## Nazi Forces Are Hurlled Back By French At Tunis

### Anglo-American Army Pushes Steadily Nearer Tunisian Enemy Navy Bases

(By Associated Press)  
The Anglo-American expeditionary force was reported rolling steadily nearer the Axis-held naval base at Bizerte and Tunis, where airborne Nazi reinforcements were said to be under orders from Hitler to hold at any cost. French troops near Tunis hurled back the Germans, the American coast there reported.

On the other side of the giant Allied "crisis" in the Mediterranean, Britain's triumphant Eighth army occupied the Libyan port of Derna, 150 miles east of Benghazi, and seized Tom Makili, 20 miles from Derna in continued pursuit of Marshal Rommel's broken Axis armies.

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## Meat Rationing Is Discussed At Nutrition Meet

### State Representative Attends Meeting Of Local Women

Education of housewives in a Share the Meat Campaign, in which a voluntary limit of one and one-half pounds of meat such as pork, beef, veal, lamb and mutton per adult person per week will be observed, in order that the Army, Navy and the allies of this country may be supplied, was outlined this morning by Mrs. Thelma G. Flanagan of Jacksonville as a representative of the State Nutrition Committee, to a gathering of 20 women, including housewives, home economic teachers, and members of the various committees of the home and community service of the Seminole County Defense Council, who met at the court house to discuss the campaign.

Mrs. Flanagan, who is also state superintendent of the W.P.A. feeding project, and is covering five central Florida counties in the preliminary block organizing plan, explained that the Seminole County organization will consist of 92 block leaders who will call on housewives throughout the county and explain to them the share of the meat rationing plan.

The Food Requirements Committee of the War Production Administration is instituting the voluntary curtailment of the amount of meat eaten, by civilians in order that the armed forces both at home and abroad will have the needs of the fighting allies met.

Even farmers who slaughter their own animals will be asked to limit the amount of essential meat they eat, either canning or freezing it, or reducing the amount of meat, turkey, or fish they desire as there is no request for reduction of these items, Mrs. Flanagan explained.

The voluntary two-and-a-half pound limit to meat eating during a week's time, will also include that eaten at restaurants, which will be requested to publish on menus the weight of each meat portion served to a customer, before it was cooked, not applying of course, to fish or chicken or non-essential meats.

This honor system of meat limit must be rigidly enforced, she said, and that all persons who dine out as guests, Mrs. Flanagan added.

"Our fighting men come first; it is patriotic to share the meat. It is fair for us to share and share alike," Mrs. Flanagan concluded.

### Wood Dealers To File Prices With Rationing Board

Prices of wood for fuel for the coal or steam must not exceed those charged last March. A. H. Peterson, secretary of the local price and rationing board, stated today, adding that wood dealers are subject to maximum price regulations and must file prices as of last March with the local board in accordance with OPA rules.

Many complaints have been received at the office that wood dealers are charging inflated and excessive prices, said Mr. Peterson. "No authorization has been given to raise wood prices higher than those charged last March. Some dealers are reported to be charging \$14 a cord for wood. This they cannot do unless they charged that amount in March. No arbitrary increase in prices is permitted."

Anyone knowing of instances of violation of wood prices as requested by Mr. Peterson to inform the local board, giving the name of the dealer, and also giving specific details.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (AP)—The Red Army killed more than 3,000 Germans in fresh fighting while holding solidly all along the winter front and taking the initiative at some points. A light German night attack was repulsed in Stalino.

A titanic smash of Japanese naval power was written into the record of American battle forces in the southwest Pacific today, when far across the world United States and British troop columns moved toward a showdown fight with the Axis in Tunisia.

In Washington, Navy Secretary Frank Knox said the United States and British troops had won the first round of the battle for Tunisia, as Madrid dispatches reported American and British paratroopers were fighting bitterly in the outskirts of Bizerte and Tunis.

### War Has No Effect On Sports Football Bowl "Matchmakers"

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—War hasn't had any effect on one of the sports matchmakers—the football bowl groups.

With the gridiron season nearing its end, those arranging these post-season extravaganzas are busy trying to outdo the other in lining up the most attractive management.

The Grapevine says the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans plans to pit Boston College against Georgia, or Georgia Tech. B. C. is unbeaten and apparently will finish that way, what with only Fordham, Boston University and Holy Cross remaining. Chances are that whichever Georgia team doesn't go to the Sugar Bowl may play in Miami's Orange Bowl.

At this distance, it appears that if New Orleans does get B. C. and Georgia, or Tech, it will have a pair that some of the other bowls can catch. And that includes the Rose Bowl. The fact that one of the teams in the Pasadena affair must be a Pacific Coast outfit has hampered it a recent years, since the coast league has rarely produced an unbeaten club. Stanford was an exception a couple of years ago, when all its games and best Ne-

braska on New Year's day. This year it is possible that the Rose Bowl rivals will be service teams, with the coast loop waiving its rule, or that one of the contestants will be a military squad, perhaps the Navy Pre-flight team at St. Mary's.

You must have heard last season, and again this fall, that no team affords its passer better protection than does Notre Dame. The Irish have one of the country's top throwers in Angelo Bertelli. He would be ranked high on any team, with or without good support. But the way Notre Dame guards him, he has all the time in the world to spot his receivers and pitch.

The Gator mentor, however, found the rest of the squad intact and devoted the drill to getting them limbered up for the rougher work to follow during the week.

In regard to Florida's loss of the state championship Saturday to Miami, Leah stated that the Hurricanes have a good ball club, but that "we had three good scoring chances to their two, yet they fished in on their's and we didn't."

Coach Bob Pitman attempted to put fire and speed in the backfield men at today's practice but found them a long offensive and defensive passing drill. Later the backs joined the linemen for a brief offensive dummy scrimmage which ended the work for the day.
