If state accepts corrected data, Seminole schools will rank second in state

SANFORD — Seminole County schools may rank second in the state if Florida Department of Education officials accept new data from the school system.

Local school officials are appealing the grades released last week by the Department of Education because an error was made by the school district in reporting the percentage of students who were tested.

District officials estimate that 12 to 13 schools will receive A's if the state accepts the district's new data. Another 13 to 14 schools would receive B's, along with 17 C's and six D's. If the state accepts

the county's new data, only the Sarasota school system would rank ahead of Seminole County.

Superintendent Paul Hagerty sent an appeal on Monday informing the state about the local error, which occurred when district officials reported every student who had attended school in Seminole County instead of subtracting the students who had transferred out of the system from the total number of students. Some students were counted twice for different schools.

"We have 57,000 students," Hagerty said. "But, our demographic data made it appear like we have 67,000 students."

At Lake Brantley High School, for instance, 719 tenth-grade students took the FCAT and Florida Writes! tests. However, the district reported that 810 students were tested. The high school received an Incomplete because of errors in reporting the percent of students tested. The district estimates that the school will receive a C.

Longwood to discuss charter changes

LONGWOOD — The questionable future of Longwood's Charter Review Committee report moved closer to clarification Monday evening.

Mayor Paul Lovstrand called for a special meeting on July 12 for the board of commissioners to consider proposed changes to the city's historical governing document.

Commissioners have until Aug. 16 to decide if any of the proposed charter amendments should be placed on a November referendum for voter approval. A total of 14 changes have been brought forward by the five-member committee, chief among them, a controversial amendment that would change the commission's current simple majority to a four-fifths "super majority" vote when it comes to the hiring and firing of Longwood's city administrator, city attorney and city clerk.

Goldsboro Center making a difference

Dedication ceremony is scheduled for July 1

GOLDSBORO — On a recent stroll Lt. Aaron Keith made from the Goldsboro Community Center, a young man called out from a semi to ask, "Is 13th Street going to be like this all the time?"

"We're working at it," Keith answered. Since the Sanford Police Department and Seminole County Sheriff's Office began daily operations on May 25 in a double-wide modular building at 1211 W. 13th St., the residents of Goldsboro say they're pleased.

Many have come into visit with the officers at the center, and on Thursday, July 1, there's going to be

a dedication of the place at 10 a.m.

"We've been handing out invitations," Keith said.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale and Sanford Commissioner Velma Williams, who championed the concept of the center, will be among those at the dedication. Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett and County Commissioner Daryl McLain will be there, too.

Williams said the only negative feedback from residents was that the center is open only on weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. "The community appreciates the efforts of the officers," Williams said. "They would like service in the evening, also - particularly on Friday and Saturday evenings."

Williams said she will push for this to happen. Meanwhile, the officers involved seem to be making progress. "The goal here is trying to be pro-

After the ABCs, the big D-ilemma Judge grants leniency to Oviedo's Jason Watts

Most people were surprised by the grades Seminole County's schools received last week on a first-ever report card from the Department of Education — there were no A's, a bunch of C's, six D's and five incompletes.

Can't be, the numbers are wrong, county school board members are telling us.

Surely, Rock Lake Middle deserves an A. And what about Lake Mary High? What happened?

"Our data processing department turned in bad data," Seminole County School Superintendent Paul Hagerty said Monday. As many as 10,000 students who had moved out of the system or transferred were counted in the scoring. Instead of 57,000 students there were 67,000 counted.

Hagerty, for one, believes the error will be corrected, and that Seminole County schools will be found academically among the best in the state. He's certainly not sweating gundrops. He sees the stir as a plus for education.

"The report cards are the buzz across the state," Hagerty said, excitedly. "There are headlines in all the papers. There's value in this alone — the focus being on education. People are going to find out the Seminole County school system is near the top."

For many years, families have moved to Seminole County because they believed the school system was near the top, the *creme de la creme*. Realtors had little trouble getting families to settle here. Corporations were able to recruit the best personnel.

Much of the school system's recent success has been attributed to Dr. Paul Hagerty, the first appointed superintendent in the county. On July 1, Hagerty will celebrate his seventh anniversary as superintendent of schools. Last week the School Board (by a 3-2 vote) hiked his salary to \$135,000 plus benefits.

One principal, who asked to remain anonymous, said Hagerty has had the program on the upswing for seven years. Hagerty, a former Superintendent of the Year in Missouri, was named Superintendent of the Year in Florida in 1997.

"The good old boys who used to run the system have been replaced," the principal said, "Dr. Hagerty runs the system as if it were a large corporation. It's the most important business in the county because of its responsibilities. What's happened is awesome."

More awesome may be what's ahead.

Carlton Henley, the County Commission Chairman, is following the school system's

doings with a critical eye. Henley was principal at Lyman High School for 31 years and ran unsuccessfully for Superintendent of Schools.

Recently the Board of Commissioners and School Board members had their first joint meeting in many months. It was a spirited two-hour session that will soon be repeated — and repeated much more frequently. It appears Henley intends to be a de facto school board member.

"We've got to be careful that our school system isn't deteriorating," Henley said. "Dr. Hagerty has his hands full. The School Board needs \$300 million to build five elementary schools and repair existing schools."

Henley also said that a number of the county's best school administrators, who made the system click, have retired in the past three or four years. He named: Don T. Reynolds, Bud Leyer, Ted Barker, Gretchen Schapker, Richard Evans.

"Our teachers obviously deserve better pay," Henley said. "Teachers have and will always deserve better pay. It's one of the worst pay discrepancies in America. Look at what athletes get. Look at pay for so many non-essential jobs. And look at what teachers get."

County Commissioner Grant Maloy, whose mother was a school teacher, said the county commissioners can do more to help.

"We can push for safety improvements at the schools —

better sidewalks, traffic signals. But we don't set school policy. That's the job for the superintendent and the school board," he said.

Father of three small children, Maloy said he wasn't sure if they would attend public school, private school or be home-schooled.

To be sure, Paul Hagerty is the man responsible for all changes. He's the man of the hour in the education of 57,000 Seminole County youngsters. His decisions affect the futures of not only these students but that of their families and the entire community.

As Hagerty said, the DOE's report card has created a buzz. Everyone is eager to find out if the DOE's grades are the real thing. While it's vacation time for most of the students and some teachers, there's much activity at the Seminole County School Building.

OVIEDO - Football player Jason Watts, sentenced to 10 years in prison for reckless homicide in a crash that killed two of his friends last November, has been given probation and will be released from jail on July 19.

Watts, a center at Oviedo High School and starter for the University of Kentucky, will be on probation for five years and be required to attend an alcohol abuse program and do 50 hours of community service.

On Monday, Judge Daniel Venters of Pulaski Circuit Court ordered that 22-year-old Watts be released. Venters declined to comment on his decision.

Venters granted Watts what is known as "shock probation," an early release to nonviolent

offenders. He pleaded guilty to two counts of reckless homicide in March.

Pulaski prosecutor Eddy Montgomery said the early release devalued the seriousness of the charges against Watts, whose pick-up truck overturned as he sped on Nov. 15. His Kentucky teammate, Arthur Steinmetz and friend, Scott Brock were killed in the accident north of Somerset, Ky.

Watts' blood-alcohol content was found to be 1 1/2 times the legal limit. Steinmetz and Brock also were drunk at the time of the crash. They had been celebrating Kentucky's victory in the last game of the season.

Before the accident, Watts entertained thoughts of a pro football career. He was Kentucky's No. 1 center for three years, snapping the ball to All-American quarterback Tim Couch.

chairman Craig Van Hooven and vice chair JoAnne Rebello officially presented the changes to the commission. At that time Lovstrand questioned whether there would be sufficient time for review and discussion of the proposed changes. A vote for a special meeting failed by a 2-1 vote last week when two commissioners were not present.

That initial rebuff has sparked heated comments from both sides about the timing of the presentation and the controversy involving Charter Review members, politics and personality conflicts.

Van Hooven took over as chair of the year-long project in May when Jim Daly passed the gavel after becoming the subject of an investigation for possible malfeasance after a verbal confrontation with fellow committee member Lynette Dennis following adjournment of an April committee meeting. A move to oust Daly from all city boards

and committees failed to generate a motion for a vote last week.

"It's the commission's job to find the time for a review," said Van Hooven afterward.

"Not to allow the public to hear and comment on recommendations files in the face of public input. What the commission said last week was, 'We don't find your time of value.'"

Butch Bundy and Daly have likewise encouraged the commission to find time for a review, in less than gentle terms. Said Daly, "It's a crying shame to negate hundreds of hours by a volunteer committee trying to

contribute to the city. Their refusal to review it is strictly political."

Commissioner Steve Miller has countered that the review committee's recommendations are likewise politically motivated.

"This is a historical document. The vast majority of

their recommendations are politically motivated. I agree with some of their recommended changes but not all of them."

Miller said, historically speaking, when multiple changes on referendums are put before the public they are often voted down just on sheer complexity.

"I don't know what is on the minds of other commissioners, but I think it would be in our best interest to review it," Miller said.

Van Hooven said the committee's most significant recommendation, a move to a super majority vote is intended to end the revolving door that has become Longwood's city administrator position. Last year commissioners voted 3-2 to fire Shelton Smith as city administrator. Smith had held the position for approximately five years. The city has had a string of seven administrators between 1985 and 1998.

Other proposed charter amendments would clarify the exact role and duties of the city administrator, amend qualifications to include a minimum of a bachelor's degree for the position, adjust the position's compensation package and outline a process for performance reviews.

active rather than reactive," Keith said. "We walk through the neighborhood each day - two officers - and we talk to as many residents as we can. We ask them if there is anything we can do. What are the problems?"

Keith said that six community service officers are deployed at the center. He said four different squads work from the station.

The officers file reports on computers at the station. "The activity about the place alone has helped create a safer mood in the community," Keith said. "The store owners here tell us they're pleased."

Keith said that the officers have issued a number of citations to those who have played their radios too loud. "The noise was bad before. Things are much quieter. We're going to keep issuing citations when there are offenses."

Williams said Monday that she has received "a good feedback"

from residents.

"They tell me that they feel more secure, that it is much more quiet and that traffic is at a good flow. No more cars stopping like they used to - deals being made like they used to. They would the station to be open on weekend evenings."

Williams said was that some residents said they expected a permanent building not a modular one.

"That may come one day," she said. "We certainly tried to find someone to sell us one of the existing properties on 13th St. We did what we could for now."

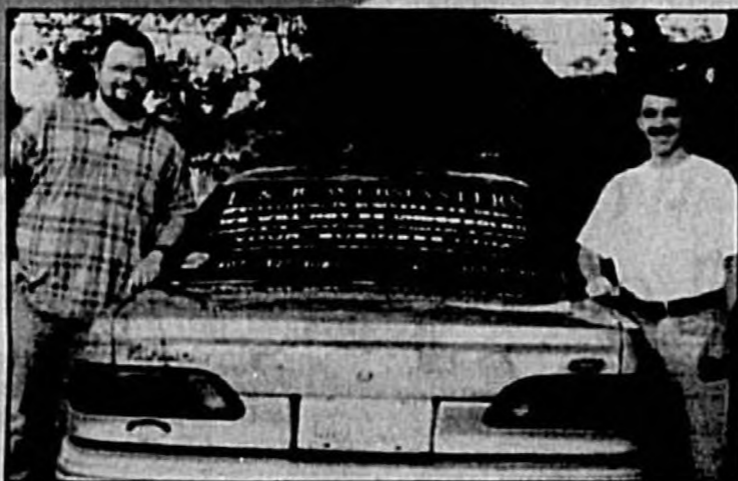

Suddenly, the gentleman in the Camaro darts into the right-hand lane and flips you a choice finger for driving "too slow." To top it off, he speeds Warp 6 in front of you into your lane, coming within inches of your car and making you spill some of that hot coffee into your lap.

Now it's 8:36 a.m. How do you feel?

If you yell obscenities at the driver, return the crude gesture, try to cut him off in return, or attempt to chase him, you are experiencing "road rage." Road rage is different from the normal annoyance you may feel on the road, such as heavy traffic or screaming toddlers in the backseat. Road rage is the point at which normally mild-mannered individuals can become

out-of-control with anger. As a result, enraged drivers put themselves and others at risk for serious injury by driving aggressively.

Road rage has been on the rise on American highways and Central Florida is no exception. Locally, drivers have had guns drawn upon them or been involved in accidents as a result of road rage incidents.

According to the US Department of Transportation, aggressive driving was a factor in up to two-thirds of the highway deaths in the mid-90's.

So what should you do about road rage? Figuratively speaking, take the high road. Refuse to let the behavior of other drivers get under your skin. Realize that an upsetting incident is not worth serious injury or losing your life over. Letting an inconsiderate driver go without retaliating greatly reduces the risk of accident or injury.

When people become angry, rational decisions become difficult to make. Driving a car is an activity that requires making many rational decisions. A driver who is calm, cool and collected is likely to be thinking clearly.

So when you feel yourself get-

ting angry on the roadways wake a deep breath. Count to ten. Instead of getting angry, let yourself laugh at the ridiculous behavior of that clown in the Camaro. Take another deep breath. Swallow your pride and realize that there is nothing you can do in your car at that moment that can change the behavior of an aggressive driver.

Do not challenge another driver by speeding up or cutting them off. Do not return obscene gestures. Avoid making eye contact with an aggressive driver.

If you feel like you absolutely cannot keep your aggressive tendencies under control while driving, seek professional help. A counselor can help you determine why you become out-of-control angry and can teach you some anger management techniques.

An upsetting incident on the roads, if handled coolly and rationally, will be soon forgotten. An accident or injury will be long remembered.

School would improve from C's to A's under the school district's estimates, while three middle schools would rise from a B to an A, including Jackson Heights, Greenwood Lake and Indian Trails schools.

Seven elementary schools would rise from a B to an A, including Lake Mark, Lawton, Rainbow, Woodlands, Wekiva, Keeth, and Partin.

Oviedo High School would rise from a C to either a B or an A. Dailey said that 94.6 percent of the school's tenth graders took the FCAT and Florida Writes! tests, and if the State rounds up to

come to school ready to learn."

In other changes to school grades, Lake Mary High School would rise from a C to a B.

Additional schools rising from a C to a B would include Milwee Middle, South Seminole Middle, Tuskawilla Middle, Bear Lake Elementary, Sterling Park Elementary and Red Bug Elementary schools.

95 percent the high school would receive an A. At least 95 percent must take the tests for a school to make an A.

However, six elementary schools will still receive D's, including five in Sanford.

days, and the suspension and dropout rates must be below state averages. Substantial improvements must be made in reading, without substantial declines in writing or math schools.

At least 95 percent of the standard curriculum students must be tested. Plus, the schools must meet all the standards for the B schools.

The school district has a 30-day period to appeal the grades.

This is the first year for the school grading system. It is part of the same education reform package that created a plan for parents in schools receiving an F twice in four years to receive vouchers for private schools.

Investigators examine barge accident site

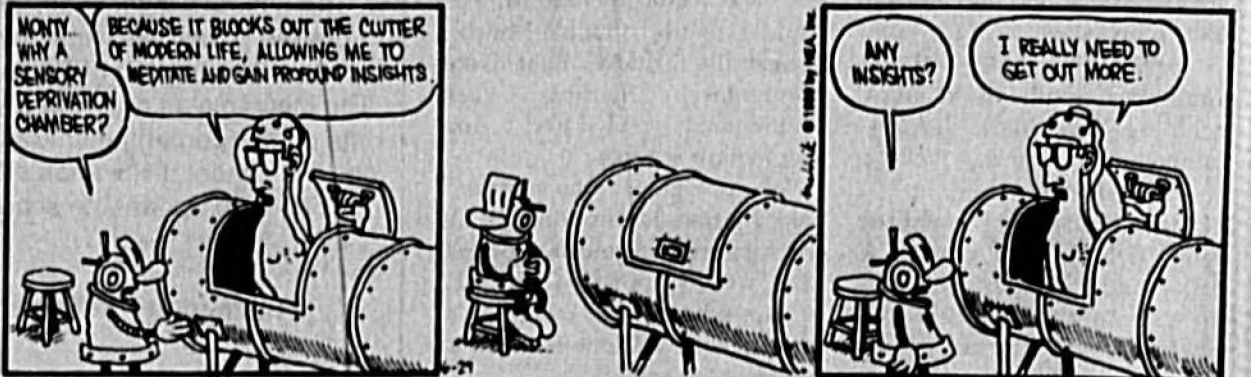

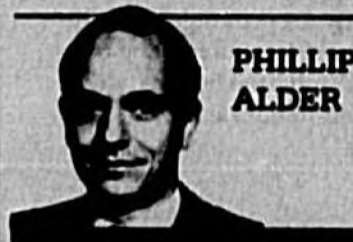

WIN AT BRIDGE

The ruff is usually right



PHILLIP ALDER

Consider a trump suit of A-K-Q-J-10 in your hand opposite 8-8-7 in the dummy. You have five trump tricks. (And if it were a no-trump contract, you couldn't get more than those five winners.) However, if you can get dummy void of a side suit and ruff a loser in that suit, you generate an extra trump trick. The five winners remain in your hand, plus you have the ruff. Note, though, that if you are void of a suit in your hand and ruff there, you do not generate an extra trick. You are using one of your five winners.

If you can take a ruff in the shorter trump hand, it is almost always the right line of play.

In today's deal, you are in four spades. You start with only three losers: one heart and two diamonds. However, West leads his singleton diamond, East wins with the king, cashes the ace, and gives West a ruff. Back comes the club jack. What next?

You have suddenly been presented with an extra loser. Now the only concern is your third heart. However, as dummy has only two hearts, you can ruff it in the dummy.

There are two rules to follow here: Draw as many rounds of trumps as you can afford, and ruff high if possible. So, after winning with the club ace, draw two rounds of trumps using honor from your hand. Then, play a heart to dummy's ace (the honor from the shorter side first), return a heart to your king, and ruff your last heart with dummy's spade jack. Finally, ruff a club in hand, draw East's last trump, and claim.

ASK DR. GOTT

Aunt really needs to bathe

DEAR DR. GOTT: My unmarried elderly aunt has not bathed in two years, because she is fearful of slipping in the bathtub. The family is concerned about her hygiene, but she angrily refuses all help. Any suggestions?

DEAR READER: I have several, but none of them are perfect solutions.

First, the family might consider laying down the law. It is appropriate for the elderly to bathe at least once or twice a week — and to change their clothes at suitable intervals. Give your aunt an ultimatum: Either she bathes or else. Sometimes this tough-love approach can be softened. For example, rubber bath mats in the tub, assistance by a female family member, grab bars and similar techniques could help lessen your aunt's fear of falling.

Second, consider enlisting the visiting nurse service in your community. These dedicated professionals, along with certified nursing assistants, can regularly visit your aunt for the purpose of attending to her personal hygiene.

Third, you may be able to negotiate

with her about sponge bathing. A good sponge bath will clean her up periodically.

Last, if all else fails, you may have to consider nursing home placement. In my experience, a refusal to bathe is usually only the tip of the iceberg. Frequently, there are other cognitive lapses as well. How about her eating habits? Her ability to handle her finances? Her memory? Her degree of cooperation? In short, has the time come to bite the bullet, have her declared mentally incompetent and give power-of-attorney to a family member?

Of course, each situation — no matter how difficult — must be individualized. Your aunt's doctor should be a vital part of the team. Perhaps there are alternatives, other than what I mentioned, that would be suitable. You must assess your aunt's total personal situation and social milieu, and not focus only on her physical cleanliness. The primary goal is to protect her from harm while allowing her to maintain the highest level of independence that she can. This usually is a delicate balancing act that can be a daunting challenge to any family.

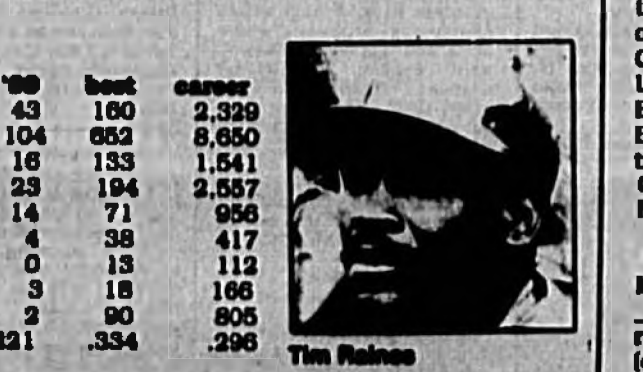
