WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Rackets Committee dug into the roots of the Chicago underworld today to take a look at juke box racketeering in the city where it may have been conceived. Some classic examples of gangsterism were expected to come to light in this phase of the juke box investigation which will last about four days. Chief Counsel Robert F. Kennedy said the inquiry would center on some of the top figures in the storied Chicago underworld. He said these would include Sam (Mooney) Giancana, reputed to be the latest successor to the gangdom throne of Al Capone.

Strength Needed, Bishops Declare

ATLANTA (UPI)—"We have not done our part in helping the church to fulfill its mission if we have not confronted man with God," a San Francisco Methodist bishop said here today. "The root of the mission rises or falls in relationship to the success achieved in worship." Bishop Donald H. Tippett said the quadrennial Southern Methodist Convocation here.

Bishop Tippett said, "Modern man may not be bothering too much about sins, but the alarming increase of successful and prosperous psychiatrists can be explained in part, at least, by the fact that his sins are bothering him." Dr. Hurst B. Anderson, president of American University, Washington, D. C., told the gathering "Somehow the American education institutions devoted to the spiritual values of our Christian culture must be strengthened."

Citrus Board Hits Juice Processors

LAKELAND (UPI)—Florida Citrus Mutual took another swipe at makers of frozen orange concentrate today and said it acted "for the constructive progress for the industry."

The big growers cooperative's board of directors voted to oppose any legislative move which would extend the life of the powerful Concentrators Advisory Committee, scheduled to die this summer if the Legislature does not renew it. At the same time, Mutual President Vernon L. Conner issued a statement designed to clarify Mutual's place in the citrus industry and to lessen some bitterness caused by a recent cleavage between growers and processors. He said "Mutual's program and aims are not competitive with any other organization but generally proved to be complementary to any and all constructive efforts to unite and strengthen the entire industry." He said "Mutual recognizes that the citrus business is big business and calmly and firmly advises against pettiness in the internal affairs of the industry and directs unified, constructive progress for the industry in marketing its products."

Mash Into River, Water Is Highball

FRANKLINTON, N. C. (UPI)—Town officials here are hopeful that residents of the area don't develop a great liking for the new taste of the municipal water supply. They fear they would be hard-pressed to legally treat the water to maintain the taste or the 40-proof kick which the water produces. C. G. High, water plant superintendent, recently received a few complaints—but not many—regarding the strange taste and smell of the liquid flowing from taps all over town.

When he analyzed the "water," he found it was a ready-made highball of corn whisky and water. High would not say how much liquor he found, but a reliable source said it was about 40 proof. Seems revenue agents knocked off a still just outside town and dumped several thousand gallons of mash and mashing into a stream which ran past the still. They found out too late that the stream runs into the pond which is the town's only source of water.

Ike Is Answered, Reuther Cheered

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (UPI)—AFL-CIO leaders today praised Walter Reuther for his comeback at President Eisenhower's jibes about union leaders meeting in "sunny" Puerto Rico to talk about a march of jobless on Washington. "I go where meetings are that I am obligated to participate in just as you will be going to the fashionable resort of Acapulco, Mexico," Reuther said in direct reply to Eisenhower's comments at his press conference in Washington Wednesday. Reuther also won cheers from fellow labor leaders for defending his proposal for a demonstration march by unemployed on the national capital. Eisenhower derided the idea of a such a march. But informed sources said AFL-CIO President George Meany was frowning on the Reuther suggestion. They said he had doubts that anything would be gained. Labor leaders are sensitive to possible charges that unionist dues have been wasted on high-priced hotels, foods and drinks.

Gunman Captured At Law Roadblock

WINSLOW, Ariz. (UPI)—A 40-year-old steelworker was captured without a struggle at a roadblock Wednesday night and admitted killing the mother-in-law and critically wounding the wife of a jazz musician Johnny Zorro in a gun battle. Leonard Mason, befriended by the Zorro family five years ago because he was friendly, told police he hid in a closet at the Zorro home in Glendale, Calif., Tuesday night and shot it out with Zorro's attractive wife. Mason was caught just west of this city on U. S. Highway 86 after an Arizona highway officer spotted his car and rained ahead to set up a roadblock. He waived extradition and will be taken back to Glendale probably sometime today by policeman sent here from the California city. He was originally believed hurt in the Tuesday night gun battle, but police here said he was unharmed. "I felt sorry for him," Zorro said in explaining his former friendship with Mason. "He seemed to have few friends. People called him a creep. 'I had so much happiness I wanted to share it with a lonely man.'"

Discharge Slated For Ex-Sergeant In 'Death March'

CHERRY POINT, N. C. (UPI)—Acting Cpl. Matthew McKeon, central figure in the Parris Island, S. C., "death march" almost three years ago, will be honorably discharged from the Marine Corps here later this month. A spokesman for the Marine Corps Air Station here said Wednesday a physical evaluation board had recommended that McKeon be discharged because of a ruptured spinal disc. The secretary of the Navy approved the discharge Feb. 2 and McKeon will leave the service as soon as the necessary paperwork is complete. McKeon, defendant in one of the most publicized general courts martial in military history, was the Parris Island drill instructor who led a platoon of recruits into a tidal creek here. Six of them drowned the night of April 8, 1956.

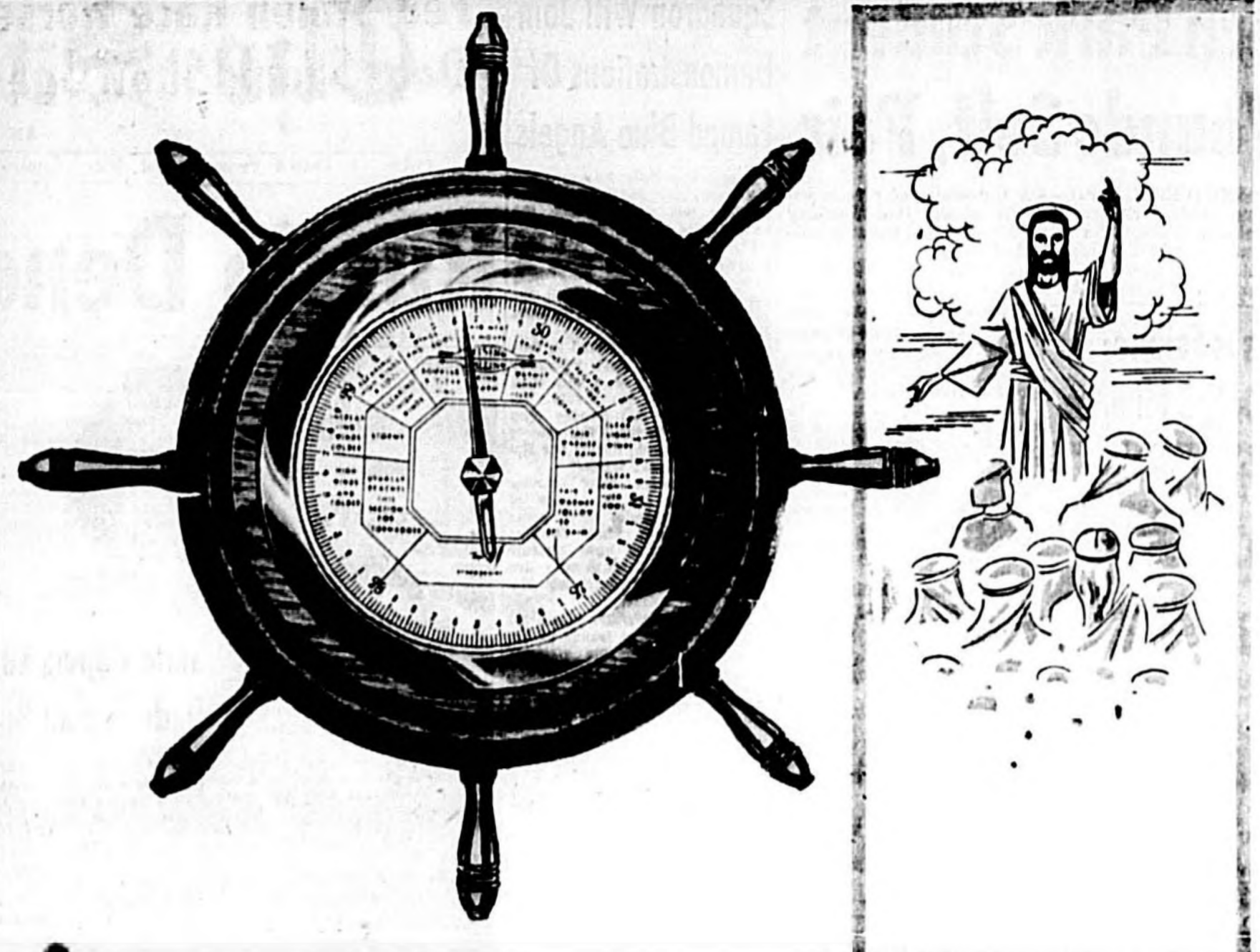

Fed Stolen Race Horses, Dogs Should Show Speed

MIAMI (UPI)—There's nothing like the horse meat being sold these days to the owners of racing dogs in Miami. It's race horse meat.

But the business was brought to a swift halt by police who arrested George B. Turner on charges of horse stealing. He was sentenced Thursday to two years in Prison. Turner was accused of butchering two race horses and delivering the meat to greyhound owners in the area.

James Wood, 35, who admitted helping Turner catch the horses, was sentenced to a year in jail and deliver the carcasses to greyhound owners, was acquitted. He said he thought Turner owned the horses.

Police arrested Turner after tracing him through the lucky cap of a 16-year-old boy who helped locate the horses.

The boy said the horses were taken from their pasture to a thicket about a mile away and killed. Then the meat was packed into boxes and delivered to greyhound owners.

Mr. and Mrs. Clayton E. Snow of Boca Raton, owners of the horses, valued the animals at \$10,000. Snow said the colts in foal could have been worth as much as \$30,000 a year when he grew to the age of four.

The mare, Bess Six, had been bred to the famous Counta Bit. Officers said Turner had been sentenced to life imprisonment in Georgia in 1941 for murder. He was later paroled and police said he had not been in any trouble since he moved here about seven years ago.

The Miami News commended the seven members of the School Board for their common sense and their courage, while the Miami Herald called the Board's action "a gesture to the inevitable."

Muscular, well-proportioned Greaves—a stalling, bob-wreaver who likes to feint and counter punch—won 140 bouts this year on knockouts over this Woodard (8) and Henry Brunko (1) on Jan. 19. That brought his record to 27 wins, 9 defeats and one draw. He registered 13 knockouts but never was stopped.

Fullmer also has a winning string of eight bouts. And he is campaigning vigorously to force champion Sugar Ray Robinson into a third "rubber" title fight or to face a fight with ex-champ Armen Basilio for the vacant case it vacated when Sugar Ray signs for a shot at Archie Moore's light heavyweight championship.

Bras For Bare Bosoms Bring Trouble

NEW YORK (UPI)—The producers of "Les Ballets Africains," a group of ethnic dancers from Africa, threatened today to make an international incident out of New York's sealing of the ad-libs of certain ladies of the ensemble to dance the native dances, they ad-lib something different at every performance, the management said. In order to ad-lib, they must be bare to the waist, a state of dress which comes naturally in Africa.

Two days after the troupe opened here, to high critical praise, the license commissioner ordered the dancers to bra their bosoms, as per New York law. The management complied but resented that the ad-libs—and necessary nudity—were not banned in Boston when the dancers were there. What's good for Boston is good for the country, it implied.

Furthermore, this is a blow to international cultural relations. It was expected that the new West African republic of Guinea would strongly protest the bosom ban to the U. S. State Department, the producer, Luben Vichey, said. He said he was "hopeful the State Department will take action when the government of Guinea puts in an official objection."

The group of native African dancers, doing the authentic dances of the wild forest, swamp, and thicket village, was put together as a ballet company seven years ago by Keita Fodeba. Now, Fodeba is minister of interior of newly independent Guinea, where bosoms are unbanned.

Fodeba has been notified of the New York sealing, Vichey said, and "We expect him to take the proper steps. This is the native dances—this is the people—how they are in Africa I have been shocked because I have been put on the level of burlesque. These dancers came here as goodwill ambassadors bringing the culture of their continent."

"They are used to performing uninhibited by a strip of cloth. They don't feel the same way. They have been laughing about it. They ask me, 'Why? I say don't ask me, just cover up. But it does have an effect on the performer.'"

Miss Chapman Here From Cuba

Ten years ago Virginia Chapman left Sanford to go to Cuba as a Methodist Missionary and now she has returned to spend another furlough at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Chapman.

She spoke of how information from Cuba had been censored under the past government and how the people received "the only fair news" from a Venezuela rebroadcast system operated by the Rebels.

In spite of the strafing upon Baguano, no one was killed and she quoted a Rebel soldier who said: "We are not shooting to kill. We only want them to surrender."

To show how early news had come from the Batista regime, Miss Chapman had a letter that she received in Nov. 1953 when she was in Havana doing study work with University students.

She was directed to "Americans living in Cuba" and appealed to their crusade for democracy in Cuba. A part of the letter read: "Batista garrison revolt" destroyed the democratic form of government and in its place a dictatorship was set up."

Until that day the people had feared the Army so much that they had behind locked doors when they were in town.

Miss Chapman described the eventful day of January 1st. It was a day of both fear and rejoicing for the people in her town. On that day Baguano was under attack by the Army and their planes strafed the town with machine guns and later used incendiary bombs that started a spectacular fire.

Although she has been in Baguano for two and a half years, she has "lived all over Cuba". She does social work and with five churches in her area she is kept busy. Miss Chapman says: "The Protestant Churches are growing" and recalled how one congregation in a small community once walked to Church in a downpour of rain, shoes in hand.

Mrs. Chapman is happy to have Virginia home. There had been delays in her mail and it is with relief that when she returns the first of March the fighting is over in Cuba.

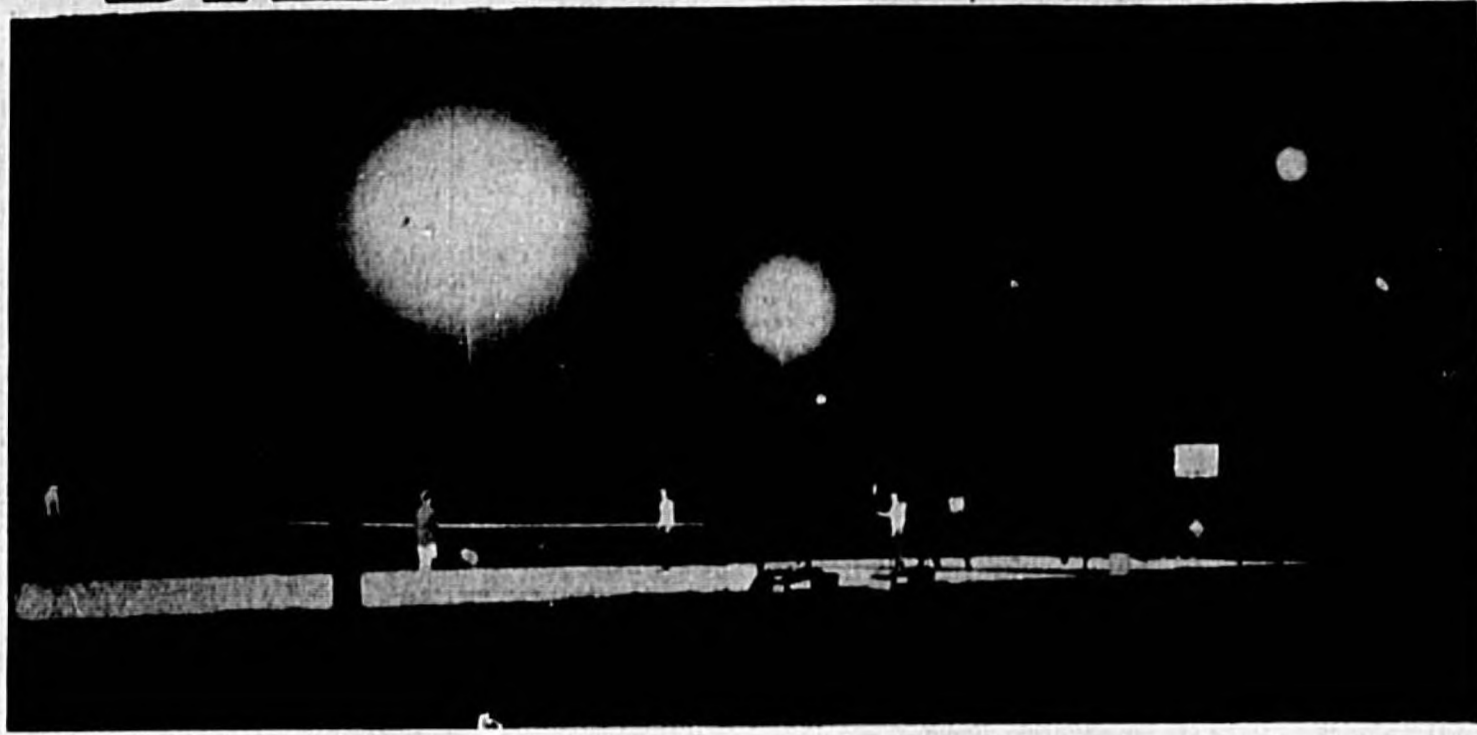

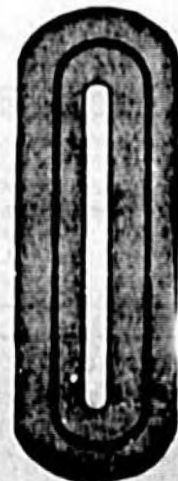
