MIAMI, Fla., Mar. 1.—(AP)—The balmy setting of the fistic fiasco had few redeeming points.

There have been more artistic failures than this Scott-Sharkey affair. Tex Rickard had his troubles at Toledo in 1919 and the boom town of Shelby, Montana was hard hit by the flop of the Dempsey-Gibbons bout there in the summer of 1935, but there at least had a glimmer of a championship struggle, no matter what the end tale in the box office.

The balmy setting of this winter's fistic fiasco had few, if any, redeeming features to offset its financial shortcomings. These might have been overlooked with a more magnificent gesture by the garden corporation had Jack Sharkey achieved a convincing and decisive victory over PHOT...

CITY GIVES OUT STATEMENT ON BOND AFFAIRS

statement contained in the letter. The letter states that the present alleged bonded debt of the city is \$8,212,000, yet an official audit of the city dated Sept. 29, 1929, shows only \$7,002,000 bonds and certificates of indebtedness outstanding, which were then considered legal obligation of the city. These included \$352,000 water bonds, which are in part self-supporting. I know of no bond issues since the date of this audit.
The letter further states that tax collections for a ten-year period showed an average of \$200,000 per year which is less than one half the amount necessary to meet our interest requirements alone. It does not show, however, that in addition to these tax revenues the city had income available from other sources, including the special assessment fund, which, according to the same and I mentioned for the year ended Sept. 30, 1929, is more than \$125,000.
Furthermore, the letter states that the city in its negotiations with the bond holders made an effort to have the representatives of the bond owners join with the city in having a survey of the city made with a view of determining, as near as may be, the ability of the city to pay. The bondholders' committee refused to entertain this suggestion.
This committee has requested the city commission to agree to confess judgment on its defaulted obligations and submit to the Federal court for impartial adjudication the question of the extent of the city's ability to pay. This would accomplish the identical thing that the city claims it is seeking and would give any decision reached the force of a judicial order. So far the city has not complied with this request.
The letter contains no suggestion whatsoever of what the city will do in the way of meeting its bondholders' half way. As the commission rightly states, the question is how much can the city pay, and it seems in the committee that it can best be determined, not by the interested parties but by an impartial judicial tribunal.
The bondholders' committee said yesterday that approximately \$5,000,000 of the city's bonds had been deposited with the commit-
