

### Speedup Of Cadet Training Sought At Naval School

#### Plan Calls For Three Years Of Training Instead Of Four

 WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—Plans are afoot for the United States navy to streamline its naval academy course at Annapolis to three years to meet the demand for officers in the vast expansion of our sea power.

According to Grapevine information, Annapolis officials already have the new course mapped out and on less than 24-hour notice from the Navy Department could put the streamlining into effect to give our fighting ships 165 more ensigns a year than they're getting now.

The plan, of course, would have no effect on the 100 young men who are getting their stripes in June—but the second classmen (juniors), numbering more than 600, probably would be kept from their summer cruise to South America. Instead they would grind away in intense training and be graduated at midyear early in 1941.

The 1,200 other young men in the academy and the new class of plebes would be thrown into a speed-up curriculum of high-gear training.

A lot of the frills and furbelows of modern education would be dropped. The advanced courses in English, for example, probably would go overboard. You don't need a knowledge of restoration comedy to haul out orders from the bridge of a plunging cruiser or a familiarity with the verse forms of Beowulf to crack commands down an engine-room speaking tube.

Also tapped for dismissal are some of the foreign language courses. A lot of the social activities at the academy would be cut off. In the time thus saved, the young sea dogs would concentrate on technical studies, such as navigation, gunnery, electricity and steam.

It begins to appear that the country's rapidly expanding naval program already has created a shortage of young officers in the fleet.

It was partially to offset this that the order was issued that only those youngsters in the 1940 graduating class who are physically unfit will be allowed to resign. In the past, when there was no shortage of officers, the young men could resign on graduation.

The officers detached from the fleet for post-graduate study at the Annapolis post-graduate school also have been ordered back to active duty. A third measure to fill the gap was taken recently when many officers, retired from active duty for physical disability or some such were called to the academy to become instructors, releasing able officers for fleet duty.

One factor which has created the demand has been reconconditioning of a large number of World War destroyers. These are a little disparagingly referred to by some of the younger navy boys as a bunch of old cans and they are not to be used for anything at the moment but Atlantic patrol duty, but they have to be officered and manned just as well as the crack ships in the Pacific battle fleet.

If the order comes down to streamline and the academy training, it won't be the first time. During the World War, Annapolis was on such a schedule, turning out classes at midyear, the classes being known as 1917-A, 1917-B and so on.

Army officials say that plans for army expansion will not necessitate any changes at West Point. There during the World War, however, the officers' training course was virtually blighted; classes being graduated not only at the end of three years, but at the end of two, and one class, pushed out in November, 1918, had only a little more than a year's concentrated schooling. These youngsters, however, were returned to the academy later for further training.

Present army increase plans will create a demand for more officers, but reserve officers may be taken on for extended service of from six months to one year.

Learning Spanish

During the next few years there are bound to be increasing opportunities in Latin American countries for the youth of the United States.

Only yesterday a plan for the formation of a gigantic "cartel system" among all the American nations was announced in Washington.

Such economic ties, as well as the military co-operation which is being increasingly contemplated, will call for large numbers of young, intelligent Americans who can speak Spanish fluently and who know something of the history, traditions, and economic life of South American nations.

Smart young men will spend their spare time these days studying Spanish, reading up on South American history, and considering the possibilities of closer connections between the American continents.

Feeding Europe

For ten or twenty years, in varying degrees, the farmers of the United States have been struggling with the over-production problem.

With the war in Europe this state of affairs seems destined for a complete reversal. In Germany something like eight million men are said to be under arms.

By the beginning of winter Europe will be one vast poorhouse of starving populations unless the people of the United States can contrive to produce sufficient food to feed them and make arrangements to transport it across the Atlantic.

"Such a reversal of policy presents an even more formidable difficulty—that it would imply the abandonment of most of the system of subsidies which the New Deal has built up under the camouflage of soil conservation.

"And yet failure to grapple with this problem immediately may well expose the present Administration to bitter criticism, a few months hence, for failing to keep up with changing world conditions and for being indirectly responsible for the nation's food shortage, either in the event of American entry into the war, or in the event of a determined campaign to help relieve the starving millions in Europe."

### Germans Declare French Army Has Almost Collapsed

BERLIN, June 19.—(AP)—Striking an against broken France, the German military experts last night declared that fighting can be stopped only when the armistice is signed. The German press threateningly added that Britain would be next.

"The military collapse of France is swiftly progressing under the pressure of our relentless pursuit," said the high command.

"England, all the newspapers, Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, now stands completely silent. This is the reality of the hour in which Hitler and Mussolini sit together in Munich as representatives of the Europe of tomorrow."

Heid the news service Dienst am Deutschland:

"There is no reason to doubt that the German military measures are being pursued by the Germans in order to apply all available military weapons of force against England—originally designated as the main enemy."

But without reference to Munich, the high command showed how the German drive in the west was going on unabated.

These were among the recent German successes claimed:

The river Loire reached from Orléans to Nevers.

The Oise river crossed at several points between Caen on the channel coast and Le Mans.

France's great armament works at Le Creusot—her Ruhr district—seized.

The elaborate Maginot line defenses being pulled apart from all sides, after being severed yesterday from the rest of France by a German wedge reaching to the Swiss border.

The capture of 100,000 prisoners in yesterday's operations was claimed.

The British, he went on, cannot feel able to free France from her treaty obligations to fight on to the end with Britain.

"The French government," he said, "will be throwing away great opportunities and casting away their future if they do not sustain the war."

As for Mussolini, Churchill dismissed him with a taunt: "It is a general curiosity in the British fleet to find out whether the Italians are up to the level they were in the last war or whether they have fallen off."

He gave no hint of the future of the French fleet, which has operated under British general command since the war started, but in the House of Lords Viscount Calthorpe said he was confident the French would seek to remove every hindrance to continuation of the struggle by their British ally.

Moreover, French soldiers in London said they considered it probable that the French Near East and African armies would keep up resistance with air and naval forces operating from British bases, and government representatives established in England.

Churchill disclosed that only three British divisions were able to stand in line in the battle of France with the French; that the battle was lost before more could be re-equipped and transported after the disaster oflanders.

He spoke strongly against recriminations that he refused to accept distinctions between members of the present government; he put out "a quarrel between the past and the present."

He made it plain he wanted no disunity to result from attacks on former Prime Minister Chamberlain who still is a cabinet member.

Behind Pierce Corley's five-hit pitching, Sanford's Florida State League pitcher defeated St. Augustine, 6-1, last night before 1200 fans. This was one of the largest crowds to attend any state league game this year.

The Seminoles hit Charley Kane, former Winter Park boy who resides at Jacksonville, for nine base knocks, but five Saint errors contributed to his downfall. Kane reached three men and struck out three.

The Orlando Senators play here tonight and a large crowd is expected to attend. Although Orlando is now settled in seventh place, every effort possible is being made to hike their place in the standings.

Corley did not allow a run until the ninth inning. Then a single by Buddy Lake, his first of the night, and a prodigious double by White accounted for St. Augustine's lone tally and robbed Corley of a well-deserved shutout. Pierce struck out seven men and did not issue a free ticket to first.

Tater Marion, singled Red Roberts and Joe Justice in succession in the fourth inning with no outs, but all the Seminoles could do was push across one run.

## Arturo Godoy Says He Will Be Next Champion Of World

June 20 is already a red-letter day in my life. For I truly know that will be the day on which I achieve my supreme ambition, the winning of the world's heavyweight boxing championship. I shall beat Joe Louis.

Actually, I will be beating Louis again—for I honestly think I defeated him in Madison Square Garden last February. I was bewildered and surprised when the decision went against me. One of the officials, Tom Shortell, who died a month ago, and other sports experts thought as I did, that Arturo won.

But, enough of that. I must accept that decision. This time I will make it so decisive that there shall be no doubt. How shall I do it? Friends, I should be lying to you if I said now definitely that I will knock out Louis or that I will win instead by out-pointing him. That is something I cannot forecast. Who knows but that a perfectly placed and timed blow will enable me to knock out the champion?

But I can't guarantee in advance that I shall have the opportunity to put across such a perfectly placed and timed punch. Maybe the fight will go the 15-round distance in that big Yankee Stadium. Let me rather tell you confidently that I shall beat Louis. The method I shall adopt and the time it will take me to acquire victory will depend on such circumstances of action that I cannot predict.

Even the referee and one judge who voted against me in my first 15-round encounter with Louis admitted that the fight was virtually a draw for 10 rounds and that what ground I lost was lost in the closing rounds. I was tired.

That fight was the first I had had in eight months. I had been back in the States only a few weeks from my native Chile. I had hardly had time to become acclimated. And, to top it all, I developed a bad cold not many days before the fight. My temperature was 103. I had to forego several days of boxing when I needed it badly. I couldn't continue roadwork to strengthen my legs. My appetite was affected. I was not at my best and that is why I tired. I was so weary in the 14th round that I just jumped around and clowned to pass those three minutes.

I am in perfect shape now. And that is one reason why I am punching harder and with better timing. Some say I don't punch hard enough to knock Louis. Phooey! Arturo punches well. I have hurt many men, and a knockout punch depends more on exact placement and perfect timing than on power alone.

I have never been really hurt in the ring. None of the punches that Louis or Galento or others have hit me have ever troubled me. Yes, they have hurt, but they haven't hurt enough to trouble me. I have never been knocked out. That is why I am not afraid of Louis. Most of his challengers have been beaten before they left their dressing rooms. But not Arturo. I know I have nothing to fear. He is just another puncher and I can take his punches. Understand, I don't underestimate him. Louis is the greatest fighter I have ever met. His jab is fearful. You move this way, and it hits you. You move that way, and it hits you. And he hits terrifically with that right. He is a great fighter. That is the reason he has won champions so long. But Arturo will beat him.

How shall I fight him? That I cannot say. For, first, it would be giving away my battle plans.

And, secondly, what if I said that I would fight him in a crouch and then I later decided not to, well that would be deceiving you and I shall not do that. How I shall fight Louis depends on how I find him in the first round or so. My manager, Al Weiss, and my trainer, Whitey Binstein, and I have devised several methods of fighting Joe. Which method we shall adopt will depend on what method Louis employs. He doesn't know what we are going to do and we don't know what he is going to do.

The crouch that we devised for the first fight worked out well. How do we know that it will work again? I can't go into the fight with only one barrel loaded. I shall have several barrels and all will be loaded. Arturo is honest. And I tell you that I confidently expect to beat Louis and become next champion. Wait and see. I'll be glad to tell you that night that I told you so.
