleged he owed the municipality for out-of-town expenses.

Swofford requested the council at a special meeting last night to give me and the people of Altamonte a Christmas present, and dismiss the law suit. Sabharwal then moved for dismissal of the suit, stating that the amount recovered would not justify the amount of expense involved to the city.

City engineer William Palm gave a progress report upon Phase 1 of the sewer system, stating that work was on schedule. Palm recommended partial payment to Orange Packing and Construction Company of \$14,250, and to Bumbley and Stimpson of \$24,825.

In other business council adopted upon first reading an ordinance for annexation of Orange Ave. into the city and an ordinance for abandonment of Williams St. was presented for second reading by title only.

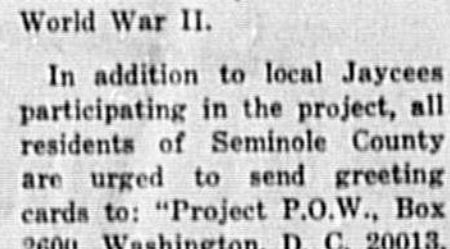



A Decade Ago ... First Of 40,000

LIVINGSTON, Tenn. (UPI)—On a warm day in May 1961, a slender middle-aged druggist named James Clarence Davis peered at a world map and, laughing, asked, "Where in the hell is Vietnam?"

He had just been told that that was where his soldier son, Tom, was going.

Eight months later, Tom Davis died with a Viet Cong bullet in his chest, on a narrow dirt road outside Dan Hoa in Vietnam. He was the first American killed in combat in the war that now has claimed almost 40,000 American lives.

Tom Davis is remembered today in Livingston, a quiet town of dentist-clinical men, busy housewives and happy children. Other young men from Livingston who died in that far off, strange country are remembered, too. But Tom Davis was the first.

One thing they remember about Tom Davis is that as a boy he "liked to hunt and fish more than anything," and that while in high school he wrote "My ambition unlimited—my fate unknown."

It was almost Christmas when the young soldier died—Dec. 2, 1961. The Davises were giving a birthday party for their daughter when a cab driver brought the telegram.

"I remember it well," says Davis, the father of four other children, a druggist in the town. "My ambition unlimited—my fate unknown." The cab driver must have known. He was all broken up.

The body followed the telegram by 14 days. "That was the worst part," Mrs. Davis recalls. "I was numb. I was numb for a long time after that."

"No one can know how the other families feel—the other 40,000," adds Davis. The search of the community's Davis clan leaned his head back, thought for a moment, and began muttering seven or eight other Livingston boys who have died in the Asian struggle.

"They brought boys home the same week. It wasn't long ago that the Bradford boy was killed."

When a Viet Cong ambush ended young Tom Davis' life at age 26, his dreams still on "ambition unlimited" died with him. Now only memories remain.

Memories a father holds of a boy "liked by everybody in the country. I didn't know he had so many friends until after he was gone."

Memories of the youngster who blew a hole in an old judge's barn while playing around with an antique motor. Memories of a boy soldier in his backyard, digging trenches for make-believe battles with wood-en-guns.

Memories held by his wife, Geraldine. Memories which will be related through a scrapbook to Cynthia, his little girl, too young to remember.

A few walls have been knocked out, some changes made, but basically the neat trimmed corner house on Cedar Street is the same as when Tom Davis left to go to war in the place his father had never heard of.

"This is the house I kept—my scrapbook of memories to keep—the faded yellow telegram, a sympathy letter from President Kennedy, colored pictures of a memorial service.

On a hill a mile and a half from the residence home is the grave of James Thomas Davis. A vase of yellow flowers is next to it. It's a quiet resting place to these Tennessee hills.

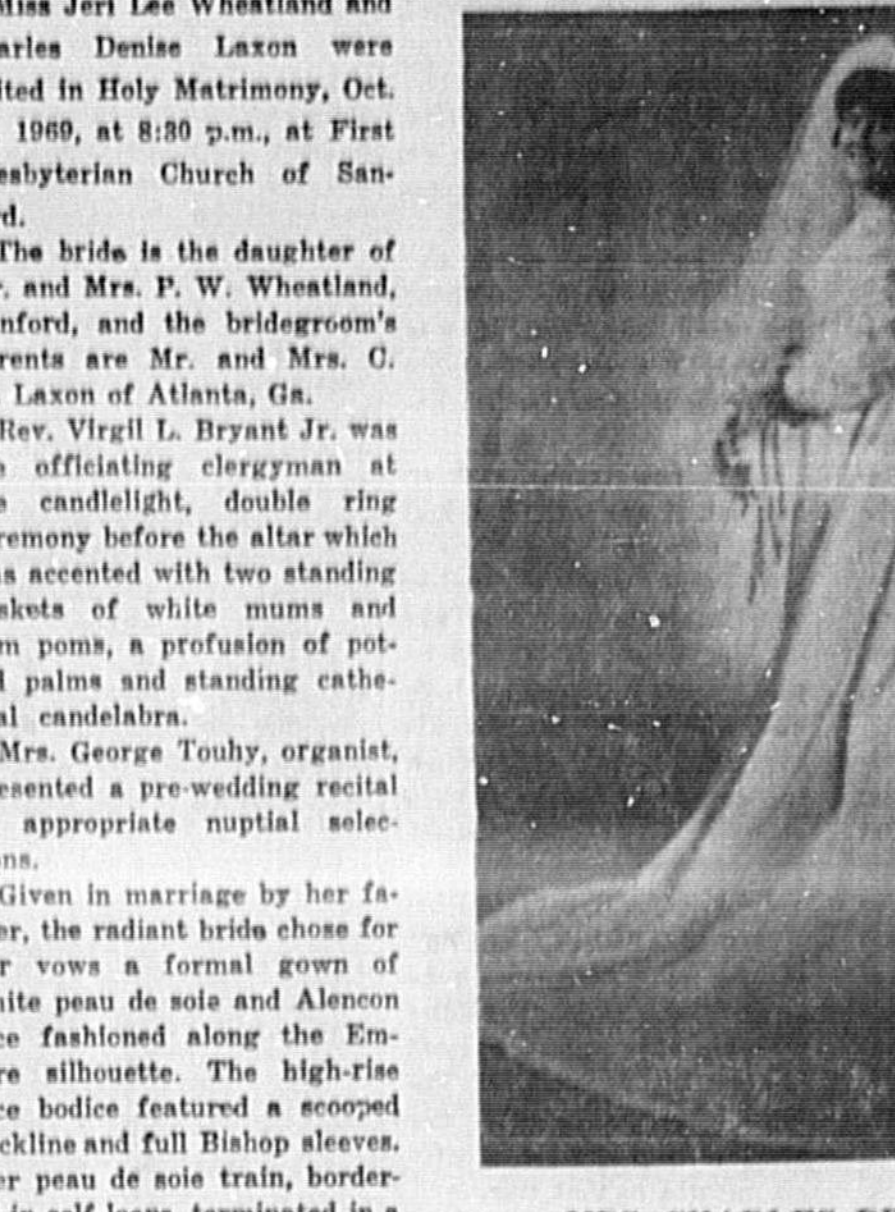

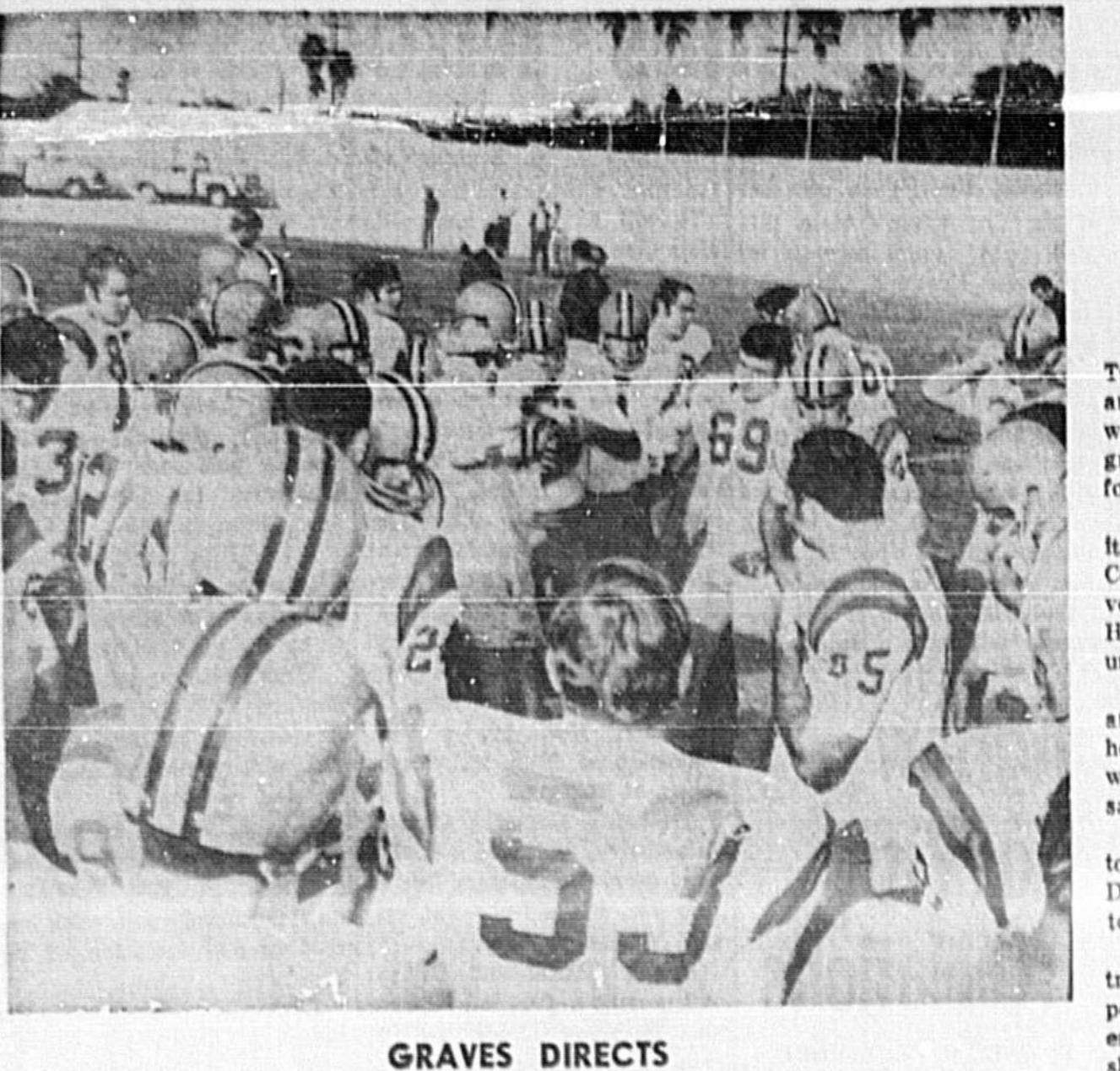
