



## Pugilistic Hosts Of Garden Prepare To Quit Scene Of Flop

**Balmy Setting Of Fistic Fiasco Had Few Redemptive Points**

MIAMI, Fla., Mar. 1.—(AP)—Bag, baggage and ballyhoo, the pugilistic hosts of Madison Square Garden prepared to beat a strategic retreat today from the disastrous scene where the second battle of the coconut palms foul and flopped.

There have been more artistic failures than this Scott-Sharkey affair. Tex Rickard had his troubles at Toledo in 1919 and the boom town of Shelby, Montana, was hard hit by the loss of the Dempsey-Gibbons bout there in the summer of 1923 but these at least had plumes of a championship struggle, no matter what the sad tale in the box office.

The balmy setting of this winter's fistic fiasco had few, if any redeeming features to offset its financial shortcomings. These might have been overlooked with a more magnificent gesture by the garden corporation had Jack Sharkey achieved a convincing and decisive victory over P. H. Scott, the bald Briton who seems afflicted with chronic difficulty in the right scatric nerve. As it was, the battle of the minute's rest added no lustre to the heavyweight history.

Scott, all hands concede, no matter whether they think the Briton was fended, has been effectively removed as a heavyweight title contender. Thus the field is at least reduced by one in the wearisome and unprofitable series of elimination bouts since the retirement of Gene Tunney in the summer of 1928.

Sharkey, the once American hope, thumps a three-round victory over Scott under extraordinary circumstances, remains an uncertain figure as a fighter of genuine great possibilities but distinctly erratic, totals one if towering. Seemingly, this day was the nadir for this Jekyll and Hyde of tacticians to wage one of his "bad" fights.

Not only did he fail to justify the long odds in his favor but actually he came within a shade of losing on a foul and spending whatever hopes he had of winning world's championship from him.

The expert concession, as a result, is that Sharkey by no means figures to have any advantage over Max Schmeling, the German fighter whom they used as a schedule heavyweight titlist at New York. The bump-and-grind feature of annual oil-burn fund shows, sponsored by the mayor's committee, which Mrs. William Randolph Hearst is chairman.

Schmeling has been out of the ring since last summer when he finally trounced Paulino after obviously securing a technical knockout over Johnny Risko, who looked good enough on that day night against Victorio Campolo to have triumphed any one on the card, including the main bout participant. Schmeling, if he can reproduce the form he last showed in this country, is conceded an excellent chance by many experts to beat Sharkey.

The opinions over the Miami battle may be heard for some time to come, for they aroused new strains of patriotic bitterness, but these will not change the result. The Miami boxing commissioners made it clear that while they will accord Scott or his manager any reasonable hearing, they have no thought of reversing or reconsidering the verdict of Referee Lou Magoldie.

UNIVERSITY, Va., Mar. 1—(AP)—College fighters in the fourth annual southern conference boxing tournament. They battled through 10 bouts yesterday.

The last set of the afternoon brings the heavyweight duels of Tulane with Virginia; V. P. I. with Duke; Florida with V. M. I. and Clemson with Georgia.

Florida's men entered the second day of battle as leaders of the field after capturing six wins yesterday and last night. Virginia and Louisiana State University were in the second place, with five victories apiece, and V. M. I., North Carolina, and Duke had taken the box four times each. Tulane, Georgia and V. P. I. had registered masterly but twice each, and Sewannee once. The Generals of Washington and Lee were relegated to the bottom rung of the ladder after defeats in all engagements.
