Forty per cent of the non\_fatal accidents occurred at night. The evidence is clear that a heavy proportion of night accidents are very serious.

# **Challenging Mysteries Within Self**

The International Geophysical Year is being vigorously touted as the greatest example of scientific teamwork in all his\_ tory. And so it is. Eighteen months hence, scientists will know vastly more about this planet and its relationship to the sun than they know now. Man will then he much better acquainted with the physical world In which he lives than he is with the marvel. ous brain that goes on quietly doing its work within his skull.

This is in no way meant to desparge the importance of the International Geophysical Year project. It is mentioned only to point up the fact that one of the greatest mysteries still confronting man is the mystery that goes on in his head. The human brain, des\_ cribed recently by a British archaeologist as that "convoluted mass of ten thousand million nerve cells which is by far the most complex instrument on earth," is a world more fascinating, in its way, than any the geophysicists can study.

This month and next a lot of vacationing speed is the gap between seeing distance and stopping distance. With average head\_ lights, for example, a driver going 65 miles an hour can distinguish objects only 198 feet ahead. Stopping distance at that speed is 306 feet on dry pavement. In other words, a driver going 65 at night will not be able to avoid hitting any object that pops into view ahead of him. Research shows that any nighttime speed over 50 miles per hour is distinctively hazardous.

This is good information for vacationers to study and digest before they start out on their annual trip. Holding nighttime speed down to 50 miles per hour may reduce the amount of territory that can be covered, but it will also boost the chance of getting

NEW YORK I - A Navy Jet fighter set a new transcontinental speed record today.

Marine Maj John Glenn Jr. took off from Los Alamitos Navel Air Station in California at 0.04:12.2 a m. e d t.

His F8U-1P Crusader fet was locked over the control hower at Floyd Bennett Naval Air Station tere at 12 27 206 p.m., an wlapsed time of three hours, 23 minutes, 5.4 seconds.

That beat by 21 minutes and 45.46 seconds the official record set March 9, 1935, by an Air Force tbit jet

Glenn slowed down for three refueling in flight, owr Grants. N. M., Emporia, Kans., and Coumhus Ohio.

His average speed was figured unofficially at 726.48 miles per hour for the 2,460-mile flight, about 60 m.p.h. faster than the speed of round at 45,000 feet.

The Navy had announced Glenn was trying for a "first supersonie speed record" across the continent It figured this would be set at an average speed of 760 miles pur hour, which is the speed of sound at sea level rather than at flight level. He failed by about five minutes.

Glenn broke through the sonie barrier at least four times in flight to maintain that average, after take off and after each refueling.


