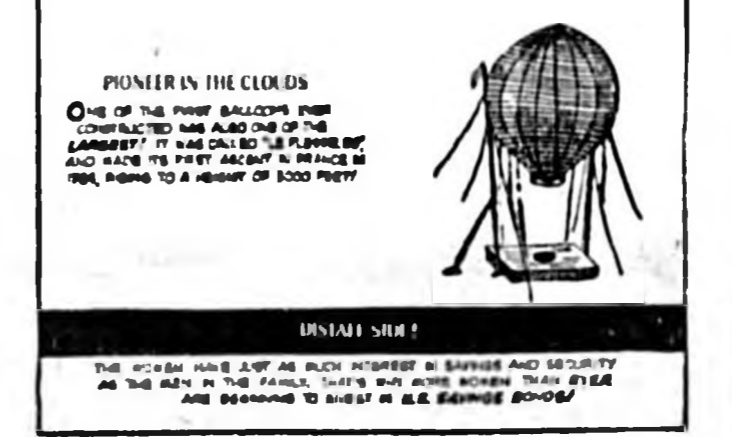

Communications were furnished by the Seminole County Sheriff's Department, the Florida Highway Patrol, and the Florida Fish and Game Commission.

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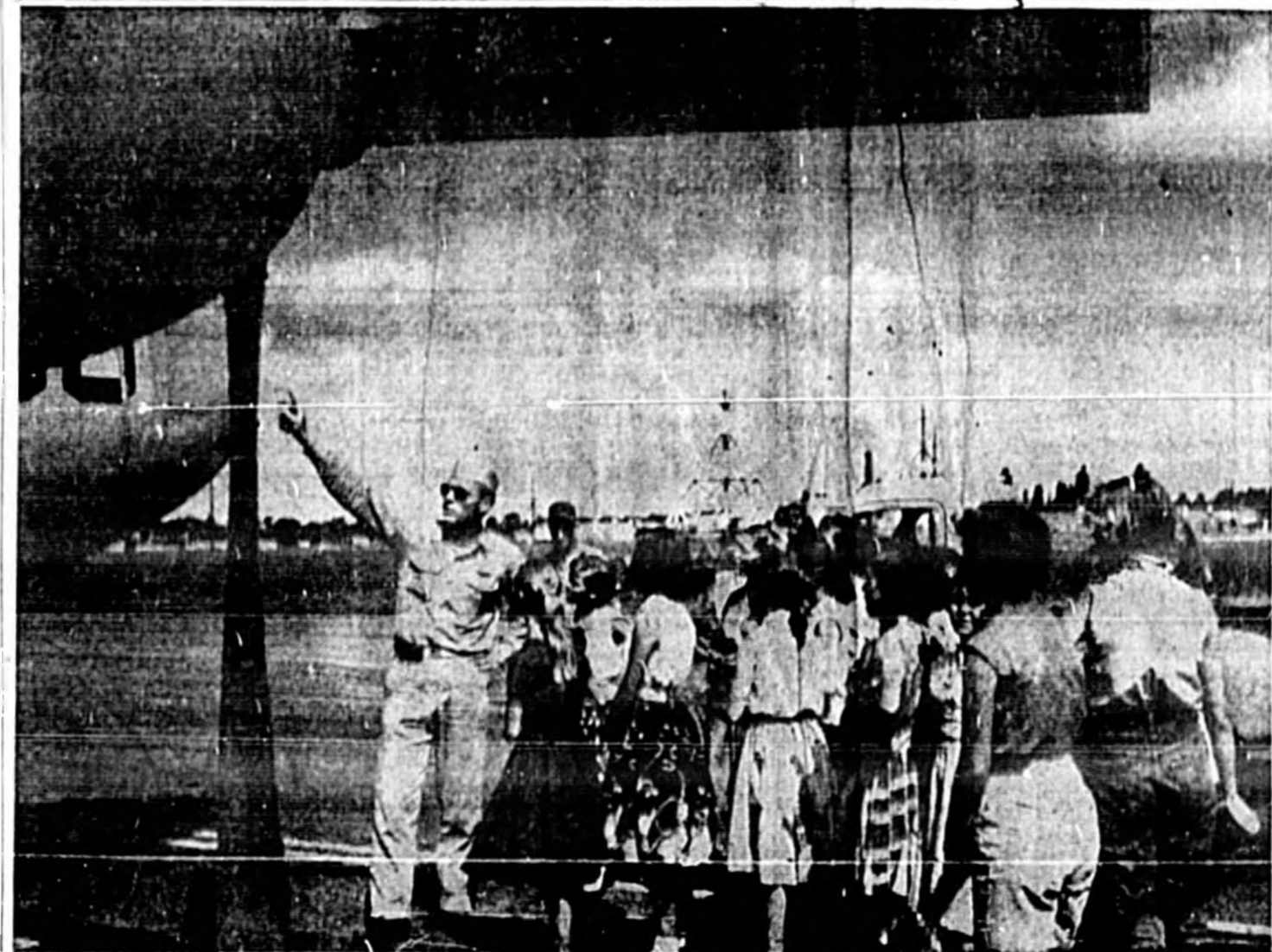

Lt. Beck demonstrated the helmet, life raft, parachute and all the other equipment which is attached to the pilot. They saw the fire markers, set off a flare, and blew the whistle that carries over water as well as at night, helping to locate a pilot down in the vast and dark sea. Oxygen was discussed and the effects that its lack has on the pilot.

Pointed out to the Girl Scouts were the AD Sky Warrior, the PV Neptune, and an F-103. Three girls at a time were allowed to inspect the AJ, guided by a most pleasant crew member. Stressed was the necessity of cooperation among the crew. The three men work as a team, not as individuals, and must have complete faith in each other.

The AEC said it was the first case of blast waves traveling through the atmosphere causing damage at such a distance. The AEC said it would check the damage reports to determine if they were test-related and accept claims for payment.

sewer system unless a sewage treatment plant was constructed to the satisfaction of the State Board of Health's sanitary engineer.

The first dispute was settled when Lee found that the Board of Sanford City Commissioners were dead earnest toward developing means for the construction of the treatment plant.

However, Lee recently refused to approve plans for a fringe area subdivision sewer system and lift station for George H. Garrison. The letter disapproving the sewer plans was addressed to the engineer for the Garrison project of more than 300 homes just outside the city limits on the Country Club Rd.

Lee told the subdivision engineer that "plans would not be approved until the City of Sanford produced definite evidence that a sewage treatment plant would be constructed."

The City of Sanford, through its City Manager, had given the developer prior approval to hook its sewer lines into the Sanford system.

Commissioners, for months, have been approaching the sewage treatment plant project with frequent reports from its fiscal agent, Wilson Holt but sufficient funds for the plant's construction could not be raised from the utility department's revenue.

City Commissioners view the State Board of Health order from Lee as alarming since it halts future construction and expansion of the city at a time when the financial condition of the city will not permit additional burden on its utility department and at a time when Sanford's growth is at an all-time peak.

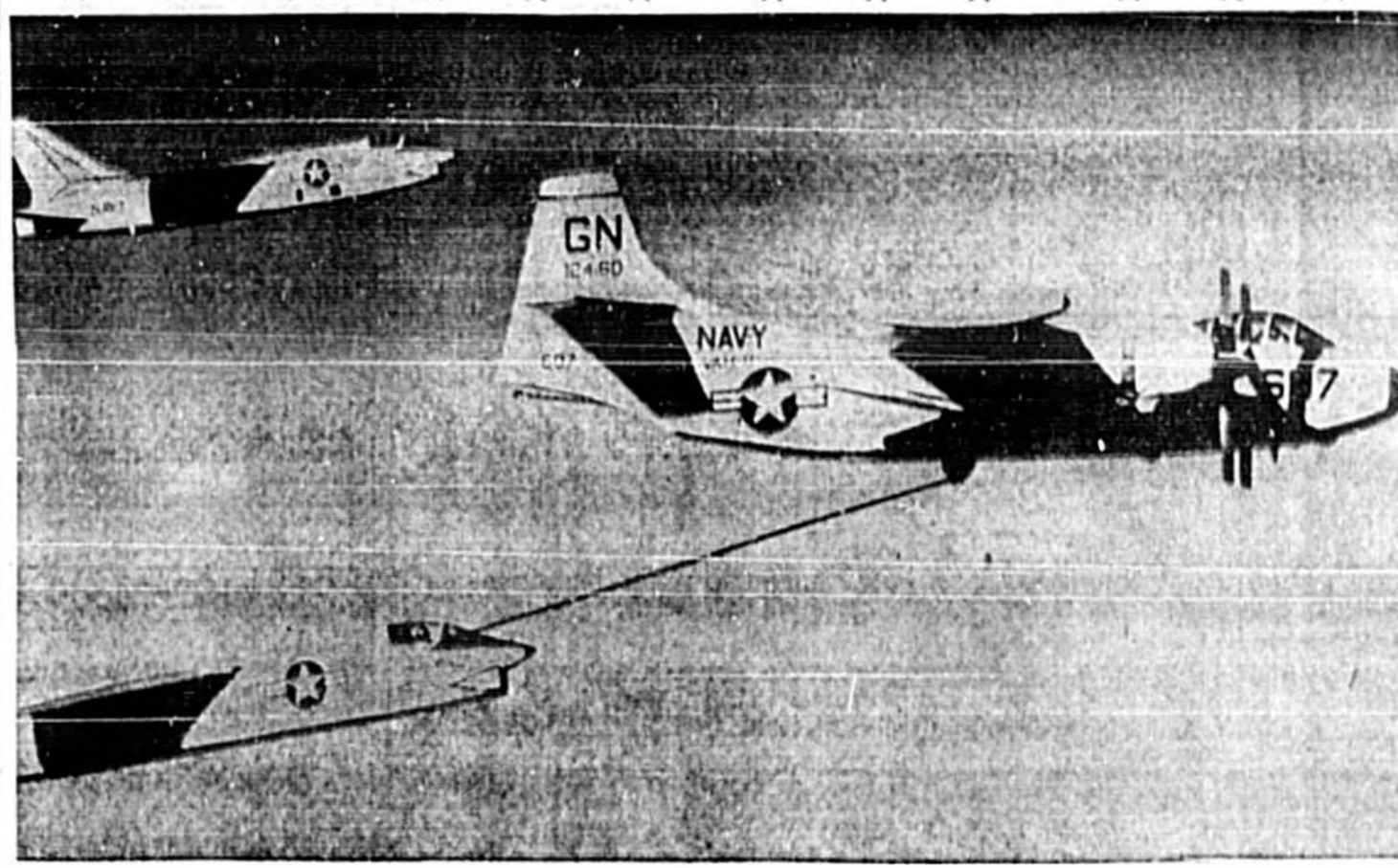
Most commissioners have expressed themselves toward disfavoring Lee's method of stopping construction of necessary expansion as "unfair" when every effort possible is being made to find ways and means of constructing the needed sewage treatment plant.

Five commissioners have expressed a desire to have the plant under construction "at the earliest possible date" and as soon as the financial condition of the Sanford Utility Department reaches the position that additional revenue certificates could be issued.

Preliminary reports said 56 persons were missing and feared dead in the crash and that 12 persons including the stewardess escaped with their lives.

2 Boys Hurt As Wagon Rolls In Front Of Car

Two children were injured this morning, shortly before 10 o'clock when the wagon in which they were playing rolled down a driveway from behind a hedge into the path of a moving automobile.

Eddie, 10, and Rickie, 8, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Edward M. Smith of 624 Catalina Drive, were playing in the driveway of a home across the street when the accident occurred.

The two children, along with another unharmed, whisked down the driveway from behind a hedge and into the path of an automobile driven by Mrs. Bert Hollingsworth, who had just picked up children from a nearby home to take them swimming along with her children also in the car.

Mrs. Hollingsworth had just pulled away from the curb when the three children dashed in front of her car and was unable to stop in time to keep from hitting them.

Eddie, the most seriously hurt of the two Smith children, was dragged 18 feet under the car, according to Sergeant Leo Rock of the Sanford Police Department who was investigating the accident. The 10-year-old youngster received two bruises and scratches on his body as it was raked across the pavement. It is possible that he may also have internal injuries.

Rickie received injuries about the forehead and mouth as well as several bruises of the knee and hand.

Both youngsters were taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment. It was revealed late this morning that the older youngster, Eddie Smith, was taken to Orange Memorial Hospital for further treatment.
